The truth of this is, that those here, who have been guilty of this non loyal disposition towards the interests of the town, knows their policy of dealing away from home would not do for every body to follow, and they are usually to be found among the first persons to con demn the practice.

#### For a Saloonless Texas

The commissioner of Internal Revunue reports that during the first seven months of the cur rent fiscal year 8,500,000,000 cigarettes had been consumed. 5,250,000,000, more than in the same period last year, 12,000,000 lbs. of chewing tobacco in excess of last year. In the seven months 48, 864,000 barrels of beer were consumed, an increase of I,8000 000 barrels.

This seems peculiar in the face of the prohibition agaitaion.

Not with standing the increase in "dry" territory, there is a constant increase in the consumption, not only of beer, but of whiskey and other intoxicants as well. Isn't it about time for honest sincere people who really want to see the whiskey traffic stopped, and the editor wants it done, to wake up?
