Since Mrs. McDonald's death in 1966, he has kept a clean house, cooked his own meals, mows his own yard, and raises a garden.

He served eight years on the city council, eight years as the city trustee. He has served as Deacon in the Baptist Church for fifty-six years, he has served as a Sunday School teacher, and was a member of the building committee.

All of Mr. McDonald's neighbors say "He has been a good neighbor and friend for many years. They just don't make his equal anymore."

## Area Mail Processing

Mrs. Cliffogene Watt, postmaster, announced today that the newest innovation of the United States Postal Service - Area Mail Processing - is to be installed at the Stephenville, Texas, post office within the next two weeks.

This was announced today by Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General, Southern Postal Region, which covers the Southern United States from Texas to Florida.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain a maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Stephenville's modern post office," Ulsaker said.

One electric cancelling machine is available at the Stephenville Post Office to move the increased mail volume from the associate offices.

"The Stephenville Post Office," Ulsaker pointed out, "is a Sectional Center Facility, and the new system will revolve entirely around that capacity and that function."

"The program will take effect June 24," he said.

Area mail is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center Area, including any or all of the associate offices of the Sectional Center Facility, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes or the out-of-town letter drops at the associate offices will be transferred to the SCF for processing and will bear the postmark designated for the SCF area.

The Stephenville SCF postmark will read, "U.S. Postal Service, Tx 764", along with the date and AM - PM designation. The city postmark of Stephenville and each individual associate office will not be changed.

Mail deposited in a designated drop unit at a post office or a letter box labeled "For Local Cancellation Only" will be postmarked at the local office of origin with the name of that office. Each Postmaster will have deposit boxes and letter drop units designated for this purpose. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

It was emphasized by Ulsaker that no office will lose its local postmark.

He asked specifically that customers no longer use the word "City" as an address in place of the name of the city of destination. "Obviously," he said, "in this new system, a letter with just 'city' could lose its identity."

Post offices affected by this program in the Stephenville area are: Albany, Cisco, Comanche, Cross Plains, DeLeon, Dublin, Eastland, Gorman, Hico, Ranger, Rising Star.

## Cable TV System For Rising Star

The city council of Rising Star is considering letting a franchise for a cable TV system for the city.

A public meeting will be held at the high school gym at 7:30 p.m. June 27. Mr. J.M. McHan from Brownwood TV cable service will be at the meeting to answer questions.

