Committee On Aging now in fourth decade of service to elderly, disabled

Meals on Wheels for its Meals on Wheels program, which delivers meals to senior citizens. Rockwall County Committee on Aging is a valuable resource for older residents and their caregivers.

The goals of RCCOA are to provide access to: meals, transportation, benefits counseling and caregiver support to allow older adults to remain living safely in their own homes. These services enhance and encourage older adult independence and

well-being. RCCOA began as a grassroots movement more than 30 years ago when Robert and Sis Hawks began cooking in their own kitchen to produce meals and had the food delivered to

their elderly neighbors. This volunteer effort took hold, and in May of 1978 the Rockwall County Committee on Aging was incorporated with Bill Bell, Vivian Hicks, Joe Bailey Canup, Elmer Kohn, Dewitt VanCleave, Henry Squires, Judge Darwood Wimpee, Dr. Randal Sparks and Odis Lowe among its charter members.

In March of 1999, the 16-member RCCOA board filed for non-profit status, allowing it to begin the Meals on Wheels program of Rockwall County.

Today the Committee on Aging prepares and delivers 135 meals each day, including holiday and emergency food packages. The program not only provides nutrition for the seniors, but it also provides contact with the outside world.

"It's really a wonderful experience to be able to brighten someone's day. Since I began volunteering, I have formed close relationships with several of the seniors I deliver meals to. Sometimes I'm the only personal contact they may have during their day, and they look forward to seeing me. It touches my heart," said one Meals on Wheels volunteer.

Margie VerHagen has been the executive director of the Rockwall County Committee on Aging for two years.

In addition to overseeing food

delivery, VerHagen supervises medical assessments of the RCCOA elderly clients. These assessments include documentation of their levels of mobility and dexterity, and an inventory of their required medications. The information obtained is packaged inside a small, sealed plastic bag called the Vial of Life, which is placed in the client's refrigerator where it can be easily accessed by emergency workers in the event of a crisis. Based on the information obtained during assessments, the committee is able to make referrals to the Home Health Care network, which provides in-home medical care.

RCCOA provides important health information and counseling for seniors. Its annual Health Fair allows people to collect literature about services offered in the area. People who are considering a move to Rockwall can call RCCOA for referrals on housing, doctors, clinics, and dentists. In addition, RCCOA provides counseling and assistance to caregivers.

When asked why she serves as RCCOA board president, Mary Joe Cason said, "I love helping our seniors, because they need to know that someone cares about them."

The Committee on Aging recently secured funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for a fire prevention

and safety program. Part of the funding will be used to purchase special devices that connect to smoke detectors and alert hearing-impaired individuals to danger. They are also using the funds to purchase weather radios for their clients, which will notify them of tornado warnings.

In addition, the Committee sponsors "Older Americans Day," which recognizes senior citizens and their commitment to volunteering in their community.

Although RCCOA receives some state, federal and local funding, most of the money used for day-to-day operations is received through sponsors and fundraising efforts. The Meals on Wheels First Annual Golf Tournament will be conducted at Buffalo Creek Country Club on July 23 to raise much-needed funds to help the organization expand their services for the growing number of elderly in Rockwall County.

"I got involved with the Committee on Aging, because I realized that if I lived long enough I would need them," said board member Annie Cornelius. "What we're creating today will serve us well in the future."

Dodson found guilty of DWI, aggravated assault

James Earle Dodson, 55, was found guilty of driving while intoxicated and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon during court proceedings conducted May 20.

According to a news release from the Rockwall County Criminal District Attorney's Office, the jury returned the

guilty verdicts after 30 minutes of deliberation.

Dodson was charged with a July 13, 2009, crash that involved his vehicle carrying a 12-year-old boy who was injured in the crash.

During the punishment hearing, jurors heard that Dodson previously had been convicted of five DWIs and was on probation for two additional DWIs, one of which occurred in Rockwall. The jury sentenced Dodson to 10 years in prison for aggravated assault and 15 years in prison for aggravated assault charging.

"Citizens all over Texas are safer with Mr. Dodson behind bars," said Kenda Cullins, the county's criminal district attorney.

Suzanne Fichtel, lead prosecutor, said the victims in the case, all of whom now are covered, "were pleased with the verdict and are ready to move on behind them."

The kits are valued at \$1,000, but by partnering between Rockwall fire and fire department and the Committee on Aging, the county is able to provide fully-funded grant of \$500 from Federal Emergency Management Agency to chase them at about the retail cost.

With the funds, the county purchased 500 kits, 140 already allocated to residents identified as meals on wheels.

The remaining available to any resident 65 or older or disabled of any age with a need. Those able to use the system are encouraged to contact the county for information.

Pallbearers were Jimmy Cox, Robert Crouch, Gary Edge, James Fikes, Lee Fikes and Ross Low.

