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J. E. CRAFT SHOT BY BANDITS AT LUBBOCK FRIDAY MORNING

J. Edgar Craft, 21, was shot and killed by two masked bandits in the Santa Fe passenger station at Lubbock Friday morning, Feb. 25. One hour later he died in the Lubbock Sanitarium.

Craft was shot, according to two eye witnesses, Deputy Sheriff Murphy of Lorenzo and Express Agent Pinkerton, when he failed to tell the bandits the combination of the safe.

It is reported by the two eye witnesses that the bandits appeared one at the ticket window and one at the trainmen's window with drawn guns and ordered them to get their hands up. Then they demanded of Craft, by name, according to the confused report of both witnesses, that he open her up. Craft replied that "I can't open it any more than you for you don't know the combination."

It is variously reported then that they either said "damn you we'll kill you, or let's kill the——," and immediately shot him to death through the chest and shoulders.

They ran as he fell, making their getaway on foot south across the fields toward the industrial district. The two witnesses were across the office from Craft. The deputy sheriff is changing some of his clothes and laid his gun on the table across the room. They were both covered before anyone had time to get possession of the gun.

Craft Pleads for Aid.

When the bandits ran, Murphy and Pinkerton started after them, but Craft, apparently realizing he was fatally wounded, threw his arms around the deputy sheriff's legs and begged the officer to get him aid. The officer, who was an old family friend, tried the young man to the telephone. The last act of Craft while lying on his back on the table where he worked when on duty and was fatally wounded, with his companions using his face and phoning for an ambulance, was to call Dispatcher Jones of this city and report that "robbers have shot me." Mr. Jones states that he did not understand him at first and Craft repeated words, which was all that he could do in his weakened condition. The dispatcher here immediately notified Sheriff W. B. Jones of the Santa Fe, and called Sheriff Holcomb at Lubbock, who responded, he within twelve minutes. Mr. Jones also notified all the local officers here, and City Marshal Nix, J. S. Hart and Night Policeman Brown went out on the main highways and scoured the country until daylight. Thirty minutes after the report of the hold-up reached Slaton, a passenger train carrying officers, emergency generators, officials, etc., arrived in Slaton. The full force of the railroad co-operated with the Lubbock police to run down the early clues, a reward of \$500 was posted, several suspects were taken into custody before 9 o'clock Friday morning.

See Bond, 22, Ed Connally, 24, and

Hulitt Connally, 22, were the three suspects arrested. Following the shooting, it is said that Ed Connally went home, where he was taken into custody two hours later. Bond and Hulitt Connally, it is said, went to the Connally home near town and a little after 6 o'clock, hearing that Ed Connally had been arrested caught a passing automobile to town. It was while they were on their way to Lubbock that they were arrested.

The officers started to take the men to Plainview, but such a demonstration arose throughout Lubbock that they changed their tactics entirely, detoured the town, eluded the cars that had followed chase and placed the men in jail.

Due to the high tension of feeling among the citizens throughout the day Friday, the officers continued to make every pretense of scouring the country and at various times left the apprehended men sitting in plain view in the sheriff's office, saying that they had six men under arrest but were not satisfied until they had found one or two more. It was through this ruse that possible violence was avoided, it is said.

The prisoners were spirited away from Lubbock to avoid a possible lynching. Special Officer Hubbert of Amarillo, Special Agent Jones of Slaton, through co-operation of Sheriff Holcomb of Lubbock, slipped the prisoners out of Lubbock about 7:15 Friday night, taking them to Amarillo in an automobile.

Confessions Made.

It is stated that Jesse Bond made a confession to officers before the prisoners were taken to Amarillo.

Confronted by his pal, Jesse Bond, with the admission that he had told the truth and told all, Ed Connally confessed to officers in the Amarillo jail Saturday afternoon, to complicity in the killing of Edgar Craft in the Santa Fe station at Lubbock Friday morning.

Following confession by Connally and Bond, Hulitt Connally, brother of Ed Connally, walked nonchalantly from the county jail to the sheriff's office and dictated a confession, acknowledging that it was he who fired the fatal shot.

