## A Message From The Soldier Boys At Camp Bowie

Oliver Lowry Tells us, Crain  
Now Talks Some, Wynn a  
Bad Arm, And Turner  
The Tooth-ache

Camp Bowie,  
October 2, 1917.  
The Reporter and friends:

As I have nothing to do for a few hours thought I would write you a few words and tell you about our work.

We passed in Review this evening and I'll tell you it is some job. But then it is the prettiest sight you ever witnessed in the way of military work. It took us about two hours and a half to get through. Every man was supposed to be looking his best. And there was very few but what had on their uniforms and every man keeping step. There was just one brigade of us which was 5400.

We are drilling about 5 to 6 hours daily, now and I certainly like it. The army life is not so bad as one would think. You hear of them putting us through 8 hours daily. Well that means from 5 to 6 hours, while we rest the other time. We are going to have drills in Grinade throwing the rest of this week, one hour each evening and drill in the morning.

We are all getting along fine with the exception of Carl, and he has a pretty bad looking arm but it is not sore enough to keep him from drilling. And Sal Turner has the toothache and his jaw is swelled up like he had been making war on the bumble bee. Clarence Crain has got so he talks a right smart.

When we go to town we see every kind of a Bar, except "Soldiers' Bar" but every other business is open to the soldier when he even buys a button it's from 25c to 50c and these boys get rid of the money. We will get a pay day this week and there will sure enough be some jingling in Camp Bowie.

We got the Reporter yesterday and every fellow from home was wanting to see it at the same time, it seem almost like some

one from home.

Well as it is about time for taps to sound, had better wind this up. Dr. Herring, sing 'Adeline' and 'Uncle Sammy' for us.

## Odell Public School Will Open Monday

Newly Elected Principal Desires a Good Attendance  
Opening Day

The Odell Public School will open Monday, October 15, 1917, with four teachers in charge. Prof. W. T. Blakely, Principal, Miss Leta Davis and Mrs. Annie Birch, intermediate, Mrs. Irene Huie, primary.

Miss Beulah Callaway, of Vernon will begin her music classes at the Public School building Monday, October 15th. Those who contemplate taking lessons should see her at once.

All pupils should enter the first day. It is impossible for the best teacher in the world to help the pupil who stays away from school. For this reason anxiety for good attendance is well founded. He who does not come at all gets no good from the school. He who comes three days out of the five gets little. He does not get three-fifths of the work to which the ratio of attendance would seem to entitle him. Hence, the importance of attendance upon the opening day.

The great war is yet on, but many schools are reporting record breaking enrollments. The C. I. A. enrollment in the music department required the service of two more teachers in that department. The medical department of the Christian University reports glowing prospects for a greater enrollment this year than last. President R. L. Scarborough of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary reports in the Baptist Standard, an increase in enrollment over the same time last year, of twenty-five students, and Baylor University has the largest enrollment in its seventy-three years, of women, the number of men is less than last year.

The world is looking for strong leaders. Democracy is demanding a higher educated citizenship Society is asking for more skilled teachers. The youth of the land is responding, the boys by entering training camps, and the girls by entering school. Many boys and girls who have quit school are reentering.

It was thought that the war would hurt the schools, but from present indications, or reports, it is apparent that there was never a time before in the world's history when there were so many people taking instruction. It is not all children, but men and women. Night schools are being conducted to accommodate those who are not in position that they can attend the day sessions. In the evenings schools, the age limit is not restricted. The children attend the day sessions and the parents the night sessions.

The state superintendent of public instruction announces teacher's examination for second and first grade certificates Friday and Saturday, October 19, and 20 1917.

## Facts Concerning The Second Liberty War Loan

If You Care to Loan Your Money to Uncle Sam Both Banks Here Have Application Blanks

Since the first of October appeals from the Government have been going out to the remotest districts of the United States urging the people to lend their money to Uncle Sam by subscribing to the second Liberty Loan.

Uncle Sam wants this time \$3,000,000,000 to equip and maintain our army and navy. The security he offers is, the total credit of the Government and the people of the United States of America. For the use of your money he will pay you four per cent, payable May 15th, and on November 15th.

Up to this time there has been very little interest aroused over second Liberty Loan here. However, W. P. Starr, cashier of the Bank of Odell, says, several parties during the last few days have spoken to him about buying a Liberty Bond and he is of the opinion that Odell will yet do her bit.

Application blanks can be obtained at either of the banks in Odell and the bank officials of the two institutions will assist you in the detail work of loaning your money to the Government. You can loan as little as \$50, or as much as \$100,000.

**Must Buy Your Gasoline Before 9 O'clock on Sun.**

**County Officials Say no Other Course But to Enforce Sunday Laws**

To the public:  
For a number of years the people of this county, by common consent, have permitted certain violations of the Sunday Law, particularly the selling of cold drinks and cigars by drug stores and confectionaries throughout the day, and the selling of gasoline and bread after nine o'clock on Sunday. The present force of peace officers and the present County Attorney found these conditions already well established upon coming into office, and in the absence of any consider-

able public sentiment to support them, they have allowed these violations to go unchallenged, but recently a strong petition was presented to us, demanding the enforcement of the Sunday Laws. This was followed by a similar demand from the Pastors' Association of the City Vernon, through a committee appointed for that purpose, and the Grand Jury recently in session came out with a strong recommendation that these laws be enforced. From this it can be seen that the issue is drawn, and as sworn officials we have no option, as we see it, but to draw the line where the law makes it. The fact, however, that these violations have been permitted to go unnoticed so long makes it our duty, in fairness to those who might be affected by our determination to enforce the law, to publicly announce our position before we proceed with any prosecutions.