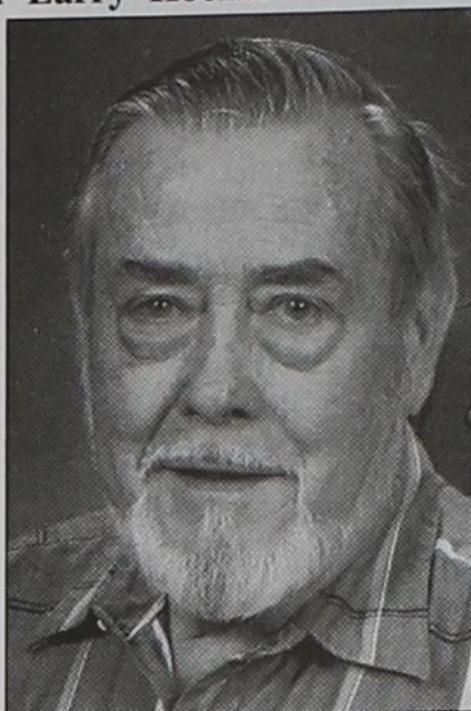
Lawrence Edward 'Larry' Hooker

In God's Word

Special Matters...1 Corinthians 14:16-19, 26

W. Burnett
 The subject of spiritual matters in 1 Corinthians chapter 14 verses 6-15. Please note that all uses of the word "tongues" refer to the gift of tongues, not to the use of the tongue as an instrument of speech. If I come unto you speaking in tongues, what shall I profit you if I speak to you either by revelation, or by knowledge, or by doctrine?" (verse 6). It does not profit the assembly of somebody speaks in tongues. Common sense tells us why, we interpret it Himself as we continue.

without lifegiving sound, whether pipe or harp, except they play on the sounds, how shall it be known what is piped or sounded? The trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself?" (verses 7-8). We can program our cell phones to give a call when a call comes in. What if that sound is changed without our knowledge and while in a group of people the phone gives an unfamiliar sound around to see whose phone is ringing.

The sounds that prepare warriors for battle. There is Reveille the soldiers, Taps which signifies mourning for the loss of a soldier there is the tune that leads soldiers into battle. The military uses buglers or pipers to play the correct tune. Otherwise, if they play unknown tunes, the soldiers would not know to prepare themselves for battle.

except you utter by the tongues words easy to be understood, it will be known what is spoken? For you shall speak into the air if nobody speaks in tongues during a church assembly and that is the case. If he speaks words that are not understood by the others. In essence, he speaks only to the air and not to the spirit.

it may be, so many kinds of voices in the world, and none of them are understood. Therefore if I know not the meaning of what is said, I will be unto him that speaks in tongues, a barbarian. He that speaks in tongues, unless he interpret, will be like a barbarian." There are many different languages and all of them are developed and significant languages. The speaking in tongues is like a foreigner and stranger to the people who are not familiar with the language.

As Paul says in verse 5, "even so, for as ye are zealous of spiritual matters, seek that you may excel unto the church." Please note that the spiritual matters does not refer to speaking in tongues. All members in the body of Christ can and should be praying often in their personal prayer lives, and at the same time being edified spiritually unto the edifying of the other members in the church.

1 Corinthians 14:14-15 gives more information, "Let him that speaks in an unknown tongue pray that he may interpret. For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prays, but my understanding is unfruitful." To "pray" is to believe to do so. All prayer must be with believing in the promised results. Also, when we speak in tongues it is the gift of tongues which prays, and our mental understanding is unfruitful. It is not that we are ignorant of the spirit that is in us.

1 Corinthians 14:16-17 provides more important information, "What is it then, I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding. I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also." To pray or sing with the spirit is speaking in tongues. Praying and singing with the understanding to those prayers that are in our own languages.

1 Corinthians 14:18-19 tells us that the world so much that He made it available for anybody who would speak in tongues. He raised Jesus from the dead, to be filled with holy spirit. We should pray with that same holy spirit, which is speaking in tongues.

