MACHINE INVENTED TO SPEED UP HARVEST OF P'NUT CROP

Recently filed in the U.S. Patent Office, was application for a patent pertaining to a machine invented by Peter B. Searcey of Austin, Texas, designed to facilitate the harvesting of peanuts.