Bond had confessed to his part in the killing and attempted robbery. That the young bandits had talked and planned the robbery nearly a month before was admitted by all three.

That Ed Connally owed a debt of \$286, and that the loot of the robbery was to pay his debt was brought out in the confessions, as it was also developed that Ed Connally was the master mind who had planned and directed but did not take part in the hold-up and shooting.

The story of the attempted robbery and killing, from its inception, as related by Hulitt Connally, confessed slayer of Craft, is:

The Life of George Washington.

George Washington was born in Westmoreland County, Virginia, Feb. 22, 1732. He was the oldest son in the family.

When George's father died, his father's large estate was bequeathed to him. There were few schools then and the children had to depend on the poor common schools of the neighborhood. At the age of thirteen he wrote for his own use, 110 maxims of good behavior. He was athletic in form, an expert rider, and fond of the woods. He received his complete education at the age of sixteen.

In 1748 Washington received a commission as public surveyor. In 1751 the frontiers were threatened by the French and Indians. The colony was divided into military districts. An Adjutant General was appointed for each. George Washington was appointed one of them.

When George's brother Laurence died he left George the estate of Mt. Vernon. In 1753 George Washington was sent as a commissioner to gain information concerning the French who had sent an expedition to the headwaters of the Ohio, and to warn them against trespassing upon territory claimed by Virginia. In 1755 he accepted a position as aide on General Braddock's staff. Braddock's defeat was largely due to neglect of Washington's wise counsel. On Jan. 6, 1759, Washington married Mrs. Martha Custis, a young widow with two children.

When the disputes between the colonies and England began he offered to clothe and feed a thousand men at his own expense, for the relief of Boston. Washington was Commander-in-Chief of the army. The war lasted about seven years, and the colonies were victorious.

The colonies chose George Washington as their first president. He took the oath of office at New York, on April 30, 1779. He served two terms and refused to serve again. After his second term was over he went back to Mount Vernon, where he was devoted to the raising of agriculture. While riding one evening he was exposed to snow and rain, because of which he died on Dec. 14, 1799.

The Life of Washington.

George Washington was born at Bridges Creek, Virginia. George had two brothers, John and Lawrence. The family lived as most Virginia families, in easy circumstances. Their main pastimes were hunting, fishing, and a little reading. Washington lived a long while at a place called Mount Vernon and moved from there to his estate on the Rappahannock. His education was very defective except in mathematics, and he was largely self-taught in this subject.

When he grew to be a man he took a great part in wars and was a very good friend of General Braddock, for when he was a child he played soldier with his playmates. He later became a great man in the history of our country and is often referred to as the "Father of Our Nation." From

childhood he was noted for his voracity. When but a small boy he was called before a boy's highest tribunal (which is his father) and taken very severely to task for chopping one of his father's cherry trees. When Father Washington asked George if he cut the tree he replied, "Yes father, I did it with my little hatchet." This not only proved George's truthfulness but his bravery and fearlessness. Why do I say bravery and fearlessness? Because it takes this for a boy of tender years to stand before an enraged father whose favorite cherry tree had been cut down by some miscreant.

Under southern skies, at the southern resorts, is the place to see the new summer clothes worn, and wherever we go there, in search of fashion's inspiration, writes an authority on styles, we are greeted by organdies and volles, taffetas and summer silks—anything that is light in weight and transparent in texture. From the look of the new, thin frocks one imagines that the old-fashioned style books have been combed and everything of a mediocre type discarded without further notice, for we are confronted with only

the best, the most exquisite, the simplest and the most picturesque of designs. One sight of the clothes in a shop here and a wild desire seizes one to take the first train for the South in search of an opportunity to wear some of these lovely things.

It is necessary for us here to wear furs and woolen wrappings, but many are the fortunate ones who are migrating to a gentle clime, and they are busily buying outfits directly the opposite of the heavier coverings. How refreshing it is to enter a shop and see displayed all those fresh and dainty garments while imagination supplies the necessary surrounding. There comes a picture of the southern sea with its bench dotted by colorful clothes all made according to the latest dictates of a fashion decree.

