## Heritage Cemetery Association Meets

A regular monthly meeting of officers met September 10, 1979, in the home of Mrs. Melvin Shook. Mrs. Glen Henry, treasurer, gave the report of expenditures and assets from January 1 to August 13, 1979. Due to donations and maintenance fees for grave permits, progress has been made in improving the cemetery, but much work still remains in marking lots properly, filling graves, and cleaning curbs. Some problems, and possibly misunderstandings arise, regarding issuing maintenance permits. These permits are required and designed to help maintain one of the largest cemeteries to be found in any small town and community. It is hopeful that the

Permanent Fund or Perpetual Care, which has grown from a very few dollars to a modest sum will continue to build so that the City of the Dead can be maintained in an admirable manner as a Perpetual Care Cemetery, when all burial spaces have been taken and the gates are closed. Some years ago our city council helped to devise a plan whereby permits could be issued and lots reserved to be paid before burial or at interment. As time passes, and the Cemetery grows larger, along with increases in maintenance such as caretaker salary, gasoline for mowers, clearing of dead trees and shrubs, filling of graves, much more financial assistance will be required. Mr. Herbert Cain has served as

caretaker for the past year and has made many needed improvements. If builders of curbs could be regulated, artificial flowers controlled (each time it is a possible hazard for the lawn-mower blade), better care can be given to your lot. Your help is needed! Many people have gone on, leaving no one to care for his place, so we, the living, hope to keep the traditions our fathers began of showing our caring and respect for the deceased. ## Sept. 27th Is Cystic Fibrosis Campaign

The Cystic Fibrosis Breath of Life Campaign, an annual appeal for funds to help children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases, begins in Rising Star on Thursday, Sept. 27th, according to Mrs. George Steel, chairman of the appeal. Mrs. Steel will be assisted in the door-to-door drive by students of the Homemaking Department of Rising Star High School, under the sponsorship of Mrs. Harley Ray Diddle. Cystic Fibrosis is the most serious of all lung-damaging diseases. Inherited by one in every 1,600 American children, it is incurable and ultimately fatal. "Progress has been made," says Mrs. Steel. "When the CF Foundation was established in 1955, few children with CF survived to school age. Today, with early diagnosis and com-

prehensive treatment, a child with CF has a 50 per cent chance of living past age 19." Improved techniques have increased both the quality and quantity of life, but these children and young people still require specialized care and treatment throughout their short lives. Time is running out for these kids and we need a cure for CF. The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation supports vital research into the cause of CF and a cure or control for the disease. It also supports specialized clinical care for individuals with CF and other related respiratory and digestive diseases. There are 121 Cystic Fibrosis Centers in the U.S., specializing in the diagnosis and treatment of CF, chronic bronchitis, severe asthma, bronchiectasis and recurrent pneumonia. The

Foundation also conducts nationwide professional and education programs designed to foster early diagnosis and treatment which extends and improves the lives of all lung-damaged children. The North-East Texas Chapter is one of over 100 CF chapters and branches in the United States conducting fund appeals to support the CF Foundation's programs of research, care and education. "We are asking residents of Rising Star to give as generously as they can when a Breath of Life volunteer calls on them," says Mrs. Steel. "Through contributions to this campaign we will see a day in which lung-damaging diseases, including cystic fibrosis, no longer take more children's lives than any other disease except cancer."

Scott Anderson from the Nimrod 4-H Club placed 4th with a senior yearling Jersey heifer in the open show and 2nd in the junior show.

