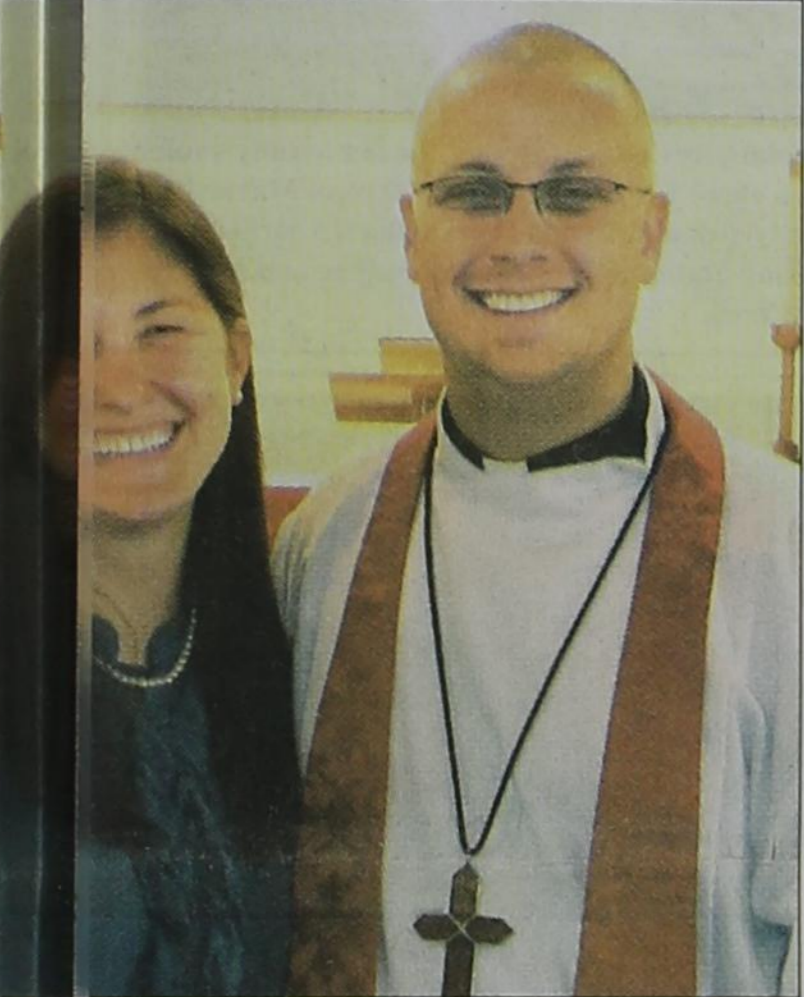

## Fate Council looks to redefine identity with new branding efforts

The City of Fate is working with a local design firm to create a new cohesive advertising brand for the city. Fate City Manager Philip Rodriguez said the objectives of the branding campaign being generated by QBall Design of Rockwall are not only to attract future development opportunities, but to bridge past and present to create one city with common goals. "It's really to expand our identity," Rodriguez said. "We're served by two different school districts and there's the very historic part of our community and folks that have just moved in who don't know a lot of that history. I think that having a brand that we can use to identify ourselves will hopefully bring us together as a community and give us a sense of an image for ourselves." Fate Mayor Bill Broderick initially began conversations about branding the city at a June 4 council workshop in order to "come up with an identity that would involve a consistent and cohesive advertising brand for the city." Not only would the city logo be redesigned, which would be included on everything from the city web site to stationery to brochures, but the city is also considering new signage at local parks and gateways at the entry points to Fate which would carry the logo. "We have several parks that need clear signage so people know they are city of Fate parks and possibly welcome signs at the entrances to our community," Rodriguez said. Artists are working on design options and may bring those to the city council by the end of the summer. Rodriguez said he and Broderick are working

with QBall, but other city departments, the City Council, the Fate Economic Development Corporation Board and eventually the Fate community will be able to offer input on the design. The Fate Economic Development Corporation will have a logo very similar to the city's but with subtle variations. Rodriguez said it's another component of branding the city "that will give Fate one central message or theme that staff can utilize when they go to trade shows or are communicating with prospective companies that may be interested in the Fate corridor." "It really gives us the opportunity to have one message, one voice, one image for what we are trying to convey about our community," he said. The cost of the project depends on how much work QBall does and if the city looks for other vendors to produce different components, such as stationery. Rodriguez said the city spoke with several design firms before choosing QBall and that QBall's prices were very competitive. QBall has done work for businesses and government agencies in the Rockwall area, as well as in Dallas, Colton and Hunt counties. Rodriguez said their work is "high quality and very polished." "We are a diverse community and we have a lot of folks that have been here forever and some that just got here. It's important to us since we don't really have a Fate school district to rally around, but we have other things that give us a particular identity," Rodriguez said. "This will give us something that everyone who lives in Fate, works in Fate, and in the future does business in Fate, they'll know just by that brand who they're working with and give us that presence that we're looking for."