Dimities and organdies and printed muslins are the thin things for dressy occasions that have received the greatest amount of attention. And they are not only for the time being. They are setting a pace for our own summertime later on; any innovation now advanced is one that carries weight, for it may be the thing that will rule the fashions of our coming summertime. They cannot be ignored, these southern fashions. Even if one is not among those who are to wear the newest things at once, still they hold their interest as an indication for dresses to come. Many are they, too, who take advantage of the chance to be beforehand and have their summer things made up at this time of the year. Now there is the most varied choice of new cottons and silks. Later they will be picked over in the

stores and not nearly so great a variety will be available. Now one can attend to fittings and designings without being prostrated by the heated blasts of late spring and summer days. One's mind works more freely and is more subject to the inspiration supplied by the fresh new things being displayed around every corner.

Materials Are Numerous.

The materials allowed for smart summer frocks are as numerous as the days of the summertime. There is no hard and fast rule about what shall be worn and what shall be taboo. Indeed, if ever there was a chance for latitude it is right here and now, and the individual may choose her clothes according to her own likings and desires with never a fear that they will be running far ahead.

Organdie is perhaps the favorite of all the thinner materials only because it is so very becoming to almost every type of womanhood and girlhood, and childhood, for that matter. A few years ago it started to rise in popular favor, and its growth in popularity has been a steadily increasing thing. The colors are what make it so extremely attractive, for they have reached the maximum of perfection. The shades are as scintillating as so much pure color, and the fact that the thinness of the fabric helps to catch and reflect the light is something that is charming in itself. Nothing can set up competition with it. It is safe and sound and unassailable, right there on its own platform.

Some of the organdie frocks are made quite elaborately, while others are most simple and unpretentious in construction and workmanship. One of the more intricate models is made of a sort of maize colored organdie, trimmed with inserts of the same color and material made in fine pin tuckings. These shapes are oval, are inserted at intervals on the full skirt and are outlined in bands of lace insertion shaped to conform with the outlines of the oval motifs. The lace is cream colored and adds the only note of relief from the predominance of the maize color. Another organdie model has a skirt with narrower ruffles extending all the way and in close succession from the hem to the waist. A panel just in front is made of the organdie unadorned by ruffles, and there is a finely tucked vest, with a sort of an apology for an eton jacket. There is a velvet ribbon girdle of dark sage green, while the organdie in the gown is of that light and shining green.

The Dotted Swisses.

Then there are the dotted swisses—sisters to the organdie family. They have dots of color and dots of the same shade as the foundation material, dots that are large and dots that are small, dots that are separated by many inches from each other and dots that are close together. Each new arrangement of the little dots gives a whole new appearance and character to the fabric, and each new handling by a designer gives a new touch that makes the frock stand out as something quite exquisite and fresh among all the others. On the new summer frocks there are overskirts a-plenty, and there is one of jade dotted organdie made in a sort of princess line with side panels that are full and make an effect like an overskirt. The only trimming on this gown is an edging of maize organdie laid on in a two-inch double fold and outlining the edges of the overskirt, the neckline and the bell-shaped sleeves. It is an attractive color combination and a new idea in the use of a combination of dotted swiss and plain organdie.

For the Summer Wardrobes

A dimity frock is an indispensable part of any of the present summer wardrobes, for this fabric has been perfected in a most remarkable manner both as to dye and weave. It has a distinct character of its own. One of these in a bright pink cross-bar is made with a full skirt that has tiny flutings of the frock's material running up either side from the hem to the waistline. It has a wide and rounded sash edged by the same sort of flutings, and the bodice is made quite snugly fit with the same little plaitings reaching about the edges of the neck and sleeves.

