ounty earns gold certification om state comptroller's office

kwall County was one of 43 es in the State of Texas retapped for recognition by the State Comptroller's Office.

an announcement made during ept. 28 County Commissioners ng, County Treasurer Bill air announced that the county een awarded gold certification a state. This is the highest certion offered through the compt's program, which designates e, silver and gold winners.

pecember, the comptroller's ofmounced its Texas Comptroller enhip Circle program designed edight local governments that opened their books online to financial transparency to the public. The program was a good fit with one of Sinclair's six stated goals announced during his 2006 election campaign for the office of county treasurer. That goal was "to improve visibility and transparency of the office."

Visitors to the county treasurer's portion of the Rockwall County website – rockwallcountytexas.com/index.aspx?nid=234 – can see the amount of information now available to the public.

The comptroller's program required that the county budget, the county's audited financial statements and the county check registers to easily accessible to the public. Sinclair said that he and the county auditor's

office have worked closely over the past four years – even before the introduction of the state's program – to achieve this goal.

The budget and financial statements have been available online for several years; however, the check registers required more effort to format for public use, Sinclair said. To date, check registers for the months of October 2009 through August 2010 have been posted, along with information to explain the various account codes used to segregate financial data in the county's books of record.

Sinclair said the effort is ongoing and will be guided by "goals of continuous improvement and by feedback received from users."

Rockwall County jury convicted than Peak, 32, of the first-degree are of injury to a child and sendhim to 42 years in a state peniary, according to a news release the Rockwall County Criminal and Attorney's Office.

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ak was charged with physically ulting his 10-week-old daughter. to conviction and sentence were led down Sept. 30.

prosecutor in the case, the child taken by her mother to Children's lical Center in July 2009 after the y exhibited increased fussiness vomiting. The baby also had a sed eye that her father claimed accidentally had received while is care.

The hospital reported that in addition to the bruise, the baby had two subdural hermatomas, or bleeding on the brain, multiple broken ribs and a broken wrist and leg, according to Woodward.

Dr. Matthew Cox, who is board certified in the area of pediatric child abuse and the medical director of the child abuse program at Children's Medical Center in Dallas, testified that the injuries sustained were intentionally inflicted and were in different stages of healing. Cox said this indicated the child has been assaulted on more than one occasion.

The doctor also testified that the same injuries sustained by the victim are fatal to one in four children, and 80 percent of those surviving such in-

juries have lifelong disabilities.

The victim is now 17 months old and, while her condition has improved, she continues to receive physical therapy.

"She's a very lucky little girl," said Woodward. "I believe that if the child's mother had not taken her to the hospital when she did, the defendant would have continued to abuse her and would have eventually killed her."

"The jury acted as one voice to speak on behalf of that defenseless baby," said Kenda Culpepper, Rockwall County criminal district attorney. "Children should be embraced and protected by a parent, not subjected to agonizing and lifechanging pain."

McLendon-Chisholm Council OKs road repairs, bans K2 sales

At its Sept. 28 meeting, members of the McLendon-Chisholm City Council voted to allocate funds to repair Klutz Road and ban the sale of cannabinoids and related paraphernalia.

On the cannabinoid issue, council members were responding to recent news reports about K, a kind of incense infused with a synthetic substance similar to the euphoric chemical in marijuana-and following other cities such as Flower Mound, Allan and Sherman which have recently passed similar ordinances.

In 2009, the National Safety Council reported that 1.4 million automobile accidents could have been attributed to drivers on cell phones, including

In Texas it is illegal for anyone under 18 to use a cell phone while driving, which includes using hands-free devices.

Drivers using cell phones look but fail to see up to 50 percent of the information in their driving environment, Smith said. Distracted drivers experience what researchers call inattention blindness, similar to tunnel vision. Drivers look but do not process everything in the roadway environment they must know to effectively monitor their surroundings, seek and identify potential hazards and respond to unexpected situations.

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



Rorie's 4th TD gives RCA last-minute victory

Rockwall Christian Academy finished the non-district portion of its football season by discovering a running back.

That made it easy for head coach Caleb Palmer to know where to turn when trailing 29-28 on fourth down with the ball at Fort Worth Lake Country Christian's 1 yard line in the game's final minute Friday night.

"The offensive line and Daniel Rorie won that game," Palmer said after Rorie scored the winning touchdown, his fourth of the game for a 36-29 victory.

Going into the game at Dobbs Field, Palmer knew about his offensive line but he had no idea about Rorie.

Before the game-winning play, which capped a long drive, the coach had called time out and charged up the linemen. "I keep telling them I need you. That's what we've been talking about all year. I told them, 'We're going to win because of you guys."

