Brock and Gerald Heinzlemann of Snyder were together and the car in which they were riding was said ment on the Jacksboro highway, crashed in a telephone pole and turned over twice.

Brock came to Putnam about 19-18 and established a supply house and began operating in the Putnam shallow oil field. Later on he and his associates established supply houses at Cross Plain,s Brownwood, Moran and Albany and sold oil well drilling machines, pipe and general oil field supplies over a wide section. They both wholesale and re-

Brock's home was at 1849 South Seventh street, Abilene. He and a brother, John Brock, operated the Brock drilling company. Most of their development for the past two years has been in Sharan Ridge pool in Scurry County.

The Putnam Supply company owned by the Brocks was closed out here about 1930 when Mr. Brock and family moved to Abilene where was born in Mississippi 59 years ago going to Odessa, where he martheir marriage.