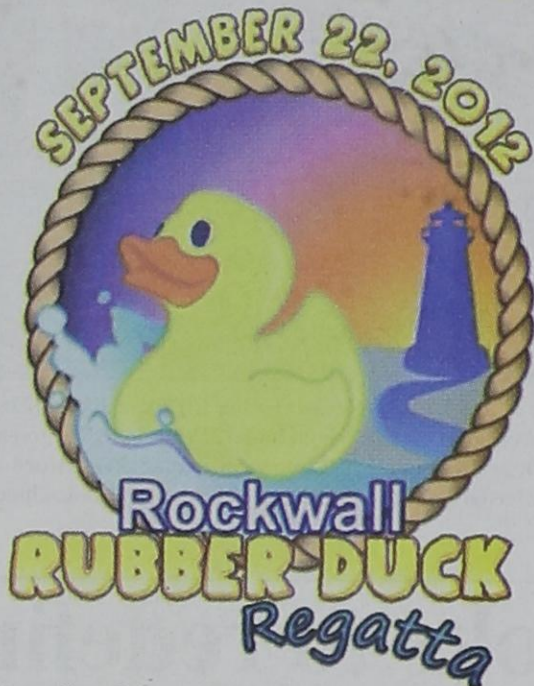

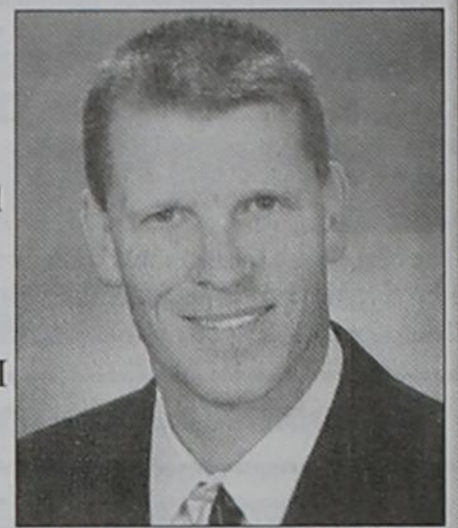

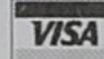

# On God's Word

## Peter's denials...

As we continue to dive into the records of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection, let's take a moment to study Peter's denials.

Jesus prophesied of Peter's denials prior to his arrest. Three of the Gospels record his prophetic references to the first denial in Matthew 26:34, Luke 22:34 and John 13:38. While the above scripture clearly show three pending denials, they do not limit the total number.

The scripture in Mark 14:30 shines more light on this subject, "And Jesus said unto him, 'Verily I say unto you, that this day, in this night, before the rooster crows twice, you shall deny me three times.'" The above three verses refer to three denials prior to a crow, while the verse in Mark refers to another three denials prior to a second crow. Two sets of three equals a total of six denials. One of the keys to rightly dividing Peter's denials is to be precise and exact with the details surrounding each one. Some details to watch for are location, time, events, people and interaction. Due to limited space, this column will focus on the general number of denials, rather than their chronology. The best choice for Peter's first denial is in John 18:15-18, "And Simon Peter followed Jesus into the palace of the high priest. But Peter stood at the door without. Then went out that other disciple, which was known unto the high priest, and spoke

unto her that kept the door, and brought in Peter. Then said the damsel that kept the door to Peter, 'Are not you also one of this man's disciples?' he said, 'I am not.'" This denial occurred while Jesus stood before Annas. A young, female doorkeeper accused him while he entered the room. Also, another disciple arranged for his entry. The other five denials occurred while Jesus stood trial before Caiaphas, the high priest. In Matthew 26:69-70, Luke 22:55-57 and Mark 14:66-68a, the accuser was a young maiden who served the high priest. It occurred in the courtyard while warming himself over a fire. Luke 22:58 reveals another denial that also occurred by the fire in the courtyard. Mark 14:68b records the first crow of the rooster after Peter went out into the porch area. The next two verses reveal that the same maiden saw him again and told others that stood by, "This is one of them." (Mark 14:69-70 and Matthew 26:71-72). Then a little while later, the people that stood by him said again to Peter, "Surely you are one of them. For you are a Galilaean, and your speech agrees with this." And Peter began to curse and swear denying having any knowledge of Jesus. This record is also found in Matthew 26:73-74a and John 18:25.

