opponent (Friday night at Midland) didn't see much.

"The scrimmage was just practice against another team," Smith said. "We weren't throwing it a lot trying to stretch the field."

The player who probably impressed Midland the most was Jackets junior running back Josh Broach. He gained 113 yards in 16 carries, and caught three of Rockwall's short passes for 15 yards.

No official score was kept, but Denison's starting offense scored three of its four touchdowns. The Jackets' defense caught up with Denison's substitutes with three interceptions, two by sophomore Spencer Edwards and one by Alonzo Owens.

Rockwall's two TDs came from its second and third units. The starters didn't score a touchdown, but produced a field goal that was the only score during a timed quarter that ended the scrimmage.

With the ball at the end of that timed scrimmage, RHS treated it as a game situation protecting a lead. Broach stayed inbounds instead of going out of bounds on two runs, and quarterback Adam Dingwell knelt with the ball on the final play. A Denison assistant commented, "We played the timed quarter like it was the first quarter; they played like it was the fourth."

Before the varsity scrimmage, the junior varsity and two freshman squads from Rockwall met their Denison counterparts.

The freshman teams played at the same time on opposite ends of the field, with drives starting at the 45 yard line, Rockwall's freshmen had the upper hand, hitting hard and making a successful goal line stand on defense, and scoring rushing touchdowns on offense. Denison's junior varsity, like its varsity, showed a powerful run-

ning game. Even for the later varsity scrimmage, there was plenty of room for spectators in the expanded stadium.

The former home-side seats were accessed by walking up steps to reach the top row, then down to the seats. That top row of seats now is below a ground-level concourse, with an "upper deck" stretching up from there to the top of what now appears to be Rockwall's tallest building.