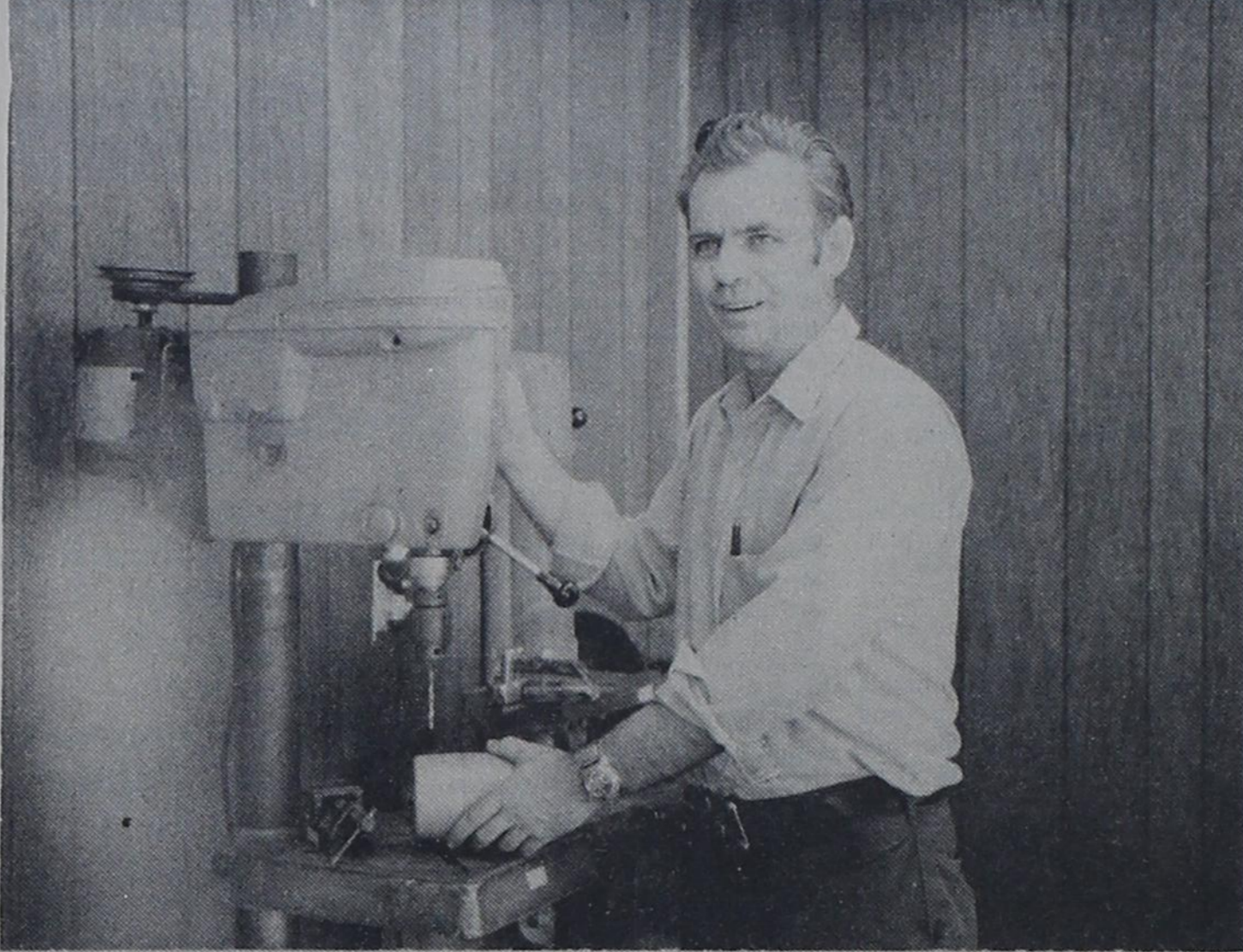

The first meeting of this family reunion occurred at this same place in June 1950.

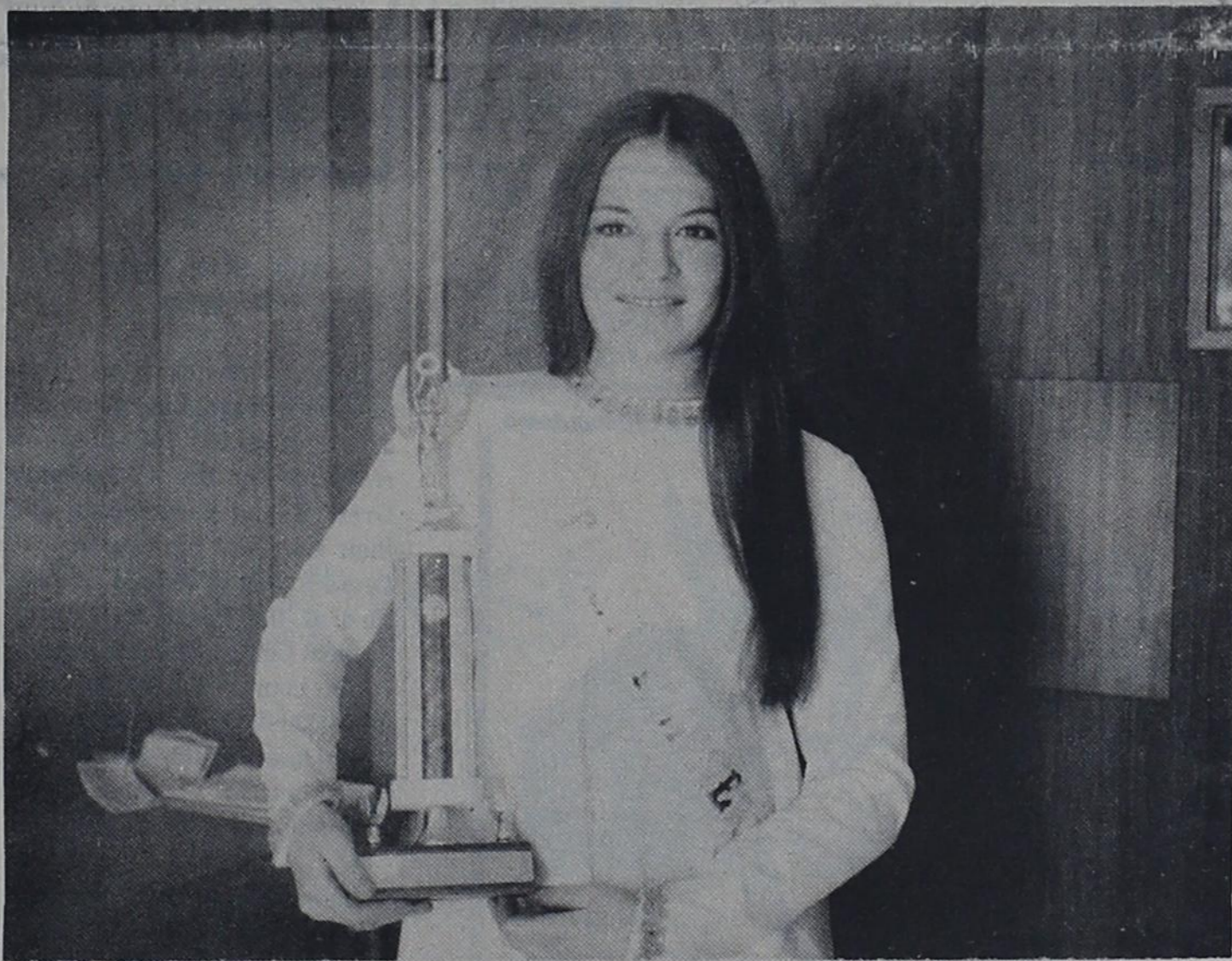
There were 61 members of the family present at this year's meeting.

