

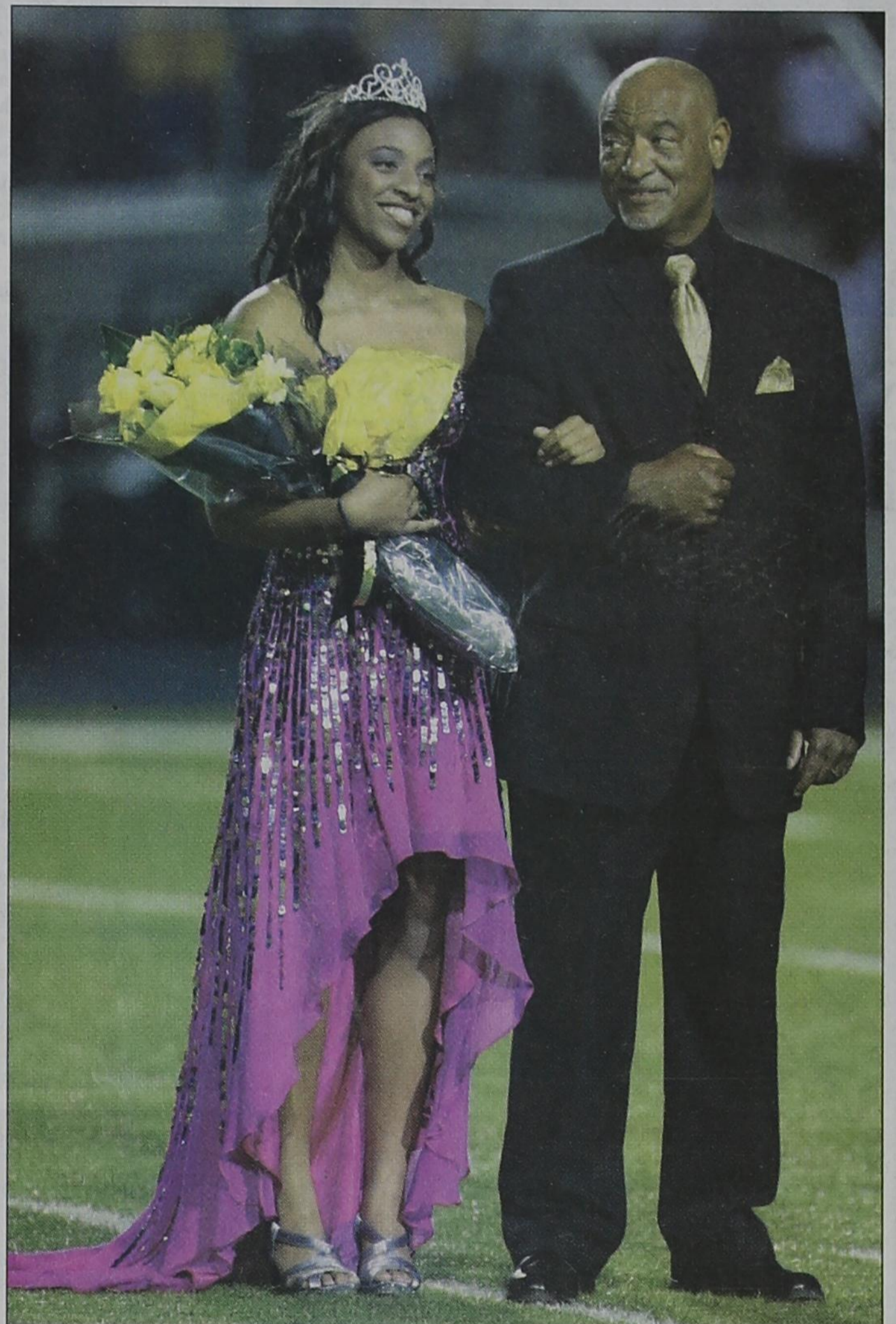

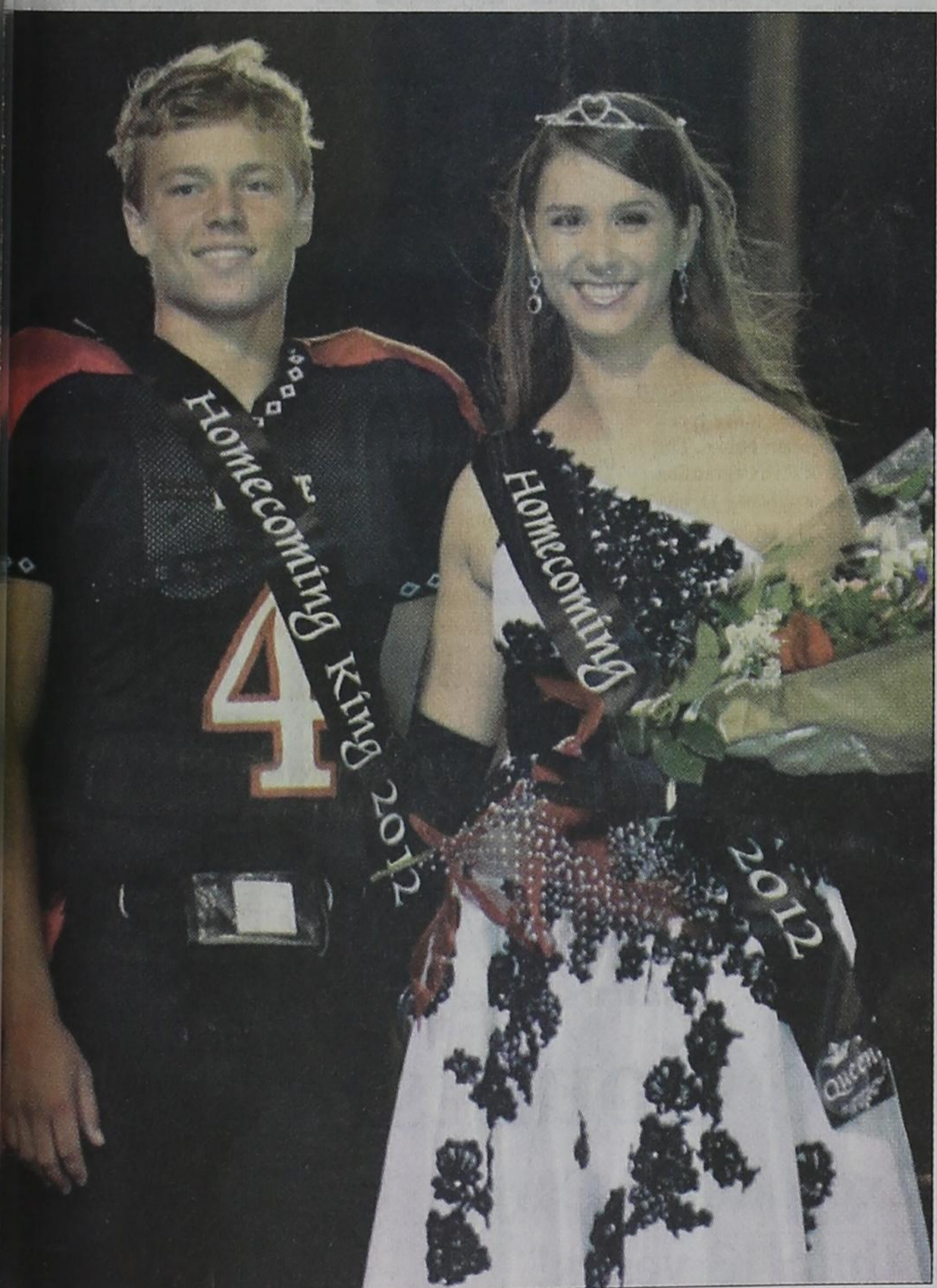

Royse City council honors team, employees in SWAT competition

The City Council of Royse City recognized officers and coaches who competed in the Texas Tactical Police Officer Association SWAT Competition in September.

