Hazards of Holiday Driving Noted

AUSTIN--Memorial Day weekend signals the start of the summer vacation season and increased dangers to motorists, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, urged drivers to exercise caution during the upcoming holiday weekend and throughout the summer.

"During the vacation season, more motorists will be exposed to highway driving hazards," Adams said. "Heading the traffic laws, wearing seat belts, and staying alert for drunk drivers is the best defense for avoiding an accident."

The DPS director requested the assistance of Texas drivers in minimizing traffic deaths.

Statewide traffic fatalities are now about 13% below the number for the same period last year," Adams pointed out. "But we also have to remember that the potential for additional fatalities during any holiday weekend is great and we must adjust our driving habits and attitudes accordingly."

A total of 58 traffic deaths resulted from accidents during the Memorial Day weekend in 1982.

"Troopers will be on the lookout for hazardous violations over the Memorial Day weekend in an effort to prevent accidents and we do not intend to relax our efforts to arrest drunk drivers and cite speeders," Adams said. "These two violations continue to cause most of the traffic fatalities in our state."

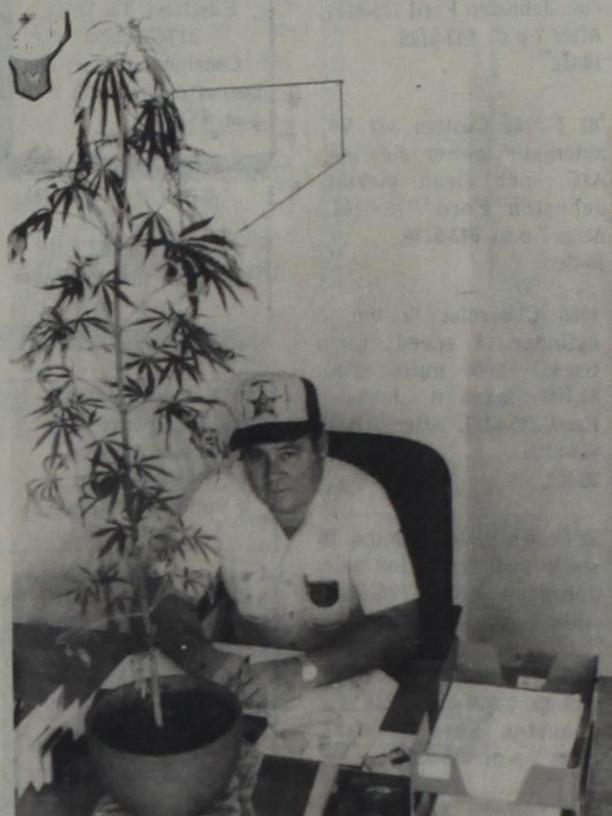
Learn to Identify and Report Marijuana Plants

Constable Gene Hicks has three pots of marijuana plants for public viewing in his office at 116 S. Main St. The plants range in size from 20 inches to four and one half feet tall. Constable Hicks stated that he has transplanted these plants as an aid to educating the public and promoting general awareness of what the growing plants look like.

Area farmers, ranchers, landowners and even residents inside the city limits of Rising Star are encouraged to learn to be able to spot growing marijuana plants and to report any sightings to a law enforcement agency, Hick said. He urges area residents to take part in putting a stop to the growing of marijuana in this area.

The site from which the potted marijuana plants were taken is not being released pending further investigation by the constable.

When you stop by the constable's office to see the plants, Hicks and Justice of the Peace Tex Evans invite you to step inside and see the changes they have made. With the permission of the building owner and at their personal ex-

pense, Hicks and Evans have put up partitions, changing what was once one large room into two offices, a hallway and a courtroom.

Going into the building, the office of the Justice of the Peace is on the left and the office of the Constable is on the right. Straight down the entrance hallway is the courtroom, which already has folding

chairs to seat the jury, tables for the use of attorneys and a desk and chair for the presiding officer of the J.P. court.

Both Constable Hicks and Justice Evans are available to the public day and night. Their office telephone is 643-7401 and they may be reached by Eastland County Dispatch (629-1728) when not in their offices.

The City Council met in special meeting Monday night, May 23, the study the utility bills and working of water and gas meters. This was a result of having met with Jerry Graham of Dynamic Production, Inc. (one of the suppliers of city gas) and Charles Taylor of Farmers Home Administration. These two men represent the two largest debits. Both gentlemen have instructed the City Council that the utility rates will have to be increased to put our city on a paying bases.

The first step the Council has taken is to place every business and home on a working meter. This includes all working water and gas meters.

Coy Rankin has agreed to do this for the city.

Our next step is to remove our complimentary supply of water to our churches and parsonages at the minimum rate and water meters will be read starting June 15.

