PUBLIC NOTICE FARM AND RANCH EXEMPTIONS MUST BE FILED

If you are the owner of farm or ranch equipment in Eastland County, a new exemption is now available. The special session of the 1981 Texas Legislature passed an amendment to the Property Tax Code which allows for the exemption from taxation of farm or ranch equipment.

The exemption is not for the total value of the equipment. The reason for this is a recent Attorney General's Opinion (NW-451) which limits the exemption amount. The exemption is limited to \$15,000 in value for an individual and \$30,000 in value for a family.

It cannot be granted to a partnership or corporation and must be applied for each year between January 1 and May 1.

As the newly enacted State Property Tax Code requires all property to be placed on the tax rolls for 1982 at fair market value, owners of this type of property are urged to take advantage of the exemption.

Homestead Deadline Is May 1, 1982

There has been some confusion as to the deadline for the filing of Residential Homestead Exemption applications for 1982. A recent article in many of the papers indicated that the deadline was April 1, 1982.

The April 1, 1982 deadline was for a few property owners who were eligible for a special one-time only sign up. These were property owners who in 1979 had been 65 years of age or older and had not signed up for their 1979 homestead exemption.

All other homeowners, regardless of age, still have the month of April to sign up for the Residential Homestead Exemption which is given by all

School Districts of the State.

The Homestead Exemption application; as well as applications for all other available exemptions can be obtained at the Eastland County Appraisal District office which is located on the 2nd floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. If you have a question, as to which exemptions are available, or as the eligibility requirements; you should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The phone number is: 629-8597.

The Deadline for All Exemptions is May 1, 1982. Please return your application prior to that date if you wish to have it granted for the 1982 tax year.

In the course of His ministry, Jesus told more than forty parables. Here is one of the best loved for its beauty and value. THE PRODIGAL SON: And he said, A certain man had two sons; and the younger of them said to his father, Father give me the portion of goods that falleth to me. And he divided unto them his living. And not many days after the younger son gathered all together, and took his journey into a far country, and there wasted his substance with riotous living. And when he had spent all, there arose a mighty famine in that land; and he began to be in want. And he went and joined himself to a citizen of that country; and he sent him into his fields to feed swine. And he would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swine did not eat: and no man gave unto him. But when he came to himself, he said, How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough to spare, and I perish with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, and am no more worthy to be called thy son; make me as one of thy hired servants. And he arose, and came to his father. But when he was a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him. And the son said unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight, and am no more worthy to be called thy son. But the father said to his servants, Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him; and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet: and bring the fatted calf,

and kill it; and let us eat, and be merry: for this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found. And they began to be merry. Now his elder son was in the field: and as he came and drew nigh to the house, he heard music and dancing.

And he called one of the servants, and asked what these things meant. And he said unto him, Thy brother is come, and thy father hath killed the fatted calf, because he hath received him safe and sound. And he was angry, and would not go in: therefore came his father out, and entreated him. And he, answering said to his father, Lo, these many years do I serve thee, neither transgressed I at any time thy commandment: and yet thou never gavest me a kid, that I might make merry with my friends: but as soon as this thy son was come, which hath devoured thy living with harlots, thou hast killed for him the fatted calf. And he said unto him, Son, thou art ever with me, and all I have is thine. It was that we should make merry, and be glad: for this my brother was dead, and is alive again; and was lost, and is found. (Luke 15:11-32). Of all the parables, this comes closest to giving us a glimpse of the hallowed face of God. It illustrates that God's love is beyond justice, beyond reason—that He ever hungers for the return of a sinner. The righteous are His already; they have His love. But they are not to be self righteous, nor jealous of their position in His eyes. They are to love His own love.