The competition included 29 teams from throughout the United States and a team for Germany traveled to the United States to participate. According to the TTPOA website, "There are over 3,000 members and the TTPOA is one of the most respected and largest tactical associations in the world."

Presenting the honor was the new Chief of Police Jeff Stapleton. Other members were Mayor Jerrell Baley, Scott McDonnold, Keith Short, Ryan Curtis, Darnell Franklin, coach Tom Shelton, John Ostrowski and son. Police officer Alan Potter was not in attendance.

The men trained for months to prepare for the competition. Although Royse City does not have its own SWAT team, the men are trained to contain a serious situation until a responding SWAT team can arrive.

At the competition, the team participated in pistol event, range run, super SWAT, sniper event, hostage rescue, officer down and obstacle course events.

According to former chief of police Tom Shelton, "Most of the events consist of the use of different types of firearms under physical stress to see how accurate officers are under mental and physical duress. This group of men dedicated a lot of their own time and money to prepare for these events."

New Royse City employees were also recognized at the council meeting by city manager Carl Alsbrook. They were Kandi Jackson Maria Mendoza, Lisa Ibarra, Brent Richards, Kellye Robertson and Lisa Green.

There were no speakers for the citizens' participation, which allows speakers in the community to address the council on an issue not on the agenda.

A public hearing was opened by Baley for anyone to give testimony regarding "...the rezoning application by applicant requesting the rezoning of Tract 2-01 of the E. Gossett Survey, A-86 (18.88 acres) from Agriculture to Commercial, on the 6.31 acres adjacent to South Erby Campbell Boulevard and Commercial-2 on the 12.56 acres west of the 6.31 acres." No one spoke in response.

The floor was opened "regarding Community Development Corporation Board recommendation to Council to accept and approve street rehabilitation incentive up to \$85,000 for Circle Lane." Also, no one spoke in response.

Stapleton praised Dario Lopez, Royse City's public works director, for overseeing the cleanup of the animal shelter, noting that several more events were scheduled to help with the project.

