Commissioners to Fight To Finish Over R-B Fund

County Judge Louis Owens, of Levelland, was in Ropes on Saturday of last week looking after business and meeting the many folks on the street. Judge Owens says the commissioners' squabble over the division of road and bridge funds is getting things in a mess, and there is likely to be a law suit which will tie up the funds for eight or nine months.

Owens believes the action taken by Myrl Brock, Jack Morton and Jim Hobgood is illegal, and sides with Smokey Jane in the contention that the other three commissioners allegedly framed Smokey to take funds away from him.

The three commissioners, on the other hand, state their action is legal, according to a ruling made by the Attorney General, and the fact it is practiced by two adjoining counties, Lamb and Yoakum. What they are asking is that the funds be divided according to the miles in each precinct, which would take away from Smokey Jane some \$17,000.00.

Smokey also contends that it takes more money to keep the roads in repair in his precinct, as it is used by trucks hauling heavy oil field equipment—and he has more pavement than the other precincts to maintain.

So far, no settlement has been reached, and in a meeting this past week Judge Owens and Smokey walked out of a meeting of the court which, according to what we have been told, makes any action illegal which the court might make, the statute in effect, we were told: "That for the court to act the county judge must be present".

However, steps taken by the court have been contemplated for several years. Former Commissioner Tom Price told the Plainsman some time ago that such action was considered by the court when he was commissioner, but other pressing matters kept them from taking it up. In his

opinion the action is legal.

Since we haven't read the opinion of the Attorney General, nor seen the other statutes, which it said states, "Tax money taken from a precinct for road and bridge purposes must be returned to that precinct", we are hardly an authority on the matter. Our one aim is to give both sides of the case and to state that if the action is legal we are for it—if it is not, any action taken should be guided by law.

Naturally, we can understand Smokey Jane's position—he doesn't want to lose the money and, on the other hand, we can understand the other commissioners' viewpoint, "if they are entitled to the money they should have it."

We have been promised a copy of the statute saying the money goes back to the precinct from which it came, and we are trying to get a copy of the Attorney General's decision.

At a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night an ordinance was passed which says in effect, "Any person in the City of Ropesville owning a dog must keep said dog on his or her property, which means that said dog must either be on a leash or penned. If said animal is found off said property he will be caught and destroyed."

The ordinance means what it says—no dogs running loose. If they do run loose they will be caught and destroyed. This Ordinance goes into effect Monday morning, August 12, 1963.

AMENDMENT TO BUILDING CODE

Amendment to the City of Ropesville Building Ordinance which reads a building must be 24x34 feet, has been amended to read: a building must be 816 square feet.

The attention of prospective builders is called to Section 2 of said Building Ordinance, which reads as follows:

SECTION 2: That such person, firm or corporation make application for such permit, in writing. Said application to include proposed building

location, kind, specifications and cost. Also, purpose for which building is to be used; said permit to be issued, upon approval of the City Council and that no building or alterations shall be made before the permit is granted. Violation shall be subject to same fine as set forth in Section 4, of this same ordinance.

The ordinance means what it says—no building is to be started until the permit has been passed by the City Council.

On the 29th of August a complete text of the Building Ordinance will appear in the Plainsman.

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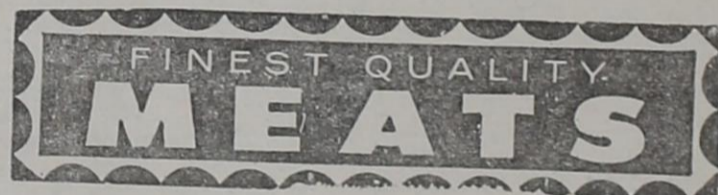
