My Story

Concerning the joyous return to their native home land and to freedom by the 52 Americans, after more than a year of physical, mental and political restraint, there are numberless stories which could be written. Doubtless, many will be told and written. But, the one story rising out of it, which I most want to write, is possibbly the most difficult to put into words. For, the picture from which I take my story is without physical form; it comes near to being a matter of the spirit of America.

The return of the former hostages came at a time when our great nation was at a low ebb. Unity seemed to be something we talked about--a precious concept once held dear in this country, along with those of freedom, equality and the pursuit of happiness. For at least a decade, the nation had been experiencing much which divided the thoughts and feelings of her people. The Viet Nam Action had

Americans now observe a renewal of deep and loving pride in this great Land we call our own. Unity and hope have risen up, strongly, from the old mass of division and

pain. Once again, God has blessed indeed America!



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

evaporate or dry out.

More expensive items are not necessarily better products but perhaps just more expensively packaged or advertised.

"Buy one, get one free" or buy \$10, get a \$25 value for \$5" is not a bargain unless

you need all or the majority of items included, the

specialist advises. However, if these items are needed, these promotions are well worth it.

Comments should be sent to the Director, Price Support and Loan Division, ASCS-USDA, Room 3741 S, P.O.Box 215, Washington, D.C.20013.

MARKETING CARDS Peanit marketing cards and producer ID cards are to be returned to the office as soon as sales are completed but in no event later than January 31, 1981.

1980 ASCS PROGRAM **PAYMENTS**

During the last two weeks in January producers will receive Form CCC 182 which will reflect all program payments made during the 1980 program year.

WOOL AND UN-**SHORN LAMBS**

January 31, 1981 is the final date to submit the original sales receipt for shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold during the 1980 calendar year.

CROP NORMAL ACREAGE

The normal crop acreage (NCA) requirements for the 1981 crops have been suspended by an amendment to the USDA Appropriation Act for fiscal 1981. Therefore, farmers will be eligible for program benefits, target prices, crop loans, etc. regardless of their planted acreage for 1981.

As previously announced there is no set aside requirements for wheat, cotton, or feed grains. The NCA limitation is not applicable for the 1981 crop year. Anu increase in acreage in 1981 shall not be used in determining normal crop acreage in future years.