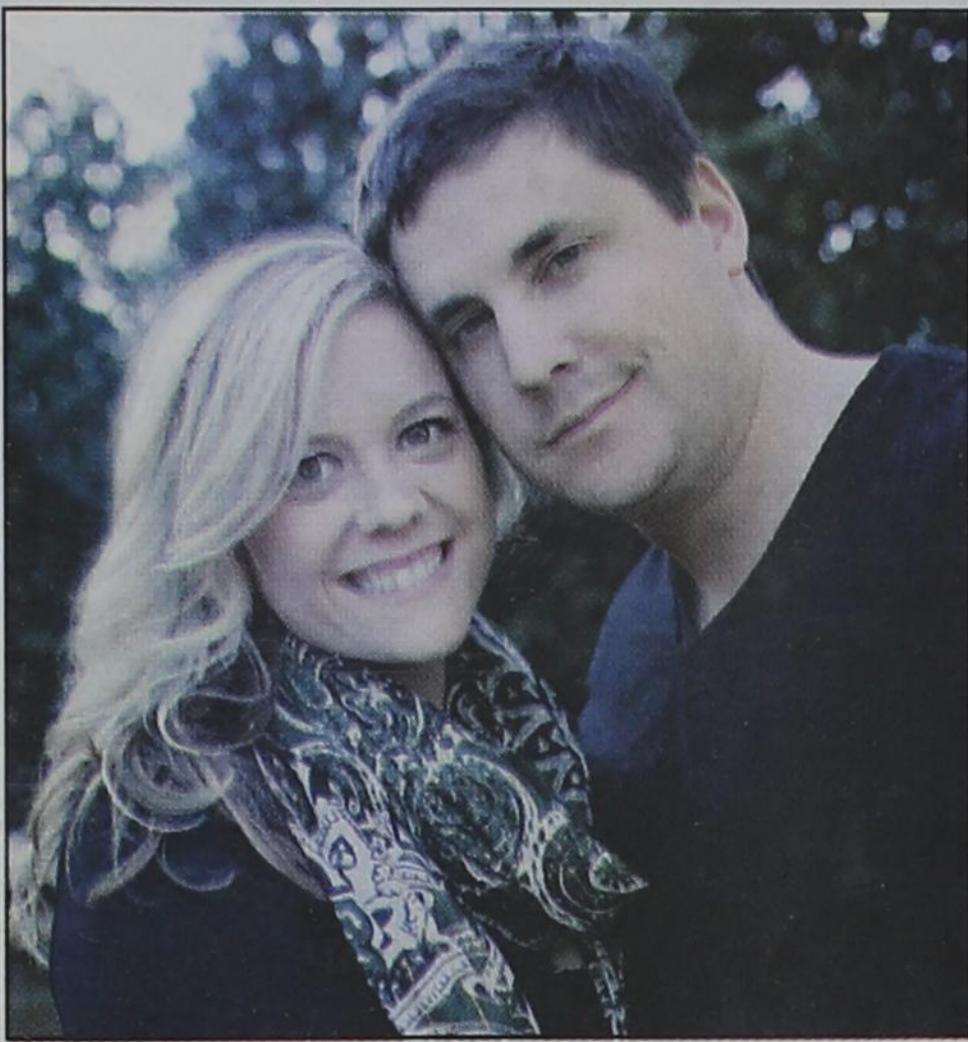

A family celebration is planned.

