## GOD

One of my favorite teachers, H. Richard Niebuhr, (died four years ago), wrote the following words:

It is a curious and inescapable fact about our lives, of which I think we all become aware at some time or other, that we cannot live without a cause. Without some object of devotion, some center of worth, something on which we rely for meaning.

Our problem is that we choose objects of devotion which are not worthy of devotion and which will not sustain us in time of trouble. For instance, many of us choose sex as that which gives meaning to our lives. On every hand, in magazines, TV, movies and radio we are urged to make this choice. This is the central object of devotion in the James Bond movies.

The best example of how sex as an object of devotion fails is to be seen in Hollywood. Here is the capital of perfectly formed physical, sexual, specimens of manhood and womanhood. Yet, where is there more divorce? Where more child beatings? Where more desertion? Where more unhappiness and sorrow? In Hollywood!

That sex is pleasurable, God-given, and a part of humanity, none can deny. But that it is to be the object of our devotion, the guideline for our living, the Christian faith does deny. Sex is too small a god. The God revealed in Jesus called Christ is greater than sex.

Another object of modern man's devotion is intellect. We think that whatever our intellect, our reason, is able to cast up should be our god. What a man can't prove by logic just isn't.

I would hate to find myself having to agree that God is what some men cast up from their intelligence. Or, even closer to home, I would hate to think that God is what I sometimes cast up from my intelligence.

The object of our devotion must go beyond self, sex and intellect, if we are to discover God. The object of our devotion must stem from what we find revealed in one called Christ. In Him lives that power which is greater than anything the self can cast up. In Him lives that which is able to sustain us throughout all areas of our living.

We sell out mighty short in life when we settle for an object of devotion that depends upon our physical pleasure or our ability to put one and two together. We are sustained throughout all this life when we go the risk of trusting that God is revealed in a mere carpenter from Nazareth called Jesus. If He is our object of devotion, we are sustained.

This is an alarming number, and since our community cannot provide facilities, we need to help those who can.

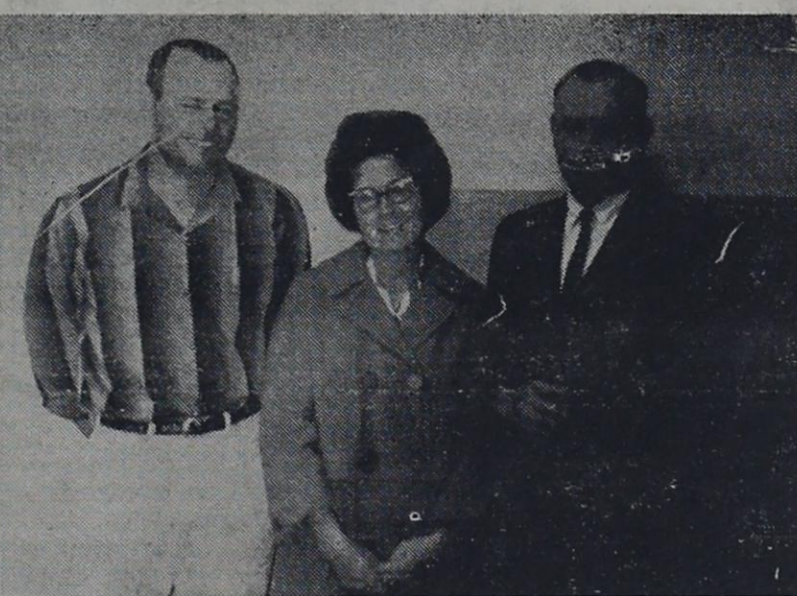
One of the fund raising projects of the Lubbock Association of Retarded Children is selling candy. Their boxes of candy, priced at on-

## A LETTER FROM DELBERT HALL

(A while back Class 8-A of Ropes Junior High wrote a letter to our boys serving in Viet Nam. Following is an answer from S-Sgt. Delbert Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hall. We enjoyed the letter, and our thanks to the Class for passing it on so that everyone might read it.)

8 February, 1966

Hello Class, I started my schooling at Ropes in the eighth grade, later to complete my school years in Ropes High School.

We sure appreciate the fine letters that have come in from all over the United States.

