
Scouting out pancakes

B&G Club has rich history of investing in children's futures

Quick: Name a Rockwall County private non-profit youth development agency that offers affordable after-school and summer activities for first through twelfth graders.

The Boys and Girls Club of Rockwall County (BGC-Rockwall) hopes the question does not confound.

Executive director Gordon L. Eldredge said they don't want to be the best-kept secret in town. Instead, he and the BGC-Rockwall board and community supporters want to spread the word that students in Rockwall County have opportunity for positive, fun, enriching, even life-changing activities year-round in a safe, friendly, adult-supervised place.

In fact, Eldredge said, "If you give me two days' notice and have two people who want to hear about the club's vision to impact young lives in a positive way, I'll be there."

Long history with clubs

He's not kidding. He is a man with a passion "to help kids be what they can be." His knowledge is personal, because he was himself one of those children, helped in life skills and character lessons from age 7 to 18 by a (then) Boys Club in his hometown of Baltimore.

After college, Eldredge became program director and then executive director for one of the Baltimore Boys Clubs. Later, he moved to Billings, Mont., to charter a club where he spent 25 years helping youngsters.

Now, two months into his leadership role at BGC-Rockwall, Eldredge has been director of Boys and Girls Clubs for 50 years, nearly half the 104-year history of the Boys and Girls Club of America (BGCA).

People tend to believe him when he says, "The programs we offer work." He's had ample opportunity to observe that "we have a big tradition and legacy."

Boys and Girls Club alumni Denzel Washington and Jennifer Lopez, as well as Shaquille O'Neal and Bill Clinton are among those who would agree with that assessment. Not to mention Bill Cosby, Michael Jordan, Brad Pitt and others who credit the influence of the BGCA for new skills, character lessons, leadership training, and healthy role models during their formative years.

The Boys and Girls Club-Rockwall, located in the former Dobbs Elementary School (now Dobbs Annex) on Interurban Street, is one of 4,500 affiliates in the United States. The local club opened in 2005 under the leadership of Gene Burton, now retired Rockwall Independent School District superintendent. He and other community leaders recognized the value of and need for extended day services to children who might otherwise be unsupervised after school and in the summer.

BGC-Rockwall is open to all 6-18 year olds, but makes a particular effort to reach out to children from economically disadvantaged homes.

Funding critical

How can this agency welcome nearly 150 students (and counting) for 11 hours a day for not just recreation, but such programs as peer mediation training, counseling, tutoring, and leadership development? As a community-based organization, it relies totally on donations for its operation.

But, says director Eldredge, "just because you're a nonprofit doesn't mean you're going to get support." It is at this point that local service groups, businesses and individuals who see the importance of Boys and Girls Club to the community are stepping up to the bat.


Consider Rockwall businessman Jonathan Lenertz. 



is happening right now," said BGC-Rockwall board member Brenda Keilers.

"We currently have approximately 135 children daily and we are open from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The children work in the computer lab, have arts and crafts time, gym, game time and swimming," she said.

Club members also can play on sports fields, shoot hoops, play foosball and billiards, or sign up for any classes offered, such as dance or martial arts. Their opportunities are often limited only by volunteers available to work with the youngsters.

The club actively seeks volunteers to assist the children with skills or to supervise their play.

"We are more than a recreation facility and we are not a daycare," Eldredge said.

He echoes the mission statement on the club's website (begreatrockwall.org): "We have a proven curriculum... helping our youth face difficult challenges with daily, guidance-oriented character development programs. We have earned the reputation of being 'the positive place for kids.""



Rockwall ISD trustees approve \$104.5 million budget with no tax increase

Following a June 21 public hearing, members of the Rockwall Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a \$104.5 million general budget with no tax increase for the 2010-2011 school year.

The budget comes with almost \$8 million in cuts but still dips into reserve funds for half-a-million dollars, an amount trustees hope to avoid using by finding additional savings over the coming year.

Even with some revenue uncertainty, board members approved a 2 percent of the midpoint raise for staff. That amount for teachers, nurses and librarians is about \$1,020.

"We met for several months over this budget and think we've done an extraordinary job and made some substantial decisions," chief financial officer Mike Singleton said. "It's something we can live with. It did not solve everything we wanted to solve."

Resident Art Ruff offered the only comments generated by citizens, warning the board of more economic difficulties to come and suggesting the teacher raise wait until mid-year.

"I can look around this town and see may retail spaces and offices not leased. I have neighbors who have been foreclosed on," he said. "We're not out of the woods on houses being foreclosed on. How

can the appraisal district thin we're going to have the revenue we had last year?"

Singleton explained that staff pay raises could not be put off until mid-year because of the nature of teacher contracts and invited Ruff to spend some time with him to learn how the school budget was put together. Che unanimous Declaration of the intrieen united states of America

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the carth, the separate and equal station to minor the carts of that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. - That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, - That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. - Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world. He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them. He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only. He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures. He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people. He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within. He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands. He has obstructed the Administration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers. He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries. He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance. He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures. He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power. He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation: For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us: For protecting them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States: For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world: For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent: For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury: For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences: For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments: For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever. He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us. He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people. He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation. He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands. He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends. Rockwall bounced back from an opening loss to win its last three games Saturday and qualify for the state Division I 7 on 7 football championships.

In the last day of qualifying, teams had to win their way into the finals of the I-30 State Qualifying Tournament to move on to the state tournament July 9 and 10 at Texas A&M University.

Rockwall scored 119 points in its last three games, including a 46-13 semifinal rout of Sachse that earned the state-tournament berth.

"It was a big win. Kids had been out of town for some of our other games. We came together today. I always hoped to go there. Last year, we never did qualify for state. This will be a good experience and good team building," said Reed Loftis. He and Josh Broach served as the team's player-coaches.

Loftis said they were prepared with Rockwall High School's offensive and defensive passing schemes. "They were things we've been taught during the spring. Then the coaches picked me and Josh to pick the team."

The players from RHS lost its first game on the RHS field to Arlington Lamar 26-19. The home team then defeated Dallas W.T. White 46-15 and pulled away from Fort Worth Paschal in the second half to win 39-24.

Lamar swept its three games in Bracket A, but because the Vikings already had qualified for the state tournament, second-place Rockwall (2-1) advanced to the semifinals against Sachse.

The Mustangs, who were in the tournament because Wylie dropped out after qualifying for state a week earlier, won a three-way tiebreaker after winning two of three games in Bracket B.

Rockwall took a 12-0 lead early, and had a 26-7 halftime advantage. After the Mustangs scored the first second-half touchdown, the home team's defense stiffened and helped it win going away.

Alan Reed passed for six touchdowns, including four to Andrew Hinckley. The first two went to Hinckley and Broach. After Sachse pulled within 12-7, Reed hit Hinckley with two more scoring passes just across the goal line.

The game's turning point arrived after Sachse's second-half score. On the extra-point attempt, Loftis reached over the intended receiver to bat a pass away.



Loftis, who played as a wide receiver as a junior last fall, said he was surprised when RHS' coaches asked him to play safety on defense as well this season.

"I haven't played it since eighth grade. Now that they're working me both ways, I can be excited about it."

After that, Reed threw a high pass that 6-foot-5 Wesley Davis reached to grab for a touchdown. Sachse appeared ready to score again until Rockwall's Casey Wright stepped in front of a Mustangs receiver at the goal line, intercepted the pass and returned it the length of the field for a TD.