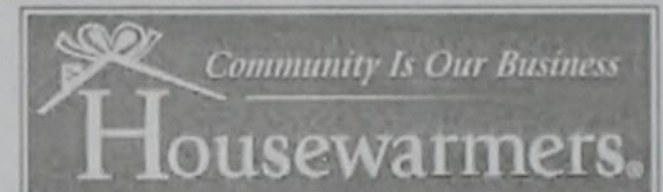
Rettig receives master's degree

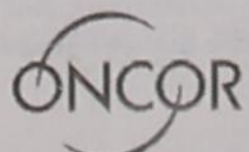

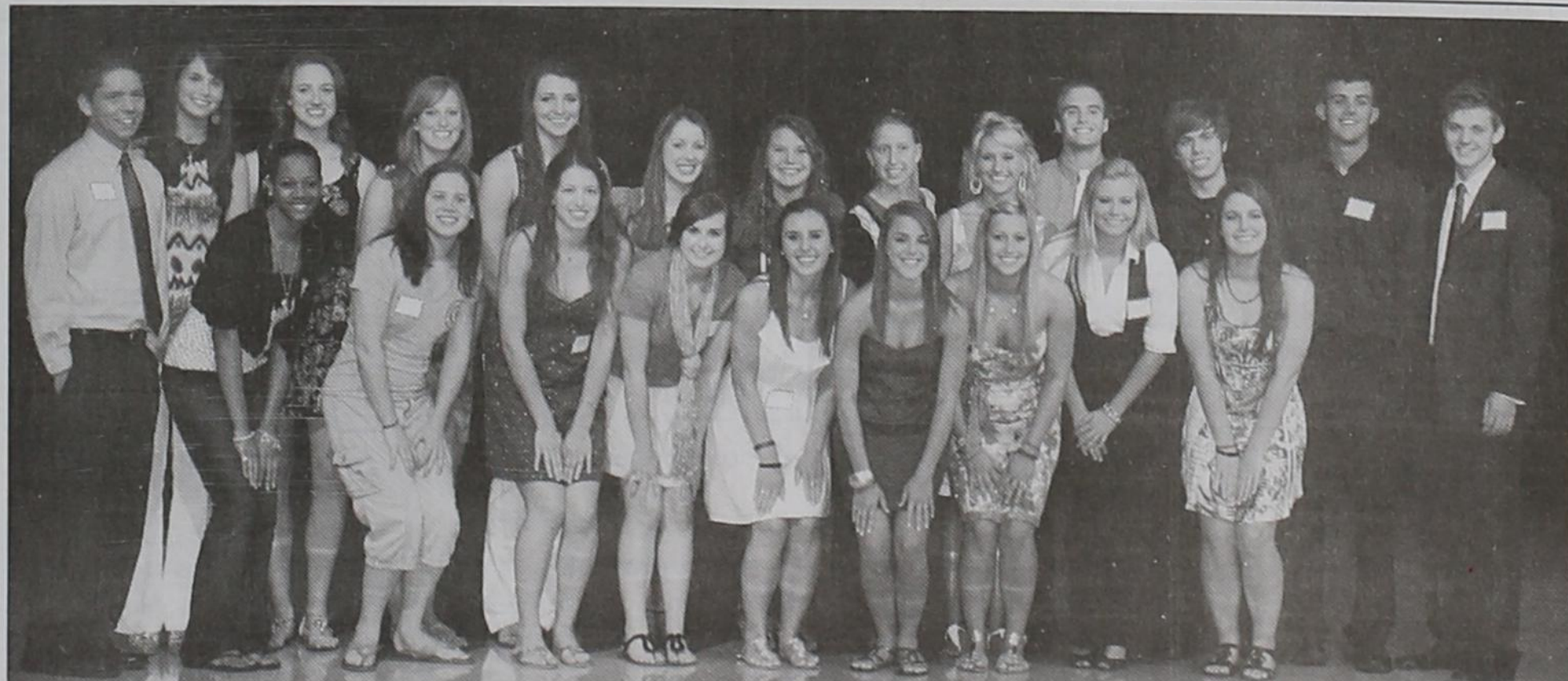

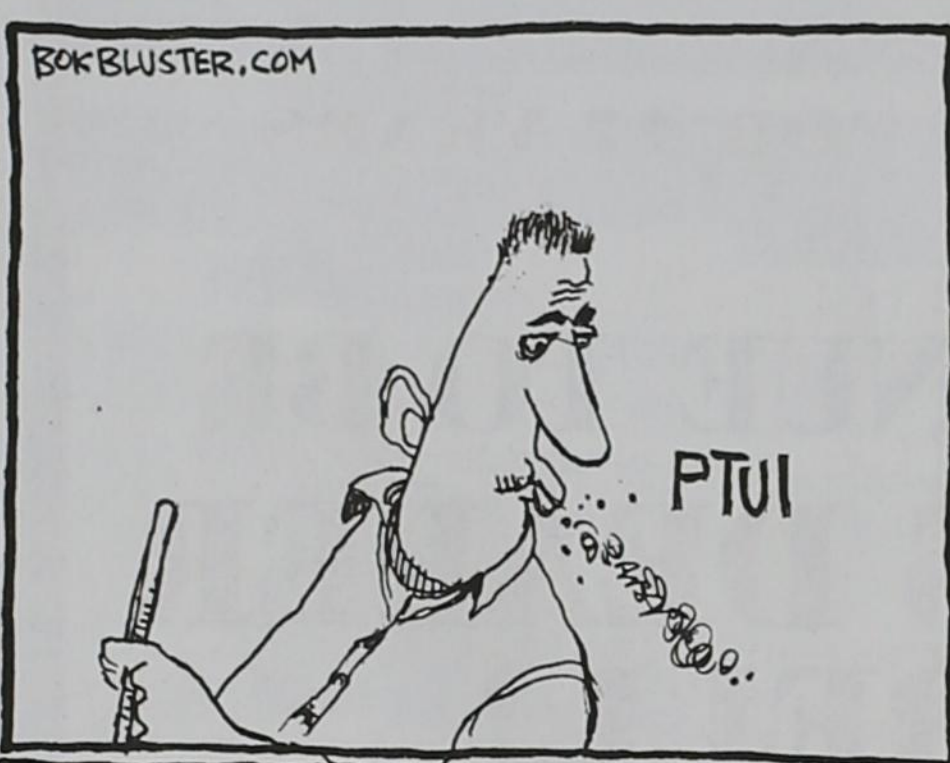

The Right To Discriminate

Rand Paul of Kentucky, U.S. Senate hopeful, is caught up in a swirl of controversy in response to his comments on MSNBC's "Rachel Maddow Show." He has been dishonestly accused of saying he thinks that private businesses have a right to discriminate against black people. Here's a partial transcript of the pertinent question in the interview:

Maddow: "Do you think that a private business has a right to say, 'We don't serve black people'?" To which Paul answered, "I'm not, I'm not, I'm not in ... yeah ... I'm not in favor of any discrimination of any form."

The "yeah" was spun in the media as "yes" to the question whether private businesses had a right to refuse service to black people. Paul had told Maddow that while he supported the 1964 Civil Rights Act in general, he thought that provisions banning private discrimination might have gone too far.

Democrats launched an attack on Paul accusing him of being a racist. Republicans criticized and in the words of Republican National Committee Chairman Michael Steele, Paul's "philosophy is misplaced in these times." He added that Paul has a libertarian perspective and "(has) a very, very strong view about the limitation of government intrusion into the private sector."

Should people have the right to discriminate by race, sex, religion and other attributes? In a free society, I say yes. Let's look at it. When I was selecting a marriage partner, I systematically discriminated against white women, Asian women and women of other ethnicities that I found less preferable. The Nation of Islam discriminates against white members. The Aryan Brotherhood discriminates against having black members. The Ku Klux Klan discriminates against having Catholic and Jewish members. The NFL discriminates against hiring female quarterbacks. The NAACP National Board of Directors, at least according to the photo on their Web page, has no white members.

You say, Williams, that's different. It's not like public transportation, restaurants and hotel service in which Title II of the 1964 Civil Rights Act "prohibits discrimination because of race, color, religion, or national origin in certain places of public accommodation, such as hotels, restaurants, and places of entertainment." While there are many places that serve the public, it doesn't change the fact that they are privately owned, and who is admitted, under what conditions, should be up to the owner.

If places of public accommodation were free to racially discriminate, how much racial discrimination would there be? In answering that question, we should acknowledge that just because a person is free to do something, it doesn't follow that he will find it in his interest to do so. An interesting example is found in an article by Dr. Jennifer Roback titled "The Political Economy of Segregation: The Case of Segregated Streetcars," in *Journal of Economic History* (1986). During the late 1800s, private streetcar companies in Augusta, Houston, Jacksonville, Mobile, Montgomery and Memphis were not segregated, but by the early 1900s, they were. Why? City ordinances forced them to segregate black and white passengers. Numerous Jim Crow laws ruled the day throughout the South mandating segregation in public accommodations.

When one sees a law on the books, he should suspect that the law is there because not everyone would voluntarily comply with the law's specifications. Extra-legal measures, that included violence, backed up Jim Crow laws. When white solidarity is confronted by the specter of higher profits by serving blacks, it's likely that profits will win. Thus, Title II of the 1964 Civil Rights represented government countering government-backed Jim Crow laws.

One does not have to be a racist to recognize that the federal government has no constitutional authority to prohibit racial or any other kind of discrimination by private parties. Moreover, the true test of one's commitment to freedom of association doesn't come when he permits people to associate in ways he deems appropriate. It comes when he permits people to voluntarily associate in ways he deems offensive.

Peace Movement finally awakening?

One problem with the Left is Barack Obama. With a few exceptions, Obama's election has silenced the critics of empire, invasion, and atomic bombings, and civil liberties destruction. Maybe they are giving him time to get settled in before he can handle the empire. Well, Obama is into his 17th month and his progress on that front. It's safe to say that he has no intention of backing, much less liquidating the empire.

Why a group of prominent leftist intellectuals, activists, and writers have added the ceasefire and has finally criticized Obama's war is time. In a statement placed in the *New York Review of Books* titled "Crimes Are Crimes No Matter Who Does Them," they state: "Crimes under Bush are crimes under Obama and must be treated as such by anyone who claims a shred of conscience."

Specifically referred to Obama's ordering the assassination of an American citizen and radical Muslim cleric living in the United States because he is suspected of participating in plots by Al Qaeda.

The statement notes that "Al-Awlaki denies these charges. No matter. Without trial or other judicial proceeding, the administration has simply put him on the to-be-killed list."

Thus a president who spared no criticism of the horrendous powers claimed by the Bush-Cheney administration has one-upped his predecessor by openly declaring the authority to murder even American citizens. Why aren't all Obama supporters expressing their disgust over this despotic policy?

The statement also singled out massacres committed by U.S. troops in Iraq and Afghanistan, cover-ups or dissembling after those events, and homicides represented as suicides at Guantanamo Bay.