There are the sports clothes of which particular notice must be taken, because they do constitute so large a part of our dressing as a whole. They are the foundation of any outdoor outfit, and so great a variety is offered for their choice that it is almost necessary to know just which things are best and which are only nearly best. The sports suit of heavy or light homespun is always good, and this season more particularly than

ever because so many smart women have adopted it as a part of their outfit, whether for the city or the country.

One of the latest ideas in an informal outdoors suit has a skirt made of a French material that is a red pique weave with a plaid of black stripes making its pattern. It is a most effective piece of material and hangs into the folds of the skirt with the utmost ease and adaptability. Then the loosely fitting very dark blue serge jacket is a proper complement to the vividness of the skirt. This combination promises to be one of the popular ones for spring, for it is one of the most exclusive that has been chosen for exploitation at southern resorts.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN.
(Copyrighted by W. T. Foster.)

Washington, D. C., Mar. 3.—During early part of the week centering on March 20 a general warm wave, of wide dimensions, will cover all the northern Rockies, Pacific slope, and Plains sections. It will affect the whole continent as it moves south-eastward, will pass east of meridian 90 by March 20, then move northeastward to Newfoundland by March 22 or 23. The warm wave is always considered the first indications of the storm and, in weatherology, is called the first feature, the first third, of the storm. It requires great force to heat up that miserable, cold Alaskan country and build up a warm wave there, the purpose of which seems to be to thaw out our southern, warmer but frozen country. These statements read like paradoxes, but they are true. Storm wave will follow and cool wave follow it. These are the second and third distinct features, and it requires all of them to make what, in crop weather language, I call the storm. It will be a severe storm and cause much bad weather along the storm paths that have been usual for the past four months, and with about the average precipitation and location of those months.

The change in precipitation will not come till near middle of April. It is safe for you to expect not much change in crop weather for next six weeks. But March will be an unusually stormy month; much like the last week in January and the weeks centering on February 7 and 18. More bad, stormy weather is expected in March than in any other month of the winter in those sections where the bad storms of the past four months have been striking. I do not mean bad crop weather, but disagreeable weather for man and the lower animals. I expect the general average of crop weather for March to be good. Most severe storms and most precipitation of the month are expected during the week centering on March 9. Better put your affairs in good condition for that week of bad weather. If you are contemplating outdoors affairs, sea or ocean voyages, and wish to avoid bad weather I advise you not to take up such matters during the weeks centering on March 9, April 22, May 10, and June 1.

Many people have occasional access to the government weather maps. By looking at these maps you can readily

see the force of the storms. Black lines usually circle around two spots, one marked "High," and the other "Low." Count the black lines between these spots. They usually run from two to three to 20; the greater numbers indicating the most severe storms. It is important to know when to expect these severe storms. If there were no severe storms there would be no good crop weather. I am having excellent success in forecasting severe storms. Scientists claim it is impossible to forecast, long in advance, the up and down movements of temperatures for any specified point. I say it can be accomplished. It is the most difficult problem ever undertaken. Scientists are unanimous in saying that, if this could be accomplished, all weather events could be foretold so as to be of practical use. I am prepared to demonstrate that this can be accomplished and will prove it in a reasonable time.

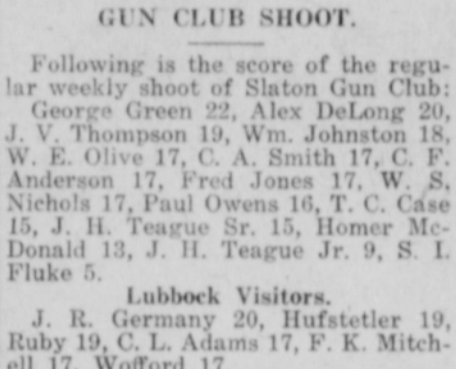
INCOME TAX FACTS THAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

Numerous errors in claims for deductions have been discovered in taxpayers' returns. To be allowed, deductions for losses must be confined to the following: Losses sustained in trade or business; losses sustained in transactions entered into for profit, though not connected with a trade or business; losses sustained of property not connected with trade or business if arising from fires, shipwreck, storms, or other casualty, or from theft. To the extent any of the above losses are compensated for by insurance they are not deductible.

