Further that he would have no partner in the practice of law, as he believes that as a matter of public policy, it is not best for the County Attorney to have partnership with one who engages in the defense of criminal cases.

The subject of this sketch is yet a young man, was raised in Wilbarger county, and is to be congratulated upon the success he has met with as a dispenser of law. His ambition is to go higher in his profession and on the promises as stated above is asking the suffrage of the people. Those who are yet strangers to Mr. Tant will no doubt have the pleasure of meeting him before the campaign ends and like many others be impressed with his appearance as a man who would make a special effort to redeem his pledges.

**R. V. Parr, Tax Collector Asks For Second Term**

Again I want to thank the good people of Wilbarger County for the vote I received two years ago. In that campaign I told the people that if elected and made good I would ask for the same office the second term and at the end of the second term, if elected that I would not ask for the third term.

Have I made good? Have I done what I said I would do? My record is before you and you will again have a chance to express your views. As your Tax Collector I have done my best to fulfill every promise and redeem every pledge that I made to the people two years ago in the execution of the law pertaining to this office.

Outside of the Assessors rolls approximately Fifteen Thousand dollars of delinquent taxes, interest, penalty, and costs have been collected during my term of office. Of course I do not claim all of the credit for this, but I have had my part to do in this matter and I trust it has been

done well. I am sure where this kind of tax has been cleaned up the abstract to said property is in a much better condition than it was before said tax was paid, and besides this money justly belonged to the State and County and should have been paid in. The County also has had my service free of charge in preparing the delinquent Record for publication.

According to promise in my campaign two years ago all of the banks in the County outside of Vernon have been visited that the people might have a chance to pay their taxes and avoid making a forced trip to Vernon. This I believe has been greatly appreciated by many.

It is, and shall be my desire to visit and personally meet and talk with each voter in the County, and so far as it is in my power to do so I will before the July Primary, but the duties of the office are sacred to me, sacred to me because of a public trust and my pledge to care for it. Should I fail to see some voter personally I hope he will not hold that against me. From a business point of view you expect me to see after your interest here and I shall do it. If it is well done I have faith in your judgment as to how well it is done, and because of said well done service that you will vote for my return the second time. So I will see after my duties in the office, do all I can to see every voter, and trust my fate to you one time more.

From a personal and human point of view I am like you, just a man and prone to make mistakes. If in your estimation I have made a mistake and not done the right thing you ought to come to me in a kindly way and tell me so. I always consider him my friend who tells me in a kindly way of every error and at the same time leads me to see the right way according to the laws that we should be governed by. The law having been enacted by our representative is of the people, and this office that I again seek belongs to the people, and he who fills it is a servant of the people, and I believe should treat all alike according to the law and do his best to maintain the dignity of the office and in a business way secure the best results possible for the State and County.

Believing that I have done my duty and that my service will meet with the approval of the voters of this County, I there-

fore offer myself as I said I would for the second term at the end of which I will not seek the same office for the third time.

As the result of a petition that was circulated over the county, an election has been set for the 24th. of this month for voters to decide whether or not they want to issue bonds to the amount of \$50,000 to build a county hospital to be located at Vernon. There were two different petitions circulated among the people regarding the proposed hospital. The first was to call an election to vote bonds to the amount of \$15,000, to erect the building. While the other and last one that followed it up, calls for \$50,000 worth of interest bearing paper. Personally, so far we have heard very little said about the election set for the 24th. But those we have heard express their opinion regarding the the necessity of a county hospital, all say, that it is not a proper investment, the county doesn't need it, and that they are going to vote against the issuance of bonds to build it. Their idea regarding the proposition is just exactly in accordance with the Reporter's. The county is already in debt, and why vote more bonds that would mean a heavier tax rate for the people just for the sake of caring for those of us who need a little medical attention once and awhile? It is not a thousand miles to Fort Worth or Dallas, and when we are sick and so near death's door that we need the aid of a trained nurse, a special physician or surgeon, the most of us want to go where we can get the very best of attention, regardless of what the cost might be.
