Grand Opening of First State Bank Branch Draws Crowd

Eastland County has scored another first, with the opening of a bank - during a time when the opposite is true across the nation.

The First State Bank, Eastland, threw open its doors in a Grand Opening Sunday afternoon, and visitors from throughout the county crowded the new facility on East Main St. for hours.

Originally scheduled for a 2 to 4 p.m. event, visitors began arriving before 1:30 and many were still visiting after 5 p.m., officials said.

President Pat Bynam and Executive Vice President Kent Pirkle expressed complete satisfaction with the reception that the bank has enjoyed, and with the number of people who

visited during the open house. The facility opened in mid-December.

"We can't begin to tell just how happy we are with the response we've enjoyed since opening the bank," Mr. Pirkle said, as he expressed appreciation to all who have helped make the endeavor such a success.

Visitors enjoyed refreshments, and souvenir pens and potted plants, and took numbers qualifying them for door prizes.

The number drawn for the grand prize \$500.00 vacation package is number 75.

Other cash prize winning numbers are: 05, 47, 55, 60, 84, 95, 109, 119, 134, 169, 183, 197, 199, 237, 254, 255, 258, 265, 268, and 354.

The bank is located in a rock building at 317 E. Main St. Telephone number is 629-3901.

Officers, directors and employees hosted the open house and officials expressed their confidence in this area as a strong economic base, and indicated that their intention is to participate in the continuing expansion of the area, and to contribute financial support for the growth and expansion of existing and new endeavors.

"We welcome the opportunity to discuss financing plans for those like-minded citizens who want to help make this area continue to grow and be a sound economic center," Mr. Pirkle said.

To the Citizens of Rising Star:

As your new fire chief I have encountered some problems preventing the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department from performing up to standards. Foremost is the numbers problem. The State Insurance Board requires that a town our size should have bi-monthly fire meetings with attendance of 20 people minimum. The last ten meetings we have had trouble attaining this number. Regulations state that insurance premiums rise when attendance falls, so every one of us may feel this attendance shortage in our own pocketbooks.

More important is the lack of participation at fires. There are very few times when enough people respond to the alarm to adequately fight a fire. The responsibilities assumed and risks taken by firefighters is more

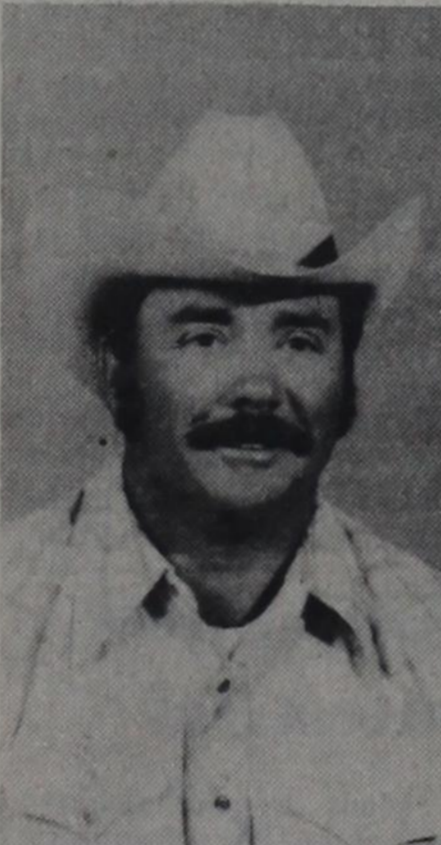
than we should ask of the few loyal firemen now taking care of Rising Star and the surrounding area. I would ask that you take time to consider your families, houses, and property in and around Rising Star and ask yourself what you would want done when fire threatens these. These are the responsibilities that should be taken by the many instead of the few.

So your help is what I am asking for. I need people who are willing to take responsibility and work together to build a fire department that we, the people in this community, can depend on.

Dee Hogan Runs for County Sheriff



Dee Hogan, candidate for Democratic nomination as Sheriff of Eastland County, has issued the following formal statement:

I am asking to be elected County Sheriff of Eastland County because I am qualified to help work toward improving the living conditions of citizens in the county, and to improving the public image of the county as a safe place from crime.

One of my primary concerns will be for the citizens, especially the young, elderly and the rural citizens, in helping provide protection for them from the criminal elements that are presently prevalent throughout our country. I will strive for a

visible, contactable law enforcement department for the county that will provide reassurance and quick response to violations which endanger our citizens.

Certainly, I will work hand-in-hand with the courts, other county, city and state officials in dealing with criminal problems. Total cooperation is necessary.

