Low voter turnout reported for **November 8 Texas Constitution** Amendment early voting

More than a week into early voting, only 248 out of 44,000 registered voters have participated in the current Constitutional Amendment election.

"It's been really slow," said Rockwall County elections administrator Glenda Denton, indicating disappointment with the voter turnout.

Despite a multi-faceted campaign to spur participation and increase voter awareness, the public has not been responsive. Some have shown interest the redistricting process, and even the ID Bill, which may have an impact on the next election, but not this one, said Denton.

The Elections Office expends many hours, and a great deal of man-hours and public resources to hold an election, including the training necessary to ensure the procedures are followed and election laws are all properly upheld.

Denton attributed the apathy to the absence of any truly controversial items on the ballot, which typically draw Metroplex media attention. Denton recorded several video public service announcements, detailing the issues surrounding the Nov. 8 election, and explaining procedures to abate any voter confusion.

Expressing a hope that voters will respond and participate on Nov. 8, the Elections Office will proceed with ongoing efforts to educate and engage the public.

"A lot of people don't think the constitutional amendment elections are anything to worry about," said Denton, "but this is what affects how you live."

Critical facts for Rockwall County voters on the Nov. 8 election:

The 16 polling places have not changed.

• The Rockwall County redistricting plan is still in progress and will not have any effect on this constitutional amendment election.

• The "ID Bill" is still in the pre-approval stage with the U.S. Department of Justice. If approved by the DOJ, new requirements will be effective Jan. 1.

Memorial, new courthouse opening slated Nov. 11

World War I ended on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, 1918. Twenty-seven years later, on Sept. 2, 1945, World War II ended with the signing of the surrender papers by the Japanese on the Battleship Missouri located in Tokyo Bay. And almost immediately afterward, the men and women from Rockwall County who had served in that second Great War

One of the first things they did, as reported in the local paper in 1945, was declare a desire and a need for the building of a veterans memorial here in Rockwall County to honor all of those men and women who had served in

And now, 66 years later, on the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the eleventh year next Friday, Rockwall County will dedicate that veterans memorial that our veterans so justly deserve.

I suggest you are going to be impressed. This memorial is not the classic statue you might expect to find on the square. Instead it is a memorial that ties together the veterans from WW I to those who have served all the way through

On God's Word

"Are We Downhearted?"

"Are we down-hearted? No! No! No! Troubles may come and troubles may go. We trust in Jesus, come weal or woe. Are we down-hearted? No! No! No!" These lyrics, by Robert Harkness, drive in some very powerful truths from God's word, which tenderizes and heals all meek hearts.

At first glance it might appear the Harkness was confused about the human condition. How can anyone be joyful as troubles come and go? The reason God gave his word to heal our hearts is because He knows that we are capable of being down-hearted or burdened with sadness and pain. With this in mind we can safely conclude that we are actually down-hearted at times and would not say, "No! No! No!" Otherwise we would be denying how we really feel

The down-hearted state is most often brought on because of each person's own mental reaction to an undesirable condition, whether internal or external. It's simply a natural reaction. So often, people blame their down-hearted state on the condition that hurt them. In truth, the down-hearted state sets in because of the way they mentally reacted.

Harkness was very likely teaching people to attack the state of pain and sadness with trust in God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Trust is a state of deep mental confidence. As we learn to maintain that trust, our first mental reaction is to trust in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, "come weal or woe."

When the weals and woes of life fly at us, we can face them straight on with complete and humble trust in God that he is able to help us from being directly hit. He can help us to endure the attacks. He is able to powerfully help us make things right and bless us abundantly with the desires of our hearts after having endured great pain. In the end, we are strengthened and built up in our hearts.

We will all be sad and frustrated over different things in life. But we can learn to guard our hearts from that heavy down-hearted state by not carrying the sadness and hurt for a long time to the point that it sets into the inner seat of our minds, which is the heart.