A possible sixth denial is in Luke 22:59-60 and John 18:26-27a. It occurred about an hour after the people spoke of his speech. Here, another accuser mentioned Peter's Galilaean speech. The accuser was a servant of the high priest and recognized Peter from the time of Jesus' arrest. Mark 14:72 says, "And the second time, the rooster crowed." Even if we don't have the chronology established, this one verse perfectly establishes that Peter denied knowing Jesus another three times before a rooster crowed a second time.

## Couple celebrates second chance at life

 Wendy Murphy just celebrated an anniversary they will never forget. On June 11, 2011, she received the gift of life -- a new heart on Nov. 11. The procedure was performed by a team of heart specialists at U. T. Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. The heart was flown from Louisiana to prepare Davy for surgery. At midnight on Nov. 11, the surgery began. Davy was diagnosed with having dilated cardiomyopathy, a disease caused by a virus. Dilated cardiomyopathy is a disease of the heart, primarily affecting the heart's main pumping chamber (left ventricle becomes enlarged (dilated) and can't pump blood to the rest of the body with much force as a healthy heart can. Dilated cardiomyopathy doesn't necessarily cause symptoms, but for some people it is life-threatening. The disease may also cause irregular heart rhythms (arrhythmia), blood clots or sudden death. Although it may occur at all ages, even infants and children, the condition is mostly found in middle-aged people. Published information on the disease, symptoms can be weakness; shortness of breath when one is active or lying down; fatigue; exercise intolerance; lightheadedness, dizziness or fainting; persistent cough; swelling in the legs, ankles and feet; swelling of the abdomen; weight gain from fluid retention; lack of appetite and difficulty concentrating or decreased alertness; and sensation of a pounding heartbeat. Davy's heart is usually the size of his or her fist, but Davy's was the size of a tennis ball due to having to work so hard to deliver blood to his organs. He was on the list for five to six days a week, 10-hour days before he entered

Doctors had previously installed two different types of pacemakers in an attempt to maintain Davy's health until a heart donor could be found that matched his needs. Doctors maintained heart failure for 10 years with medication, biding for just the right time for the transplant. Davy was admitted to the hospital four weeks before the heart was found, having gone in before Halloween. This is normal procedure to conduct extensive testing to make sure his body is healthy enough to accept the new heart. After one week in a normal setting, he was admitted into the ICU to make sure he was in a totally germ free environment as the preparations continued. The slightest type of infection could have removed him from the transplant list. He was given only six months to live at the time he entered the hospital, should a heart not be found in time or he could have a LVAD (a pump to assist the heart) installed. Davy spent three weeks on transplant list as a "1A" top of the list. "1B" is the classification for the middle list, and "2C" is the bottom of list. Two other hearts were rejected for Davy before the match was found. The first heart was a female heart and would be too small to match his body size, as with a teenager's heart. The second heart had other complications that made it not a viable heart for the transplant. Once UT was notified that the organ had been found and was on its way, preparation for Davy to enter surgery began. His breast bone was split and chest opened. The pacemaker Davy had worn for several years was removed and he was put on a bypass machine and respirator. Once the new heart arrived, the old one was removed, the new heart put in. Then Davy was taken off the bypass. His breast bone was wired together and stitched up. Davy had been placed at the top of the list because of his young age, physical fitness, the condition of his existing heart and the fact that he didn't smoke or drink alcohol and maintained a very strict diet.