"In some respects this is worse than Bush," the statement continues. "Obama says that the government can detain you indefinitely, even if you have been exonerated in a trial, and he has publicly floated the idea of 'preventive detention.' [And] the Obama administration, in expanding the use of unmanned drone attacks, argues that the U.S. has the authority under international law to use extrajudicial killing in sovereign countries with which it is not at war."

Acts that might have been "anomalies" under Bush, the group notes, "have now been consecrated into 'standard operating procedure' by Obama, who claims, as did Bush, executive privilege and state secrecy in defending the crime of aggressive war."

It closes with an appeal to "end this complicity of silence." This is a hopeful sign, indeed. Maybe it's the spark that's needed to launch a real peace movement so that this immoral and criminal behavior will finally stop.

Finally, the Private Option Health Care Act would lower the prices of prescription drugs by reducing barriers to the importation of Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved pharmaceuticals. Under my bill, anyone wishing to import a drug simply submits an application to the FDA, which then must approve it unless it is either not approved for use in the United States or is adulterated or misbranded.

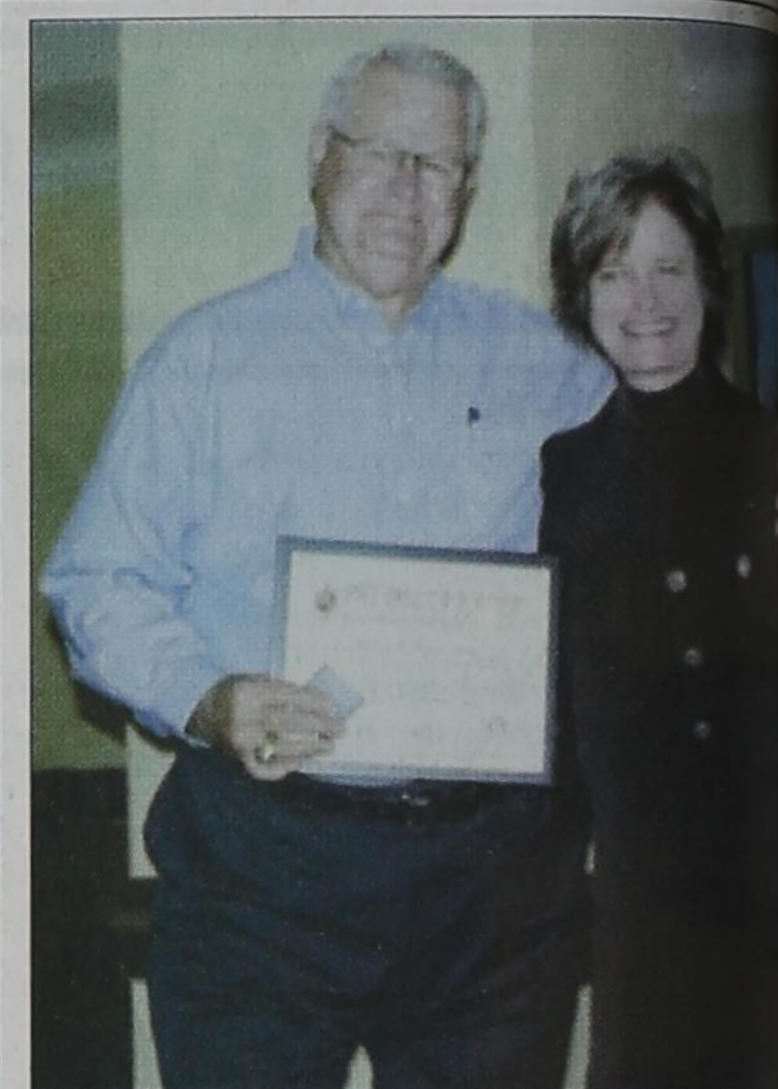

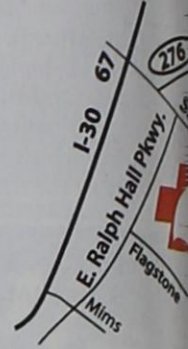

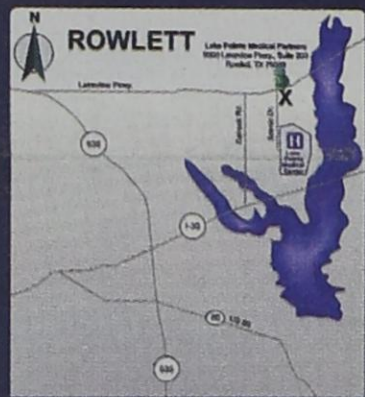

Fast Facts on Podiatry

Podiatric Medicine

- There are an estimated 15,000 podiatrists practicing in the United States.
- Podiatrists receive a doctor of podiatric medicine (DPM) degree.
- Doctors of podiatric medicine receive basic and clinical science education and training comparable to that of medical doctors, including four years of undergraduate education, four years of graduate study at one of the nine podiatric medical colleges, and two or three years of hospital-based post-graduate residency training.
- Podiatric medicine is to the foot and ankle what ophthalmology is to the eye and cardiology is to the heart.