For the information of all concerned, we quote from Statutes upon which future prosecutions will be based. Article 302 of the penal Code provides that: "Any merchant, grocer or dealer in wares or merchandise or in any business, whatsoever, or the proprietor of any place of public amusement, or the agent or employee of such person, who shall sell, barter, or permit his place of business or place public amusement to be open for the purpose of traffic or public amusement on Sunday, shall be fined not less than \$20.00 and not more than \$50.00." Article 303 of the Penal Code reads as follows: "The preceding article shall not apply to makers or dealers in provisions as to the sale of provisions made by them before nine o'clock, nor to the sale of burial or shroud material, newspapers, ice, ice cream, milk or to the sending of telegraph or telephone messages at any hour of the day, nor to keepers of drug stores, hotels, boarding houses, restaurants, livery stables, ice dealers, nor to telegraph or telephone offices." Our construction of these articles is that the sale of cold drinks and cigars is not permitted at any time on Sunday, and that the sale of gasoline, bread, meats etc., is not permitted after nine o'clock on Sunday morning. The keeping open of garages and repair shops for repairs on Sunday is also prohibited by law.

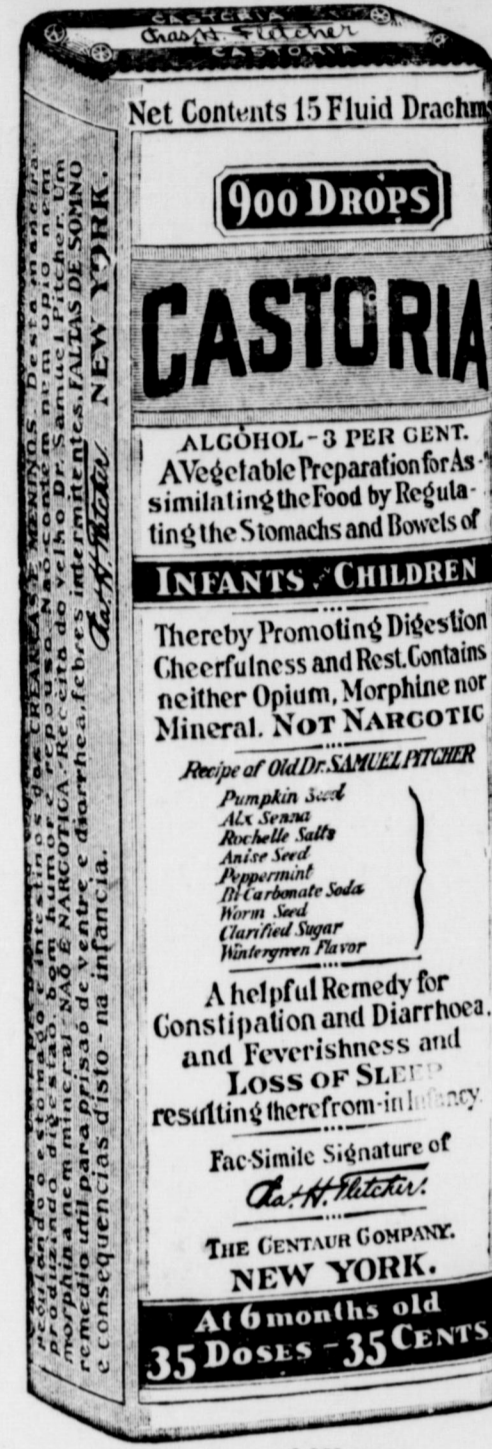

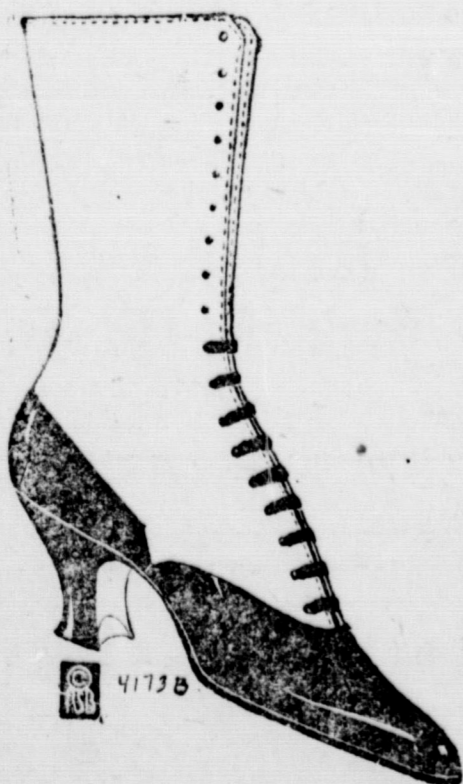