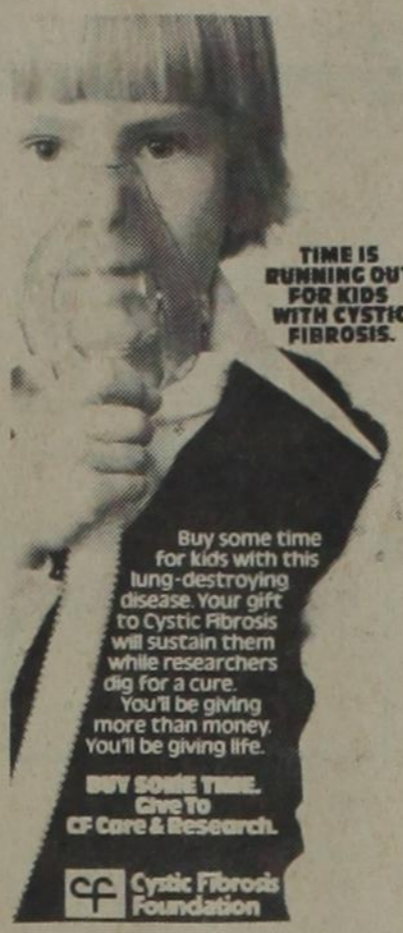
Bud Wood from Nimrod placed 1st and 3rd with a

