



Consumer Views Important to Cattlemen

College Station --Cattlemen must know the changing needs and attitudes that consumers have toward beef before they can hope for beef consumption to increase.

High beef prices are the major reason that consumers give for not buying red meat. This explains the noticeable per capita decline in beef consumption since 1976, says Mary K. Sweeten, food and nutrition specialist with the Texas A & M Extension Service.

'High prices have forced consumers to cut back on beef purchases, substitute

cheaper cuts, and buy poultry and fish rather than beef. Others have stopped buying beef altogether," Sweeten explains.

"Cattlemen should realize that recent major changes in society have affected food consumption. What should we eat to stay healthy? Hardly a day goes by without someone trying to answer that question. Newspapers, magazines, books, radio nd television give us a lot of advice on what foods we should or should not eat.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has published "Dietary Guidelines for Americans". These guidelines are: 1) Eat a variety of foods, 2) Maintain ideal weight, 3) Avoid too much fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol, 4) Eat foods with adequate starch and fiber, 5) Avoid too much sugar, 6) Avoid too much sodium, 7) If you drink

These guidelines are suggested for most Americans. They do not apply to people who need special diets because of diseases or health problems.

alcohol, do so in moderation.

Food alone cannot make you healthy. But good eating abits based on moderation hd variety can help keep you healthy and even improve your health.

Frequently, we receive calls at the Extension office by persons wanting information on which foods contain high or significant amounts of sodium which should be eaten in moderation or avoided in low-sodium diets.

Table salt is the most common source of sodium. Many foods contain added salt because of the processing through which they are made ready for consumers. Some of these sources are: Preservatives in ham, bacon, frankfurters, frozen or dried fish and dried beef. Brines used in corned beef, sauerkraut and pickles also have significant amounts of sodium.

All mixes such as dried fruit-flavored drink mixes, pudding mixes, cake mixes, and biscuit mix as well as commercially baked goods

contain sodium. Quick cooking cereals and processed cheeses contain disodium phosphate. Sodium benzoate is used as a preservative in sauces, relishes, and salad dressings.

Drinking water may contain sodium without tasting salty. Your local board of Health or water board should be able to give you the sodium content of your water supply.

Some other sources of sodium we don't normally think about are the "stick-um" on postage stamps and envelopes also have sodium in the glue. Low calorie carbonated drinks may be higher in sodium than the regular carbonated soda drinks.

Sodium is very important and our bodies need the right amount. Too little sodium is just as hazardous to our health as too much. Sodium plays a regulatory role in our body's metabolism. Sodium compounds are responsible for maintaining osmotic pressure between cells and surrounding fluids. Sodium is important in maintaining the pH (acid/base balance) of the blood and other body fluids. Sodium compounds produce alkinlinity in the small intestine which is necessary for digestion.

Excessive consumption of sodium may increase the retention of body fluids. Research has indicated that high sodium intake contributes to the development of high blood pressure. Also reduced perspiration resulting from today's limited activity and extensive use of air-conditioning necessitates chronic excretion of excess sodium by the kidneys which may contribute to their eventual malfunction.

To avoid too much sodium in your daily diet, learn to enjoy the unsalted flavors of foods. Cook only with small amounts of added salt. Add little or no salt at the table. Limit your intake of salty foods such as chips, salted nuts, popcorn, pickled foods,

cured meats, etc. Read food tables carefully to determine the amounts of sodium in processed foods and snack items. Check with your medical doctor concerning your body's requirement for sodium.

Boiled Cookies are a favorite of mine. They are quick to prepare for they do not have to be baked in the oven. They are delicious'

BOILED COOKIES

2 cups sugar 12 cup milk

12 cup margarine 14 cup cocoa

12 cup peanut butter 3 cups cooking oats, uncook-

12 cup pecans, chopped

2 teaspoons vanilla In large sauce pan, combine sugar, milk, margarine and cocoa. Blend and bring to a boil on surface unit. Stir and let boil about 2 minutes. Add peanut butter and stir until blended. Remove from heat and add uncooked oats, nuts and vanilla. Beat until well blended and thick. Spoon onto wax paper and mixture can be packed in a greased pan and cut into serving pieces. May be considered either candy or cookies. Yield 3-4 dozen pieces.

U.S. AGRICULTURE STILL A TOP IN-DUSTRY

Today's consumers benefit fromt he fact that U.S. agriculture remains a giant among American industries.

It sill has the capacity, says Dr. W.E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, to produce all the food needed at home as well as for many people abroad.

The average U.S. farmer today feeds 48 at home and 22 abroad. This so-called capacity is primarily the result of new technology and capital flowing into agriculture. But, productivity agriculture is slowing down, Black warns, primarily because of the reduced research support to this critical industry.

"U.S. agriculture plays a vital role in defraying part of the mounting fuel import bill. In 1981, we will likely export \$48.5 billion of food and import about \$18.5 billion. U.S. agriculture will generate about a \$30 billion positive balance of trade. In order to bring in these dollars, the U.S. will export about 163 billion metric tons

of food and fiber". "The world is better off because the U.S. is an agricultural giant", Black says. "Our future food supply depends on increasing yields per acre, rather than putting new lands under the plow. Today, the farmer is using more sophisticated

machinery, better seeds, herbicides, insecticides, antibiotics, and so on. With increased research support, he may well be poised on the threshold of even greater technological revolution," he adds.

Increasing costs of capital, fuel, water, labor and other production needs are of much concern to farmers. Producers are not always able to transfer these rising costs to consumers as they occur, and consquently many are caught up in a tight cost-price squeeze very rapidly.


Folk Life Festival Slide Presentation Available




Ruby Martin