We are informing you at this time that utility rates will increase soon. We will notify you of this as soon as the Auditor completes our books and and '83-'84 budget is accepted.

Let me assure you that this utility increase will be no more than that will be required to meet our monthly payments.

The City Council and I are urging you to continue your present support and we will be able to see our city through this crisis.

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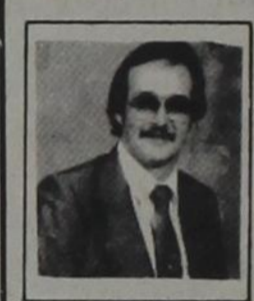

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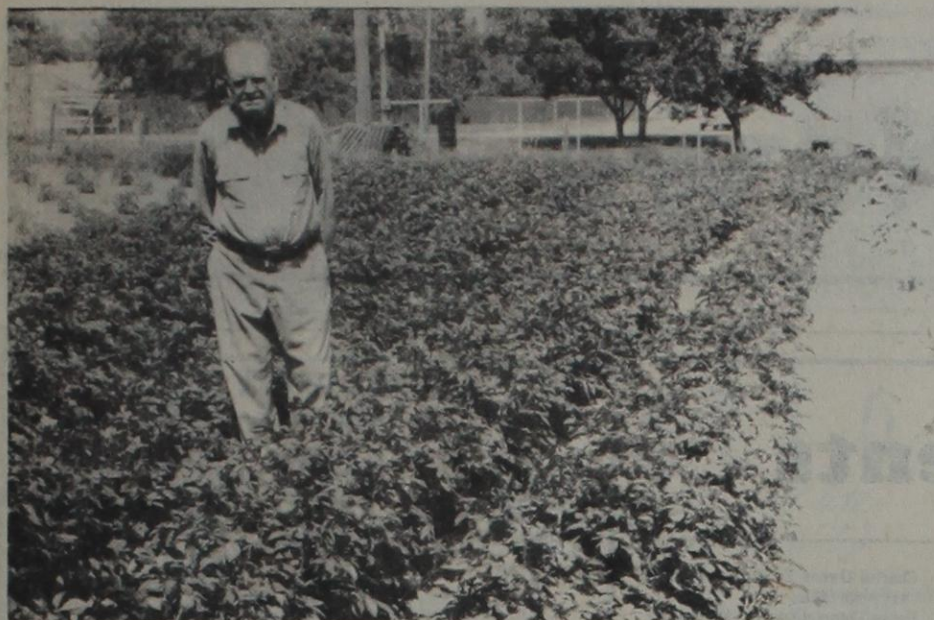

Lakewood Recreational Center Posts Rules, Fees

Lakewood Recreational Center located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star on the north side of highway 36, offers members a 9 hole golf course; a swimming pool; an excellent Bass, Catfish and Crappie fishing lake; a miniature golf course exists but is not maintained; monthly dinners and a ladies association. Non members may use the center but must pay user fees.

Membership fees are \$20.00 per month and run from first of the month to first of the month. This includes only the immediate family living in the same household. All other family members and friends must pay the non member fees.

Members may own their own golf cart sheds but must maintain their membership and pay a monthly electrical fee.

The ladies association is \$3.00 per year with monthly luncheons and bi-monthly afternoon Bridge parties.

Non members user fees are: Green Fees \$4.00 weekdays and \$5.00 on the weekend and holidays; Fishing \$2.00 per person; Swimming \$1.50 per person 13 and over, \$1.00 per person 12 and under; Miniature Golf \$1.50 per person; Picnic Facilities fee vary depending upon the size of the group and the length of time to be used, fees start at \$2.00.

Fees related to both members and non members.

Golf cart rentals \$4.16 per 9 holes. No one under 16 may rent or drive a Lakewood owned cart and only two people are allowed on a golf cart. You must keep car on golf cart roads and return the car immediately to the from office upon completion of holes; this is necessary due to limited number of carts available at one time.

Pavillion fees. All fees are based upon the size of the group and the length of time to be occupied. Rates start at \$25.00. Family reunions start at \$50.00.

Club room. \$25.00 and up. Rented to adults only and not available for family reunions.

Overnight camping is available for \$2.00 and up.

Swimming pool rental \$25.00 and up.

Members and non members, in other words everyone, must stop at the office and register before engaging in any activity at Lakewood.

Road Rally Race Runs Through Texas

Son of Locals Has a Part in the Race

A road rally type race from Knott's Berry Farm is Buena Vista, Calif. to Indianapolis, Ind. is in progress this week, May 21 to May 28.

A local boy, Bill Shults, is participating as Mechanic in the race with his responsibility being a 1935 Rolls Royce touring car entered by Therman Mfg. Co. of San Marcus, Texas and out of the Central Texas Museum of Automotive history at Rosanky, Texas exhibit.

