First, we would like to say something about the conditions of the school, and its prospects.

There are approximately a thousand students enrolled in the school that we attend. There is a very crowded atmosphere around here.

The school does does have enough equipment for the number of students enrolled. The length of the course is about six weeks, and some of the students stay longer.

The chances of employment seem favorable, because there is a call for students every day, and today there was a call for 50 graduates to go to work at Consolidated Aircraft in California. Douglas, Lockheed, and North American Aircraft Factories put in a call for men very frequently.

There is a course, preliminary, that requires a lot of

The bale was bought by Louis Peeler at the gin, at 16.50 which is almost one cent above market price. A merchant's premium was given him, the contributors to which was as follows: E. H. Jones \$2.00, G. B. Jones 1.50, T. E. Verner 1.50, James Rucker 2.50, Cicero Smith 2.00, W. A. Wisenhunt 50c, Meadow Drug 1.00, W. H. Hand 5.00, Lackey Chevrolet 1.00, H. C. Boyd 50c, John Roberts 50c, A. E. Richards 1.00, and W. M. Turnbough a free bill of laundry.

The cotton was gathered almost two weeks ago, but it was damp when he brought it in, and the rains started, so it was not ginned until Monday.

The weather most of this week has been ideal, with a slight wind, and the sun shining most of the time. A small shower fell Thursday morning, but soon the clouds drifted away, and local farmers are now wishing for at least 90 days of warm, dry days, so that they may proceed with the harvesting of their crops without further delay.