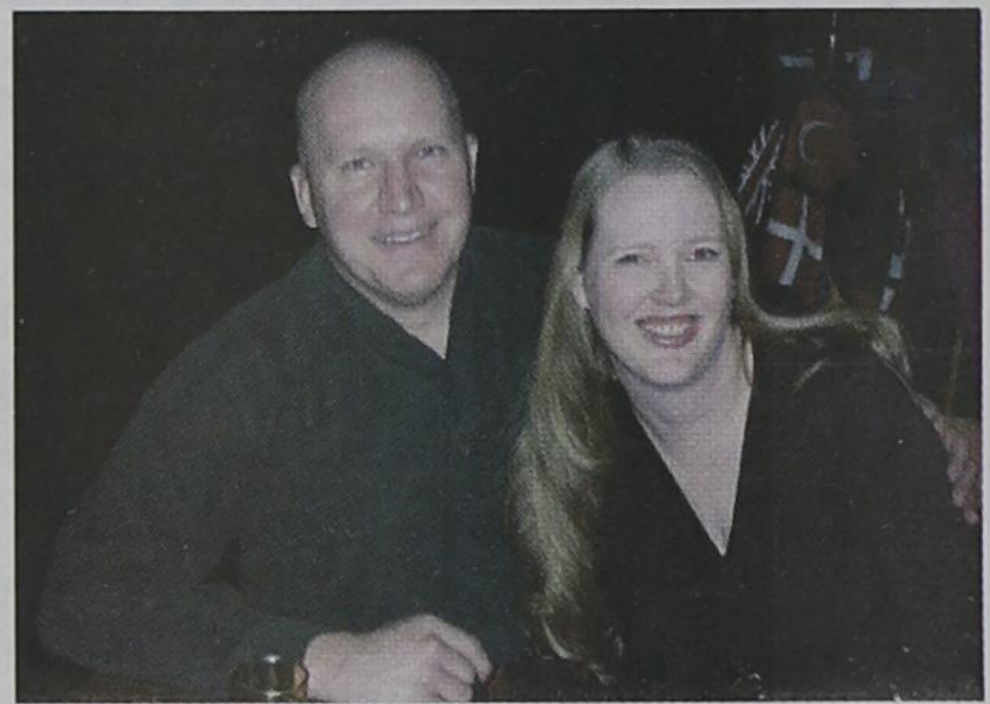
Prior to the transplant, the harvested heart was tested for disease or any other problems, which might cause Davy's body to reject it. The slightest problem would have stopped all proceedings. A small hitch in the strategic plans of transporting the heart came about when stormy weather moved through Louisiana, causing a delay for the jet to take off. But at the last moment, the front passed on through quickly and the jet took off for the 700-mile trip to Dallas. In the operating room surgery ran so smoothly, that the team of doctors was totally amazed. Normally the total surgery takes five to six hours to complete, but Davy's was completed in about three. Miraculously, there were no problems during the surgery and he did not need any blood transfusions. Within 24 hours after the surgery, Davy was awake, sitting up in a chair, eating his lunch. Three days later, he was out of the Cardiovascular ICU and back in the Isolated ICU. Davy's wife, Wendy, was at his side for every test or related event that took place that during the extended hospital stay. Davy