At Washington all members who have enrolled and failed to report are considered "slackers" because it is not known what they have done. Please let me hear from everyone of you at once because ! know there is not a "slacker' boy or girl in San Saba county and want to prove it to the Washington office. This is the only way I can do it.

Do Not Fear When Fighting a

STEADIER HOG MARKETS PLANNED

Hog Producers and Packers Confer With Representatives of the Food Administration and Agricultural Department and Adopt New Plan of Regulation.

In accordance with the policy of the Food Administration since its foundation to consult representative men in the agricultural industry on occasions of importance to special branches of the industry, on October 24 there was convened in Washington a meeting of the Live Stock Subcommittee of the Agricultural Advisory Board and the special members representing the swine industry to consider the situation in the hog market.

The conference lasted for three days, and during this time met with the executive committee of the fifty packing firms participating in foreign order for pork products and with the members of the Food Administration directing foreign pork purchases.





St. Louis, Nov .- The American Red Cross must answer the! appeal of civilian war sufferers and continue its work of reconstruction, said George W. Simmons, manager for the Southwestern Division of the organization. His statement was made in regard to the work of the Red Cross now that the war has

Simmons said that the work of the organization will be inbecause of the great amount of relief that must be given. He said the French and Belgians and Italians in many cases had been reduced to starvation and that the world looks to the Red Crosss to save these sufferers and restore conditions swept

away by the war.

"Armistice and peace does not mean a cessation of Red Cross work," said Simmons.

"No power in the world can aid in physical and human reconstruction as one the American struction as can the American Red Cross. We would be unworthy of the high ideals in which the world holds us if we now fail in this responsibility. Now is our opportunity as civilians to do our big share for those who have been fighting our fight for us until we could get into it ourselves." While the Red Cross must

have large sums of money to relieve the war sufferers, a date for raising funds has not been set. It is probable that subscriptions may be asked in the spring. From December 16 to 23, the organization will conduct a membership campaign. It is hoped that every American in the world will join the Red Cross during the campaign.



The undersigned committee appointed by the United States Food Administration on stabilization and control of hog prices affecting the those agreement made in Washington last week wish to announce the following here tor you.


There has been appointed in each market a sub-committee to work out the plan of the Food Administration which shall consist of one representative of the packers, one representative of the commission men, a representative of the Bureau of Markets and where the Bureau of Markets is not representated, the first two mentioned shall select a third member. This committee shall be in control of price stabilization and this shall be understood as affecting all purchases and sales of hogs. It shall be understood that all parties covered by this agreement will undertake not to buy or sell hogs for less than the following agreed minimums for the month of November, that is a daily minimum of \$17.50 per hundred pounds on average of packers' droves, excluding throw-outs; throw-outs to be defined as pigs under 130 pounds, stags, boars, thin sows and skips; further, that no hogs of any kind except throw-outs shall be bought or sold at less than \$16.50 per hundred pounds; the average of packers' droves to be construod as the average of the total sales in the market of all hogs except throw-outs for a given day. 



NEW RULES AND REGULATIONS ADOPTED BY FOOD



T a meeting of representatives of seed growers, seed dealers, farmers and others interested in pure seed for the Texas farmer, held in Houston August 23, 1918, a vesolution was unanimously adopted requesting the Federal Food Administrator for Texas to formulate and promulgate rules and regulations controlling the sale and handling of field seeds.

In compliance with these recommendations E. A. Peden, Federal Food Administrator for Texas, prepared and submitted to the legal department of the United States Food Administration for approval a set of rules and regulations carrying out the wish as expressed at the conference August 23, 1918. These rules and regulations were approved by the Washington office and Mr. Peden was instructed to promulgate them.

There is no State statute controlling the sale and distribution of field seeds.

The new rules and regulations are as follows:

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. There is hereby created an organization of seed dealers in an event as important as a birthday Texas, to be known as "Food Administration's Certified Seed Dealers of Texas.'

Sec. 2. Membership in said organization shall be voluntary.

