## Meek Family Reunion

A family reunion for the decedents of John Meek, born November 26, 1805, died January 10, 1902 will be held Easter weekend, April 1, 2 and 3, 1988, in Paluxy, Texas at the residence ranch of Jean (Wann) and Buster Edwards, formerly known as the old Brooks' "homeplace".

John Meek, migrated to Texas from Tennessee in 1847, via wagon train with seven small children and his wife, Mahalia Tidwell Meek, settling first in Upshur County, near Gilmer, Texas. Moving farther westward in the early 1850's he farmed near McKinney in Collin County, and served as a magistrate for the county while living there.

Sheriffs were: H.S. Schmick-1875, A.J. Stuart 1880, G.W. Shannon 1881, J.K. Schmick 1882, Sam Finley 1892, Joe Whitesides 1896, J.L. Nobles 1898, J.R. Skinner 1912 and H.E. Lawrence 1916.

Elected Sheriff after 1920 were: Sam Nolley 1920, J.D. Barton 1922, R.W. Edwards 1924, John S. Hart 1926, Virge Foster 1928, Loss Woods 1936, John S. Hart 1942, J.B. Williams 1946, Frank Tucker 1950, J.B. Williams 1954, Lee Horn 1960, and L.E. Sublett 1964.

Later additions to the list include Ronnie White, Johnnie Morren and Don Underwood.

The fifth grade was honored last Wednesday, March 23, by a visit from Bill Dennard, crew member of the United States Ship Franklin. Mr. Dennard presented a program on the most decorated ship of World War II, the USS Franklin, the ship on which he served. The USS Franklin was an aircraft carrier with around 3,000 men. It was the length of three football fields and 15 stories high. Mr. Dennard narrated two videos that showed the near fatal attack on the USS Franklin of the coast of Japan in March of 1945. One video re-enacted the dramatic escape route of Bill Dennard and his fellow crew members as remembered by several survivors living in the New York area. The other video showed the actual attack on the USS Franklin by the Japanese bombers. Two bombs hit the Franklin and over one quarter of the crew were left off the coast of Japan buried at sea in a watery grave. Mrs. Cooksey and Mrs. Thompson greatly appreciated Bill Dennard's program because it helped to factually show our students

why we should all be proud of our freedom, our past, our heritage and also the men that made these things possible. This great demonstration of patriotism by these young eighteen and nineteen year old men of the USS Franklin who saved their country so well, made these fifth grade students so proud of their country. This program gave them a real-life situation from the past to look at and be proud of. Mr. Dennard ended the program by showing the fifth grade his own moments of the USS Franklin. Inscribed on the back of a pocket sized picture of the Franklin were these words:  
You can tell it to them sailor, in the years, that are to be, You were one aboard the Franklin in that epic sea. You've a right to boast about it; you were one who saved "Big Ben"; One who lived to tell the story of her glorious fighting men. You can tell it to them, sailor, with a touch of Yankee pride, You were one of those

aboard her when that good ship almost died. One below, or was it topside? - oh, it doesn't matter where- You were one to give the Navy added glory, all can share. When the youngsters gather round you, as they will when you've ashore, You've a stirring tale to give them that will live forevermore. You can tell them of the Franklin, under Japanese attack, With the dead and maimed upon her, but the living fighting back. To American tradition; aye, to Yankee faith and pride, And the glory of the Navy, spread the story far and wide! You've a right to boast about it till your breath is running short: How you brought the battered Franklin, flag still flying into port. Just folks, E.A. 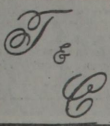

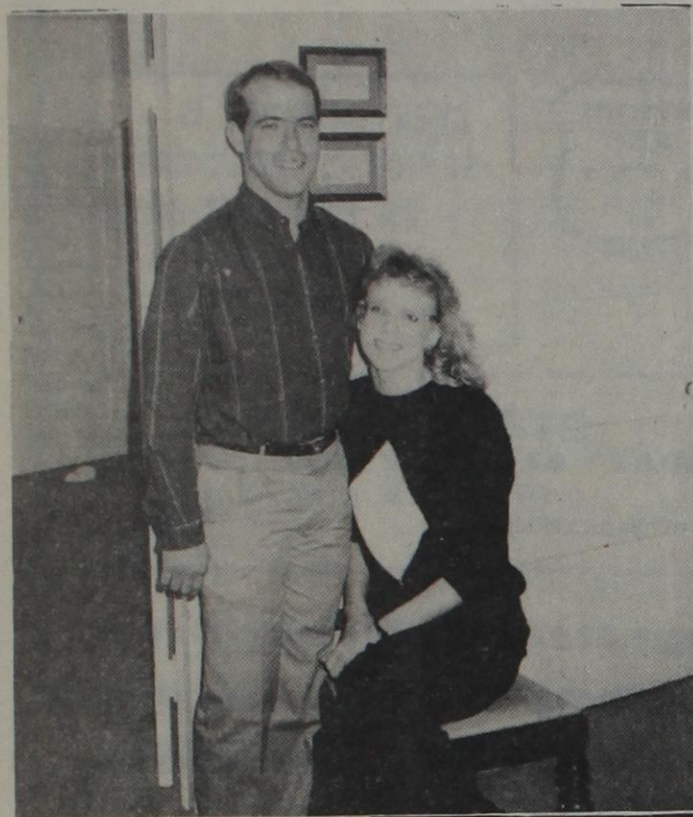