was dismissed to go home the evening of Nov. 25. The company where Davy works, N.J. Malin and Associates, delivered an entire Thanksgiving meal including, prime rib, a smoked turkey, all the trimmings and desserts, to the couple's home on Thanksgiving Day, all pre-cooked, just waiting for them to return home. This was indeed a Thanksgiving holiday that Davy and Wendy never will forget. The sight both of them wanted to see most was surprisingly not "home." It was their beloved Chihuahua, Toby. Very close friends have been taking care of him during this long ordeal, and he was every bit as happy to see them as they were to see him. When asked if Davy and Wendy had anything they wanted to share, they both quickly replied, "Be a donor." "Give someone a second chance of life," he said. "A heart, liver, kidney or other organ is the most precious gift one can give and most definitely the most precious to receive. Everyone wants to be a hero, and no matter what kind of person you are in your life, if you are a donor, you can leave this world being someone's hero." 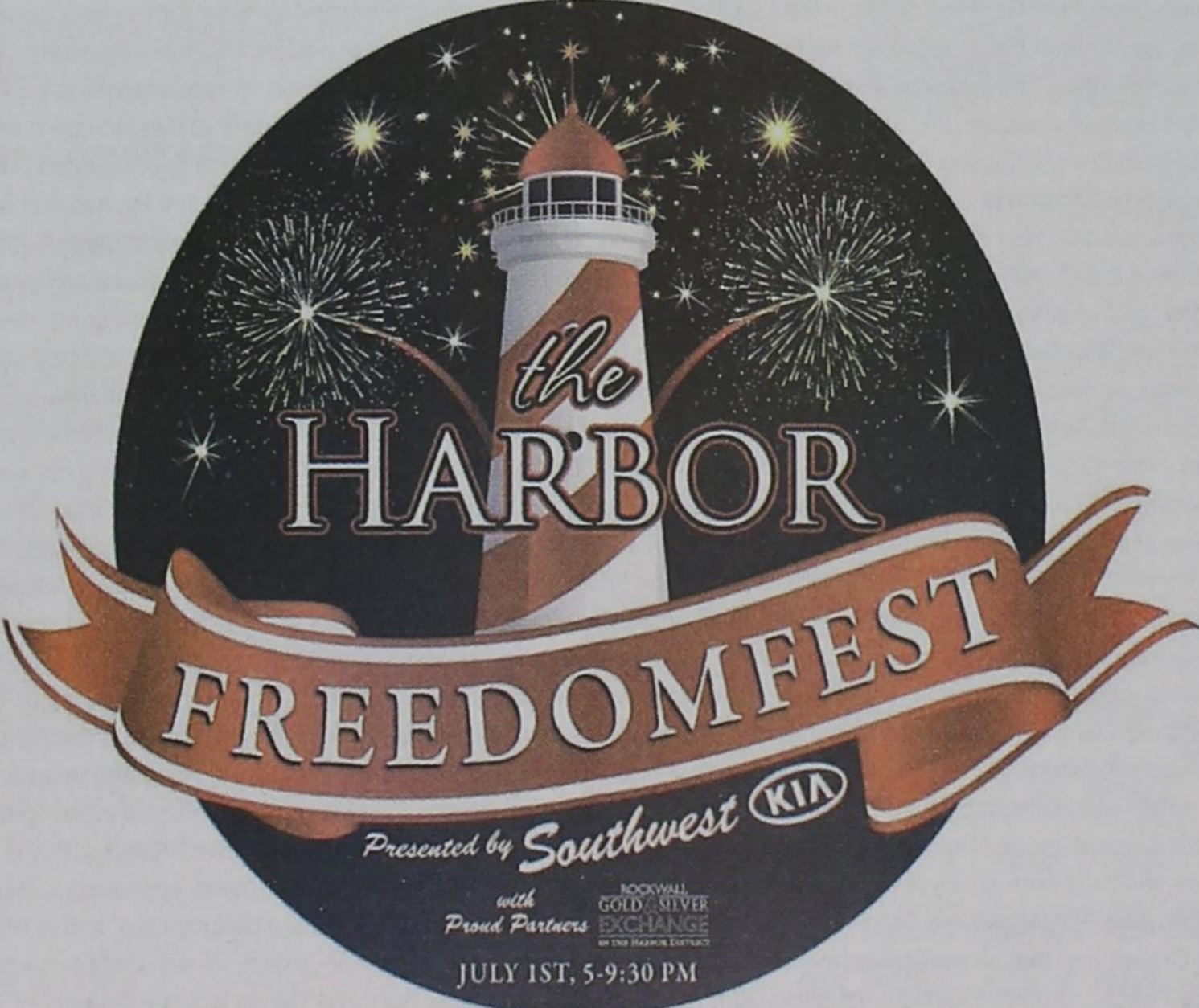