If you've been painfully down-hearted for a long time, then heal your heart by spending lots of time meditating on God's word, especially the areas that address what is bothering you or what happened. Pray often to God with thankful hearts, letting Him know how you feel and what hurt you. Replace those painful

Rockwall-Heath's volleyball team just wouldn't give up.

The Lady Hawks had come too far in the best season in their history to have it end in the first round of the playoffs.

But that's the fate they faced Tuesday night after upset-minded Frisco won the first two games of a best-of-five Bi-District playoff match at Sachse High

Rockwall-Heath rallied to win the match 23-25, 22-25, 30-28, 25-21, 18-16, improving its record to 42-5. Frisco finished its season 27-15. The Lady Hawks, ranked seventh among the state's 4A teams, advanced to Thursday's Area round against District 11-4A champion Dallas Molina.

RHHS didn't even take a lead until a kill by Regina Tillis, one of her unofficial 23 in the match, made the score 3-2 in the second game.

The Lady Hawks had trailed 16-10 in the first game, but rallied within a point of the lead before losing 25-23. In the second, their lead grew to four points at 7-3. However, a 6-0 run by the Lady Raccoons turned RHHS' 16-13 lead into a 19-16 lead for Frisco, which went on to win 25-22.

Said Rockwall-Heath head coach Maggie Younger, "They were impressive. They played a clean game of volleyball. We did have a lot of errors."

Some of those errors were balls that were falling to the middle of the court between RHHS defenders. One move Younger made was inserting Brianne Lacey into the back line during the final games after promoting her from the junior varsity for her first varsity match.

"She helped us digging-wise and passing. She's a gamer. She syncs in with our other players," the coach said.

Still, all it would take for the Lady Raccoons to complete the upset was to win one more game.

It appeared that the third game might be that game. The Lady Hawks again took a 3-2 lead, and stretched it to 16-11 before Frisco ran off five consecutive points to tie the score. After that the difference in the game, which featured seven lead changes and was tied 13 times, wasn't more than 2 points.

The Lady Hawks evened the match at two games by taking the lead for good at 12-11 on the way to a 25-21 victory in the fourth game.

Their momentum didn't last long in the tiebreaking game five to 15 points.

Frisco took an early 3-2 lead, and stretched it to 12-7. The hard-hitting Tillis went to work then with a change of pace, dropping three soft hits just over the front line for the kind of points FHS had made earlier in the match. The Lady Raccoons still had two match points at 14-12 and 14-13, but RHHS saved both of those.

Rockwall-Heath's Aubree Baune and Kailey Peters each served for the match, but FHS saved the first of those and Peters served into the net.

"We made some adjustments because we had a lot of serving errors (20 to 7 by Frisco in the first four games). We only had one in the last game, but it did come at a bad time."

RHHS overcame that error that tied the score at 16-16. On Frisco's serve, the Lady Hawks' Molly Nelson had a kill to regain the lead. Senior Kelsie Murphy then served the winning point, which came when the Lady Raccoons made a play on the ball at the net but were called for lifting the ball.

Objections to the Proposed Constitution From Extent of Territory Answered

From the New York Packet. Friday, November 30, 1787. James Madison

To the People of the State of New York:



WE HAVE seen the necessity of the Union, as our bulwark against foreign danger, as the conservator of peace among ourselves, as the guardian of our commerce and other common interests, as the only substitute for those military establishments which have subverted the liberties of the Old World, and as the proper antidote for the diseases of faction, which have proved fatal to other popular governments, and of which alarming symptoms have been betrayed by our own. All that remains, within this branch of our inquiries, is to take notice of an objection that

may be drawn from the great extent of country which the Union embraces. A few observations on this subject will be the more proper, as it is perceived that the adversaries of the new Constitution are availing themselves of the prevailing prejudice with regard to the practicable sphere of republican administration, in order to supply, by imaginary difficulties, the want of those solid objections which they endeavor in vain to find