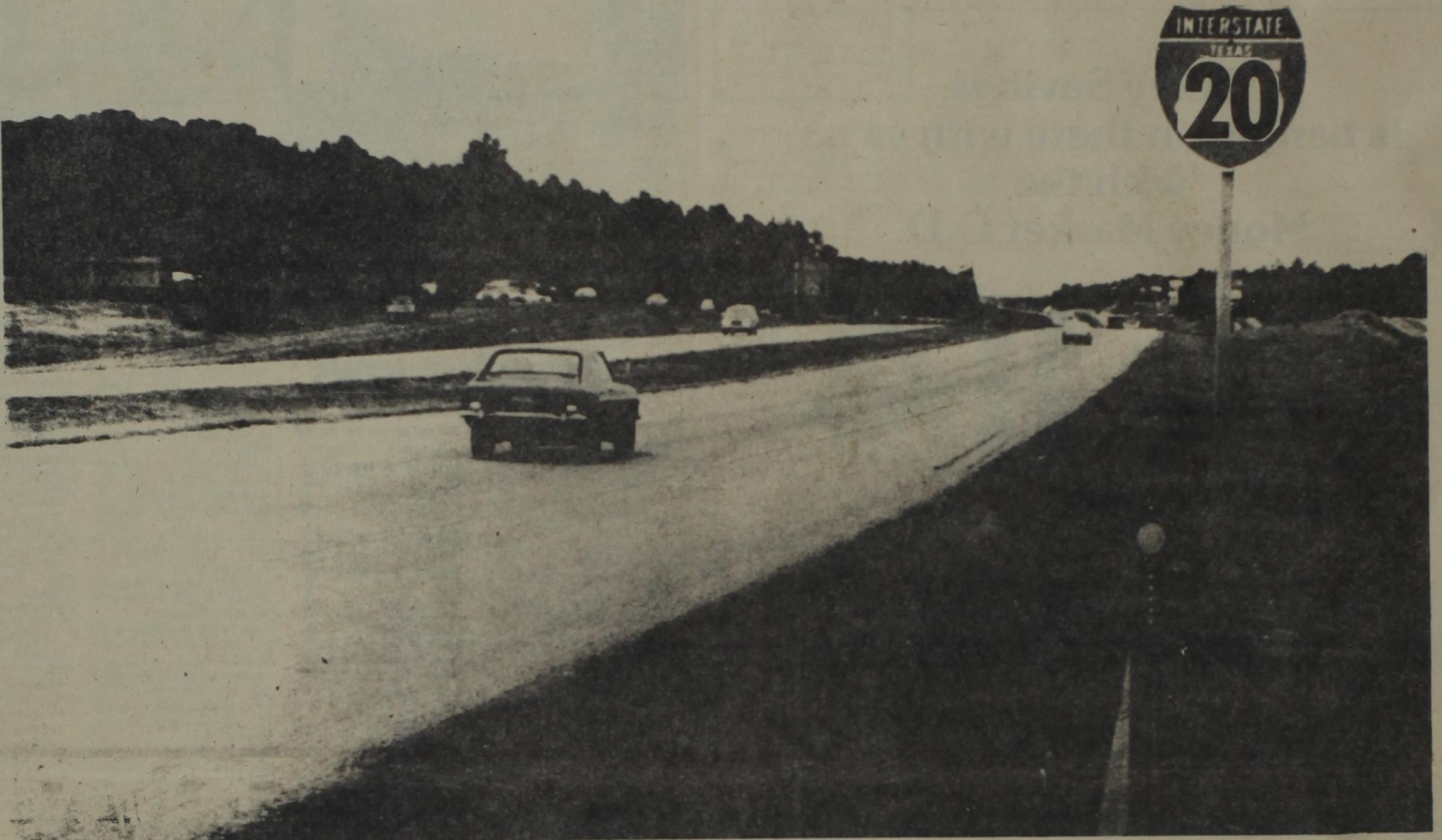

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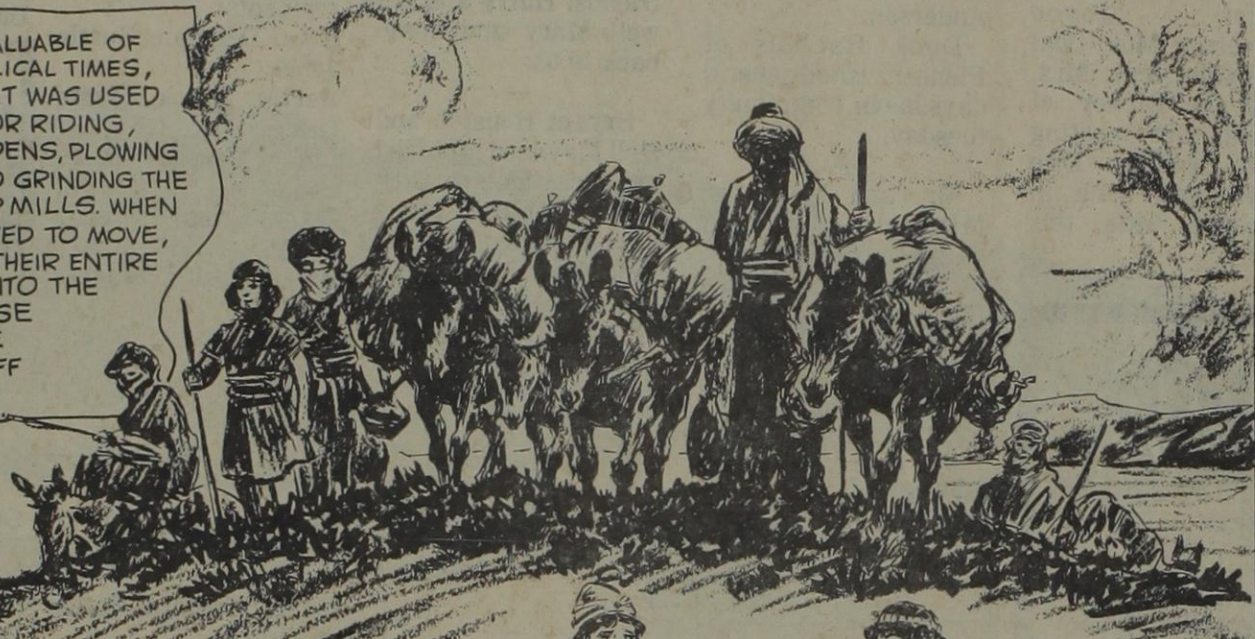

# GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

It seems we missed another chance for rain last week. Farmers and ranchers in Eastland County have been hoping for rain to finish what could have been record breaking yields in 1979.

However, because of the dry weather in September, it appears now that we have lost all chances for a bumper peanut crop. The peanuts have been stressed due to the lack of moisture for the past three weeks. This will hurt the Runner types more than the Spanish type peanuts because the Runner types require about three more weeks to mature than the Spanish types.

Grain Sorghum crops promised excellent yields in August, but now the prospects are somewhat less. The peanut and grain producing areas of the County had good soil moisture up until September. The

northern one half of the County has been dry all summer and fall except for good rains on August 20th and 21st. The rainfall in the Eastland area for 1979 is three inches below average for this time of year.