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He said of the climactic play, "The offensive line pancaked five kids on their

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backs. They brought seven. Daniel sidestepped one of them, then ducked his head and ran over a linebacker." For the game, the sophomore carried 29 times for 197 in his first high school

start at running back. "Since sixth grade, he had never lined up as a running back, but he had some carries as a wide receiver," Palmer said. "He ran better than any running back

we've had in six or seven years. He ran over kids, and he ran hard. He grew up a lot." The Warriors (3-2) needed Rorie's effort because another sophomore running

back, Daniel Ruiz, had been injured two games earlier and the ground game had gone nowhere since. Rorie had played offensive tackle as a freshman, and was fast enough that he sometimes was a pass receiver.

Palmer was pleased with two aspects of his team's game.

"We showed we could march down the field in the last 3 minutes. We converted three fourth downs. We saw we could run the ball and run effectively."

The last-minute heroics wouldn't have been necessary if RCA hadn't lost a 28-7 third-quarter lead. Lake Country (2-3) scored 16 points in rapid succession on Tad Howard's second touchdown pass of the game, a safety when a Rockwall Christian snap went out of the end zone and Kevin Gonzalez's 60-yard scoring return on the ensuing kickoff. Then the Eagles added the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Before the game, Palmer had told Rorie, "I'm not going to be surprised in what you do because I believe in you."

That belief was justified.

Brother act busts up Winston for Falcons

For the first half of the season, Leverett and Rabah carried the ball well enough to carry The Fulton School's football team with them.

So when Dylan Leverett and Milan Rabah couldn't play Friday, Oct. 1, against Dallas The Winston School, Falcons head coach Josh Johnson turned to his next-best alternatives:

It was Dylan's younger brother, freshman Hayden Leverett, and Milan's older brother, senior Hasan Rabah, who scored three touchdowns apiece to lead Fulton (3-3) to a history-making 50-0 victory.

The Falcons, who already had set a Fulton record for most victories in a season, recorded both their first shutout and first win by six-man football's 45-point mercy rule over the outmanned Eagles.

Winston (0-4), which started the season with 12 players, was down to six for Friday's kickoff. During the game, two other Eagles were hurt. The teams played 5-on-5 after the first player was injured, but agreed to give Fulton a 5-on-4 advantage for the remainder of the game.

The Falcons really didn't need that edge.

The game ended on another first, a 55-yard interception return for a touchdown by Brett Steffen. It was the senior's first TD in his four years at Fulton.

Before that, Hayden Leverett, playing his first game as a running back, carried seven times for a game-high 161 yards and two touchdowns. He also scored on a 61-yard kickoff return. Hasan Rabah gained 56 yards and scored twice on just three carries, and also ran a punt back 62 yards to score. Steffen gained 70

Johnson said, "It was kind of bittersweet. Brett had some touchdowns that were called back in other years. I hate that it wasn't on the offensive side for him, but it was good for us to end the game.

"We pretty much dominated in all three phases of the game. The two touchdowns in the special-teams game weren't a surprise. That's why we're having some success. Even the games we lost we had a good special-teams game."

Hawks' mistakes lead to 1st loss, at McKinney

The winning touchdown scored with 22 seconds to play, but Rockwall-Heath head coach Mickey Moss knows the team's first loss also resulted from actions earlier in that game and even during the week of practice.

He hopes his players also received that message following Friday's 34-31 defeat on the road against McKinney at Ron Poe Stadium.

"It was a good learning experience for us. I hope we learned from our mistakes and choices. We made poor choices leading up to the game, and we didn't practice like we should have," Moss said.

The coach didn't detail what those poor choices were, or which Hawks didn't play as a result of those choices.

RHHS had entered the game 4-0 overall and 1-0 in District 10-4A. The loss to McKinney (2-3, 1-1) dropped the Hawks into a second-place tie with the Lions and four other teams behind first-place Highland Park.

"That put us in a bind because we have a loss now. We can't depend on somebody else to help us." Moss said.

Those who did play for Rockwall-Heath performed well enough for most of the game to win. But then there were those mistakes.

Moss said, "When a game is lost with 30 seconds left, every play in that game means something. One single play, one false step, a missed alignment all become a glaring error."

He detailed some of the more glaring errors: a roughing-the-kicker penalty and missed tackles on a kickoff-return touchdown, an interception-return TD and a long run after McKinney caught a short pass.

Making the defensive and special-teams scores even more grating was the fact that the Hawks had lived by making those plays themselves, with two interceptions, a kickoff and a blocked field goal run back for touchdowns.

RHHS fell behind by 10 points twice, but came back to take a 31-27 lead on a 60-yard touchdown run by Dorian Lawry, who hadn't played since

the season-opening game. With 2 1/2 minutes to play, that lead might have seemed secure, but the Lions roared