The error which limits republican government to a narrow district has been unfolded and refuted in preceding papers. I remark here only that it seems to owe its rise and prevalence chiefly to the confounding of a republic with a democracy, applying to the former reasonings drawn from the nature of the latter. The true distinction between these forms was also adverted to on a former occasion. It is, that in a democracy, the people meet and exercise the government in person; in a republic, they assemble and administer it by their representatives and agents. A democracy, consequently, will be confined to a small spot. A republic may be extended over a large region

To this accidental source of the error may be added the artifice of some celebrated authors, whose writings have had a great share in forming the modern standard of political opinions. Being subjects either of an absolute or limited monarchy, they have endeavored to heighten the advantages, or palliate the evils of those forms, by placing in comparison the vices and defects of the republican, and by citing as specimens of the latter the turbulent democracies of ancient Greece and modern Italy. Under the confusion of names, it has been an easy task to transfer to a republic observations applicable to a democracy only; and among others, the observation that it can never be established but among a small number of people, living within a small compass of territory.

Such a fallacy may have been the less perceived, as most of the popular governments of antiquity were of the democratic species; and even in modern Europe, to which we owe the great principle of representation, no example is seen of a government wholly popular, and founded, at the same time, wholly on that principle. If Europe has the merit of discovering this great mechanical power in government, by the simple agency of which the will of the largest political body may be concentred, and its force directed to any object which the public good requires, America can claim the merit of making the discovery the basis of unmixed and extensive republics. It is only to be lamented that any of her citizens should wish to deprive her of the additional merit of displaying its full efficacy in the establishment of the comprehensive system now under her consideration.

As the natural limit of a democracy is that distance from the central point which will just permit the most remote citizens to assemble as often as their public functions demand, and will include no greater number than can join in those functions; so the natural limit of a republic is that distance from the centre which will barely allow the representatives to meet as often as may be necessary for the administration of public affairs. Can it be said that the limits of the United States exceed this distance? It will not be said by those who recollect that the Atlantic coast is the longest side of the Union, that during the term of thirteen years, the representatives of the States have been almost continually assembled, and that the members from the most distant States are not chargeable with greater intermissions of attendance than those from the States in the neighborhood of Congress.

That we may form a juster estimate with regard to this interesting subject, let us resort to the actual dimensions of the Union. The limits, as fixed by the treaty of peace, are: on the east the Atlantic, on the south the latitude of thirty-one degrees, on the west the Mississippi, and on the north an irregular line running in some instances beyond the forty-fifth degree, in others falling as low as the forty-second. The southern shore of Lake Erie lies below that latitude. Computing the distance between the thirtyfirst and forty-fifth degrees, it amounts to nine hundred and seventy-three common miles; computing it from thirty-one to forty-two degrees, to seven hundred and sixty-four miles and a half. Taking the mean for the distance, the amount will be eight hundred and sixty-eight miles and three-fourths. The mean distance from the Atlantic to the Mississippi does not probably exceed seven hundred and fifty miles. On a comparison of this extent with that of several countries in Europe, the practicability of rendering our system commensurate to it appears to be demonstrable. It is not a great deal larger than Germany, where a diet representing the whole empire is continually assembled; or than Poland before the late dismemberment, where another national diet was the depositary of the supreme power. Passing by France and Spain, we find that in Great Britain, inferior as it may be in size, the representatives of the northern extremity of the island have as far to travel to the national council as will be required of those of the most remote parts of the Union.

Favorable as this view of the subject may be, some observations remain which will place it in a light still more satisfactory.

In the first place it is to be remembered that the general government is not to be charged with the whole power of making and administering laws. Its jurisdiction is limited to certain enumerated objects, which concern all the members of the republic, but which are not to be attained by the separate provisions of any. The subordinate governments, which can extend their care to all those other subjects which can be separately provided for, will retain their due authority and activity. Were it proposed by the plan of the convention to abolish the governments of the particular States, its adversaries would have some ground for their objection; though it would not be difficult to show that if they were abolished the general government would be compelled, by the principle of self-preservation, to reinstate them in their proper jurisdiction.

