Wheat Harvesting About Over; Grain Yield 10-20 Bushels

It is still dry and the grain harvesting is just about over, only a few small crops yet to be harvested. The grain has turned out considerably better than most people thought it would. Especially, the wheat crop which has threshed out from 10 to 20 bushels and as fine grain as could be grown here, testing 60 pounds and better. The oat crop was poor, many fields did not make enough oats to pay the expense of harvesting. Oat acreage was small as there was no big acreage seeded and quite a lot of that was killed by the freezes.


The cotton and feed crops are good. Cotton is still growing and doing fine, with perfect stands and most of it cleaned out and in good condition and will continue to grow for some time yet without rain. The feed crop is needing rain now and the yield will be light unless it





SILAGE MAKING SEASON IS ON HAND, YOU CAN'T HAVE TOO MUCH ON HAND

Silage making time is here. To make good quality silage, such feeds as grain sorghum and sweet sorghum should at least be in the stiff dough stage. It is better to have the grain getting hard provided the majority of the leaves are still green.

The feed should be packed into the silo so as to exclude excess air. If it is chopped with a cutter, the pieces should be in half inch derlengths or less and distributed in




