Bronze Bust Presented to Congressman Stenholm

It was a special day at the Majestic Saturday when the bronze bust of Congressman Charlie Stenholm was unveiled and presented to him by Eastland County friends.

A number of these contributing friends were in the audience, along with Stenholm Staff members and news media from the area.

The Majestic was resplendent for the event, with antique cars at the curb and a beautifully decorated stage inside. Stage appointments included an American and Texas flag, with a background of greenery and a large basket of red gladiolus highlighting the speakers rostrum.

On stage for the program were Congressman Stenholm; H. V. O'Brien Editor

and Publisher; Dale Stewart, bronze artist and creator of the bust; Ed Allcorn, Manager of the Majestic; and C. W. Hoffmann, Eastland Mayor and Master of Ceremonies.

Of course attention of the audience was also centered on an object to the left of the stage - a large purple cloth covering the bronze bust on a high stand.

Pianist Carolyn Bolt, in keeping with the program theme, gave a medley of patriotic songs as the crowd gathered. She also played for the National Anthem.

Mayor C. W. Hoffmann greeted the crowd and gave the Invocation. Ed Allcorn led the audience in a stirring

Longtime Principal and Teacher Retire From Rising Star Schools

Children and personnel will be sure to notice the absence of two longtime teachers from the Rising Star school system. Weldon Hill, principal of ward school for the past 22 years, and Edith Bibb, elementary teacher, both retired at the end of the last school term.

Both Hill and Bibb grew up near Rising Star and have strong ties to their hometown.

Hill attended first grade at Okra school, then spent the rest of his school years in the Rising Star system. He was an outstanding athlete and attended Howard Payne University on an athletic scholarship. After earning his degree, Weldon began teaching as an assistant coach in high school here in 1956. His entire career of 34 years, except one semester, was spent in the Rising Star schools.

That career was interrupted twice when Weldon was drafted into the armed services, once during the Korean conflict soon after he began teaching and again several years later during the Berlin crisis. After being discharged from the service, he taught half a year at Jim Ned, replacing a teacher who was also called into the service.

Weldon's high school coach, Ray Nunnally, was still coaching when Weldon's long teaching career began. Hill continued as a high school coach for 12 years, then became principal of ward school, a position he held the remaining 22 years before his retirement. Weldon had received his masters degree in 1966. For 33 of his 34 years of service, Weldon was a classroom teacher, in addition to coaching or administrative activities. He taught math and business classes except for this past year, his last before retiring.

Weldon and his wife, Arla, are parents of four now-grown children, Pam Thompson, Laurie Thomas, Steve Hill and Kelly Hill.

"Home" has always meant a great deal to Weldon and he is continuing to work his family stock farm, in addition to his own acreage. The home farm, located several miles east of Rising Star, was farmed by Weldon's grandfather and his father. He expects to remain busy with his farm work and demonstrated a recent purchase, equipment

for moving large round bales of hay. After last winter's killing freeze during a dry period damaged most pastures in the area, it seemed there wouldn't be much hay this summer; the floods in late April, followed by hot, dry, windy weeks didn't help the situation, but the slow steady rains that began in mid-July have brought on rapid growth of vegetation.

Weldon said he has many fond memories from his years in the school system and found joy in teaching more than one generation in families here. Although he feels he's sure to miss the association with kids, other personnel and members of the community that teaching affords, he plans to continue to support school activities and keep in touch with the school and community. Hill expressed appreciation for the support given him by the community, school board, the teaching staff and children throughout his career. "The town has been good to me through the years," he said.

His retirement decision was made after the close of the school year and he didn't have the opportunity to let the teachers he worked with know what working with them has meant to him, Hill added. He reiterated his appreciation to them.

Hill has worked on farms ever since he was big enough and it is an endeavor he enjoys. Putting in the many hours necessary to farming without having to schedule it around his school work will bring a certain relief, but the activities of school children will not be forgotten by this longtime teacher and principal.

Edith Bibb's family ties date back to the settling of Rising Star and she plans use part of her time after retiring to help her husband, Kenneth, with making improvements on inherited farm land, which already has a pecan orchard on it. She says she is considering doing some substitute teaching after school begins.

Edith is also spending more time with her grandchildren this summer, which has worked well because she has more grandchildren this year. The Bibb children, Tommy, Steve, Marilyn Isom and Randy, now have a total of 10 children, eight boys and two

girls, whose ages range from 11 years to a few weeks.