The pecan crop still looks good in Eastland County as well as across the state. Based on September 1 conditions, the Texas pecan crop is forecast at a record 95,000,000 pounds. This year's production is expected to more than triple the 26 million pound crop of 1978, and if current conditions hold throughout the fall, the crop should be the largest on record since estimates began being kept in 1919. Production from native and seedling varieties is estimated at 80 million pounds with improved varieties forecast at 15 million pounds. In some locations trees are so heavily

loaded with limbs have broken from the added weight.

Nationally, pecan production is estimated at 256.7 million pounds, up 2 percent from 1978.

We have recently had questions concerning mealybugs on stored potatoes. We do not have any insecticides cleared for use directly on the potatoes themselves.

The infestation usually occurs when potatoes are stored in the same area for a few years or come into contact with old, infested potatoes.

Infested potatoes can be cleaned by soaking in water (with a bit of soap) over night.

To prevent infestation clean storage area of old debris, potatoes, ect. A spray of malathion may be used in the area. Let it dry before placing potatoes in the treated area. If straw, mulch, or other material is to be used do not use old material. Use clean, fresh material each season. Once cleaned, infested potatoes may be eaten.

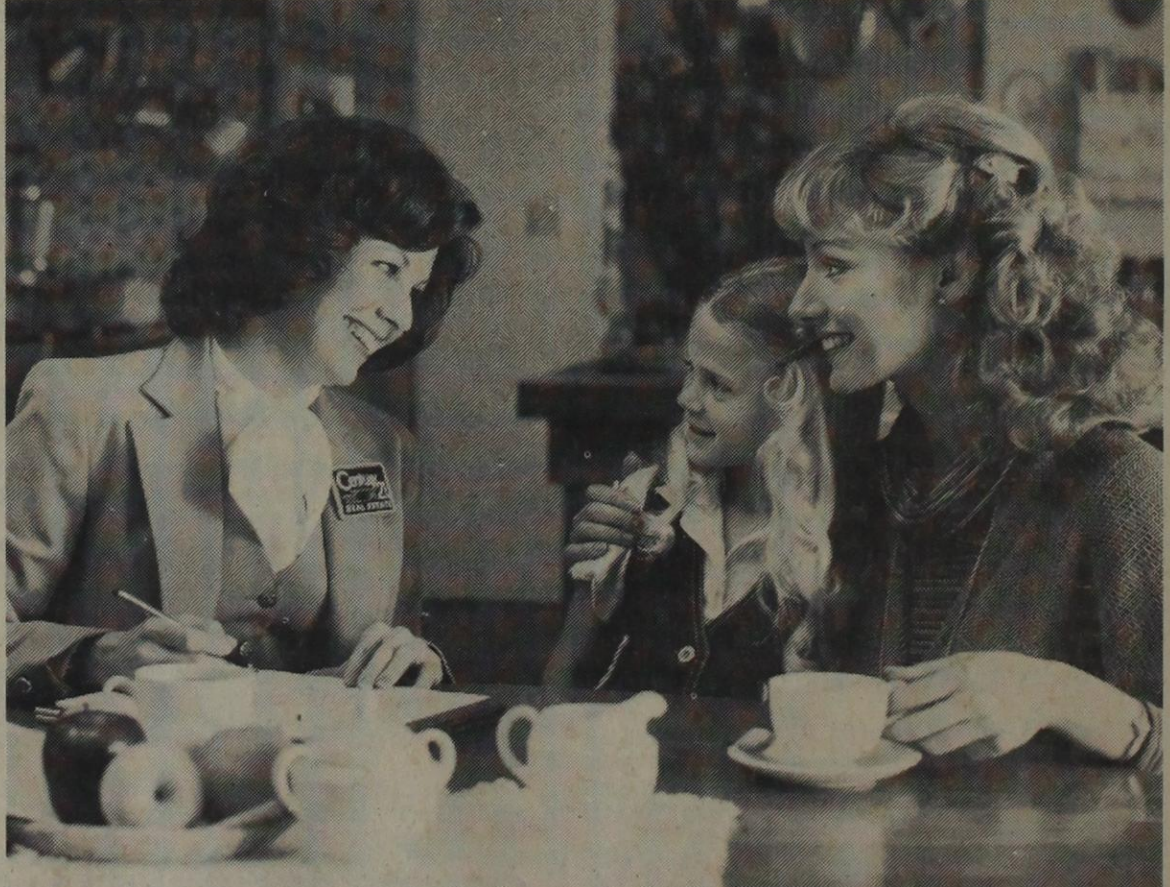

## CJC Community Service Courses Offered

Cisco Junior College will offer twelve different Community Service courses to people in the general area of Cisco during the current Fall semester. Community Service courses are open to everyone, have no admission requirements, and are usually