The United States Supreme court held the windfall tax law persed by the last congress as being constitutional, and the government would not have to return the tax collected under AAA to the processors. This was about \$1,000,000,000 collected by the processors before the law was held unconstitutional. We do not know that it was any better by letting the government keep the tax, and it was collected off the consumer illegally and should have been returned to the people that it belonged to. The law passed would not permit the processors to bring suit unless they could show that they paid this tax themselves, which they could not do because it was passed on to the consumer.




