Vernon Wins Honor

Abilene, Nov. 9.—The Northwest Texas Methodist Episcopal conference buckled down to business this morning. There was quite a lively and spirited debate when the order of the day was taken up and candidates were put in nomination for entertainment of the next session of the conference. Rev. A. L. Moore nominated Vernon and Rev. A. M. Martin nominated Sweetwater. Vernon, however, won by a good majority and it finally was made unanimous. The statistical tables shows that there are 124 local ministers in the conference, 143 traveling ministers with a total membership of 34,487, and 604 infants have been baptized during the year. There are 64 Epworth Leagues with 4,165 members, and there are 263 Sunday schools with a total membership of 30,000.

Brick Building Started

The Dr. A. C. Daniel brick building that is to be erected along side of the structure that Williams Bros., now occupies, was started this week, the contract being let to G. F. Mabry, who superintended the building of the Williams Bros. brick here two years ago, which is also owned by Dr. Daniel. gratitude for the liberal manner in which they have patronized the Reporter in the way of advertising, not that we feel they have not received full compensation from their advertisements, for it has been a business proposition with them to keep their name and business before the people, for it is conclusive evidence to the people that the house that advertises most liberally is usually in position to offer the best bargains for their trade; therefore it has become a business proposition with both the people of the country and those who live in town, to read the advertisements in the newspaper to learn just what the merchants have behind their doors, and then they can find what they want to buy without hunting all over town for it.

About one of the greatest drawbacks and hindrances to this country just now, is the Orient road's failure to furnish necessary cars for transportation, the corn buyers at this place have quit buying for this reason, the result being that there is very little corn hauled in here to be marketed now, some of it going to other places to be sold which should by rights come to Odell, this shortage of cars which is somewhat of a general complaint, has put the local corn buyers and people of this country at their rows end, towards doing anything at gathering and selling corn; while so far most of the farmers of this immediate country have been kept busy gathering their cotton crop, and there has been but very few days but what they could devote their time to this work, but as usually the case here in the fall of the year there are lots of days cold weather will not permit one to pick cotton, which could be used in gathering and marketing corn; but under the existing circumstances ascribed to the Orient's failure to supply cars for shipment, the marketing of corn which always heretofore been an advantage to Odell, does not look to be a very dependable trade; and the car famine which has been such a nuisance to the country this year, is one among the matters we hope to soon see regulated.

Texas Turkey Population

The coming of Thanksgiving Day brings to the mind of the thinker the question of the probable cost of a good fat bird for the day's feast. This question, while of the greatest import can be easily answered, for the production of all kinds of fowls has been decreasing during the past ten years while the value of same has been steadily increasing during the same period.

In 1900, Texas had a total of 14,861,382 head of fowls, valued at \$4,806,642. Turkeys in which we are most interested at the present time show a population of 648,671 head valued at approximately \$590,000, or an average of 91 cents each.

In 1910 our gobble population was 363,666 head valued at \$440,526, or an average of \$1.21 each.

During the past decade the number of turkeys on Texas farms decreased 285,005 head or 8 per cent, while the value increased 33.6 per cent.

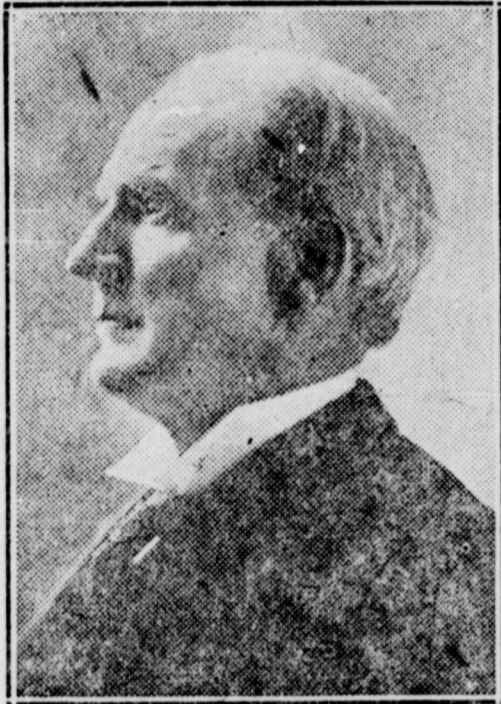
Collin county was the largest poultry producing county in 1910, showing a total of 263,233 head valued at \$111,593.

Poultry is raised on 357,363 farms in Texas, which is 85.5 per cent of the total farms in operation in this state. Chickens are the leading specie of fowl raised by the Texas farmer; the Federal Department of Agriculture showing a total of 356,875 farms reporting, while turkeys come next in general favor, being raised on 76,429 farms.

Col. Pryor's Report Shows Decrease In Cattle

San Antonio, Texas, November.—The Report of Col. Ike T. Pryor of the Texas Welfare Commission on the Raising and Marketing of Livestock which has just been made public shows an alarming decrease in the production of cattle per annum in Texas. Coming just at this time when the price of meat is soaring higher and higher, the re-

port is interesting and is being studied carefully by stockmen throughout the State. During the past decade, our supply of cattle in Texas has decreased 2,047,499 head while our population has increased 847,832. In Continental United States our population has increased 15,977,691, while our cattle have decreased 2,332,000. "The situation becomes all the more alarming when we consider that Texas supplied the decrease in number of cattle for the entire United States," says the report, "and we contributed heavily towards the loss in sheep and scarcely broke even on hogs. The figures show that the livestock industry, which has been our leading occupation, is rapidly waning in Texas."

The report urges the farmer to raise more livestock, to improve the grade to the highest possible standard; recommends the building of silos and the feeding and finishing of our livestock for market and also sounds a note of warning against the wholesale marketing of calves.