To be allowed as a deduction in the return for 1920 a loss must have been actually sustained during that year. A taxpayer may feel certain that real estate owned by him is worth less than what he paid for it. A merchant may be convinced that certain stock cannot be sold unless marked below cost. In neither event, however, is he entitled to a claim for deduction until the loss is made absolute by sale or other disposition of the property. Claims for losses must conform closely to the wording of the statute. A loss sustained in the sale of an automobile purchased for personal use is not deductible, because it is not a transaction "entered into for profit." A loss sustained by a taxpayer in the sale of his home is not deductible for the reason that ordinarily when a man buys a residence and moves into it he has no intention of selling and has not "entered into a transaction for profit."

IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE.

Last week the Slatonite gave somebody a gentle reprimand because the order for the invitation cards of the senior class of the Slaton High School was placed with a firm out of Slaton. I wish to explain that the senior class alone assumes all responsibility for the placing of the order, because I knew nothing of it till after the order was placed. However, I should likely have done just as they did, for I had no idea that the Slatonite was equipped to do engraving.

Mr. Editor, WHY DID YOU NOT ADVERTISE? You know it is unusual for a country paper to equip a plant to do engraving, therefore advertising pays.

All the stationery and printing for the Slaton schools has been given to the Slatonite this year. The work has been of an excellent quality, and, with few exceptions, done as cheaply as could have been done anywhere.

Upon the kind solicitation of the editor I have been furnishing monthly school reports to the paper. I realize that it is helpful to the school for such reports to be published, but editors have advised me that the reports were valuable to them as news. They sometimes visit the schools and enlist the interest of different departments to select some one to make weekly reports. That has been the spirit in which I have been making school reports.

Mr. Editor, say something good about us now and call this even.

First, we never intimated that any one but the senior class had ordered printing from out of town. Our language could not be construed to mean that the superintendent, any member of the faculty, or of the school board had been guilty of this. It is customary though, for the superintendent to approve all orders placed by the seniors, and most firms require his signature to the contract or agreement. Otherwise it is lax business methods.

You say it pays to advertise. That shows a progressive spirit. But if a groceryman did not include pepper in his regular advertising would you think of going to a hardware store to buy it? If you wanted a printed article wouldn't you naturally think of a printing establishment. There is no good reason why a country office should equip its plant for engraving when we can sell it at the engraver's price, take 50 per cent profit, pay for it by the fifteenth of the month fol-

lowing date of invoice and take an additional 5 per cent cash discount. It requires no capital to handle business of that kind. Then why invest money in equipment to do that class of work? You cannot find a town in this section of the state of like size that has as much money invested in equipment as the Slatonite, and some towns with a larger population do not have half as much invested. And in every instance you will pay the highest price for printing in the poorly equipped shops.

It is a pleasure to publish anything about the school activities, and as you say, the editor of this paper personally invited you to give the paper any item that you cared to have mentioned. We fully realize that many things happen around schools that do not need publicity, therefore it is the desire and intention of the publisher of this paper to publish only the things that are best for the school. The editor does not recall that you ever gave him a personal invitation to visit the schools.

As you say, school notes certainly have a news value, but sometimes incidents occur at some schools that never find their way into public print that would make richer reading than the brand of news that the grocery boy peddles. It is our desire to always keep the best side of the schools to the front.

Members of the school board have repeatedly told us that the schools are flourishing, that they have a superintendent that is the equal of any they have ever had, that the schools are being conducted without any apparent friction from any source, and even though handicapped with crowded buildings and insufficient equipment that the schools are the best ever. You certainly deserve a great deal of credit for this condition.

LESSON FOR MARCH 6

JESUS AMONG HIS FRIENDS.

LESSON TEXT—Matt. 26:1-12.
GOLDEN TEXT—She hath done what she could.—Mark 14:8.
REFERENCE MATERIAL—Mark 14:3-9; Luke 7:36-50; John 12:1-8.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Showing Our Love for Jesus.
JUNIOR TOPIC—Giving Our Best.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Our Best for Christ.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Liberality of Love.

