r Louise Bobo, it's more than just a meal.

eals on Wheels delivers fresh, hot food to more than 100 vall County residents five days each week, but for many, like the meal is secondary. It's the company - the human contact she and many others look forward to each weekday.

he people that deliver the food are so very nice," Bobo said "I couldn't ask for a better group of people. I just look forto even seeing the people whether they're bringing me lunch It just means a great deal."

Bobo is one of about 120 residents of Rockwall, Fate, Heath, McClendon-Chisholm and Royse City who receive noon meals Mondays through Fridays through the local MOW program.

The weekday routine begins at about 7 a.m. when cooking begins on site. Low-salt and low-sugar menus developed by a licensed dietician are prepared, as are meals tailored to specific dietary needs - diabetic meals, low-residue meals and "chopped" meals, Ver Hagen said. Each meal created in the MOW kitchen is designed to provide one-third of the U.S.-recommended daily allowance of nutrients required for optimal health.

Volunteers begin arriving by mid-morning, and meal deliveries run from 10:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. Deliveries are made via 11 routes organized by physical location. Although the program has about 80 volunteers, only 11 are needed in a single day to cover the routes.

On average, a route will average between eight and 15 deliveries, or "visits" as Ver Hagen described them. Each volunteer drives his or her own vehicle and pays for the

fuel used to make the trip. "When you take the time, the miles, the hours - everything - and

know that it's donated, it adds up," Ver Hagen said.

One volunteer, who lives outside of Rockwall County, drives in to Rockwall to pick up meals to be delivered, then runs his route before returning home. Ver Hagen estimates he drives about 75 miles each day he delivers.

"Some routes are more like 35 (miles)," she said. "And then some could be five (miles.)"

Two employees are responsible for keeping the volunteer-driven MOW program functional.

MOW is the primary program of the Rockwall County Committee on Aging, a nonprofit corporation established in 1978. It's mission is to "keep senior citizens living independently through referrals, meal delivery, education, information, benefit counseling, advocacyombudsman and emergency food boxes," according to a committee brochure.

Designed to serve the elderly and the disabled, MOW is funded by local and federal funds, private donations and fundraisers.

Some of the more high-profile donations are those made by local restaurants and organizations recruited by Ver Hagen to fill in the gaps in the MOW meal delivery schedule during holidays.

"There are seven major (holidays) where the kitchen is closed, so I try to find a sponsor for that holiday meal. They give us money, then we go to a restaurant and order the food and the volunteers come that day and deliver the meal on the holiday," Ver Hagen said.

This year the Rockwall Breakfast Rotary Club has agreed to sponsor both the Thanksgiving and Christmas meals. Rotarians also have offered to step in and handle meal deliveries on the holidays, giving the regular volunteers the holiday to spend with friends and

"This whole operation is run by volunteers," Ver Hagen said, "It's unbelievable. Every single day... we have to have these volunteers show up every morning. We just make it work. But we're always in

need of additional volunteers and donations."

In addition to delivering the meals, volunteers also are do a quick assessment of each MOW recipient with whom How did he look? Did she seem to be in good spirits? Did tion any specific needs with which the Rockwall County C on Aging might assist?

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"The volunteers are the eyes and the ears of the eld Hagen said. "Some of them have such a relationship witl the seniors now that they end up going back after they run - just to visit with them. They take them to the doctor, shopping...."



Hayes began sharing his stories in print in 1982 and has received many awards, including the Texas Bluebonnet Award for Ghost Fever in 2007.

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



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
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Hays Husky runs generate \$20,000-plus for school

City of Rockwall offers insight into DTV transitio

The City of Rockwall wants to assist local residents in navigating the digital transition scheduled for Feb. 17.

The U.S. Congress passed legislation requiring most broadcast TV stations to switch from transmitting traditional analog TV signals to digital signals. This switch, known as Digital Transition or DTV Transition, may affect how some families watch after the transition date.

Although the cable and broadcast industries are making efforts to prepare viewers for the change, some citizens may need additional guidance, according to a city news release.

Charter Communications cable subscribers, AT&T U-Verse subscribers and DISH or DI-RECT TV satellite subscribers already should be prepared for the transition. These providers have been sending information regarding how and what they will provide their customers to ensure this transition.

Individuals with a newer digital or high-definition television using an antenna to view over-the-air broadcast channels should be OK; however, if your family does not subscribe to any of the providers listed above and your television is an analog (with an antenna), there is a strong possibility that your broadcast signal will be lost with the February changeover.



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Minter Mortgage Matters

Rising Rates Demand Mortgage Management

Most families spend considerable time and energy planning things like retirement, education and investment strategies. Although the home and mortgage represent two of the largest items on the family's balance sheet, more time may be spent planning a weekend getaway than examining whether their equity and debt is properly managed.

Of Course You Would. Why then, would you not exercise the same due diligence if you were planning on borrowing the same amount of money, or more. Any professional financial planner would agree that many of the same concerns are addressed whether borrowing or investing. Both involve programs and strategies that are tailored to criteria of long and short-term objectives, risk tolerance and yields. Balance is the key to a sound investment portfolio and to ignore the liabilities side of the balance sheet, especially the mortgage loan would clearly be irresponsible. 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

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



My 3-year-old daughter was diagnosedwithAcuteLymphoblastic Leukemia in May and since then has endured 58 days in-patient at Children's Medical Center, four surgeries, 13 chemotherapy treatments, nine spinal taps, five blood transfusions and on and on. She has two years and two months of treatment remaining in her fight to beat cancer.

The medical bills, weekly prescriptions costs and the loss of income has been overwhelming to our young family. Pediatric cancer is the most under funded cancer in regards to research. Your readers would be surprised to learn that since it is also the number one killer of our children. Calling attention to our story will not only help our family, but help our cause.

At the end of a long month of "Think Pink," we would like your readers to know that September was Childhood Cancer Awareness month. Maybe next September we can think gold and make a difference in the lives of so many sick children.

My daughter is one of many, 46 children a day are diagnosed with a pediatric cancer, and some do not win their fight.

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

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Highland Park's Luke Woodley threw for 256 yards in a 38-31 overtime loss to Heath and Royse City's Richard Morrison had 310 yards for the Bulldogs in a 42-28 loss while last week's playoff opponent, Hillcrest, lit the Hawks up for 367 yards through the air despite getting

blown out 58-21. But perhaps the game that haunts the Heath secondary, was their 56-49 overtime win against Richardson Pearce, where the Mustangs shredded the Hawks defense for 587 yards and seven touchdown passes.

On the other hand, it will likely be Ennis who will have nightmares about trying to stop the Hawks' high-octane offense that uses the run first.

And often second.

With the amazing Kendial Lawrence rushing 266 times for 2,565 yards and 45 touchdowns and Gilbert Everett picking up another 815 yards on the ground on 79 carries as well as catch-