Aviation being fairly new, only 65 to 70 years old, creates problems to the General Public. Noise, crashes, near misses, high density traffic near major airports are only a few of the problems. You may think, "I wouldn't ride in one of those small airplanes, they are too dangerous." Just how

dangerous are these small aircraft? Sure, there are crashes, maybe one or two every three or four weeks. These seem to make the newspapers all over the country. How about fatal automobile crashes! Only approximately 20 to 25 per day throughout the United States. And in most cars there are three or four people who die. I read the newspapers pretty regular and I don't see all of these in glaring front page headlines.

Automobiles are put together on an assembly line and some how they seem to make the parts fit. Sometimes the doors don't close properly, one fender may be an inch longer than the other, the engine sometimes runs when you try to start it, it guzzles gas at 12 to 14 miles to the gallon.

Small aircraft on the other hand are almost completely hand made. Each rivet goes into a specific location. Each part must fit exactly. Each and every part is tested, and X-rayed for stress, strain and flaws. Each aircraft is thoroughly tested until it is a work of perfection. The engines are good for 2,000 hours before needing an overhaul. This is the equivalent of over 250,000 miles. Can your car do this? The typical small airplane flies over 100 miles per hour burning less than five gallons of gas averaging between 20 to 25 miles to the gallon. Try that in your beetle.

Now you start to say, "Well when the engine on my car quits, I can pull over to the side of the road and stop." This is true, you can't do this in an airplane, but a good safe pilot never runs out of gas. He

knows how far his plane will travel on the amount of gas carried, he knows enough to land when it does get low. But say that the engine does quit. What do you do? Easy. An airplane will not just 'fall' out of the sky. An airplane will glide to anywhere within a 10 to 15 mile area. Look for a fairly good flat large field. Make a normal traffic pattern and land. It may be rough and may even damage the landing gear but it is a safe landing if done properly.