I. The Jewish Authorities Plotting the Death of Jesus (vv. 1-5).

1. Christ's Fourth Prediction of His Death (vv. 1, 2). He, with divine insight, predicted not only the fact of His death, but its time and manner. Death was no surprise to Him. For this He pre-eminently came into the world (Heb. 2:14). He calmly walked up to death.

2. The Authorities Plotting (vv. 3-5). In secret conclave they were plotting how they might silence His voice by putting Him to death. It was the divine purpose that He should go to death. They in their wickedness were plotting to do that which the divine plan had ordained. They try by subtlety to take and kill Him. Their plan was to do this after the Pass-over feast, lest there be an uprising among the people. Satan, through his conspirators, was trying to hinder the offering of the sacrificial Lamb at the appointed time.

II. Jesus Anointed by Mary of Bethany (vv. 6, 7).

For the identification of Mary see John 12:1-8 and Mark 14:3-9. This anointing occurred when Jesus was at meat in Simon's house. Mary had the keenest spiritual apprehension of all the disciples. By sitting at His feet in loving fellowship she obtained a grasp of truth which none of the other disciples did. She saw that His body was to be broken and that His precious life was to go out. She entered into fellowship with His sufferings and the joys of His resurrection. This is shown in this wonderful symbolic act of bringing her most precious possession and lavishing it upon Him. Knowing that no loving hand could minister to Him in that dread hour, she did this service in loving anticipation. It was the highest expression of love. Genuine love takes no account of cost—is not calculating.

III. The Indignation of the Disciples (vv. 8, 9).

The utter baseness of the disciples is in strange contrast with Mary's love. Judas Iscariot is the leader, but the whole apostolic company are led over. The spirit of fault finding is very contagious. The one whose heart is filled with base purposes can offer such plausible reasons for things that a whole company can be swept off their feet, not perceiving the real purpose underlying it all. The real thing that hurt Judas was the losing of the money which the ointment might have been sold for, not that he cared for the poor.

IV. Mary Defended by Jesus (vv. 10-13).

Jesus would not allow His most appreciative disciple to lie under the censure, so He came to her rescue. Though all the disciples censured her, He had nothing but the highest praise. If we can but have His praise, what need we care for the censure of men! He bestowed upon her the very highest praise possible when He said, "She hath done what she could." (Mark 14:8). In this defense Jesus teaches, according to Doctor Erdman:

1. That no gift to Him can be too great if made in grateful love (v. 10). "She hath wrought a good work on me."

2. Care for the poor and other duties which are of perpetual obligation may give way before an opportunity for service which cannot recur (v. 10). "The poor ye have with you always." Sometimes even charity is not the highest expression of Christian devotion.

3. Jesus appreciates the meaning and motive of our service (v. 12). He estimates them at their highest possible value and interprets them in the light of His own love and knowledge. He declared that the ointment poured upon Him was a preparation of His body for burial.

4. The influence of an act of Christian service will never cease (v. 13). The example of Mary is still filling the earth with the fragrance of loving service. Through this act of uncalculating love Mary's name has become immortalized.

As the result of this defense Judas is so stingingly rebuked that he has us away to betray his Lord.

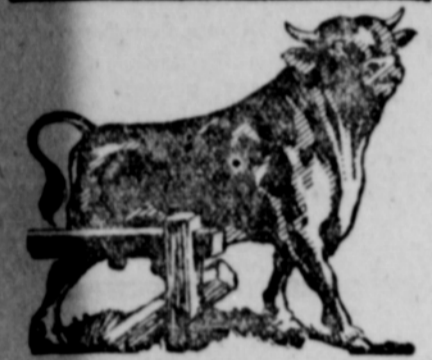
"Don't they look happy," she gushed. "But no wonder. Why, I remember my happiest days were when I used to wear short, little gingham dresses."

