Pioneer Baptists Erect New Ed Building

Under the theme of "Sharing Good News", the Rising Star Church of Christ announces a series of special evangelistic meetings for August 5-11.

The speaker for these services is Lee Peters, Minister with the Church of Christ in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma.

Owen Aikin, preacher for the Rising Star Church of Christ, states that at the present time when so many are losing confidence in religion, government and in each other, it was felt absolutely essential that the simple, powerful truths of the Gospel of Christ be emphasized before the world.

"We would like to urge all of our friends and neighbors in this area to attend these special meetings, both morning and evening", says Aikin.

Drouth Triggers Outbreak Of Corn Borer

AUSTIN--Agriculture Commission John C. White reported that hot, dry weather seems to have triggered one of the worst outbreaks of lesser cornstalk borers in recent years in Central Texas peanut fields.

According to a progress report issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture on the status of the corn borer, practically all fields have damaging infestations, with a few fields running as high as 65 percent infestation. Dry land peanuts, where the lesser cornstalk borer is harder to control, have higher infestations than irrigated fields.

The corn borer is a subterranean insect which is capable of reducing peanut yields as much as 70 percent. The insect

is widespread, hard to detect and feeds by drilling holes into the plant. Plants then become weakened and can be destroyed by diseases and other insects.

White said that a majority of the irrigated acreage has been treated for the corn borer, but lack of available moisture makes dry land treatment very difficult. The DeLeon Research Lab reported that treated fields should be checked again within 15 days to see if reinfestation has occurred.

Commissioner White urged all farmers to carefully check their fields before applying an insecticide and treat only if needed. He added that insecticides should be used according to directions and within the amounts specified.

The name unanimously selected is CONCERNED CITIZENS OF TEXAS. The membership has pledged to continue the fight against the Equal Rights Amendment which has already been added to the yet to be approved new Texas Constitution via the Bill of Rights.

Officers elected at the birth of the new organization are: president Mrs. Cowan Hutton of Pioneer, vice president in charge of speaking engage-

ments--Mrs. L.E. Nixon of Cross Plains, secretary--Jeanetta S. Creamer of Cottonwood, treasurer--Mr. O.B. Hughes also of Cottonwood and publicity chairman--Mrs. Homer Don Parson of the Pioneer-Sabanno sector.

Mr. John G. Lee, pastor of the Bible Baptist Church of Rising Star, declined office, expressing the need to organize such a group in Rising Star to alert the public of the drastic measures included in the very innocent sounding ERA.

Mrs. Glenn Vaughn and Mrs. J.D. Hutton (nee Sandy Linney) taped the message of the night for those who asked that this be done.

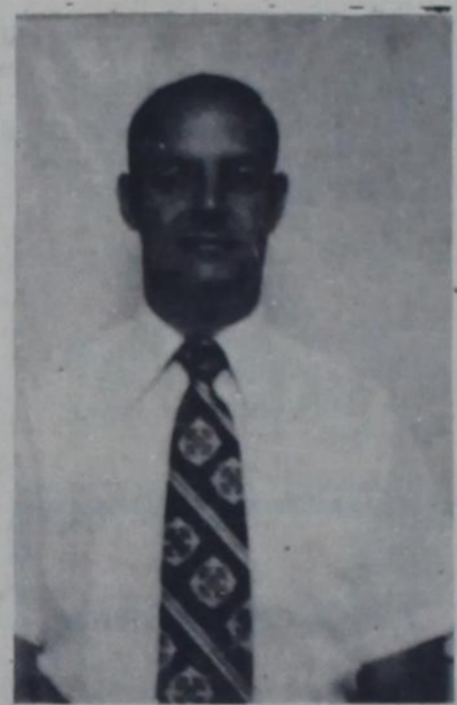

"To be born in America is an accident, to live in America is a privilege. To die in and for America and to leave it to our children is both a duty and responsibility."

These parting words by a "People-to-People" representative in a briefing before we left Houston for Amsterdam have rung loud and clear throughout our entire tour, especially in the Soviet Union.

After spending eight days in virtual isolation of news from the "Free World", our hearts breathed a sigh of relief upon entering Berlin and tuning into an English speaking military radio station with world and U.S. news each half hour.

Then again upon arrival in New York, our hearts were made grateful for a safe return to our country.

The joy welled higher, despite the tiring 24 hour day (we left Madrid at 2:15 p.m., arriving New York at 3:45 p.m.--gaining seven hours there and another hour in Texas) as we arrived in our own state of Texas via New Orleans.

Needless to say, the big moment came when we flew over beautiful Eastland County and Lake Leon and were reunited with our children and family at the local airport. (Coverage of trip in following issues)

To Participants In The Work of People-To-People Travel

It is always an inspiration for me to talk to a group of people who are banded together to extend friendship and to strengthen friendship around the world.

People-to-People is not a regimented organization. It encourages you to merely carry out one of the finest duties a citizen can possibly perform. It is to make others in other lands understand that we are peaceful and to gain from them the conviction that they are likewise peaceful and want to know more about us.

What I am trying to say is that each of us can join People-to-People very profitably. Each of us can find a friend. Or we can do something to support those who are trying to make friends because there is reward in the satisfaction that you have done something to remove the misunderstanding, suspicion, and prejudice from this world.

Because, you see, everyone who has traveled extensively knows this--that no people wants war. Every single people in the world, including the Red Chinese, do not want to be marched up to the battleline and be mowed down and lose their lives.

Why, then, we ask with people sharing this common and noble aspiration, why do we have misunderstandings? Well, it comes about unquestionably by our parochialism, brought about possibly by false political leaders who either misunderstand others or misinterpret the opinions of others and the feelings of others to us.

So People-to-People proposes merely to jump the government. By the way, I am not by any means criticizing governments. Each government thinks it is interpreting unquestionably the aspirations and loftiest ideal of its own people. But we have not yet come to the point where government, with their selfish and parochial viewpoints, can exploit and make full use of this universal longing for peace. So

we jump that. We make it Joe Doakes with Jose Lopez or any other person. And by doing so we add just that much to the understanding that we need. Because, while mutual understanding of itself will not create peace, no universal and just peace is possible without understanding.

I do not know of a single war-monger in this country. We have paid a fearful price in blood and treasure, and we have, since the close of World War II, devoted a great deal of effort and treasure to trying to help others in their education, in raising their standards of living, so that they too can enjoy more of the fruit that the world may produce if we don't have to waste so much money on war or on defense against war.

I feel this so deeply that I do not believe there is any more valuable movement in the world. And People-to-People is trying to be helpful. And, by helping, can vastly multiply the great good that is being done by all the special organizations for peace in the world.

My sincere appreciation to each and every one of you for the personal contribution you are making to International Understanding. With more and more Americans like you, our hopes, aims and goals will be reached much sooner than any of us anticipated and truly "Understanding Between People" will be the Passport to Peace."

If Christianity is to right the world, and many of us believe it can, then we must first put ourselves right.

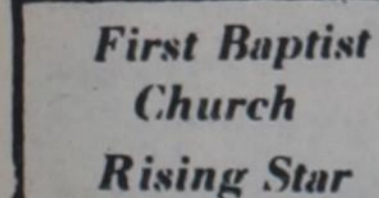
Christianity, as a living movement, saved civilization when the Roman Empire fell.

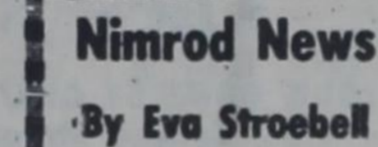