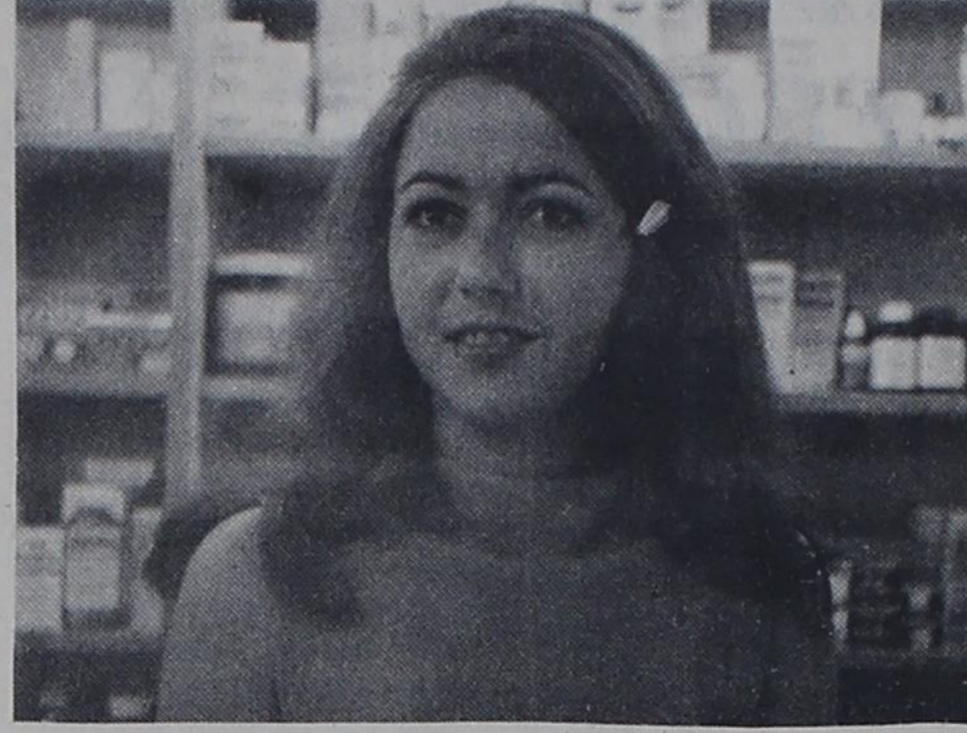
This brings up another point of view, Pilot Error. There are instances where pilots do not have the skill or the know how in an emergency. He may get into bad weather, get lost or run out of fuel. Now stop and think. How many times have you continued to drive at 70 miles per hour because that is the speed limit, even though it is raining and you can't see ten feet in front of your car? Ever get lost in your car or run out of gas? Very few people can never honestly say no to these questions.

There is a saying in aviation circles, "There are Old Pilots and Bold Pilots, but there are no Old Bold Pilots". I am as safety conscious as almost all pilots in the world. I carefully map where I am going, check the weather faithfully, preflight my airplane checking every detail to be sure it is safe, and fly like the sky is full of airplanes although I may never even see one in a four or five hundred mile flight.

Next week I will continue further into the world of aviation and in closing this article, ask help from all of you to make this a successful column in your newspaper.