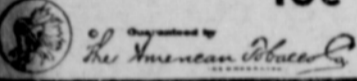

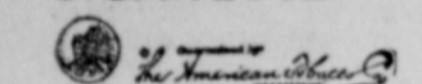

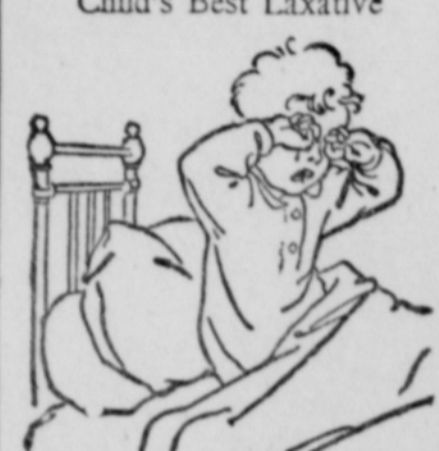

BOY SCOUTS

(Conducted by National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.)

"SPIRIT OF THE BOY SCOUT"

More and more is scouting inspiring painters, writers and sculptors to put into permanent form their conception of the practical service of the boy scouts and especially their conceptions of the idealism, the spirit, of the movement. In bronze and marble in a number of cities, boy scout tablets and statues of various kinds grace homes, private parks and public places. One of the most notable works of art of this nature is the beautiful Roosevelt memorial boy scout fountain erected in its grounds at Golf, Ill., by the Glen View club.

The latest endeavor of this kind is the inspiring statuette modeled by Robert Tait McKenzie, famous physician and sculptor of Philadelphia, which he has named "The Spirit of the Boy Scout" and has dedicated it to the Boy Scouts of America. Dr. McKenzie has been professor and director of the department of physical education in the University of Pennsylvania since 1904. As a sculptor he has exhibited at the Royal Academy and elsewhere in Europe and is the

creator of such notable statues as the Sprinter, Athlete, Competitor and the heroic figure of the Youthful Franklin on the campus of the University of Pennsylvania.

Replicas of his "The Spirit of the Boy Scout" are eagerly sought by scouts for their troop rooms and other meeting places. The headings of the twelve points of the scout law are lettered on the base of the statue.

NEW YORK SCOUTS CHASE DIRT.

The boy scouts of Greater New York have undertaken one big job—making and keeping the largest city in the world cleaner. Feeling urgent need of adding materially to its force of 800 volunteer "block captains," the Anti-Litter bureau of the Merchants' Association of New York recently sought the aid of the boy scouts' organization as the largest single force prepared for voluntary civic service, and the chief scout executive gave enthusiastic support to the plan, saying:

"Many propositions soliciting the co-operation of boy scouts in seemingly well-intentioned movements are declined almost weekly for one reason or another because they conflict with the fundamental principles of scouting, so it is indeed refreshing to have your clean-cut plan for city betterment presented to us and through us to the more than 17,000 Boy Scouts of America in Greater New York, who are the life blood of the local movement, as are the 381,000 registered scouts throughout the country the life blood of the national organization."

The objects sought are for scouts to do all they can to free the streets, sidewalks, arcways and vacant lots of unsightly litter and dangerous and unhealthful conditions; and also to familiarize themselves with the laws regulating streets and to call attention to infractions of the laws.

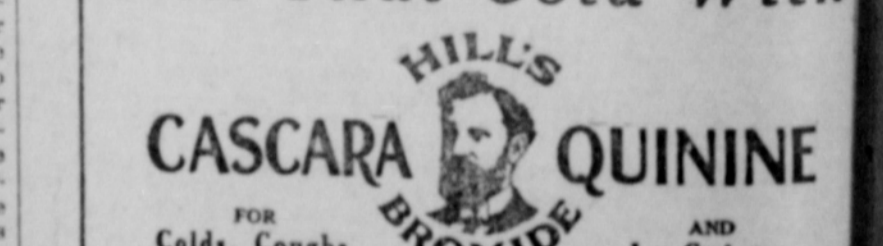