Looking at the names of the class it looks so much like I am back in school again. Names like Hobbs, Redman, Roberson, Jordan, Smith, Martin, Wright, Etheridge, all this is just like old home week.

We as American fighting men like to hear news like this from home, that our job that has to be done is not a lost cause. This task is not something that can be done over night. We must tighten up our belts, so to speak, prepare to stay here for a long period of time. You are dealing with a people here who know nothing more than living day by day. You can't explain this, only seeing is believing in a case like this.

I am located in an area that is as flat as West Texas is, but there is high mountains on all sides with an inlet to the ocean.

Saigon is just a large over crowded city with all kinds of people there. Vung Tau is a nice clean little city located on the coast, a nice

place for a holiday. Phan Thiet is a rocky area with rolling hills and mountains in the background. Phan Rang is a dirty little town where the people are busy taking their goods to the market places. Cam Ranh Bay is one of the largest sea ports in this area. Nha Trang is a rest center and supply center for many of us in this area.

I have sat down and eaten the noon meal with many of the people over here. They enjoy this when you try their ways of life. Rice is the basic food and then they put other things with it that I couldn't start to name.

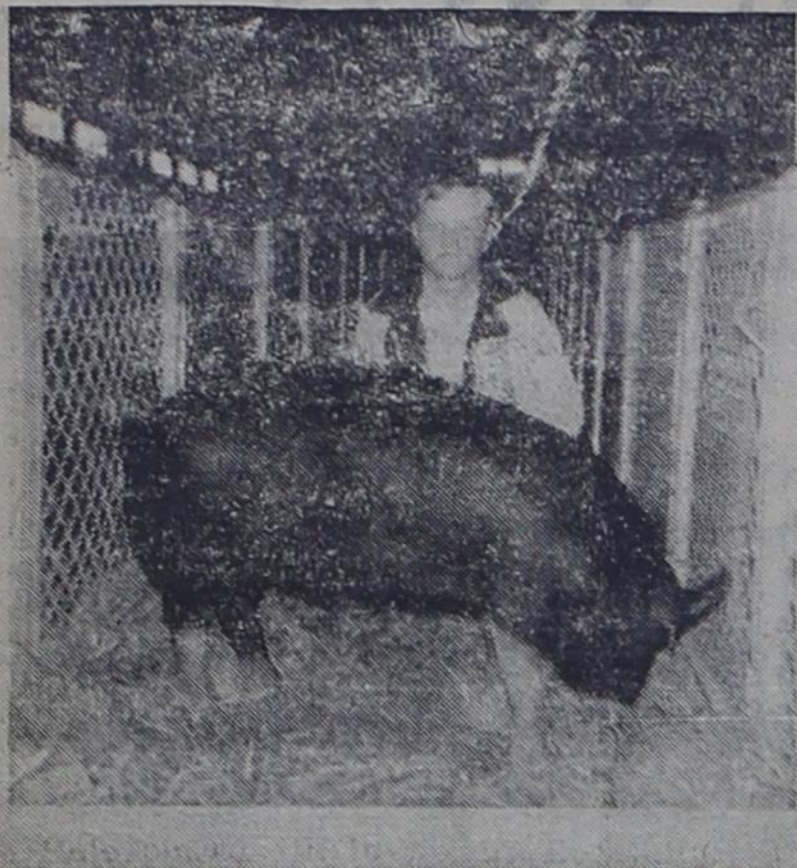
Children are all alike no matter if you are in Japan, Germany, Korea or Vietnam. They only know and learn from what they see and hear. It is not a class room that makes a class outstanding, but the children in that class room which take what their teachers are offering to them and make proper application. These people want only to live and let live. To be understood. To stand on their own two feet and fight for what is rightfully theirs. Don't look for greener fields somewhere else when they can be right in front of you. The most simple things of life are the hardest ones to understand.