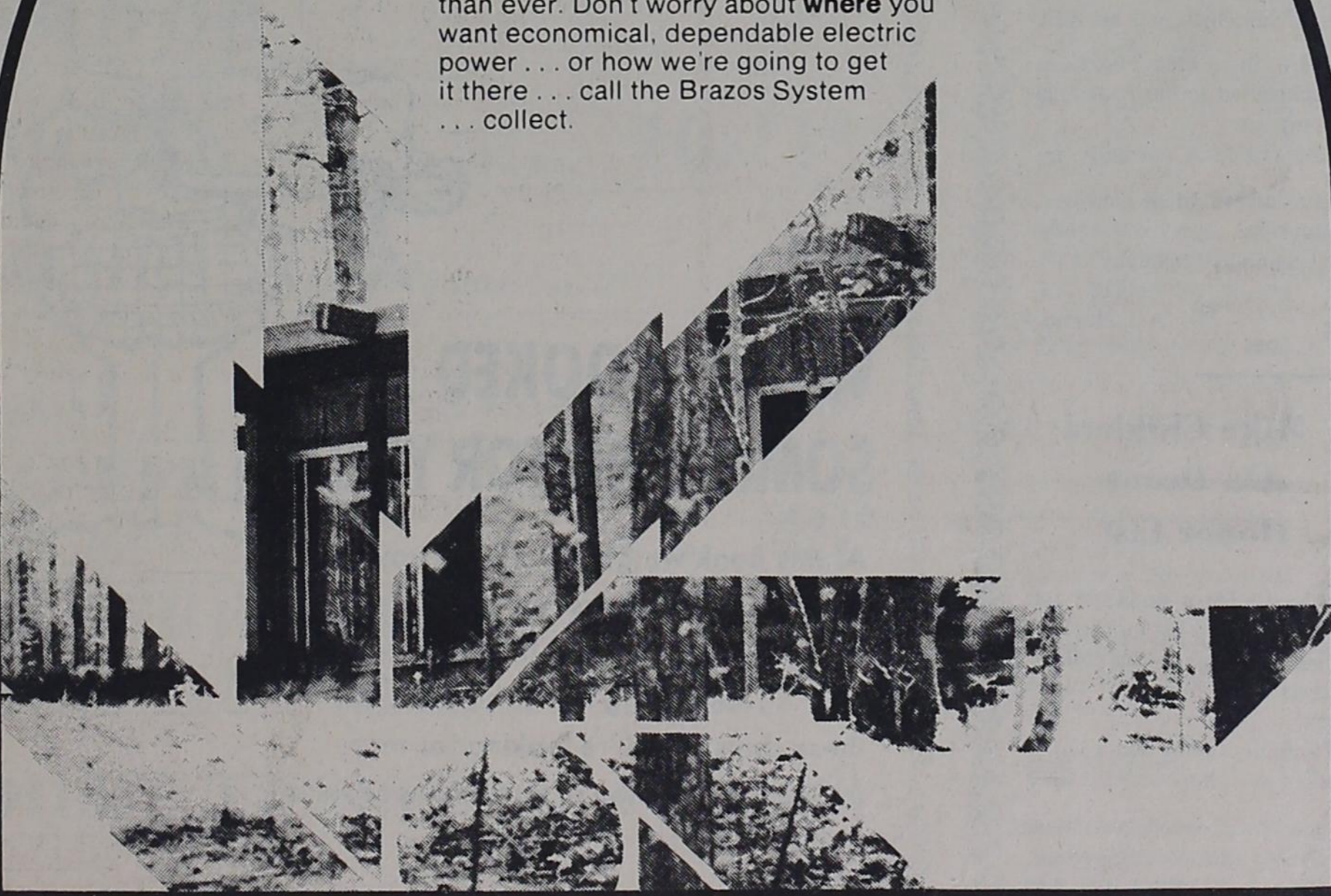

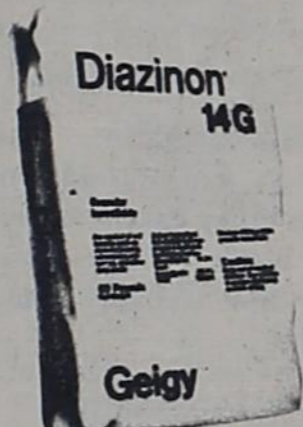
Oak is one of the most popular hardwoods commonly used today. It is a tight-grained wood, so staining is somewhat difficult. Once applied, however, a stain on oak will last for years. Spanish furniture is made primarily of oak stock.

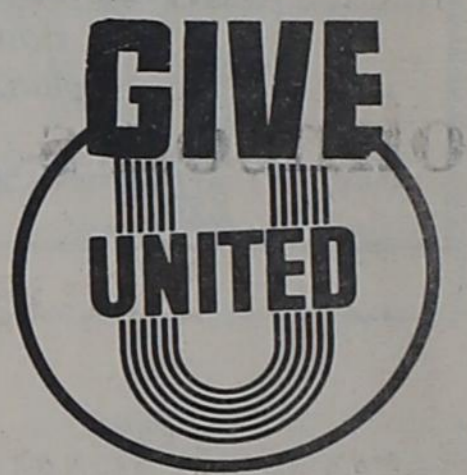

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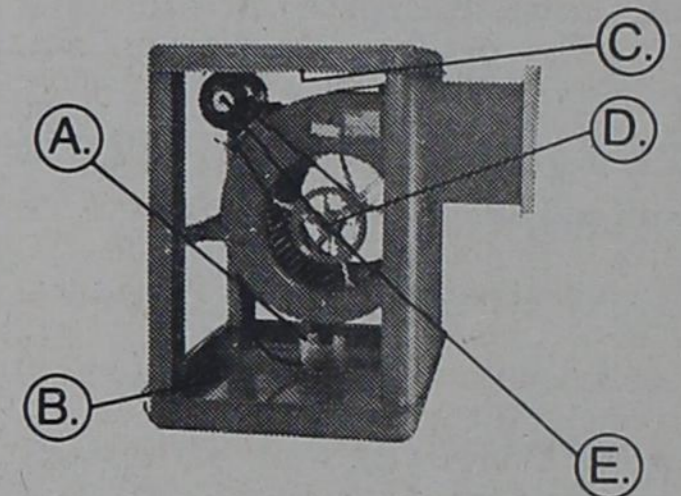