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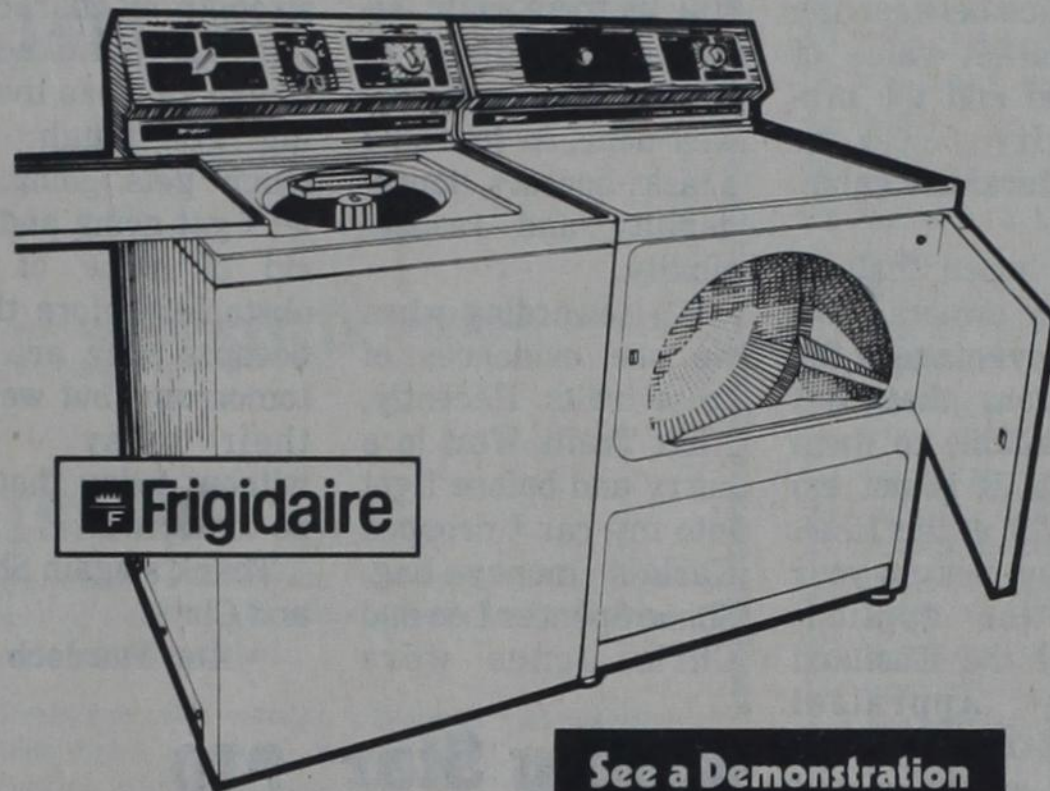

PUBLIC NOTICE EXEMPTION DEADLINE IS MAY 1, 1982

The end of the filing period for 1982 tax exemptions is now only three weeks away. The law requires that only those exemptions filed by May 1, 1982 be granted.

The law provides for many types of exemptions and a list of all of them would not be possible in the space available. However, the following is a short list of those exemptions available that will benefit the majority of the property owners of Eastland County, if they qualify. **\$5,000 Residential Homestead Exemption:**

This is a reduction in the taxable value of a persons residence for school tax purposes. All adult homeowners regardless of age, are eligible to apply for this exemption.

\$10,000 Over-65 Residential Homestead Exemption:

This is a reduction in the taxable value by \$10,000 of the value of the residential homestead of all homeowners over 65 years of age who apply for the exemption. This \$10,000 is in addition to the \$5,000 granted to all qualified homeowners. The exemption again applies to school district taxes only, but does carry a "freeze". The tax amount due is frozen for the Over-65 owner at the amount paid in the first they signed up.

\$10,000 Disability Exemption:

This exemption is granted by school district to those who qualify as being totally disabled and unable to work. The law requires proof of the disablement to be provided before this exemption may be granted.

Disabled Veterans' Exemption:

This is an exemption of taxable value that ranges from \$1,500 in value for a ten (10%) disability to \$3,000 for a

one hundred (100%) percent disability. It is granted by all tax jurisdictions and must be applied for each year.

Open-Space Land Exemption:

This is an exemption granted on all land that is used for agricultural purposes, whether it is used for the production of crops or for grazing of livestock. The major qualification is that it is currently being used for agricultural purposes and that it has been for five (5) of the last seven (7) years. All taxing jurisdictions must give this exemption when it is properly applied for and granted by the County Appraisal District. The amount of the exemption is based upon the difference between the fair market value of the land and the productivity or agricultural use value.