I believe that close coordination with the State Jail Standards Commission is necessary, but I oppose the expansion of our present county jail facilities. To expand, would mean additional tax burden which our citizens cannot stand, and I am convinced that state Standards can be met through good management.

Our jail can be kept in compliance by managing its population in the following ways:

a. Expedite the release of those who should be out on personal recognizance bonds.

b. Close coordination with the Texas Department of Corrections van in the timely transfer of inmates.

c. Expedite bringing the indigent prisoners to the attention of the courts at the earliest possible moment to prevent long costly stays.

I herewith pledge to enforce the laws equally and

fairly throughout the county. Crimes committed against any person and/or property deserves immediate attention and investigation. A special program will be implemented for the protection of senior citizens and those living in areas not having city police protection.

This county has an abundance of highly qualified, intelligent citizens with integrity and I would first recruit those here who are known and respected, to fill positions in the sheriff's department. This would be done fairly and openly and always within the guidelines of prevailing laws.

In an effort to begin early in teaching our children, I will immediately establish a program in cooperation with our ministerial alliance, ministers,

WOOL AND MOHAIR Producers are encouraged to file wool, lamb, and mohair sales documents as sales are made. To be eligible for wool/mohair incentive payments, the animals must have been owned for at least 30 days. The number of head purchased and the liveweight must be reported for unshorn lambs. The final date to request incentive payments is February 1.

CONSERVATION RESERVE SIGNUP The sixth signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be Feb. 1 through Feb. 19. Applicants will submit bids stating the rental rate they would accept to convert their highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetative cover for 10 years.

Land will be determined eligible if the land is highly erodible and was planted to an agricultural commodity during at least two years during the years 1981-85.

FINAL DISASTER TRANSFER DATES The final date to transfer seg. 2 and 3 peanuts from quota loan to additional loan is Feb. 1.

HOLIDAY NOTICE We will be closed Feb. 15 in observance of George Washington's Birthday.

ACP SIGN-UP A signup for ACP cost-sharing will be held January 19 through January 29. The County Committee has determined that establishment of permanent vegetative cover will be of high priority during this signup.

Approval will be made based on the need and priority of the practice.

1988 COUNTY COMMITTEE Delegates from Local Administrative Area 3 reelected C.W. Richter to a three year term on the County Committee. Delegates to the County Convention selected Cecil Self as Chairperson and Ronnie Love as Vice-Chairperson for the 1988 year.

REPORT OF PRODUCER PAYMENTS During the last two weeks in January the Data Processing office will mail a notice of payments made by ASCS during the 1987 calendar year to producers on CCC-182. A separate notice will be received for each county in which payments were made. The amounts shown on the notice were reported by ASCS to the Internal Revenue Service. Producers having questions concerning the notice should contact the applicable ASCS county office that disbursed the payment.

Eastland County Commissioners

Internal Audit Presented - Other Items At Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners heard an internal audit from the firm of Smith, Verett and Parker during a meeting Monday. They also heard details of Jail Compliance, and discussed various other items of business.

Present for the regular meeting were Commissioners Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Norman Christian, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and Billy Bacon, Pct. 4. L.T. Owen presided over the first part of the meeting while County Judge Scott Bailey attended a funeral. Judge Bailey then assumed the chair.

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that 23 people were presently in the County Jail, with several due to be moved out soon. The building "looked clean," he said. But the San Angelo firm that was supposed to fix the Inter-Com had reportedly done nothing more about it.

Ken Parker from Smith, Verett and Parker gave the figures from an internal audit of the County finances for the fiscal year of 1986-87, ending with September 30, 1987.

Among the points mentioned in the audit was that the County had received a

total revenue of \$2,834,942 for this fiscal year of 1987, and had spent \$2,977,816 during the same time.

This left a short-fall of around \$142,000, but \$62,000 of this was funds financing the lease-purchase of equipment. So a figure of \$80,505 would more accurately reflect the deficit, according to Parker.

"No replenishment of Revenue-Sharing funds" was listed by some members of the Court as a major reason for the deficit spending.

In data prepared by the auditing firm, several

County Departments were reported as having deficit spending in 1987. The District Court spent \$102,967.00 above budget, the Sheriff's Department \$13,209.00, the Jail \$5,693.00, and the Central Appraisal District \$1,870.00.

The Organized Crime Trial last summer in the District Court was named by the Commissioners as a reason for the deficit spending there.

Ken Parker said that his report reflected more delinquent taxes than the previous year. There was \$412,796.00 owed in taxes

on September 30, 1987 and at the same time in 1986 there had been \$364,114.00.

Parker said he could find "no major material weakness" in internal control of county funds, but that there needed to be refinements. More detail and compliance was suggested in some cases.