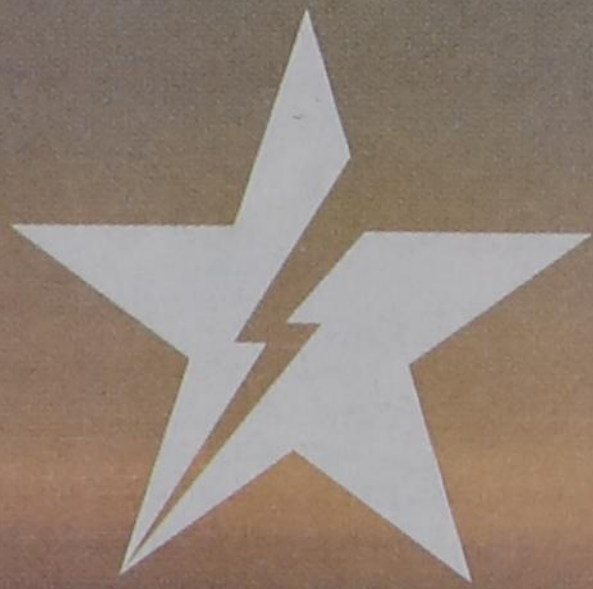

### IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776

## The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world. He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till he should assent; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them. He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only. He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures. He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people. He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within. He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands. He has obstructed the Administration of Justice by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers. He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries. He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance. He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures. He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power. He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation: For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us: For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States: For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world: For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent: For depriving us in many cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury: For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences: For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies: For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments: For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever. He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us. He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people. He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation. He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands. He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, not with a silent submission, but with a protest, to denounce our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and in the Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

Zone Sectional Championships, for those older than 14.

Sixteen-year-old Jared Butler from Rockwall-Heath reached the finals in the men's 200-yard freestyle and 200 and 400 individual medleys. The Rockwall ISD's two girls' state champions also qualified for the Sectional finals: Rockwall's Raena Eldridge, 15, in the 50 free and 200 IM and RHHS' Claire Walters, 16, in the 100 free and 200 butterfly.

RACE's head coach, Neil Walker, was excited about the Sectionals performances.

He said, "These kids have come so far in the past year. Last year, we only had one swimmer compete at Sectionals. This year, we sent eight. The future looks very bright for RACE in the senior category. People are starting to notice our swimmers around the state."

The club's other qualifiers for the Sectionals were 17-year-old Tobias Kim, 16-year-olds Bentley Gilbert and Justin Tokuz and 15-year-olds William Rapp and Jeremiah Kim.

# Maheshwari wins 2 of local athletes' 15 gold medals

Rockwall County athletes picked up 15 gold medals when the USA Track & Field Southwestern Association Junior Olympics Championships came to Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium last week.

Fifty-seven athletes from the Rockwall Mustangs, Texas Titans and Club Vaultitude qualified 81 times for the Region 12 Junior Olympics Championships in Lubbock beginning July 3.

The first six in each event qualified for the regional championships. The three local clubs added 16 silver and 11 bronze medals for a total medal count of 42.

The Mustangs totaled nine gold, nine silver and four bronze medals.

Kajol Maheshwari followed up her undefeated career at Cain Middle School by taking gold in both the youth girls' 3,000-meter run in 11 minutes, 28.59 seconds and 1,500 meters (5:25.59). Other Mustangs gold medalists were Liah Collins, midget girls' 800 (2:31.83); Fiona Dunleavy, intermediate girls' 3,000 race walk (17:26.23); Tanner McCalister, midget boys' shot put (36 feet, 2 ¼ inches); Justin Willis, intermediate boys' long jump (19-0); Dillon Maheshwari, bantam boys' 1,500 (6:17.01); Thomas Dunleavy, 3,000 race walk, and the midget boys' 4X800 relay team (10:34.70).

Silver-medal winners for the Mustangs were Canyon Hall in the bantam boys' shot put and high jump; Grayson Gilkey, youth boys' 3,000; Nicole Wohnsiedler, midget girls' javelin; Dyrus Toliver, midget boys' 100; Calen Mayfield, midget boys' 800; Sean Williams, sub-bantam boys' long jump; the bantam girls' 4X400 relay, and the midget boys' 4X400 relay.

Taking home bronze medals were Desman Williams in the youth boys' shot put; Davis Baucum, midget boys' 800; Devon Maheshwari, midget boys' 3,000, and the midget boys' 4X100 relay.

The Titans picked up four gold, six silver and three bronze medals.

Its gold medalists were Steven Martinez in the intermediate boys' 1,500 meters in 4:34.22; Heather Semar, youth girls' 3,000-meter race walk (20:20.71); Sara Cuzick, young women's 3,000 race walk (21:50.92), and Christina Rowlands in the young women's 1,500.

Martinez added bronze medals in the 800 meters and 400-meter hurdles. Cuzick was second in the discus, and qualified sixth in the shot put.

Silver medalists for the Titans were Sean Semar in the midget boys' 3,000 and 1,500, also qualifying with fourth place in the 800; Alissa McClain in the young women's 800 and 1,500; Madison Ramirez in the intermediate girls' 3,000, and the young men's 4X800 relay team, in 9:06.15.

Vaultitude athletes were awarded two gold, one silver and four bronze medals.