Bibb attended Rising Star schools and took part in a number of school activities. At the time she was in high school, cheerleaders were aided in boosting school spirit by a pep squad, which numbered about 40 then, and the drum corps, made up of 16 snare drums and two basses; only seniors were eligible to be cheerleaders. Edith was in the drum corps three years, then was a cheerleader. She also was editor of the annual staff. After her graduation in 1947, Edith attended Abilene Christian College.

She began teaching in 1950 in Throckmorton where she spent her first four years of a career that covered more than 31 years before her retirement. It was in Throckmorton she met and married Kenneth Bibb; the couple later moved to Happy, where they lived for nine years.

Edith didn't teach during that time but took up her career again following their move to Rising Star. She taught home economics in Sidney for a half year before joining the local school system as an elementary teacher in 1963. During her years here, she served as sponsor to the junior high pep squad for ten of them.



Parents May Apply For School Lunch Program

Parents and guardians who believe they qualify for free and reduced lunch program for school students may now apply. All information in the application is treated as confidential.

Households meeting federal income guidelines are eligible for free or reduced-price meals for students. Copies of the school policy and the eligibility guidelines are sent home with each student.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with a ruling may discuss the decision by making a formal appeal, either orally or in writing. A federal address is also available if

any member of a household believes they may have been discriminated against.

In Rising Star ISD the price of breakfast is \$.60; lunch for K-6 students is \$1.15 and for 7-12 students it is \$1.25. Anyone is welcome to eat at the school.

Reduced prices are \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

Schools, Parents Advised Of New Immunization Rules

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) is notifying all school and child-care facility administrators that new, more stringent immunization rules for all Texas children will become law effective Sept. 1. Health officials are advising parents to ensure that their children's immunization records comply with those rules. Still more changes in the immunization requirements, including a mandatory second dose of measles vaccine, are set for 1991.

Wes Hodgson, epidemiology coordinator for the TDH Immunization Division, said, "The large measles outbreaks which began in 1988 under-

scored the fact that measles and other vaccine-preventable diseases can pose tragic health threats unless all susceptible people are immunized against them.

Hodgson said, "Some parents in recent years have failed to have their children vaccinated. Also, some school and day-care operators have not kept adequate records. The result is a growing number of insufficiently immunized children and young adults at risk of measles infection."

Hodgson said that currently the law requires all children entering Texas schools or day-care to show proof of immunization at certain ages against

polio, tetanus, measles, rubella (German Measles), mumps and diphtheria. In addition, the law requires pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine for all school and day-care children younger than 5.

However, amendments adopted by the Texas Board of Health in June more sharply define, and in some cases change, children's immunization requirements. Among the major amendments are: - Beginning Sept. 1, 1990, children and students enrolling in Texas child-care facilities or schools must have received both mumps and measles vaccines on or after their first birthdays.

- Beginning Jan. 1, 1991, students whose 12th birthdays occur on or after Sept. 1, 1990 will be required to have two doses of measles vaccine, or provide evidence of measles immunity. The two doses must be administered at least

30 days apart, and proof of the second dose will not be required until the child's 12th birthday.

- Beginning Sept. 1, 1991, Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine will be required for children, age 18 months through 4.

- Beginning Sept. 1, 1991, all children and students enrolling for the first time must have received rubella vaccine at age 1 or older.

Hodgson added that persons needing further details about immunization requirements should consult their family physicians, local health departments or school officials.

Each flag is held high by a member of the military team accompanying it. Marching briskly down cobblestone streets bordered by green bushy vegetation, crowds of onlookers wearing clothes as colorful as the banners cheer the gathering of soldiers. U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. David B. Jones, son of Viola Tyler of May, walked in the march. Each unit marches 25 miles per day for four days to complete 100 miles. This is the 44th year of participation by U.S. armed forces.

Though civilians initiated the marches in 1909, the four-day walkathon also honors American soldiers of the 82nd Airborne Division and 1st Airborne British soldiers who fought to secure bridges occupied by Nazi soldiers during World War II. Americans volunteered to work or march in Nijmegen this year.

"I volunteered for this march because it seemed like a great challenge. After three days and 75 miles, I now realize I should have thought it over more," said the 30-year-old aircraft control and warning radar technician based at Alzey Air Station, West Germany.

The marches were initiated by the Royal Netherlands League for Physical Culture to encourage Dutch people to participate in physical activity. U.S. Army and Air Force volunteers went through rigorous training in preparation for the grueling walkathon.