The Foot

- Each foot has 26 bones – both feet contain nearly one quarter of all the bones (206) of the body.
- Each foot is made up of an intricate network of over 100 tendons, ligaments, and muscles.
- Every step places 1.5 times your body weight of pressure on your foot (a 150-pound person places 225 pounds of pressure on the foot with every step).
- The average person walks 5,000 to 7,000 steps a day. The American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA) estimates that the average person will walk nearly 100,000 miles in a lifetime, between three to four times the earth's circumference.

Foot Ailments

- Nearly eight in 10 Americans have experienced foot problems as a result of wearing uncomfortable or ill-fitting shoes.¹
- The most reported foot ailments among Americans are heel pain, blisters, and ingrown toenails.¹
- Heel pain is the most common foot ailment, with 43 percent of Americans experiencing this condition within the past year.¹
- Six in 10 (60%) Americans who have experienced heel pain over the past year also have had trouble performing life's daily activities.¹
- Other common foot ailments Americans have experienced within the past year include pain in the balls of the feet (35%), nail problems (33%), and sweaty feet or foot odor (32%).¹

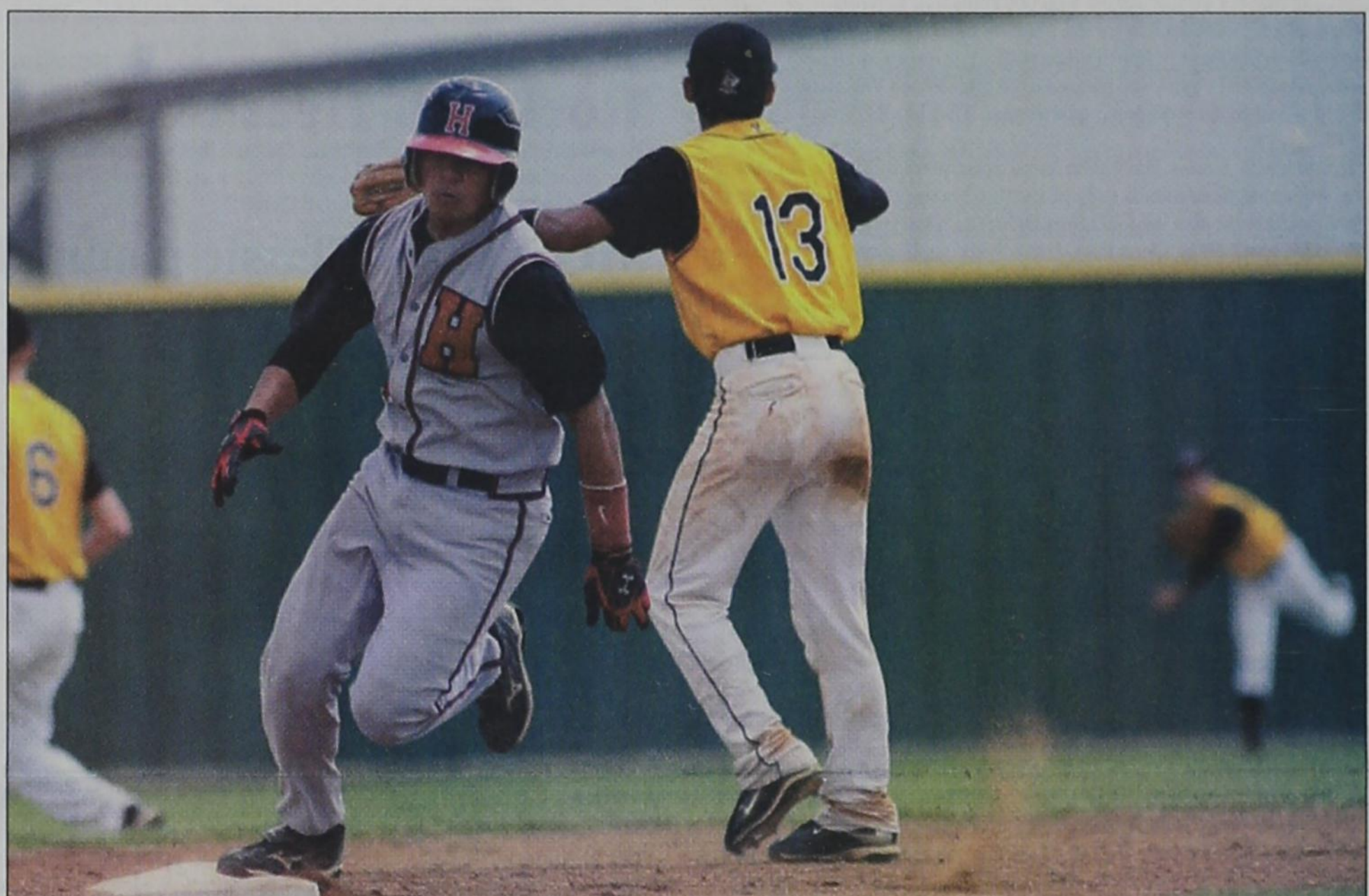

Rockwall Christian Academy sophomore John Edwards was named a first-team pitcher on the TAPPS 1A/2A All-State team.