A second observation to be made is that the immediate object of the federal Constitution is to secure the union of the thirteen primitive States, which we know to be practicable; and to add to them such other States as may arise in their own bosoms, or in their neighborhoods, which we cannot doubt to be equally practicable. The arrangements that may be necessary for those angles and fractions of our territory which lie on our northwestern frontier, must be left to those whom further discoveries and experience will render more equal to the task.

Let it be remarked, in the third place, that the intercourse throughout the Union will be facilitated by new improvements. Roads will everywhere be shortened, and kept in better order; accommodations for travelers will be multiplied and meliorated; an interior navigation on our eastern side will be opened throughout, or nearly throughout, the whole extent of the thirteen States. The communication between the Western and Atlantic districts, and between different parts of each, will be rendered more and more easy by those numerous canals with which the beneficence of nature has intersected our country, and which art finds it so little difficult to connect

A fourth and still more important consideration is, that as almost every State will, on one side or other, be a frontier, and will thus find, in regard to its safety, an inducement to make some sacrifices for the sake of the general protection; so the States which lie at the greatest distance from the heart of the Union, and which, of course, may partake least of the ordinary circulation of its benefits, will be at the same time immediately contiguous to foreign nations, and will consequently stand, on particular occasions, in greatest need of its strength and resources. It may be inconvenient for

Making choices: Constitution Sh Amendment Election Nov. 8,2

by Wesley W. Burnett

It has been my observation over the years that the Texas Constitution has been amended so many times that it is very difficult to actually know how many there are and the purpose for most of them. The document is so convoluted to be virtually unrecognizable as a constitution. In fact, it is more like a jumbled up series of legislative tampering. However, it is what it is, and something we have to deal with until we elect reasonable, common sense legislators and state-wide officials.

I measure these amendments with the basic criteria that hopefully voters will adopt: how does each of these propositions enhance or diminish the rights of individuals (rights defined by the American Declaration of Indepdendence)? Does the proposed amendment adhere to the American principle that government's sole purpose is secure the rights of individuals?

For what it's worth, the following are my answers to those basic

Proposition 1, SJR 14:

Tax Exemptions for the Spouses of Deceased Disabled Veterans

The Ballot will Read: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran."

Yes. Any legislative action to reduce or abolish taxation is a step in the right direction. We cherish the day that an amendment option will be available that allows for every Texas property owner to "opt out" of the government ownership of our property through taxation.

Proposition 2, SJR 4:

Bonds for Water Resources Development

The Ballot will Read: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."

No. government should never be allowed to borrow on the backs of its citizens. Government officials yearning for borrowing should be required to personally pay the debt.

Proposition 3, SJR 50:

Bonds for Government Loans to Students

The Ballot will Read: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

No. Government should never be allowed to borrow money.

Proposition 4, HJR 63:

Use of Property Taxes for Transportation Funding

such food that has caused a food revolution is the buffalo wings. The buffalo wing is actually a relatively new food creation of sorts. Wings served as a dish started in 1964 at the Anchor Bar in Buffalo, N.Y., by Teressa and Frank Belissimo. Quickly, it became a favorite and to a degree

So, in keeping with honoring the buffalo wing I made a western journey to the Wing Pit located in the Rockwall County part of Rowlett. The Wing Pit was an interesting experience as its main offering is well. Wings. However, it offers an odd pairing -- Pho, which is a Vietnamese rice noodle soup.

When you enter the tucked-away restaurant, you will find the most plain looking non-descript place. The food on the other hand is full of flavor and definitely exciting. Every flavor was amazing. My favorite was the spicy garlic wings. The spicy lemon pepper wings were a flavor overload. I have never had such huge portions on veggie sticks.





Taylor Corbin ran for four touchdowns and Daniel Rorie scored two Friday night as Rockwall Christian Academy beat Richardson Canyon Creek Christian Academy at its own ground-based offensive game.