The car is a 22 foot

long masterpiece of fine engineering with a 6 cylinder engine of 460 cubic inches displacement. It is bright yellow with black trim and a great deal of polished chrome. Forty-eight years ago it was a mechanical marvel. Now with no plans or specification-all destroyed in an air raid-it is a giant mechanical puzzle and needs a lot of tender loving care it is to make the trip.

The race is limited to cars made before 1942 and is scored on points given to the car that

comes closest to a 50 mile per hour average speed for the 3,000 mile trip. Entry fee was \$5,000 per car and first prize is \$100,000 offered by the sponsor of the race, Interstate Battery of Dallas, Texas. It is patterned after the movie starring Tony Curtis, "The Great Automobile Race" and is hoped to be the first race in what is to become an annual event of "Race Week" culminating in the Memorial Day race at Indianapolis.

Bill Shults is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Shults. He graduated

from Rising Star High School and later from Southwestern State University at San Marcus in 1976 with a degree in Industrial Arts. He taught auto mechanics at Cisco Junior College. After six years experience in an independent shop, Bill is now employed at Central Texas Restoration in San Marcus as Chief Mechanic in the restoration of antique cars. He married the former Judy Simpson from Cisco, Tex. and they have one daughter, Staci Michelle, age seven.

Battle Mesquite with Herbicides

Late spring and early summer is the time to battle mesquite with aerially applied liquid herbicides, says a range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Studies have shown that mesquite control is most effective when rainfall has been average or above for at least three months before treatment.

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Green Thumb Workers Honored

WACO--Governor Mark White will sign a special proclamation declaring Wednesday, June 1, as Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb-Senior Texans Employment Program Day in recognition of the hundreds of older workers enrolled in the two senior employment programs.

Texas Farmers Union (TFU) has sponsored the Green Thumb program in Texas since 1970. The largest and oldest federally-funded senior employment program, Green Thumb has more than 17,000 enrollees nationwide, including 1,059 in 111 Texas counties.

In 1973, the Texas Legislature adopted a TFU proposal to establish the Senior Texans Employment Program (STEP), which now receives both state and federal support through the Texas Department on Aging. STEP employs 830 workers in 122 counties.

"Both programs concentrate their resources in rural Texas," said TFU President Mike Moeller, "because the need there for employment opportunities and for the services the workers provide is so great." The programs

place workers with senior centers, schools, libraries, and municipalities to furnish services that would not otherwise be available.

"In signing the proclamation on June 1, the Governor will be saying 'Thank you' to these hundreds of workers for a job well-done," Moeller said. "He will be saying to these people that their work and their small towns remain a vital part of the Texas of today."

Moeller will attend the signing ceremony along with Green Thumb state director Diane Parrish; STEP project director Bob Girard; Bob Gibbons, Board Chairman, Texas Department on Aging; and Dan Stewart, of the TDOA staff. Enrollees from both programs will also be present to meet the governor and witness the signing of the proclamation.

Brush and cactus are major problems for Eastland County rangeland owners. The plants compete with grass and often make land almost useless.

Several new chemicals are now on the market for brush and cactus control. Some of these new chemicals are formulated so that landowners can treat individual plants very effectively.

County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon established two brush control demonstrations May 6 to help Eastland County producers determine the most effective and economical methods of controlling these unwanted plants.

The demonstrations were established on H.L. Ferguson's place on Highway 183 northeast of Cisco and on Mac McWhorter's ranch northwest of Eastland. Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control specialist from Texas A&M, and Extension Agent John Blair assisted with the demonstrations.

On the Ferguson place three plots of mesquites were treated with three dif-

ferent rates of Velpar L. This liquid is deposited on the ground around mesquites. Another plot of mesquites were treated with 2,4,5-T and oil. This material is an old treatment, but used as a comparison in the demonstration. Another material, Garlon 4, was applied to the base of mesquites in another plot.

Tordon 10 K pellets were applied to prickle pear in a plot. This material has been a very effective control for various types of cactus.

A new chemical known as Graslan bullets were applied to oak shinnery on McWhorter's place. The bullets are about 3/4 inch long and are dropped on the ground around the plants. Three bullets are needed for each inch of trunk diameter. In addition to the shinnery a block of catclaw was treated.

These demonstrations will be evaluated and results will be in the demonstration result handbook that is distributed every spring. In the fall a tour will be conducted of these brush control demonstrations Gordon says.

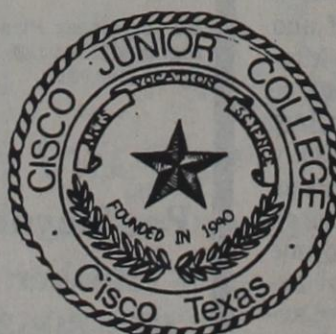

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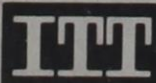