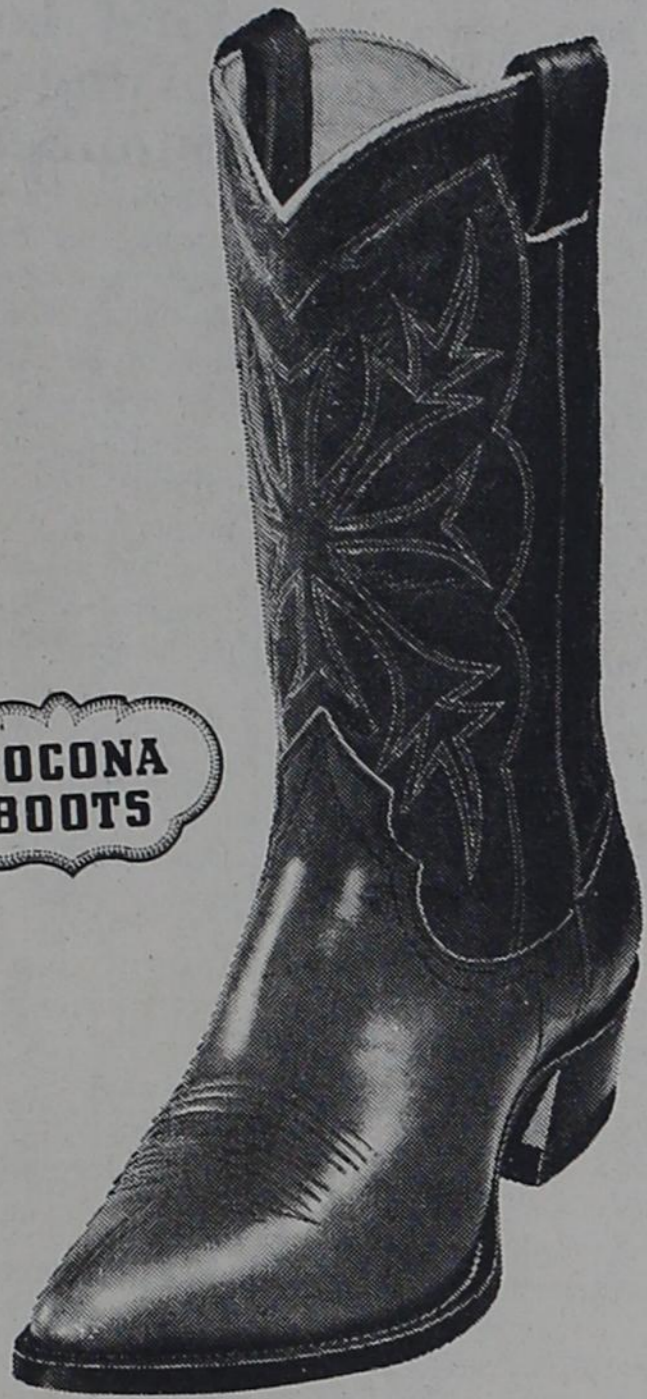

#### Texas Farmers Union Plans Trip To Austin

Concerned farmers and ranchers will visit members of the legislature during the special session on Tuesday, June 20. Texas Farmers Union is planning a "Drive-In" to Austin and members from across the state will spend a full day talking with legislators on important state legislation including trailer safety legislation changes, additional funds for the screwworm eradication program, and the need for property tax reform.

The farmer-day in Austin will begin with a breakfast at 7:00 a.m. at the Downtowner Motel near the Capitol. Following a briefing by Farmers Union staff members, teams of rural men and women will visit members of the House and Senate on key issues affecting rural Texans.

