The Seminar will be an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage, the proper role of government and the threat of communism. Several lectures will concern first hand accounts of people who have been under communistic rule.

YES, THERE WILL BE HOLIDAYS AT THANKSGIVING TIME

In an article appearing recently in the Plainsman, for some reason we failed to state that school will be dismissed for two days for the Thanksgiving Holidays.

At a meeting of the Ropes Independent School District board of trustees, the budget was set for the school year of 1963-64.

The budget for the year is \$753,138.00. Four hundred and thirty-six thousand was set aside for the new Junior High building, while the actual operating expenses will be \$280,794.00. This is an increase over last year when the expenses for operating the school was \$253,000. This increase is brought about by the fact that two new teachers have been added and, also, there is an increase in salaries for the teachers of \$108.00 per year, a law passed by the Legislature two years ago.

The work on the elementary building has been completed, with two rooms added which will give ten rooms for elementary grades. The two new rooms will have new furniture.

The contract for the new Junior High building will be let in September and it is hoped it will be completed for use during the 1964-65 school year.

The band hall has been moved from the campus to a spot back of the bus shed, to make room for work on the new building. It is thought that the band hall, when the new building is completed will be moved to the football field there.

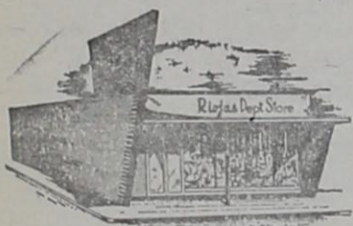

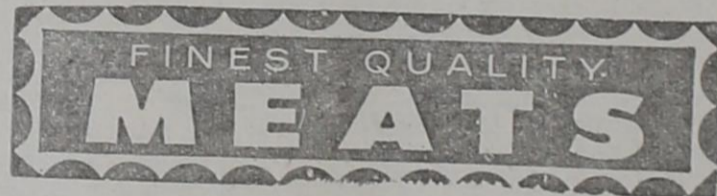

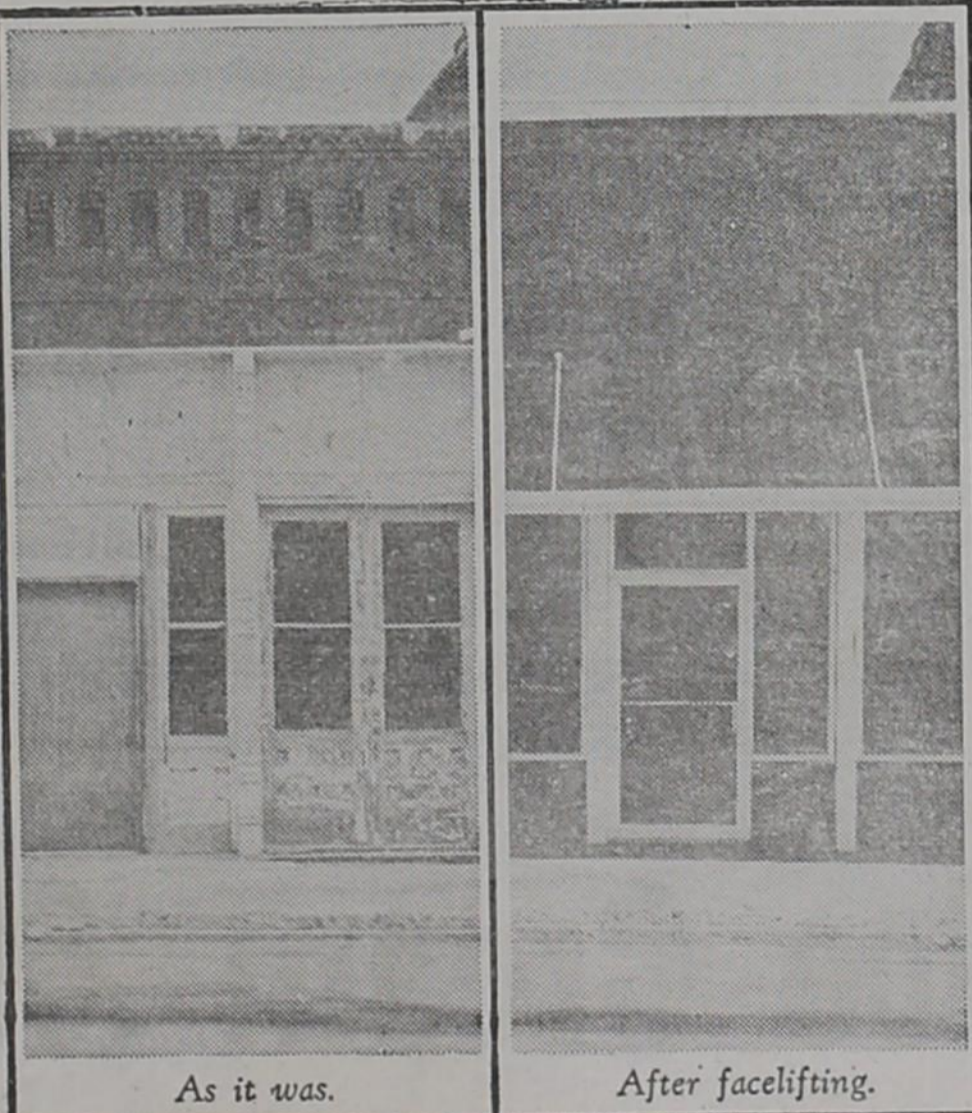