Parker remarked that employees who use county vehicles for anything other than county business need to report this as a fringe benefit.

"Driving back and forth to work is personal mileage," he said.

In other business, the Commissioners discussed the implementation of the state and county policy regarding the use of track and lug type machinery on county roads.

They also granted a request by Ronnie Love to cross County Rd. 484 with a water line. This is in the Chaney community in Pct. 2.

A request from Christie Gas Transmission was also granted. This line will cross two places on County Rd. 485 in Pct. 2.

Texans Health Outlook

By Roy V. Cartee

QUESTION: My husband needs a wheelchair very badly but I am having no success in getting Medicare to pay the expense. Do you have any idea how I can get the care?

Answer: In order to get wheelchair coverage you must obtain a doctor's prescription which shows that the wheelchair is medically necessary for your husband in that it has a therapeutic goal. You may obtain a durable medical equipment claim form from your Medicare carrier—the insurance company in the state of Texas.

Question: I am 65 years old and have a husband who is 57. I understand neither of us are eligible for social security. How can I get S.S. without a penalty?

Answer: If someone is not eligible for social security, he/she may enroll in Medicare during the initial

enrollment period without incurring a penalty. You will pay the part B premium as a beneficiary who is eligible for S.S. which was \$17.90 a month and now \$24.80 beginning January 1, 1988. Your payments will be \$234 a month during 1988, which is an increase from \$226. This is not a penalty rather it is simply the premium which must be paid by those who did not pay into the social security system.

Question: Mr. Cartee, what must be done to qualify for Medicare Skilled Nursing Care, that is entering a skilled facility (SNF)?

Answer: So many myths have been given that it is hard for the person to know to whom to contact. First, contact your doctor and he will determine if you have a need. Secondly, contact a skilled nursing facility and they will guide you. Don't give up if you feel you are eligible.

"Made In Heaven" At The Majestic

Alan Rudolph (Choose Me, Trouble in Mind) is one of the more idiosyncratic movie makers. Even when he takes on what might be a thoroughly conventional romantic fantasy about two lovers who meet in heaven and try to find each other once they return to Earth, he does so in an unorthodox manner. Rudolph takes the time to present a cavalcade of off-beat American cultures, ranging from self-absorbed advertising worlds to rural families to cults of jazz families. Timothy Hutton, who did such an excellent job in "Ordinary People", is ideal as the protagonist, and Kelly McGillis is effective as his true love. Look for Hutton's real-life wife, Debra Winger, in an unbillied supporting role as an insinuating angel who's in charge of comings-and-goings. There are other cameo roles by unexpected faces, such as musicians Neil Young, Ric Ocasek,

and Tom Petty.

Timothy Hutton stars as Mike, a young man who dies while rescuing a woman from drowning. Sent to Heaven, he meets Annie (Kelly McGillis), a "new soul" born in Heaven. When Annie is sent to live out her mortal existence on Earth, however, Mike begs the mysterious Emmett Humbird, "the man in charge" of Heaven, for the chance to follow her. Hem-

bird relents, on the condition that the two will have no memory of having met in Heaven, and must find each other within 30 years or be condemned to eternal unhappiness.

As it is, the film does split into two sections: the first half, in Heaven, is quirkily sentimental and warm; the second half, on Earth, presents death, poverty, despair, and heartbreak as obstacles the

lovers must overcome to be reunited.

"I hope 'Made in Heaven' does well," Rudolph says, "I really do, because I think the values of the film are really nice. I think it's the best thing Tim's done. I know he loves the movies. He's a terrific actor, with a great sense of humor, which he doesn't often get a chance to show. Kelly is great, too. She is so versatile, so intelligent."

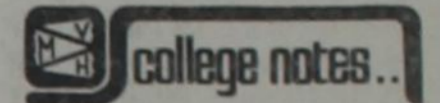

Court Rules on Student Newspapers

On January 13, school officials were given even more power to silence the voice of the American student. By a 5-3 decision, public schools now have the authority to censor forms of student expression including school newspapers.

Justice Byron R. White stated "In the majority opinion that a school, acting as the publisher of a school newspaper

"disassociate itself not only from speech that would substantially interfere with its work or impinge on the rights of other students but also from speech that is, for example, ungrammatical, poorly written, vulgar or unsuitable for immature audiences."

This opinion might leave the impression that the Missouri High School students had been printing

stories of erotica or worse, unfounded tabloid stories of scandals within the high school administration. However, the articles the principal refused to publish dealt with teenage pregnancy and the effects of divorce on students.

Justice William A. Brennan argued that the newspaper served as a student forum and should receive protection under the First Amend-
