Mother Earth Here Gets 2 Inches of Rain

Low Places in Ground Now All Hold Water-Best Rain In Months

Odell business men and farmers in certain sections of this country are smiling today. The smile that wreathes their countenances being due to the thought that the long drought the country has been suffering with so long, was broken here yesterday evening, when between an inch and half or two inches of rain fell.

The rain began falling a short while before 4 o'clock and was accompanied by considerable wind and some hail. For an hour or more here in Odell, seemingly a solid sheet of water came from the clouds. And when ceased, low places in the ground that had not received a good soaking for months, were all turning loose water.

Just over what area of country this rain extended, the Reporter has been unable to definitely learn, but according to some reports did not reach very far south of here. But wherever the ground has been moistened by this last precipitation you may look for a busy time with the farmers. Many of them will begin putting seed corn in the ground. Others preparing land for cotton and such other spring crops as are adapted to this country.

To Teach Local Boys Some Lessons of a Soldier

S. B. Sutton And C. E. Foster Our Ex-War Boys, Will Drill Home Guards

While other towns over the country are organizing their home guards and are drilling them in some of the maneuvers of warfare and home protection, Odell is preparing to make a move in that direction by starting up a Company composed of several of the local boys.

The drilling of this Company will be in charge of C. E. Foster and S. B. Sutton, who are both familiar with work of the kind, from reason of the fact they were soldiers in the regular army during the Spanish-American war. These gentlemen will drill the boys in such lessons as foot movements, the bearing of arms and other work required in a regular school for soldiers.

While several of the boys have signed up for the drill work, yet the company is still open for all boys over 16 years of age who care to become acquainted with some of the lessons required of a soldier.

Since it is generally understood that such home guards do not obligate themselves in no way to the call of Uncle Sam; the Reporter has been requested to state that all boys in this community over the age stated, with men too, who care to take the drill work of a soldier are invited to enlist.

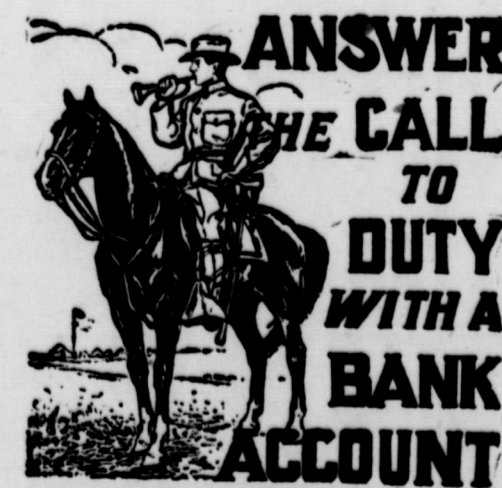

Already applications are being made to the local school board for positions in our school next year. Stand by the trustees in who ever they select to teach the school, as you have selected them and the Reporter is sure you could not have picked better men in the district.

Regardless of the fact that this county has not yet received the moisture it ought to have to start off a spring crop, many farmers over this section of the country; we understand, have a good stand of corn growing, which is holding up fine under the conditions. Judge Quentin D. Corley of Dallas County, who is known as the "armless Judge" has offered his service to the country in this way. He says he will go to Europe and assist in directing the maimed soldiers of the allied countries in the use of patent arm and leg appliances. He is of the opinion that he can be of great value to the fighting boys in Europe, who have been deprived of an arm or leg, in explaining to them the patent mechanism.

According to the Brownfield Herald, a newspaper published in Terry County, M. A. Smith, a

former merchant in Odell, has been elected as one of the school trustees at Brownfield. M. A. was for a long time one of the members of the school board here and his friends in this section will join the Reporter in recommending him to those western people, as a progressive school man, ready and willing at all times to do the right thing for movement that has a tendency for educational uplift.

Here is an example of a knock at the drygoods men of their city and also one at the high cost of living. The young men of Eldorado, Oklahoma, have lately decided that one of the pieces of their week day costumes, which they shall wear this summer, will be a pair of stripped overalls. The originators of the movement donned their duckings and marched over town, demanding that their associates get into a pair of these cheap trousers and wear them, except on Sunday or when they go out of town. The penalty for the fellow, they say, who declines to dress as they do, will be a dip in the public water trough in their city. Drummers who visit their town may also be ordered to wear overalls while there.

