WTU to Ask for Fixed Fuel Factor Increase

West Texas Utilities will file a request early next week with the Public Utility Commission to reconcile historical fuel costs and increase our fixed fuel factors to reflect expected increases in the cost of fuel.

The new factors are not expected to affect customers' bills until later this year or early in 1992. The actual date will be determined by the time it takes to complete the regulatory process.

Travis Williams, WTU local manager, said the new factors will increase the average residential customers' bill by \$1.44 a month, or 2.5 percent, based on consumption of 660 kilowatt-hours per month.

"Our cost to residential customers is essentially divided into two major parts, the base rate and the fuel factor," said Williams. Fuel factors make up about forty percent of the total cost to customers.

The company is requesting the increase now primarily for three reasons. First, it has under-recovered retail fuel and purchased power costs through December 1990 by \$3,050,015.

Second, the PUC has recently expressed the opinion that fuel costs should be reconciled at least every three years through either a rate case or a fuel reconciliation case such as we are filing. WTU's fuel costs were last reconciled in a rate case which covered a period ending with March 31, 1987, almost four years ago.

Third, while WTU may be

over-recovering during some of this year (partly as a result of renegotiated terms in a major gas contract), they expect that will change to some extent during 1992. In other words, by the time a decision is reached in Austin the company expects the new fuel factors will be necessary.

The company is not asking to collect its present under-recovery balance at this time. Instead it is asking to update the balance just prior to conclusion of the case and make a refund or surcharge over a twelve month period if that is warranted.

During the upcoming proceeding the company will present information on all fuel and purchased power costs since April 1987 to demonstrate that it has generated electricity efficiently, used effective cost controls, and negotiated fuel-related contracts in a manner that produced the lowest reasonable costs for customers.

The company's cost control efforts include construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide access to more suppliers, renegotiation of supply and transportation contracts for gas and coal and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so that they burn less fuel to make electricity.

Legal notices of this filing will be published in newspapers of general circulation in WTU's service area. In addition, customers will receive individual notice by post card according to requirements of the commission.

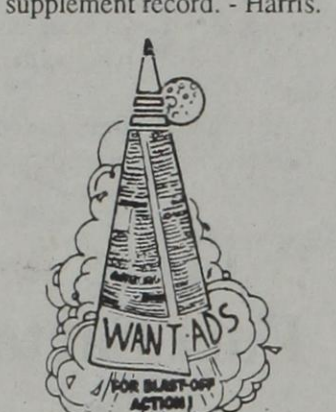

Texas Hunting & Fishing Fees to Increase

If there was ever a morning during this winter that gave promise of spring, warmer water and a better bite for your bait, it had to have been this past Monday. An unusually warm day coupled with the warm light gentle rain made my arm ache as if it were diseased. And I suppose a disease it is but what a way to go, me mother nature and few good friends fishing.

The warm rains will keep bringing water temperatures up some so if your out looking for a lunker, go ahead and check out the shallows back of river channels, especially on the north shore.

The second big bass of 1991 has been landed in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Lone Star Lunker program, Tony Seeton of Burleson submitted a 13 pound, 10.72 ounce Lake Fork lunker on a crawworm Thursday. The fish measured 25 1/2 inches long and had a girth of 21 inches. Sounds like this sow had just began showing an egg laden belly folks.

Lunker time is getting near. T. P. & W. officials are calling for an increase in rec-

reation hunting and fishing license this year. The plan calls for a combination license to increase from \$15.00 to \$20.00. A resident fishing license would go up from \$10.00 to \$13.00 and a residence fishing license would step up from \$8.00 to \$11.00. At this \$11.00 per black bass an angler would only have to catch a one day limit of 5-14 inch bass to equal in cost per fish stocked on the average. But better get it would only take one happy youngster with their first fish to call it even.

These increases will still put Texas as one of the cheapest but one of the best states for outdoor activities.

Don't forget the 1991 Anglers Choice Professional Draw kick-off at scenic Lake Sam Rayburn Feb. 9 & 10 for the Central Region. These events will continue with March 9 & 10 Lake Quachita, May 18 & 19 Lake Eufaula, June 22 & 23, Lake Palestine and July 20 & 21, Toledo Bend.

Pharmacy Topics

The newest in beauty surgery--plastic surgeons in Texas and elsewhere are implanting new, high "checkbones" made of silicone. Surgery is done through the mouth, so there are no visible scars.

Migraine sufferers get early help if they use ice packs while waiting for medication to give relief, the journal Emergency Medicine reports.

Keeping a journal for writing down one's deepest thoughts may offer "preventive psychotherapy," says a professor of psychology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Writing helps organize stressful feelings, making them more manageable, he explains.

In a study in England, women at high risk for breast cancer are taking tamoxifen, a drug that blocks estrogen from binding with receptors in cancer-prone tissues. The drug, given to prevent recurrence in women who have had breast cancer, may be tested as a preventive here too.

Chicken pox fevers and lesions can be lessened with the use of acyclovir, say researchers at the University of Minnesota.

Request for cost-sharing of conservation practices are continuously being accepted. The County Committee has determined that they will consider requests at their meeting February 21. Additional approval periods will be announced as funds become available. Practices applicable at this time include planting grasses, reorganizing irrigation systems, and water impoundment reservoirs.

Practices that are started prior to approval by the county committee are not eligible for cost-sharing.

Requests for cost-shares under the Long Term Agreement program (LTA) will be accepted February 4 through February 15.

The LTA concept of solving conservation problems is to concentrate on a particular area with a contract for conservation work to be done over a three to five year period. Cost-shares are generally based on 50 percent of the average cost and are limited to \$3,500 per person per year.

Your assistance is requested in keeping your farm records current. If you have leased, sold, purchased or rented additional land, please let us know.

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Act requires foreign-ers who have certain land transactions to file a report within 90 days of the transaction at the ASCS office where the land is located.

USDA has announced that it expects the 1991 National Peanut Poundage Quota will be 1,550,000 short tons, down 10,000 short tons from the 1990 level.

Information concerning the 1991 Peanut Program will be provided to producers as soon as received.

A multi-county Peanut Short Course will be held at 9 a.m. Feb. 20 in the Desdemona School Building. Pre-register by calling the Eastland County Extension Office (629-1093) before 5 p.m., Feb. 15.

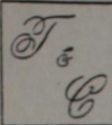

The calf scramble is an exciting part of Houston rodeo action, featuring Clint Black as part of that evening performance.

Jeremy, the son of Fred and Nannette Keith, will compete for one of 252 calves to be awarded at the 1991 Show.

Additionally, as many as two youngsters from each of the 18 rodeo performances will be awarded "hard luck" certificates for their hearty efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 36 more certificates actually given.

An entertaining event whose net proceeds provide educational contributions to Texas students, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo ranks as the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships. Currently, more than 1,000 students are on Show-sponsored scholarships. The Show's educational commitment for the 1990-91 school year exceeds \$2 million.

Equally important is the Show's commitment to youngsters competing at the event itself. The calf scramble is one of the Show's major programs benefiting youth, requiring a yearlong commitment from the winter to the animal project.

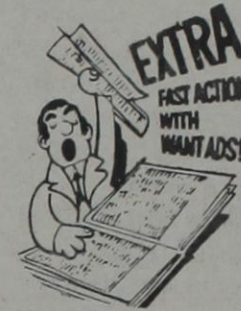
When you grow much older, the muscles in your skin will become weak and your skin will lose some of its stretch. It will be too big for you again and little folds - called wrinkles - will develop.
