

#### THE 60 FAMILIES AGAIN

In an editorial in last week's issue of the News in discussing the subject of sixty families controlling the United States we stated that instead of sixty families the number of stockholders would run into millions, and the Reporter-News furnished the information that was not available at the time of writing the editorial in the afternoon edition of Friday, January 14, with the following comment: "Seeking to refute the claim that sixty families rule this country because they hold the most of the wealth, the New York Times says that in 1932 there were 26,-000,000 stockholders in corporations. Allowing for duplications, the Times estimates that between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000 (million) persons, not sixty families, actually own the country. Mere bigness in business is not a crime. He further stated that this loss was equivalent to 5,600,000 (million) head of cattle weighing 600 pounds per head.

There are several reasons for the cause of the decline in meat consumption, but the primary cause is the rise in price of the meat until the people who eat the most of it are unable to purchase it on account of the high price. The department at Washington charges it to the drouth but the primary cause was the destruction of some six million cattle in 1934, and paying the farmer not to raise wheat, corn and other food stuff which created a scarcity in the number of cattle and raised the price of meats out of all proportion to the earning capacity of the consuming public.