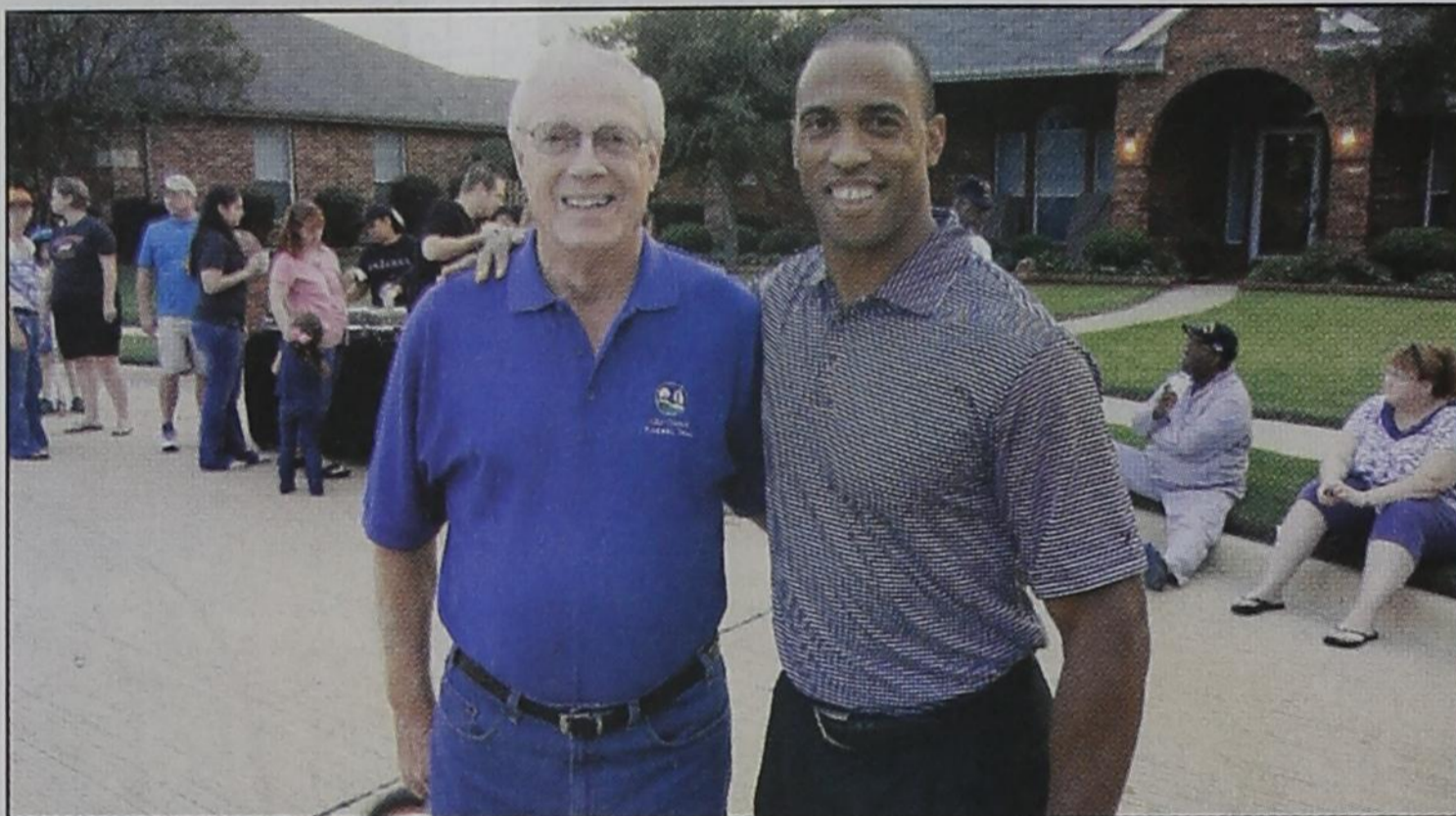
Vaughan tapped for wind ensemble

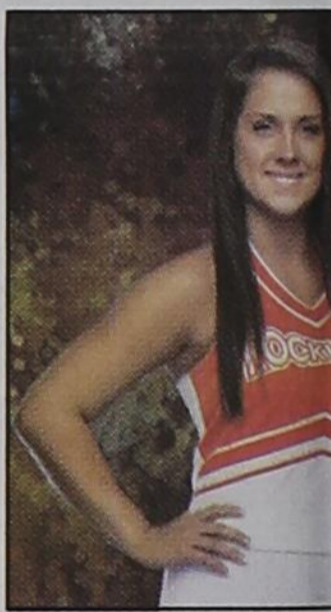
Art League judged show set Oct. 19

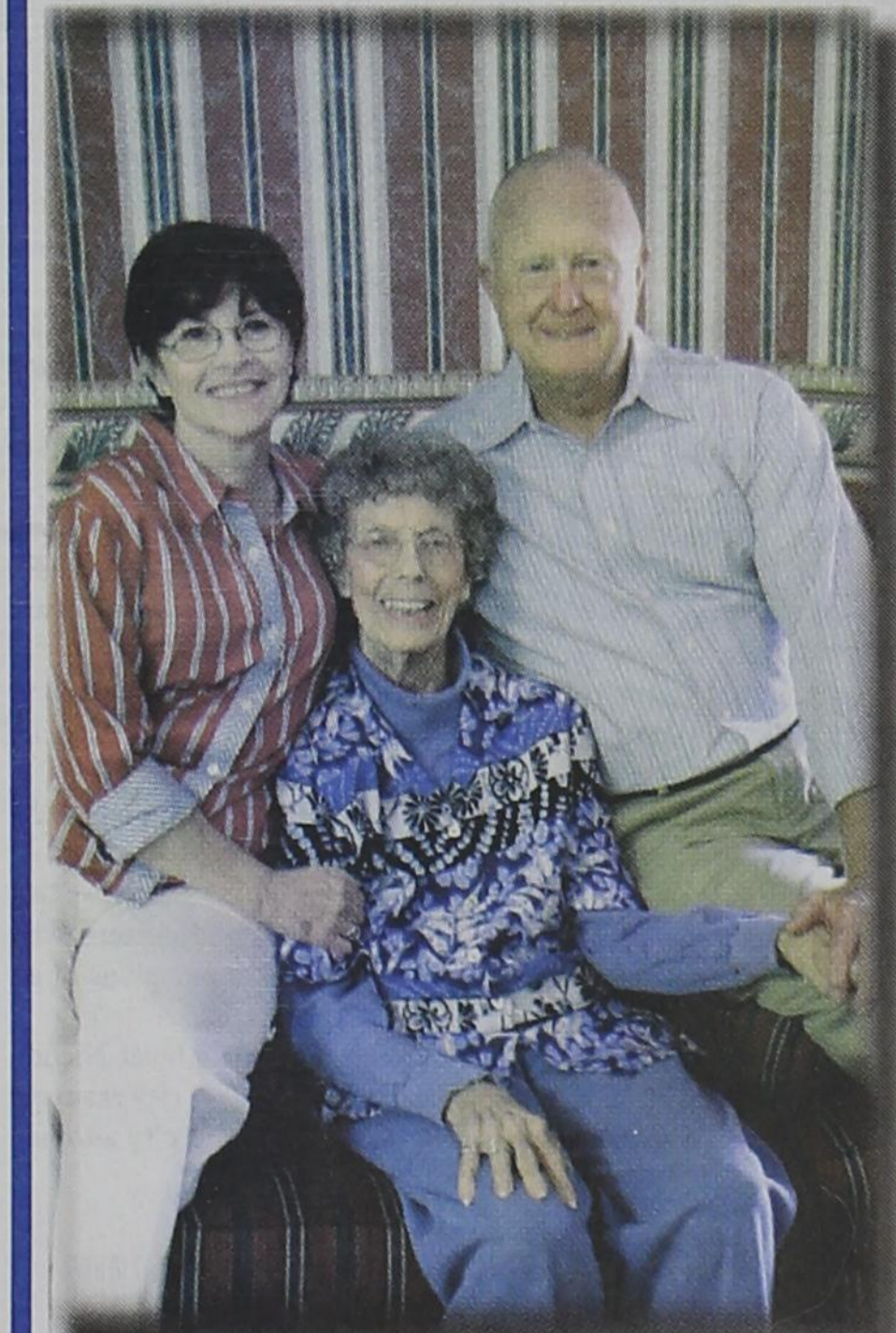

Patriot Paws trainer speaks at Rotary Club

Fry, a devoted service dog trainer for the Patriot Paws, was the speaker for the Royse City Earlybird Rotary Club on Oct. 10.

Patriot Paws is a service organization that places service dogs with veterans. Founder Lori Stevens started the programs in 2006. Dogs come from particular breeders, animal shelters, rescue and service puppy raisers. They are given to the veterans at no cost. Service dogs cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000 for their training.

Stevens' personal dog, is used as the association's demonstration

dog. He helped Fry demonstrate to Rotarians how the dogs can help the disabled veteran lead a more productive life by retrieving things like clothes, the phone or items dropped on the floor.

Jazz retrieved a credit card Fry dropped on the floor.

"Yes, we used to use money until Jazz swallowed one not long ago, so we decided to use something he couldn't swallow," she said, laughing.

The dogs are trained to fit the veterans' specific needs such as wheelchair bound, veterans with prostheses, etc.

Most of the dogs used in the program are golden retrievers or Labradors, as they are strong enough to pull a wheelchair or a person should the need arise. Smaller dogs would be unable to do such a task.

Royse City has new police chief

At the Oct. 9 Royse City council meeting, Carl Alsbrook, the new mayor as of Oct. 1, announced that Jeff Stapleton has been named chief of police.

Stapleton, who served eight years in the U.S. Army as an infantryman, was deployed in 1990 to the Middle East while still on active duty and was assigned to the Second Division of the Marines, during the Gulf War.

In 1994, Stapleton attended the Grayson County College Police Academy, where he began his career in law enforcement. He became a police officer where he served for two years with the City of Rockwall.

In 1996, Stapleton became a full-time police officer with the Bonham Police Department in Bonham, where he worked until 2001. He served as a K-9 officer for more than three years, then became supervisor.

In July of 2001, he transferred to the Royse City Police Department, where on Oct. 8 he became police chief. Stapleton earned several awards while in Royse City including Officer of the Year, Narcotic Officer of the Year and was honored by the city for his role as interim chief of police in 2004.