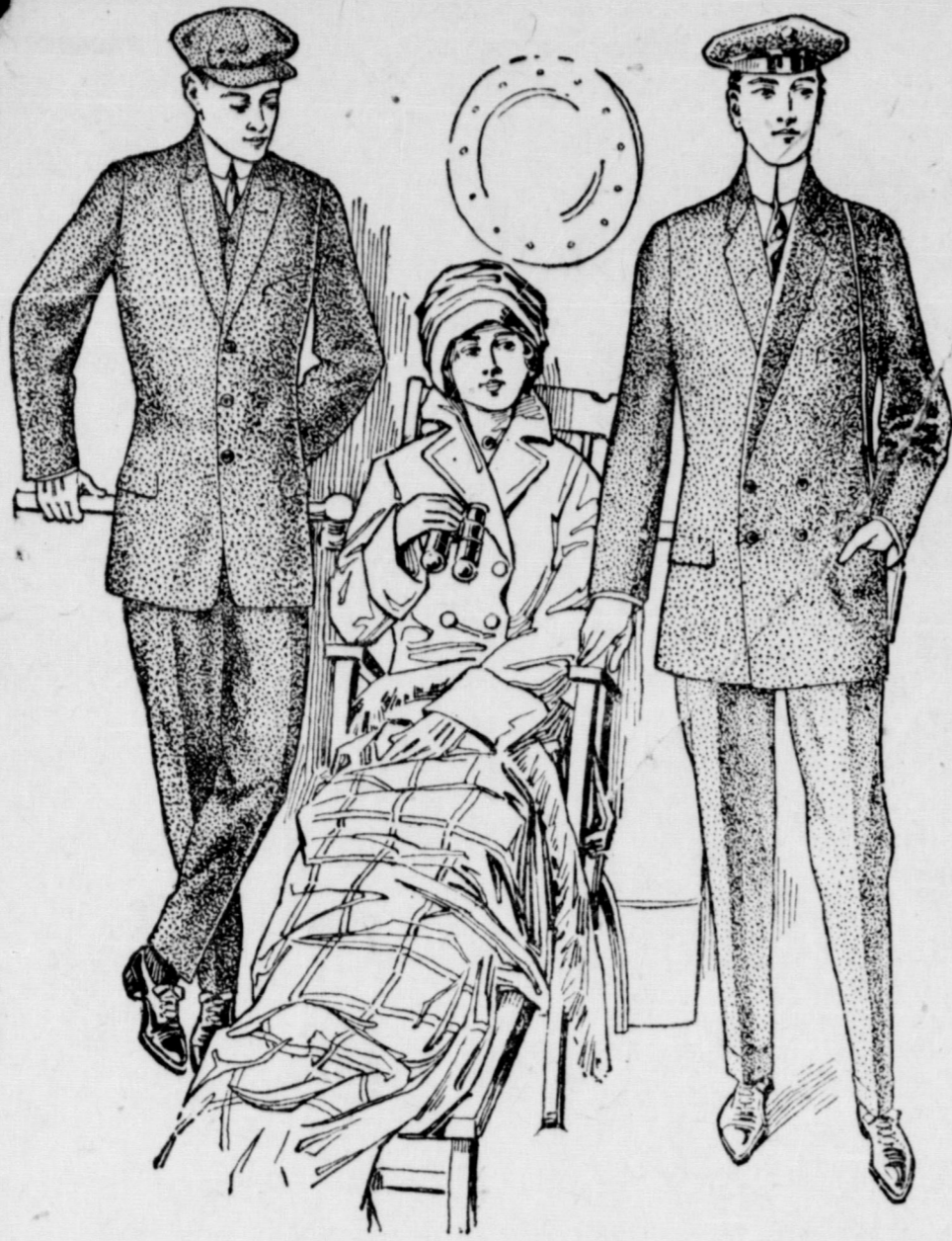

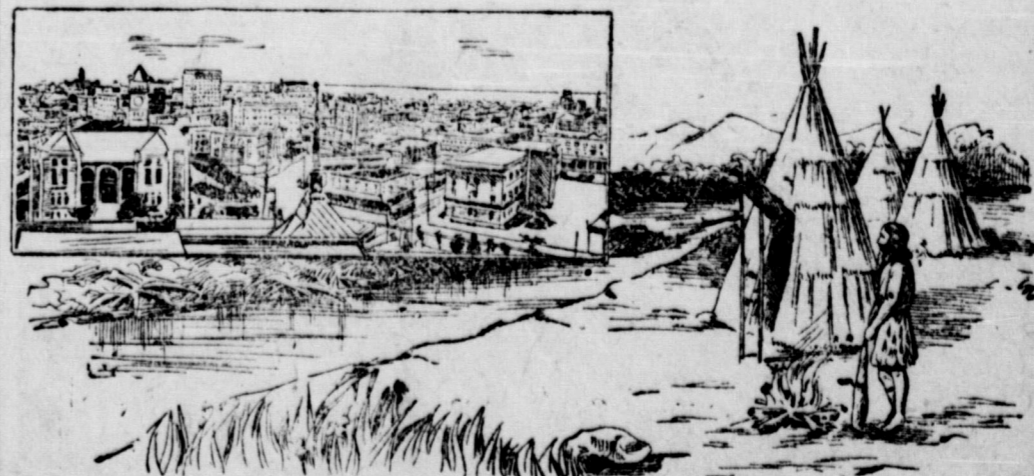
Work was started today towards remodeling the postoffice building, more room will be made in the office for the accomodation of the public and a number of lock boxes will be installed.