"Our training originally consisted of one and two hour walks. We started in April, gradually increasing the mile-

age. We participated in several German volkmarches that were 12 to 24 miles in distance. We received very little time to march because we still had our normal duty requirements," Jones explained.

The Americans were joined in the march by soldiers from countries such as; the Netherlands, France, Italy, Sweden, Belgium, Norway, Denmark, Switzerland, Poland, Chile, United Kingdom, Canada, Luxembourg, and Spain. The walkathon was combined with a summer festival Nijmegen hosts each year. An estimated two million visitors enjoyed marching, musical bands, and shopping for souvenirs.

Friendly rivalries developed between the soldiers as they marched and chanted; keeping morale and enthusiasm high throughout the four days.

"We kept motivated while marching by singing rhythmic songs to keep us in step. We also say hello to the hundreds of people we meet along the march route. When we're marching in combat boots and carrying 22-pound backpacks, a simple thing such as hearing people clap their hands helps us tremendously," said the 1978 graduate of Littlefield High School.

Jones is married to the former Linda J. Custer.

H. V. O'Brien then addressed the "fellow coordinators and friends," saying that the bust came about because of a desire to show appreciation to Congressman Stenholm for the kind of representation he gives this District in Washington.

In looking for a personal and different kind of gift, the thought came of having something made by a unique way to pay tribute, but Charlie's out of the ordinary too," O'Brien said.

The newspaper Editor also noted some of the Stenholm Staff in the audience: Dan Wagner of Washington, D.C.; Dale King of Abilene; and Bill Longley, Don Starr, Kay Looney and Jane Schoolmaker, all of Stamford.

Continuing, O'Brien said that many have had a part in the bust project, and participation is still coming in. He described Dale Stewart's work as a "labor of love," saying that the sculptor had put a lot of time and care into this special piece.

He said: "Charlie may think we're an Indian giver, but I've asked permission for the bust to remain in Eastland a short while, so others will have an opportunity to view it."

He added that the bust will be on display at Eastland National Bank, probably until Fun Day in Stamford on Sept. 8.

Touching on the situation in the Middle East, O'Brien said: "I'm thankful to God that we have a man like Charlie for times like these."

At this point Dale Stewart stepped to the bronze. With

Stenholm nearby he lifted the cloth from it, revealing the likeness of the Congressman. The audience applauded and Stenholm flashed a smile as he looked over the gift.

"Thank you" seems so inadequate, but I'll say it," the Congressman told the crowd. "Most things like this come to people when they are no longer a part of this world. The love and thoughts behind this is what counts."

Stenholm then turned to the trouble in the Middle East, saying that he was "behind the President 100 percent. I'm glad the United Nations is performing in the way we want and expect it too."

He said one hope was that the United States will have a true blockade supported by every nation in the free world. Another hopes was that out of this dangerous situation a lesson will be learned - to never again have the United States dependent on foreign oil.

"For years we've ignored warning voices - took energy for granted," Stenholm said. "Now we must have a National Energy Policy. We cannot let one country control the economic lifeblood of the whole world."

He again expressed appreciation to everyone involved in the gift of the bronze. "My family and I will enjoy it while I'm till serving you," the Congressman said.

Stenholm also mentioned that Congress would begin its session Sept. 10, and had a "full year's work to do in three weeks." He said there needed to be bi-partisan support critical issues.

When the formal program ended the bronze bust was carried to the mezzanine, where a reception was held.

Refreshments of assorted cookies, punch and coffee were catered by Joyce Eaves of Kokomo. The crowd enjoyed visiting with Congressman Stenholm, Dale and others - and admiring the work of art.

It was a good, patriotic day in Eastland County.

Gordon Spot

The peanut crops in Eastland County look extremely good. This could be one of the best peanut crops in years because of the good rains in July and August. This is not to say there are no problems. Because of early spring rains and the mid-summer rains the weeds are growing extremely well. Growers are having to rely on heavily on post-emergence herbicides. It's unfortunate that when conditions are good for peanut growth and nut development, it is also good for weeds and disease development.

Peanut leaf spot is showing up everywhere and will get worse unless a good fungicide program is followed. Southern blight, which kills the peanut plants could be a real problem since the conditions, (warm, moist air and soil) are good for that disease also. Then there are some peanuts that have had so much rain that the plants have a yellow color indicating a shortage of oxygen in this soil. This happens when the water takes up all the air space in the soil. We call it "drowning out."