taken by people interested in the subject for the pleasure of learning it or how to do it. The courses are designed primarily for adults, but one is offered especially for children. Each course will carry a small tuition fee to cover the basic costs of offering it.

Beginning the week of September 24, 1979, Monday evening classes are as follows: Typing--fundamental techniques for beginning and out-of-practice typists; Micro-Computer--an introduction to the micro-computer for small businesses and hobbyists.

Tuesday afternoon and evening offerings are: Art for children--beginning and intermediate art for children ages 5-14; Adult Oil Painting--beginning and intermediate painting for adults; Beginning Cake decorating--basics of cake decorating; Ladies

Bowling--exercise and fun for ladies, basic techniques of bowling; and Basic Welding--Oxy-acetylene and electrical welding for beginners.

Wednesday night classes include: Conversational Spanish--fundamental principles of communicating in Spanish; Ballroom Dancing--an opportunity to learn the basic steps in ballroom dancing; and Tole Painting--basic tole and decorative painting for beginners.

Thursday evening offerings are Water Color Painting--basic techniques and procedures in water color painting; and advanced Cake Decorating--advanced techniques of cake decorating.

Interested persons may pre-register through the CJC Registrar's office, or at the time of the first class meeting. Early registration is advised because some of the courses have a class size limit. Tuition costs range from \$10.00 to \$16.00 with some classes requiring the students to furnish their own supplies.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Teresa Brasher of

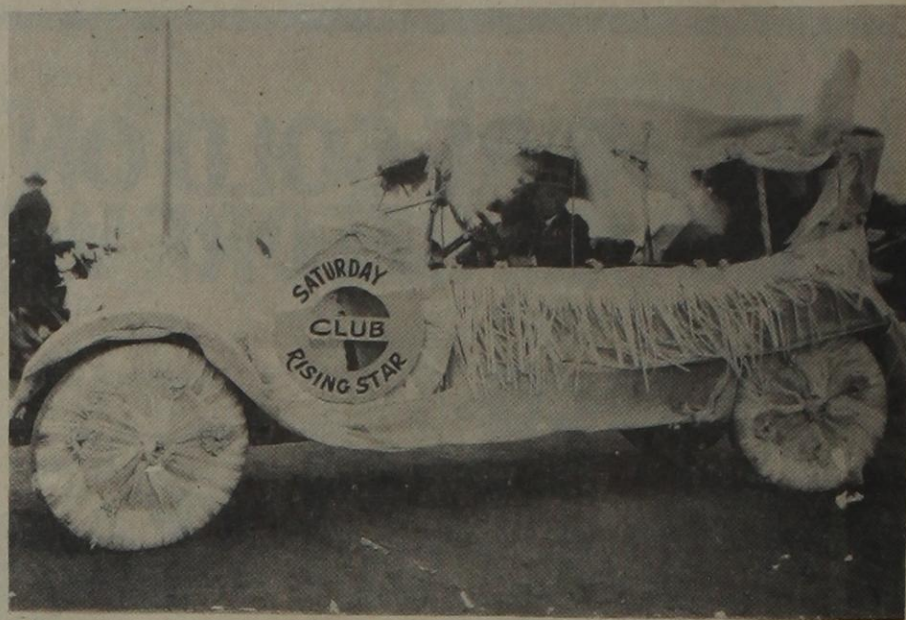