According to late information received here this week from Vernon, the agitators for the million dollar bond issue, to build roads with in the County, after rightly studying the matter over, finally decided to post-pone the election indefinitely. Thanks to these gentlemen for their good judgement. For this question, as to whether or not this County was in position to take care of so large a debt as one million dol-

lars, was taking the right course to be one of the most warmly discussed ones that had ever come up in Wilbarger County. It probably would have created an unfriendly feeling between towns and caused a general disturbance among the good people of Wilbarger in other ways. So rest easy, whether you was a fellow for the bond issue or not, because there will be no election on the 19th, of May as you were notified.

Colored People Loyal

Greenville Herald: While their action was wholly unnecessary to convince most of us of their loyalty, it is nevertheless with considerable pride that we learn of the loyalty meeting of the colored people of Greenville, held Monday afternoon on the courthouse lawn. At this meeting resolutions strongly commendatory of the course of President Wilson and pledging the support of the colored people of Greenville to any measure that may be undertaken by the Government in the war that is waging were adopted. The colored citizens of Greenville may be counted on as among our loyal citizens.

No one who knows the negroes expects, or ever expected, anything but loyalty to their country. It is to the enduring credit of the colored race in America that in the times that tried the soul of the South as it never was tried before the negroes were not only loyal to the Southern flag, but faithful to the highest obligations when the men of the Southland were away at the war. —State Press, in Dallas News.

Late Planting For Safety

The advantages of a two or three money crop as against one are many. With long seasons and varying climatic conditions the Southwest is adapted to many kinds of crops and suitable for raising almost all kinds animals needed in progressive farm management. Under such conditions several crops are safer than one, several kinds of livestock where the manager is prepared to raise them, are better than only one, and a combination of crops and animals is better than either with out the other.

Now since we have made a good beginning in developing markets for crops other than cotton we can afford to include some of the best suited crops in our rotations to supplement cotton as a money crop.

Each farm manager must be his own judge as to how much he should plant in such crops as peanuts, Sudan, milo, Kafir sorghum, peas, soy beans, sweet potatoes and June corn. But there are very few farms where some of these crops would not be suitable, thus reducing the danger of dependance on cotton.

Let us not forget that the market for cotton next fall is unknown. While prices are high we cannot tell what might cause disastrous markets next fall, Let us take no chances, but plant for food and feed as well as for money crops.

In doing this "we shall reap in due season if we faint not".

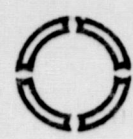

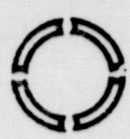

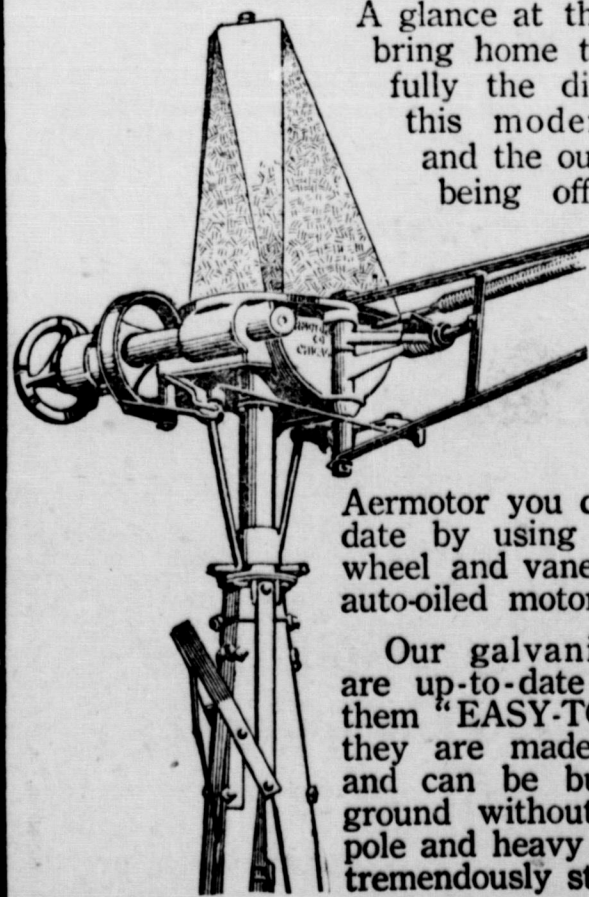
