Mrs. Nichols Celebrates Seventy-fifth Birthday

Mrs. J. D. Nichols, in celebrating her 75th birthday on Sunday, Jan. 6, recalled many interesting events, the most sorrowful being when her parents were killed by a neighbor, and later her husband was killed by a bullet fired at their son.

Mrs. Nichols was born on Jan. 6, 1888, the daughter of Sarah and Alex Harp in Scotville, Ky., where the family farmer, later moving to Tennessee near Shelbyville.

"We raised most everything we needed," said Mrs.

and I won a blue ribbon. Dr. Sharp, our family doctor, rode by my side.

Soon after this Mrs. Nichols married Dennis Baxter, and they were very happy on a farm. In 1908 they came to Texas, settling at Charley, and stayed two years. Then they moved back to Good Springs, Tenn., and in 1912 they moved to Alabama.

Mrs. Nichols continued, "We moved back to Good Springs 8 years later where we farmed until my husband was killed by Horace Rose.

"It was an accident. My oldest son was having an argument with Rose and my husband went over to see if he could settle the trouble. He got our son to go back in the house and was walking by his side when the shot was fired. It was intended for our boy, but it killed my husband."

Mrs. Nichols told of a devastating tornado cloud in Tennessee:

We were living between Minor Hill and Claska, Tenn., at Bethel Springs. Two clouds came together almost over our house, one from the south and one from the north. For a moment they boiled and rolled, then a tail shot earthward. It passed our place without striking the ground, but a little way from us it killed five families and destroyed many homes. The Bethel Church was destroyed, but the pulpit remained standing and on it was the Bible, opened at the Gospel of John, 2nd chapter.

"When I was small I remember Jesse James eating dinner at our house, and visiting with my father. With him were Frank James and Cole Younger. Years later, when we lived at Charley, Texas, we went to Lawton, Okla., and saw Frank James, Cole Younger and little Jesse. Frank and Cole were old men then.

"After my husband was killed and the children were married I came to Lubbock in 1942 where I married J. D. Nichols. Except for one year when we lived in Tennessee, we have lived in this section, the past twelve years in the Ropes community."

(But trouble was still dogging Mrs. Nichols' footsteps.)

"One day we went to Levelland to have my teeth pulled and on the way home we had a car wreck at Smyer. I was taken to a hospital at Levelland where I remained for 31 days. I have had to use crutches most of the time since."

Mrs. Nichols has raised her family, two boys from a sister's family, and four of her grandchildren. Three of her grandchildren are still with her and Mr. Nichols.

A son, Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Baxter and two boys of Andrews, helped her celebrate her birthday Sunday, bringing a beautiful cake and a gift. Other presents were received by Mrs. Nichols.

260,000 BALES CLASSED LAST WEEK

The Lubbock Cotton Classing Office had another big week with 260,000 samples classed for the week ending January 4. The Light Spotted grades and 15/16" staple accounted for well over a majority of the cotton classed. This report came from Hollis H. Bowling, Market Supervisor for the Lubbock Office.

For the year 1,478,000 samples have been classed in the Lubbock office. This compares with 1,354,000 samples classed on the same date last year. There was a carry-over of 70,000 samples reported.

The Lamesa office classed 18,700 samples for the week. This office has classed 167,500 thus far. Last year at the same time 285,000 samples had been classed. The territory served by the Lamesa office had short production this season due to a shortage of moisture during the spring and summer.

Last week the Brownfield office classed 14,000. A total of 240,000 samples have been classed in that office for the year. Last year the Brownfield office classed 242,676 samples for the season. This office was closed prior to the first of January 1962.

Strict Low Middling Light Spotted continued to account for the largest volume with 35 percent. Middling Light Spotted was 17 percent and Low Middling Light Spotted was 9 percent. Strict Low Middling accounted for the majority of the white grades with 18 percent. Other white grades were: Low Middling Plus 2 percent and Low Middling 8 percent. Of the cotton classed 7 percent was Spotted and 2 percent was Tinged in grade.

Nichols. About all we bought was coffee and sugar. We raised our own corn for meal, and wheat for bread which was ground at a nearby mill. We always had hogs, milk cows, chickens and sheep.

"The sheep furnished us mutton, as well as wool for our clothes, blankets, etc. Many were the times I spun yarn from the wool on our spinning wheel.

"Farming was not easy, as crab grass grew plentiful and the ground rocky and hilly. We had walking plows and cultivators, which was very hard work. Many times I carried in loads of wood and then cooked meals, then more wood to carry, and I washed dishes by candle light.

"My father and mother were killed in 1892. Lee Williams owned adjoining farms, my parents lived on one and a man named Lee Mooney on the other. Nearby was a spring from which both families carried water. On the fateful day my mother went to get water as usual, only to find the fence around it secured with strong nails. My father told her to climb over it, but it was too high.

"My father tried to tear the wires loose, but failing to succeed he started to climb over it. Just as he threw his leg over the top, Mooney stepped out in sight and shot him. The gun was loaded with slugs, and one missed him and hit my mother who was standing behind him. My father passed away that night, and mother a few days later.

"Mooney got away. My oldest brother tried to find him, but was unsuccessful."

Soon after this the Harp children were adopted out to different families, and it was 43 years later before they again met. A war veteran and wife, W. H. and Mary Jones, an elderly couple, took Mrs. Nichols, and were very good to her.

"A very happy time," continued Mrs. Nichols, "was when, a short time before my marriage, I was allowed to ride a beautiful black horse at the State Fair in a parade at Shelbyville, Tenn. The horse was from Dallas, Texas

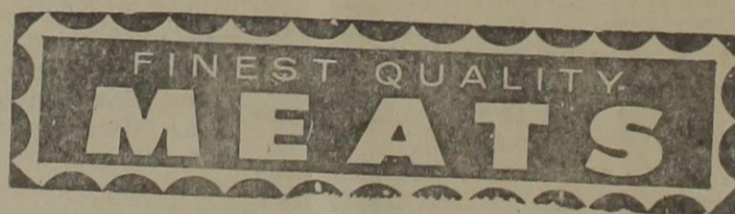