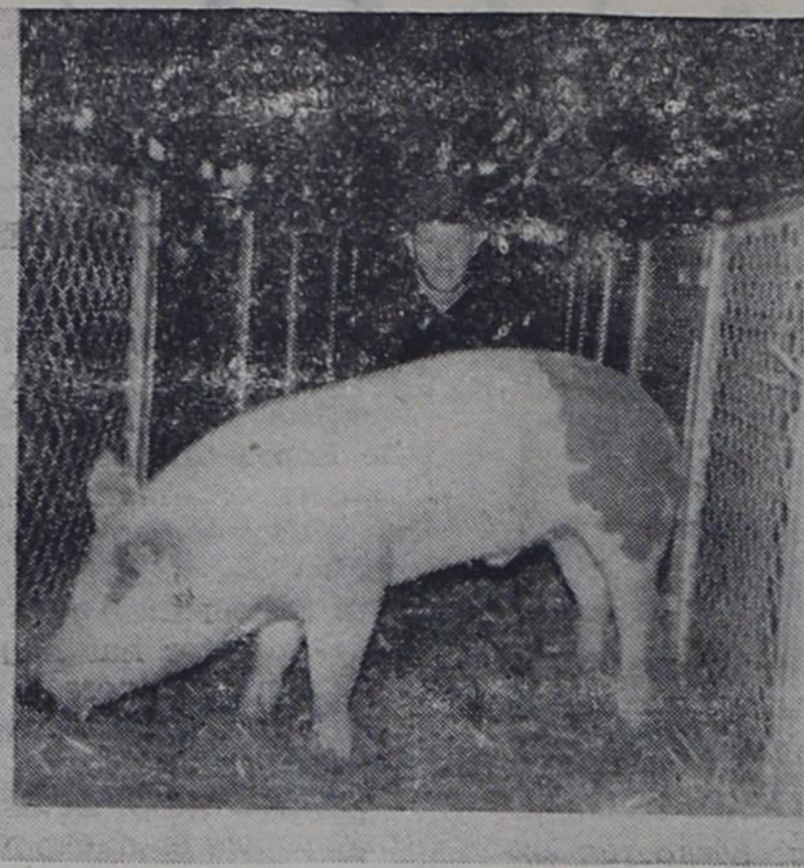

Mrs. J. D. Nichols is ill this week suffering from blood poisoning in her finger, where she was gored by a rooster. She is receiving medical care in Lubbock.

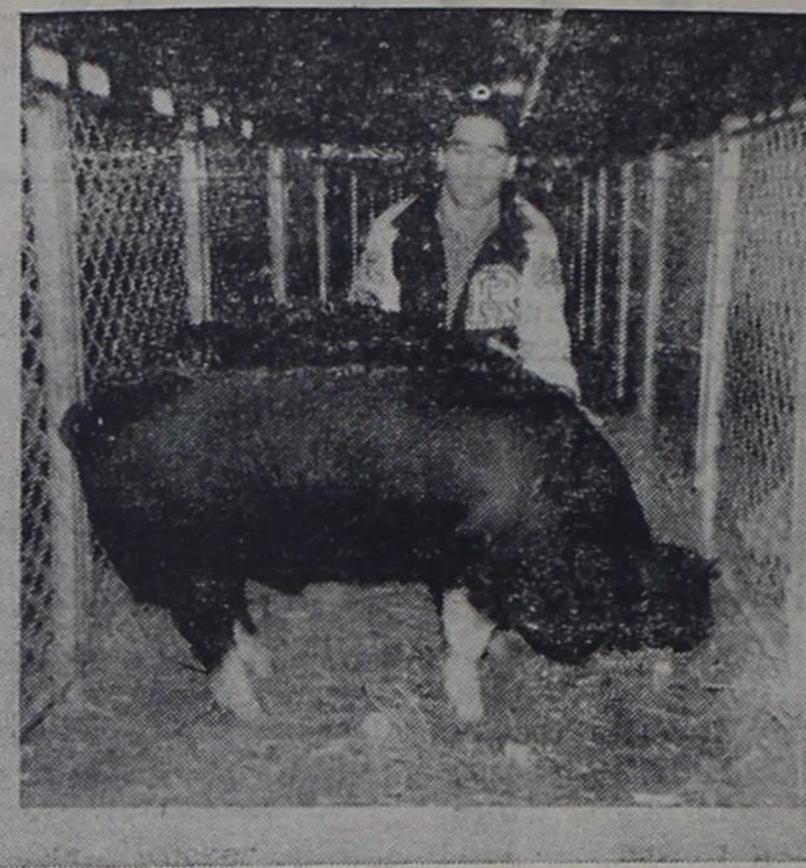