Stapleton has an advanced peace officer certificate through the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. He is currently enrolled in the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas through Sam Houston State University and is working towards acquiring his Bachelor in Administration degree in law enforcement.

Linda, his wife, and he are the parents of two children, Alex and Niccole.

Warren rushes 268 yards and 4 TDs as Jackets defeat N. Mesquite 49-29

All fans had seen this before, but only once. It seems like an easy formula for winning a football game. Give the quarterback Warren often enough that he can gain more than 200 yards and a handful or so of touchdowns.

The formula had worked when the sophomore scored all six touchdowns. Yellowjackets defeated Rowlett 41-37. It worked again Friday, when Warren had 36 of RHS' 60 carries for 268 yards and four scores as the Jackets won their first District 12-5A game this season, 49-29 over North Mesquite at Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium.

Warren, it isn't easy to will such an outcome. It took a lot more for Warren (2-5 overall, 1-2 in the district) to win over the Stallions (2-4, 1-1 in the district).

In addition to Warren's 200-plus yards, three other Jackets accounted for 100 apiece. Quarterback Dylan Campman passed for 97 and ran for 175. Sophomore Xavier Castille threw for 40, ran for 56 and passed for another 55 and 151 total. Zach Berryman's output was 30 rushing and 82 receiving, for a 112 total. Castille ran for two TDs and was carried for another as all seven Rockwall scores came from their running game.

Head coach Scott Smith pointed out that the offensive line pushed out of the way to enable Rockwall's runners to be effective. The line, not coincidentally, has yielded its fewest points this season in wins over Rowlett and North Mesquite.

Smith said, "When we held them to two field goals early, that was huge." North Mesquite matched RHS' first-quarter drives to touchdowns by Warren and Warren with its own scoring drives. However, Rockwall's stiffened inside the 20 yard line, so instead of tying the score 14-14, the Stallions came away with just two field goals by Juan Mendez. That left the Jackets to lead 14-6 after the first quarter.

Warren's second touchdown stretched the lead to 20-6, but NMHS scored just 1 minute, 42 seconds apart to pull within a point at 21-20. The

first came on a 9-yard pass from Cody Williams to Ta'Varius Luke, with the second on Thomas Oberg's return after intercepting a pass from Campman.

RHS had been having trouble punching the ball into the end zone at the end of scoring drives just before halftime. But not Runnin' Rockwall Friday. Castille ran in from a yard away with 7 seconds remaining in the second quarter, and the Jackets had a 28-20 halftime lead.

Castille's 39-yard run was the only touchdown in the third quarter. In the fourth, Warren pounded into the end zone with his final two TDs. North Mesquite's Williams passed for another touchdown, and the scoring ended with 1:15 to play when instead of punting from their 25 yard line, the Jackets ran the ball back into the end zone and touched it down for a safety.

Smith explained, "Worst case, it's blocked and they get a cheap score. With the safety we can get a free kick, and whenever you do a free kick you know it can't be blocked. I would like to take a little more time off the clock, though."

"It didn't affect the point differential for the playoffs." Any victory by 14 or more points is treated as a 14-point victory for playoff tiebreakers.

Rockwall at Tyler Lee Raiders (1-5, 0-2), 7:30 p.m. Friday, Tyler Rose Stadium. RHS can move more into

playoff contention by defeating the turnover-prone Raiders. The Jackets currently are tied for fifth place in the district with Rockwall-Heath, but they're just half a game behind two teams tied for 12-5A's final two playoff berths.

Smith said of Lee, "They're very athletic and explosive."

RHS seeded 1st for district tennis

Outlook was good for Rockwall's tennis team in the District 12-5A Championships. Because they earned the first seed through their victories in district dual-match competition, the Jackets would play matches in this week's tournament on their home court.

Warren also drew a bye for Thursday morning's first round. Its semifinal match Thursday would have been against a team that already played a match that morning, either Mesquite or fourth-seeded Rockwall-Heath.

