, Dr. J. L. Cline of the weather bureau studied his charts and remarked that not a single reporting station in Texas had offered anything like a record high temterature this summer. It has been hot enough in spots, with temperatures around 100 and considerably higher, but Texas has had no exhausting heat wave to date.

"It is much too early to say we won't have,' said Dr. Cline, "but the fact remains the summer thus ton had lived longest continuously for has not been unbearably hot in in the county. Tom Smartt of Texas."

He attributes this to air conditioning from many scattered thundershowers and from cool breezes from the Gulf of Mexico.
