Price of a Hog Now; His Value in 1895

W. T. Collins and son, J. M. Collins, are stock farmers. Having been citizens of Wilbarger county for several years, they are classed among its pioneers.

Mr. Collins and sons, like many other Wilbargerites, who pitched their tents in the lower panhandle in its early days, picked six cent cotton, raised three cent hogs and sold wheat for thirty and forty cents a bushel.

But those cheap days are gone, for a time at least. As wise men who look into the future predict it will be many moons before the time shall come again when a farmer will be compelled to sell what he raises at a low commercial value.

The Writer one day this week, happened to be in the Bank of Odell, one of the town's strong banking institutions, and with which the elder Mr. Collins is connected as president, and was shown where he and his son had been given credit for a check amounting to \$2978.45 for 84 head of hogs they had lately sold.

A comparison of that check with one the writer's father, J. R. Ross, received in 1895, as profit from the sale of a bunch of hogs, induced us to write this article. Which article will show in a way, how the price of swine have jumped in a lapse of twenty two years. And lastly, leave the reader to conclude that supply and demand always is the principal agency in controlling the price of food stuff and that the high price the porker is bringing on the market today is not altogether due to the work of a party, which claims to produce a government, by the people and for the people. Grover Cleveland was the democratic president of the United States in 1895 and hogs sold for three cents a pound. Woodrow Wilson is now Democratic President and good hogs are worth on the market today 17 cents.

In the winter of 1895, J. R. Ross and the late J. C. Sumner, formed a partnership and went out over the country and bought up a herd of 79 head of hogs, paying on an average of three cents a pound for them. The swine were turned loose for open range on what was commonly known then as the A bar ranch and the writer and a younger brother, who were then mere barefooted boys, were appointed herdsmen.

Outside of what Mr. Parker rustled, he was fed on grain that was bought, until early fall, when the hogs were placed in a pen and fed on corn that was raised on the ranch. Forty acres of corn was gathered and fed to this herd of swine, which was made ready for shipment about the middle of October. The hogs were driven to Vernon, loaded on a Denver freight train and shipped to Fort Worth and sold for three cents a pound. And when all expenses had been paid, not figuring the corn that was

fed nor the herdsmen's upkeep, or other trouble in fattening the hogs, when the money was divided, the herdsmen's father received a check for forty-five dollars.

See the difference between what a hog is worth today and what he was worth in 1895.

It is a significant fact, that a majority of the different business concerns in this old world realize the value of advertising, but not all of them want to be out any money for publicity. If the managers of country newspapers were to find space in their publications for all the free advertising they receive through the mail, most all their time would be devoted every week in taking care of that kind of matter, and their papers would contain but little of anything else. It seems these space grafters over the land, havn't yet reached a point to be willing to give editors of the country newspapers as a whole, credit with enough sense to detect the difference between newsmatter and what ought to be paid advertising. And in this connection, we must admit, that some of our fellow scribes, does exercise very little judgment in that respect. And it is an evident fact, that just so long as these business concerns, which work all manner of schemes to secure advertising without having to be out any cold cash, realize, that with a stamp, an envelope and a letter head they can land from two to five dollars worth of advertising in some newspapers, just that long, will the country press be hampered. For our part, it always gives us a certain degree of pleasure to tear up and pitch in the waste basket, so many of these letters which reads, "will you please publish in your paper the enclosed item as a matter of news"

Not until Garbriel toots his horn and sounds a warning for his people to come together from the four quarters of the globe to be judged, will the inhabitants of God's foot stool quit complaining. But then, we are not altogether to blame for complainful natures. Our first ancestors complained. When father Adam and mother Eve were placed in the Garden of Eden, seemingly with everything at their disposal the human heart could desire. Eve complained to Adam about the stringent law of God and plucked the forbidden fruit. And soon down until this day we are still complaining. We complain about the high price of what we have to buy. 
