Not too long ago a couple of well dressed gentlemen came storming into our office, and before they had time to introduce themselves one of them burst out with great enthusiasm, "We are going to sell some advertising for you, or let you sell it." And immediately they began opening their volumes of display, showing us what they had done for other papers. Their idea (which they had patented) was a large full page lay out on the advantages of people trading at home, with home merchants. This page was to run in the paper once a month, and they were to sell advertising space on that page to local merchants at about four dollars a throw, and for a years contract. Of course for their trouble they would get a very liberal percentage, which would be cash in advance.

The ideas were good. People should trade in their home communities. By buying from home concerns, they help build up the community, and patronize their neighbor instead of strangers. But, at the same time we did not feel under any obligation to pay these fellows any enormous sum of money to take it and high pressure local firms with it.

There are just two reasons why people should trade with their home merchants. In some towns it is their obligation to buy from local merchants, and in other towns it is a privilege,

If you have to pay more for your needs from local businessmen, then it is your obligation to trade there, because by so doing you help build up the town, and he p maintain local institutions If you do not intend to help build a community, why not move to a place you do want to build up? That is what U. S. officials have been asking people who are trying to tear down our country, and build up some other country. Why not just go to that beloved countr you are wanting to build up?