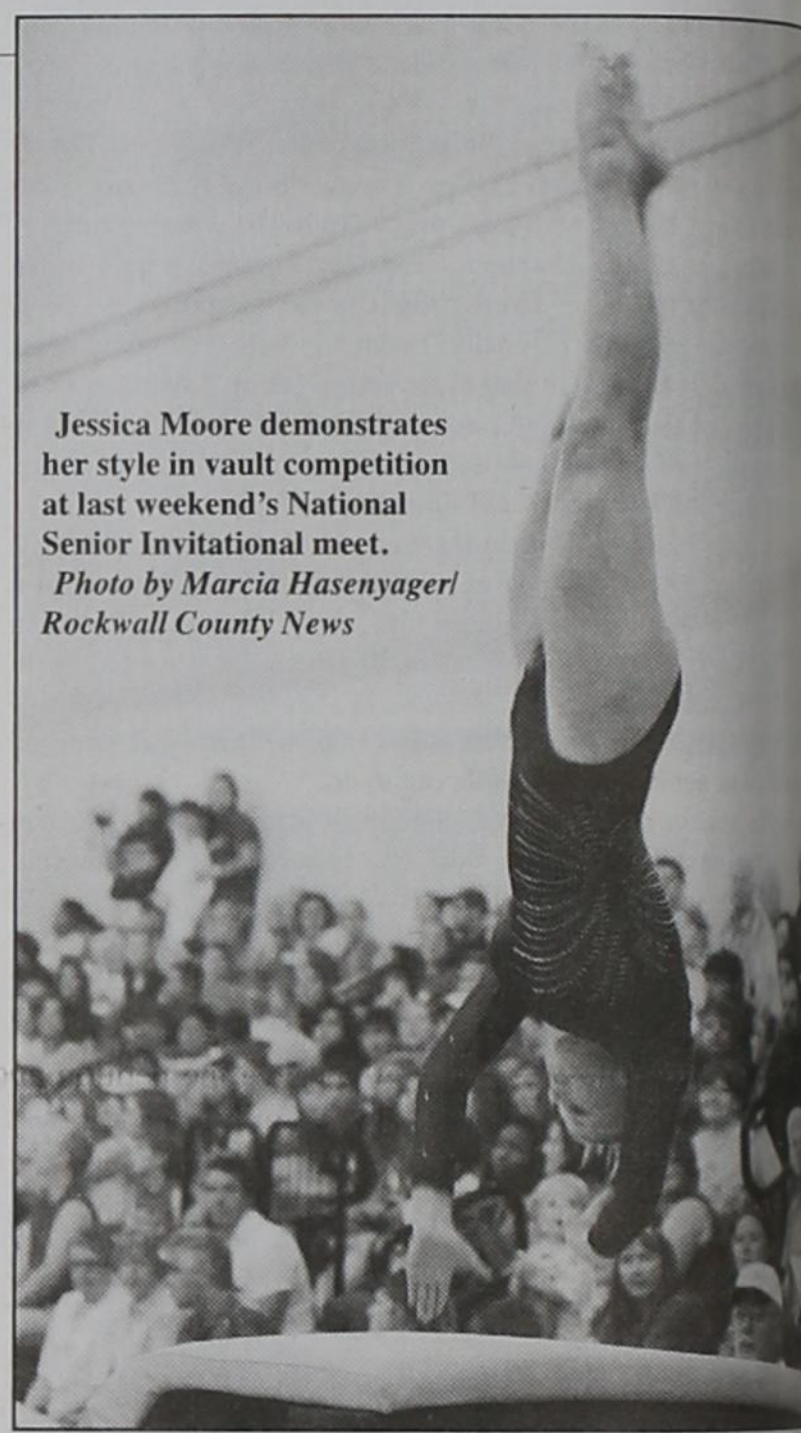
On the All-State second team was RCA senior catcher/pitcher Kasey Weadon.

The purpose of the petition are for the conversion of Lavon Water Supply Corporation to a Utility District and the organization, creation and establishment of Lavon Special Utility District under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 59, Texas Constitution, and Chapter 65 of the Texas Water Code, as amended. The District shall have the purposes and powers provided in Chapter 65 of the Texas Water Code, and CCN No. 10066 shall be transferred as provided in Chapter 13, Texas Water Code, as amended. The nature of the services presently performed by Lavon Water Supply Corporation is to purchase, own, hold, lease and otherwise acquire sources of water supply; to build, operate and maintain facilities for the transportation of water; and to sell water to individual members, towns, cities, private businesses, and other political subdivisions of the State. The nature of the services proposed to be provided by Lavon Special Utility District is to purchase, own, hold, lease, and otherwise acquire sources of water supply; to build, operate, and maintain facilities for the storage, treatment, and transportation of water; and to sell water to individual members, towns, cities, private business entities and other political subdivisions of the State. It is proposed that the District will protect, preserve and restore the purity and quantity of the water within the District. It is anticipated that conversion will have no effect on the rates and services provided to the customers.