Kaylee Hinton went 17 feet, 2 inches to win the intermediate girls' long jump gold, and Noah Sewell placed first in the youth boys' pole vault at 7-11 ½. Hinton also qualified fifth in the 400 hurdles in 1:13.72.

The team's silver medalist was Roger McCrary in the youth boys' pole vault at 7-11 ½. Bronze medals went to Jonny Lee in the youth boys' pole vault (13-6 ¼); Garrett Dennard, intermediate boys' pole vault (11-9); Gaines Kinsey, young men's 800 (2:01.63), and Kerry Anderson in the youth boys' high jump (5-11 ½).

## The Military View

A very good friend of mine whom I served with in the US Army recently sent me an email that he had received from one of his sons. He gave me permission to reprint parts of that email in this article.

"I remember the day I found out I was accepted into West Point. My mom actually showed up in the hallway of my high school and waited for me to get out of class. She was bawling her eyes out and apologizing that she had opened up my admission letter. She wasn't crying because it had been her dream for me to go there. She was crying because she knew how hard I'd worked to get in, how much I wanted to attend, and how much I wanted to be an Infantry officer. I was going to get that opportunity.

The same day two of my teachers took me aside and essentially told me the following: You're a smart guy. You don't have to join the military. You should go to college instead.

I could write an essay defending West Point and the military, as I did that day, explaining that West Point is an elite institution and that it is statistically much harder to enlist in the military than it is to get admitted to college and that serving the nation is a challenge that all able-bodied men should at least consider for a host of reasons. I won't write that essay, but what I will say is that when a 16 year-old kid is being told that attending West Point is going to be bad for his future, then there is a dangerous disconnect in America, and entirely too many Americans have no idea what kind of burdens our military is bearing."

In the four years of World War II, 11.2% of our nation served in the military. In the twelve years of the Vietnam War, 4.3% served. And since 2001, only 4.5% of our eligible population has served in the Global War on Terror.

Fewer and fewer of our people have shouldered more and more of the burden of war. Our troops were sent to war in Iraq by a Congress consisting of only 10% veterans. Only one person in the Congress had a child in the military. We fought that war without an increase in taxes to pay for the war; without War Bonds being sold; gas was not rationed; and those little coupons from WWII that allowed each family to buy such rationed items as coffee, sugar, butter, and cigarettes, did not exist for this war.

The average citizen was asked to sacrifice nothing, and with the exception of those people who had family serving in the military or had close family friends serving, most people really had no idea what was happening in Iraq and then Afghanistan. It did not impact them and it was a long way from their house to whatever was going over there in the Middle East.

But what about those people who were serving in the military? They continued to go, deployment after deployment, and fight on. Many lost relationships, spent years of their lives in extreme conditions, endured years apart from their kids that grew up without one parent, and then came home wounded and wondering why America did not understand what had been happening for the last 10 years.

When they talked to their fellow citizens back here at home, they didn't understand why their neighbors don't understand suffering, why sacrifice is not a common word, why people do not understand why the Soldiers were fighting, and most important, why the public simply doesn't understand that bad people exist and are trying to destroy the world as we know it today.

Making it even harder on our veterans, "they go back to college and sit in the classrooms with political science teachers that discount their opinions on Iraq and Afghanistan because of their bias because THEY WERE THERE and cannot understand the macro issues they, the teachers and Professors, gather from books."

Then add in the wounded veterans, ranging from PTSD, that most of the citizens don't understand, to missing arms and legs. Talk to the veteran who can't get a job because he is in the National Guard or Reserve and employers know he may be called to duty once again. Or to the veteran who has served his 4 or 5 years and then tries to go out and get a job and finds that civilian industry has little use for guys who really know how to "walk point" or hit a target with a sniper rifle from 1000 meters.

But do you know, the most amazing thing, almost every one of these veterans will tell you they are proud of what they have done and how they would do it all over again in a heartbeat. They believe in America, in their fellow Soldiers, and they believe they have done what some of the greatest men and women of this country have done since 1775...THEY SERVED.

If you get a chance, go out of your way to help a veteran and their family. They would appreciate your support and they certainly deserve everything we can do for them because they are protecting our freedom, our values, and our way of life!

Another friend of mine said to me, "Until one knows the abject fear of an enemy at the gates, there will continue to be little or no respect for our military; and by then it's too late." Let's make sure around here that it is NOT too late.