A relatively new peanut disease found in Eastland County is causing damage. Sclerotinia blight is favored by cool temperatures, moist soils, and high relative humidity. Conditions we were having the first week of August caused this disease to develop rapidly. Symptoms of Sclerotinia blight are similar to those of Southern blight. The first visible symptom is the rapid wilting or flagging of the tips of infected branches. Foliage of the infected branches turn yellow, then turns brown, and withers. Once the stem is girdled, the branch dies. It can be distinguished from Southern blight by the presence of numerous black sclerotia (seed) on and in infected plant tissue. These are found on branches, leaflets, pegs, and pods.

The same fungicides used to control Southern blight will not control Sclerotinia blight. The Environmental Protection Agency has recently granted an emergency Section 18 label for the use of DCNA (Botran) for control of Sclerotinia blight on peanuts in Texas. This request was made as a result of severe outbreaks of this disease. The outbreaks have been noted in the Central Basin area around Mason, in the Cross Timbers area near DeLeon, Gorman, and Rising Star, and for the first time ever in West Texas in Collingsworth County.

There are some conditions for using Botran that growers need to be aware of. 1.) Applications will be made at the rate of 2 to 4 lbs. of product per acre, equivalent to 1.5 to 3 lbs. of active ingredient per acre. A maximum of 8 lbs. of product, equivalent to 6 lbs. a.i., may be applied per acre per season. 2.) The first application may be made when a minimum of one percent of the peanut plants in the field to be treated exhibit visible signs of sclerotinia infection. Applications may not be made within 30 days of harvest. 3.) Botran may be applied through overhead irrigation, by ground application equipment with flat spray nozzles capable of producing large droplets, or by aircraft with equipment capable of producing fairly large droplets. 4.) Precautions must be taken to ensure that Botran does not contaminate flowing creeks or rivers. 5.) Use of treated peanut hay, hulls, meal, or vines as livestock feed is prohibited. 6.) This specific label exemption expires October 21, 1990.

The pecan crop continues to look good in this area. Most improved orchards have a good crop set although the natives are thin except in a few areas. Since the market looks like it will be very good this fall due to projected short crop and a low carry over in cold storage, growers would be wise to protect the crop they have. Make sure the trees have ample water in the next few months. The recent rains have been welcome relief but trees should not go longer than three weeks without water. The crop will need to be protected from shuckworms and weevils.



Family Support Program

Low-income Texans may be eligible for payment of Medicare premiums (both Part A and B), and the coinsurance and deductibles for Medicare-covered services.

Individuals who qualify for the special benefits must meet the following criteria:

-Persons must be enrolled in Medicare Part A.

-Persons must be at least age 65 or declared disabled by the Social Security Administration.

-Countable resources, such as bank accounts, real property other than a homestead, etc., valued at no more than \$4,000 for an individual and \$6,000 for a couple.

-Gross monthly income cannot exceed \$491 for a single person or \$652 for a couple.

Texas residents who meet these criteria should contact their local Texas Department of Human Services office to explore eligibility as a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary.

Qualified Beneficiary Program

Individuals with physical disabilities that substantially limit a major area of activity such as self-care, economic self-sufficiency, mobility, learning, or independent living or who have a record of such disability are potentially eligible for the In-Home and Family Support Program.

The IH/FSP program provides direct grant benefits to individuals with disabilities and their families for the purchase of equipment and/or services that enable the person with a disability to live independently in the community.

An eligible applicant may qualify for either or both of the following benefits:

-a \$3,600 one-time grant for purchase of equipment or architectural modifications.

-a \$3,600 annual subsidy for purchase of on-going services.

Individuals may live alone, with caretakers, or a spouse. Individuals served are age 4 and above. Eligibility is based on assessment of financial needs, need for services and functional and physical disability. There is no resource limit. The award will be presented to the male varsity athlete who has the highest academic average. "Robby always encouraged athletes to get the most out of their educational opportunities," Lawrence added.





Teething Troubles

Q. Why does my baby have trouble teething when my neighbor's baby doesn't?

A. No one really knows why some babies suffer from drooling, chewing and crankiness before the eruption of each tooth, and others show no discomfort at all. In fact, the parents of such a child as the latter may be surprised to look into its mouth and find a tooth! We do know that the time of eruption of the first tooth can vary widely. The average age is 6 to 7 months, but it can happen anywhere from 2 to 12 months. Provide your baby with safe items to chew on, but check with your dentist before giving him any type of medication.