The proposed District is located in Collin and Rockwall Counties and will contain approximately 13,713.88 acres. The territory to be included within the proposed District includes all of the territory of the existing service area covered by CCN No. 10066 and is set forth in the following map designated as Exhibit "A" hereto. The proposed District is also depicted in the vicinity map designated as Exhibit "B" hereto.

CCN No. 10066 will be transferred after a positive confirmation election.

ESTIMATED CASE HEARING. The TCEQ may grant a contested case hearing on this petition if a written hearing request is filed within 30 days after the newspaper publication of this notice.

To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a corporation, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number; (2) the name of the petitioner and the TCEQ Internal Control Number; (3) the name of the person requesting a contested case hearing; (4) a brief description of how you would be affected by the petition in a way not common to the general public; and (5) the location of your residence relative to the proposed district's boundaries. You may also submit your proposed reasons for the petition which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address provided in the following section below.

The Executive Director may approve the petition unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after the newspaper publication of this notice. If a hearing request is filed, the Executive Director may not approve the petition and will forward the petition and request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a contested case hearing is held, it will be a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in district court.

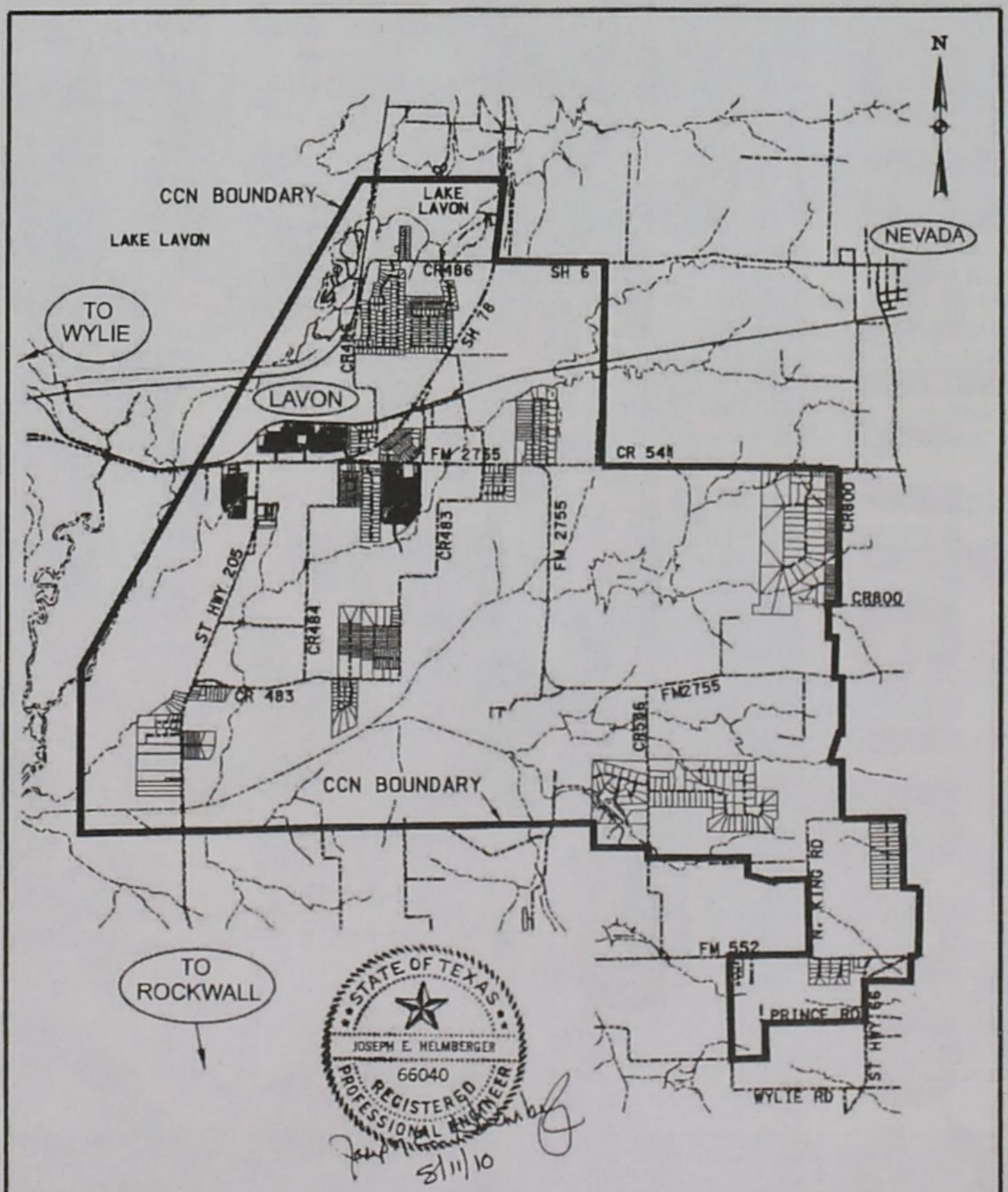