Farmers Union has called on Governor Smith and members of the legislature to bring about meaningful reform to the trailer safety law passed in the last legislature, and to do something about the recent serious outbreak of screwworm infestation. Farmers Union supports legislation to give farmers and ranchers ad valorem tax relief and has insisted that the legislature pass a corporate profits tax. Texas Farmers Union president Jay Naman of Waco says that the "Drive-In" of farmers and ranchers to Austin is the beginning of a continuing program that will "recur many times in the next regular

## Screwworm Cases Reported In County

Two cases of screwworms were found in Eastland County last week reported County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. He said there were the first confirmed cases of screwworms in Eastland County in six or seven years.

One case was found near Gorman and the other near Rising Star. The confirmed cases are being treated by releasing sterile flies. These sterile flies mate with native screwworm flies causing the flies' eggs to be infertile. "Hot-spot" treatments consists of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case. Fly releases are also being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile in a major portion of Eastland County.

Weather condition were favorable for heavy screwworm buildups last winter in northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest, explains the agent. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive

screwworm invasion. According to Gordon, more than 5,000 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring and summer, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak - 200 million a week - treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest. Gordon urges all livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) to follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestations. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels

## 'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and safety tips to drivers preparing for summer vacation trips or, traditionally, just more time on the open road:

- Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near the minimum safe tread depth of 1/16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.
- If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.
- Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but never exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.
- Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.
- Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.
- Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disablement.
- When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.
- Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.
- Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting out.
- Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.
- Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage. You'll like the folks at

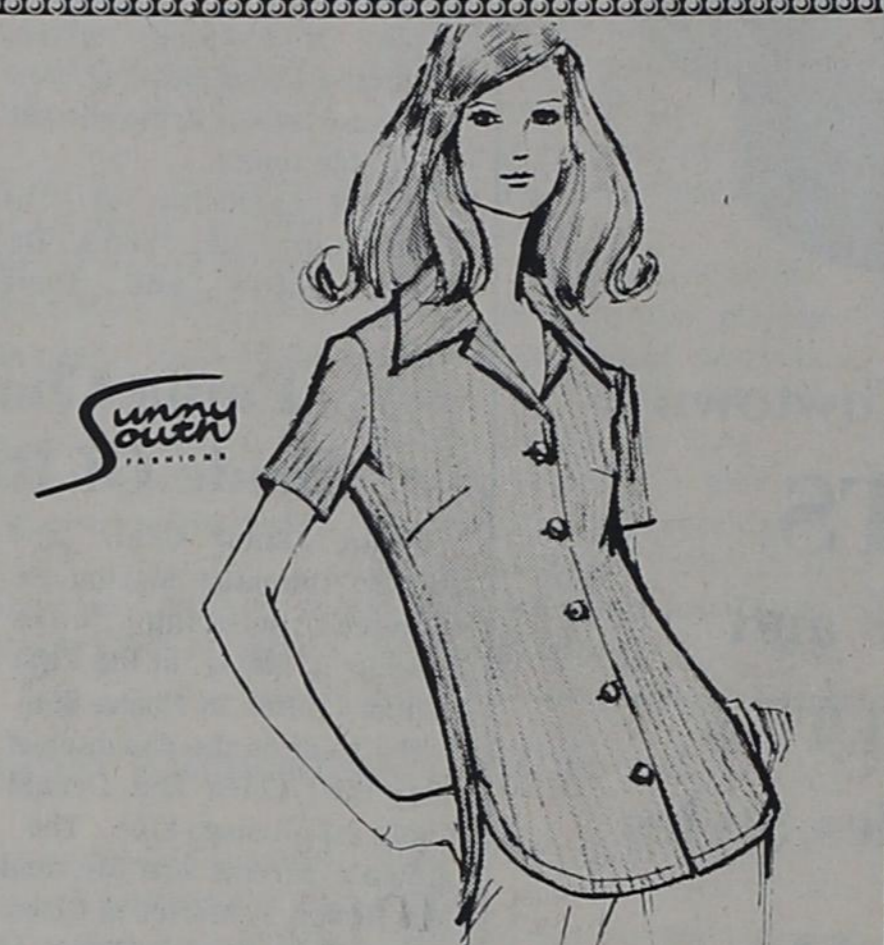
