

More than 600 nursing homes are members of the state association. These licensed nursing homes provide more than 70% of the 47,000 nursing home beds now available in this State.

Theme of Texas Nursing Home Week is "Nursing Homes: For The Better Life." The theme was chosen to dramatize the changes taking place in the nation's nursing homes which, during the past decade, have modernized their facilities and programs and now offer a wide range of therapy and para-medical services to chronically ill and convalescent patients of all ages.


