"Here in Washington, the grass roots thinking from rural America is being drowned in a babble of voices. Farm organizations disagree as to what the farmer is saying as well as the kind of program-or absence of program-he wants. The Congress is sharply divided on legislation, and has been for many years. Newspapers and magazines claim they know what the farmer is thinking and what is good for him, but you can get almost as many different opinions as there are magazines and newspapers.

"As a result, we are hearing more today from those who SAY they know what the farmer wants than we are from the farmer himself. Since I have been in public life, I have learned the best way to find the most practical program is to go to the people directly. Personally, I look forward to these meetings with great pleasure and expectation.
