SENATOR PRESTON SMITH The ever-present "pressure groups" of almost every legislature are not missing from the 55th.

In fact, recent years have by these groups in their attempts to encourage action on bills favorable to their own purposes.

One of the current pressure groups working on the House and Senate is the representation of the municipal policemen and fire men. This group has presented a strong front by entering the legislative halls in goodly numbers, persistently plugging for the flood of wage, longevity and hour bills introduced in both the House and Senate.

Opposing these efforts on the part of the policemen and firemen is the League of Texas Municipalities. The municipalities claim that favorable response by the legislature, to the pressure group on wage and hour bills would place the lawmakers in the position of dictating to home rule cities, at the expense of municipal workers other than those who would benefit under the bills.

Harold R. Downs, president of the League of Texas Municipalities, has charged that legislative sponsors of the firemen and policemen bills "are setting themselves up as super-duper city councilmen at a five million dollar annual expense to the taxpayers of 71 cities."

He listed the probable cost of the major bills to 51 cities as follows:

SR 50, by Senator Doyle Willis, Fort Worth — \$3 per month for each year of ser-

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

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