Sec. 3. Membership shall be received upon application made to and minds of American mothers this year granted by and in the discretion of the Federal Food Administrator for Texas. Sec. 4. Wholesalers, retailers, jobbers, brokers and growers of field seed,

whether dealing exclusively therein or not, shall be eligible to membership. Sec. 5. ARTICLE VIL

\ Section 1. All field seeds sold or offered for sale shall be clean, as here-

"They must be sound, bright, of uniform size and color, free of insects, germs and spores of disease, and of germinating power in accordance with the table hereinafter set out. They shall not contain more than 3 per cent of forcent allowance may be made for broken grains, and shall not contain more that one noxious weed seed or foreign seed to each 500 of the variety of seed offered for sale. In any lot of seed offered for sale, the seed shall not be less than 85 per cent of any variety offered." Sec. 3. The following are hereby classed as noxious weed seeds:

Seeds of dodder, Russian thistle, bind, weed and other varieties of wild

Section 1. The following standards of germination shall be used as a minimum in all seeds sold or offered for sale. "Alfalfa, 85 per cent; clover, 75 per cent; all other sogbums, 75 per cent; broom corn, 75 per cent; oats, 85 per cent; barley, 85 per cent; wheat, 85 per cent; rye, 85 per cent; Speltz and Limmer, 75 per cent; cowpeas, 80 per cent; to count as one seed, 75 per cent; vetch, 75 per cent; rape, 85 per cent; millet, 80 per cent; Johnson grass, 75 per cent; Bermuda grass, 75 per cent; Sudan grass, 75 per cent, and Rhodes grass, 45 per cent."

Military Situation Forms No Adequate Reason for Relaxation of Conservation Plans.

The nation-wide campaign of the United States Food Administration setting forth the new food program for American homes, because of influenza, has been deferred from the week of Oct. 27 to Nov. 2 to the week of Dec. 1. The week will begin with conservation Sunday on Dec. 1. The December date is necessary in order to avoid conflict with the Y. M. C. A. campaign

Mr. Hoover advises Mr. Peden that vation, but, on the contrary, the European developments make emphasis upon this conservation effort as particularly important. The evacuation of occupied territory imposes upon the American people responsibility for additional civilian population, and every acre regained means so many additional mouths that must be fed.

Food Control After War. control after the war?" Mr. Hoover was asked.

He replied: "Well, what do you think? There are practically 53,000, 000 people starving right now in Poland and Russia. There are more in request. Roumania and Serbia. We are doing nothing for them now, but we must do when the chance comes. So far as the western allies are concerned we are sending them now what is equivalent to food enough for 30,000,000 people. That represents their deficiency. That deficiency will not disappear with peace. And there are all the starving people we are not reaching now to be considered. I will not speak of the people in the enemy countries.

"We can't stop when the war stops For one thing, if we abandon control of exports, if we went back to conditions as they were before the Food Administration was created, we'd have a famine in this country within six months of peace. Europe would storm our markets. We must maintain regulation for that reason alone. But I think we will want to do it for the same idealistic reasons that have been responsible for our conservation pro gram up to now.

Animal Herds Wiped Out.

"The animal herds of many parts of Europe are being wiped out-they are almost gone in some places. They had to be slaughtered for meat and because they couldn't be fed. So here we have been working to build up a great animal reserve. We must replenish those herds for them after the war-we must be ready to do it. Those herds mean milk and butter and fat as well as meat. And the meat is going to be vitally important in rebuilding the weakened and impoverished peoples who have had to go through the strain of the war.

"We're getting the reserve. Doing that involves a good many problems. Feed is one. Then there are drouths and blights that we have to combat as they come. We have to move cattle by train at times from a section where they can't be fed or watered. Still we are succeeding and there are no difficulties we can't overcome. We are doing splendidly with hogs. A year ago our herd of hogs numbered about 60,000,000. Now it has gone up to 90,-

Now Looking Ahead.

"These are facts which answer the question. We are looking ahead now to the time after the war. We still have plenty to do during the war and will have, and the war is not over yet, nor can we see the end of it. But we can't ignore what we shall bave to do afterward. If we do, we will not be
