SCIENTISTS HASTEN TIRE PRODUCTION



One of the chief bottlenecks in tire making has been eliminated by scientists of the General Tire & Rubber company, through the development of a new synthetic rubber. 

sion in postwar social security benefits, and by advocating reduction of lower brackets on federal income taxes to enable him to save conserve and invest. In the reconversion program, priority will be sought for farmers and ranchers in sale of federal housing surpluses. Another reconversion plank urges maintenance of the West Texas army camps in postwar hospitalization and defense plans because of the area's unexcelled climate and facilities for training purposes.


The ballot also proposes new steps in the WTCC's long fight for freight rate parity. It presents a comprehensive legislative program for tight fiscal control in state, county and city budgetary practice; for legislative redistricting; for school apportionments paid on an attendance rather than a census basis; and for promotion of a \$2 million two-year campaign, state financed and directed, for nationally advertising Texas resources and business opportunities. The editorial board of West Texas Today, WTCC's magazine, will have regional leadership if this plank carries.

Another plank authorizes a campaign before Congress calling for a maximum \$20 billion postwar federal budget, with abolition of excess profits and capital stock taxes, deduction of corporate dividends in detrmining net income for taxation, and with income tax and surtax rates not exceeding 15% in the lowest bracket and 60% in the highest. On Wednesday, November 8, the WTCC's final assembly of officers, committees and directors will be held in the headquarters building at Abilene, for final action on and canvassing of ballots and for election of the new officers.