The championship match was set for 9:30 a.m. Friday at the Rockwall Tennis Facility, with the third-place match scheduled for the same time at Rockwall-Heath High School.

Warriors' mistakes lead to 38-20 victory for McKinney Christian

When things were equal, the Rockwall Christian Academy football team made mistakes.

Things weren't equal Friday night at Rockwall High School, where McKinney Christian Academy's offense outgained RCA by nearly 200 yards. In that, three Warriors fumbles and a long kickoff return allowed by special teams led directly to four of MCA's five touchdowns.

The result was a 38-20 loss, the fifth in a row this season for RCA (0-5). Most of that difference came in the first quarter, which ended with the McKinney Christian team leading 21-6.

Warriors had tied the game 6-6 on a 12-yard touchdown run by Daniel Rorie, his first of three in the game.

It didn't take long for the Mustangs (3-3) to regain and keep the lead. Daniel Doyle, who had scored the visitors' first touchdown, returned the kickoff after Rorie's touchdown 75 yards to the Warriors' 7. Doyle scored on a 10-yard run.

Warriors fumbled the ball away on its next possession. Two plays later, the Mustangs ran with MCA's Sky Walker, who scored on a 29-yard pass from Brock. Warriors made the game closer in the second quarter, when Rorie's run provided the only scoring and a 21-12 halftime deficit.

Rorie at quarterback, RCA controlled the ball for much of the game, 52 plays to 44 for the Mustangs. Rorie accounted for all but 10 of McKinney Christian's 233 yards, but MCA was able to spread its offense with Brock and Walker to complement Doyle's 265 yards (138 rushing, 127 receiving).

Warriors' second-half touchdowns followed Warriors fumbles. The Mustangs added a fourth-quarter field goal after holding RCA on downs. Rorie scored his third touchdown, a 2-yard run, on the last play of the game, then passed to Jonas Poland for a 2-point conversion.

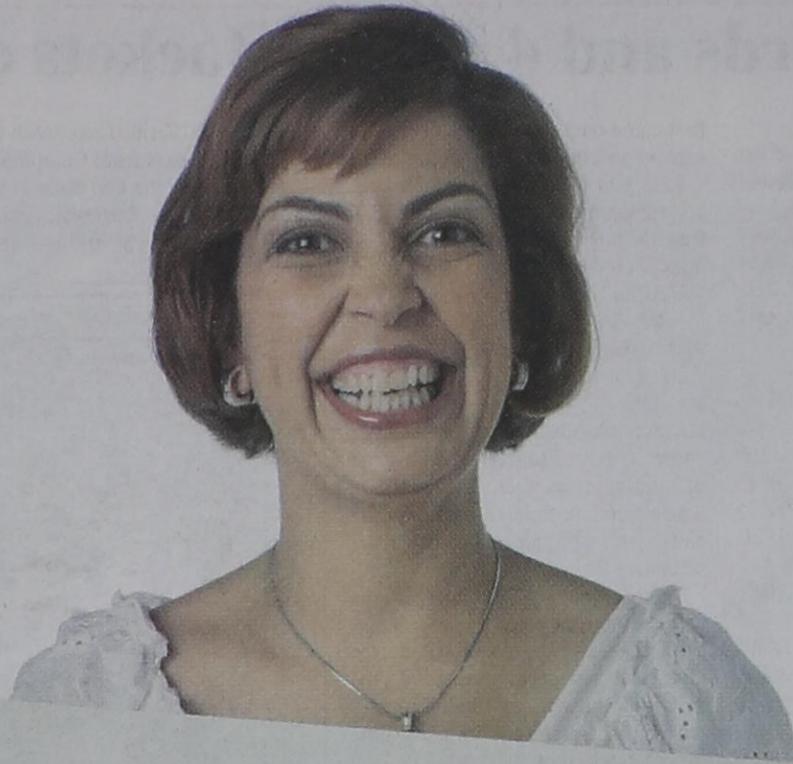
