DALLAS, March 31. (Special) -Approval of the plan to abolist the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is indicated by the public opinion poll of Facts Forum, Robert H. Dedman, chairman, announced today in releasing final results __ the March question-

Voters participating in the poll of the national public affairs organization cast their ballots in the ratio of 74 per cent for; 26 per cent against, in response to the question, "Should RFC be abolished?" This opposition to the big government lending agency has been consistently expressed by Facts Forum voters. When the issue first was polled in June, 1951, 77 per cent voted in favor of abolition, and on four polls subsequent to that date through March, 1952, the voting was 79, 78, 78 and 75 per cent, respectively.

About Fertilizer

COLLEGE STATION, March 31.-A situation, says M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist for the Texas Extension Service, has developed in the fertilizer field which is causing concern among farmers. Ammonium nitrate, he says is in short supply but farmers should not fail to use a nitrogen fertilizer if one is needed to boost crop and pas-

ture yields. Thornton's recommendation for overcoming the existing shortage is to use ammonium sulphate. He says the supply of this material is plentiful and readily available. It contains 21 per cent nitrogen as compared to 33 percent for the ammonium nitrate. To get the same amount of nitrogen in the soil, Thornton says, just apply one half more of the amount of nitrogen as 100 pounds of the ammonium nitrate.

What fun for the family to make an Easter egg cart out of ice cream, drawn by a team of bright-eyed bunny cookies! A perfect cart is the block-shaped carton of pre-packaged ice cream so conveniently available

To make the Easter bunny cookies, follow directions for your favorite sugar cookie recipe. Cut half the dough with a bunny cookie cutter, and remaining half with a round cutter. After baking, place bunnies upright on base in small mound of confectioners' sugar frosting. Place block-shaped ice cream on serving platter. Mound shredded coconut on top of ice cream to resemble Easter nest; fill nest with jelly beans. Place chocolate mint patties on sides for wheels, and put bunnies in front. Now They've Electrified Everything!



New applications of electricity to household and farm use have made the business of everyday living continually easier through the years, from such major projects as mass milking operations, to things as simple as toasting a piece of bread. Now they've even electrified the kitchen cabinet itself. A new fixture called a "totalite," which fits in the base of these unusually-styled glass-door "pantryettes," has a two-way fluorescent light, and convenient electrical outlets to plug in the toaster, coffee-maker or electric mixer. The light illuminates both counter-top below, and the interior of the "pantryette."

Dairymen Must Cut Operation Cost To Make A Profit

COLLEGE STATION, March 25.—Plans should be made now ays R. E. Burleson, dairy husandman for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, to provide the dairy herd with ample pasture and forage during the next 12 to 15 months. At least one acre of sudan for summer grazing, six tons of silage and two tons of hay for each cow in the herd, should be the mintmum goal, he adds.

The first step in the forage program, believes the specialist, is to collect and submit soil samples for testing not only from crop land but pastures as well. Soils, he says, can be over or under fed the same as a dairy cow and the only accurate way for determining what is needed in the soil, is through soil testing.

Competition and milk prices, says Burleson, are factors which are now calling the signals in the dairy industry. To meet the situation, operations must be made more efficient. The dairyman, he says, who puts into practice the known methods for cutting costs will continue to make a profit from his opera-

In addition to growing most of the roughage at home, another mighty important consideration for the dairywan is the growing of replacements for the herd. It takes as long to raise a heifer as it does to build a battleship, so do a good job, advises Burle-