The Warriors (2-6 overall, 2-2 in TAPPS District 2-IV) led throughout the game before a Homecoming crowd at Rockwall High School. Rorie finished with 125 yards in 11 carries, and Corbin ran 19 times for 116 yards.

"Daniel ran the ball well, and we played good defense against them," said Rockwall Christian head coach Caleb Palmer.

It was RCA's first victory over the Cougars since 2006.

Canyon Creek (5-3, 3-1) was led by quarterback Cameron Oliver's 198 rushing yards and three touchdowns in 28 carries. However, RCA held him to 2-for-9 passing for 33 yards. Corbin completed 6 of 12 passes for 81 yards.

Rockwall Christian took a 7-0 lead on Rorie's 35-yard run in the first quarter. Corbin then scored from 9, 15 and 4 yards out to help the Warriors to a 27-10 third-quarter lead. Oliver then ran 15 yards for a touchdown that cut the lead to 27-17 after three quarters.

When the Cougars took over the ball deep in RCA territory early in the fourth quarter, Oliver's third TD cut the lead to 27-23.

After that, Corbin ran 7 yards for a touchdown, and Rorie closed the deal with a 5-yard TD run.

"I told our kids after the game that showed a lot about what we are," Palm-

"It was one of those points where something big happens to change momentum. One of two things can happen. You can lay down and pretty much lose, or you can step up and play. We didn't let our foot off the pedal. The way they responded, it looked like it didn't even affect them."

RCA totaled 329 yards to 321 for CCCA. The Warriors had no turnovers and recovered two fumbles by the visitors.

Palmer said, "I felt pretty good going into this game. It played out pretty much the way I thought it would. We built on how we had finished last year against them, and what we did in the second half the week before going into

With Canyon Creek playing undefeated district leader Garland Christian in next weekend's final game, Rockwall Christian could finish as high as a tie for second place by defeating Waco Texas Christian Academy Friday at RHS. The Warriors also could finish fifth and out of the playoffs by losing.

The Lady Eagles won their second consecutive TAPPS District 2-2A championship, and they won an Area playoff match to advance to Saturday's Regionals.

That's where HCA's season ended, with a 17-3 record after a 25-16, 25-10, 25-18 loss to defending state champion DeSoto Canterbury Episcopal at Plano John Paul II High

"We were not ready to play," Samford said. "We just get too anxious when we know what's on the line."

Even a rally from an 18-6 deficit in the third game wasn't any consolation for the coach.

Six consecutive points, five served by Micalah Hawkins, brought the Lady Eagles back within 18-12 and they moved within five points at 22-17. Anabel Burke's hitting also helped HCA come back.

Samford said, "Anabel was really on. I wish we all could play our game every game, but when it's so important we can't finish.

"We've been building a team, but Canterbury has had a program for a long time."

She also could tell her junior-laden team that they lost to a team made up mostly of seniors.

"We're still building up, and we're one step closer than we were last year, one game away from the state tournament. We need to push fur-

"They'll be seniors next year. I want them to remember how this felt today."

Samford indicated that the Lady Eagles need to be pushed more frequently during the regular season. They swept through their district schedule.

"Our district is so weak. Our tournaments and preseason are usually pretty competitive. We need to play a lot more competitive teams." Perhaps redistricting could put

HCA in a more competitive district and help the Lady Eagles toward their first state tournament in what athletic director Robert Huckabee said was "years ago, when we were a very small school."

and Oklahoma. In 2010, the program expanded into Jackson, Miss., where Dr. Dwayne Pickett of the New Jerusalem Missionary Baptist Church uses the curriculum to address issues in the black community. MOH/LOH uses a strategy that includes camps, conferences and weekly

curriculum-based teaching led by men and women of "outstanding character," according to the news release. The curriculum is structured to teach guiding principles in an interactive way and utilizes books, workbooks and DVDs written and produced by Rorie and Dr. Edwin Louis Cole.