It is hoped that all property owners have taken advantage of the exemptions that are available to them for 1982. It is not too late to file at this time. You may pick up your exemption applications at the Eastland County Appraisal District Office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. If is more convenient, you may have the application mailed to you by calling 629-8597.

It is again emphasized that all exemptions need to be in by the May 1, 1982 deadline. If you have any questions concerning your qualifications, you may obtain information at the telephone number listed above, or by going by the Appraisal District Office.

Bogus Drugs Pose Problem

They look like real drugs, but that's where the similarity ends and the controversy begins.

Called "look-alike" or "counterfeit" drugs, the capsules and pills are sold through the mail or on the streets of Texas' larger cities.

The imitation drugs are almost indistinguishable in appearance from controlled substances that are widely abused. The look-alikes have the same size, shape, color and even imprinted letters and numbers resembling those of legitimate manufacturers of controlled substances.

But the Texas Medical Association says the difference is that the imitations usually contain large doses of non-prescription, over-the-counter ingredients such as caffeine, a stimulant; phenylpropanolamine, an appetite suppressant and nasal decongestant; and ephedrine, a decongestant.

Magazine advertisements for the look-alike drugs makes claims such as "strongest body

stimulants and appetite suppressants available without a prescription" and "100% legal-safe."

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration thinks differently. It has noted increased cases involving phenylpropanolamine at poison-control centers and has linked look-alike drugs to nine deaths nationwide.

The FDA has confiscated the drugs from several look-alike manufacturers on grounds that they are counterfeit drugs prohibited by the U.S. Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act. In addition, the U.S. Postal Service has filed complaints charging the mail-order companies with misrepresenting the safety of their products.

The main problem is that only 13 states have passed laws to combat look-alike drugs. Texas is not among the 13. The American Medical Association, however, has developed model state legislation directed at banning the manufacture, sale and distribution of imitation controlled substances.

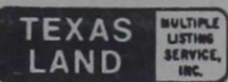

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White House Meeting Launches

All-Out Campaign Against Drug Use Menace

Washington, D.C.—It was a gathering of people who have said "enough," who have drawn a line and who have vowed to fight the spreading menace of drug abuse with all the resources they can muster.

They met at the White House March 22, and during the day-long session, hosted by First Lady Nancy Reagan and sponsored by ACTION, the national volunteer agency, they mapped plans to battle the drug culture that threatens the health and lives of young people throughout the country.

"I am scared to death for our children," said Mrs. Reagan. "Drugs ruin lives before they've even had a chance to develop and then compound the damage by destroying the family ties that offer the best hope," she added.

Out of the White House Briefing on Drug use and the Family, one overall message kept being

repeated: the best hope for combatting the drug menace is for parents to face problems openly and band together with other parents.

"Parents are not helpless," said Marsha Keith Schuchard, a co-founder of Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education in Atlanta, Ga.

Sue Ruscle, executive director of DeKalb families in Action, Atlanta, told the conference that parents must shake the idea that "if kids use marijuana you are a bad parent and it's your fault. It's not true. Forget that!"

A pediatrician on the panel, Dr. Donald Ian McDonald of Clearwater, Fla., said it has been only recently that physicians have begun to realize that drug usage is a probable cause of the physical problems that they see in their young patients. Dr. McDonald, who is active in parents' organizations, noted that nearly all parents say they didn't know

their children were on drugs until it was too late. "Parental responsibility is not to protect kids from life, but to help them deal with real life," he advised.

Thomas W. Pauken, director of ACTION, said his agency will help mobilize parents, religious leaders, corporate executives, and all others who can volunteer in the fight against drugs. Technical assistance and small seed money grants will be provided through the ACTION Drug prevention Program, headed by Angie Hammock.

Pauken said the volunteer effort will be aimed at prevention—making young people aware of the health hazards of drugs so they won't get started in the first place.
