Slaton Appeal To Commission Is Answered

Slaton's appeal for expediting construction of an interchange on US - 84 at its intersection with FM-400 has won approval from the State Highway Commission, it was announced last Friday by Clark Self Jr., city commissioner. Self also is a member of the Chamber of Commerce highway committee.

Self was notified by State Rep. Bill Parsley of Lubbock that the Texas Highway Department had issued an order for the work on the interchange south of Slaton "to proceed in the most feasible and economical manner."

A group of Slaton men, accompanied by Rep. Parsley, appeared before the highway commission in Austin Sept. 1 to appeal for an earlier construction date on the overpass. Dr. Lee Vardy was spokesman for the group, which also included Self and Earl Elden.

The local delegation also made a pitch for moving up the time schedule on a grade separation at FM-41, but apparently the commission did not feel it was an emergency situation as much as the FM-400 crossing.

A number of accidents, including two fatalities, have been recorded at the FM-400 crossing on US-84 since construction began on the new bypass. Slaton officials, first appeal brought a traffic light installation at the crossing.

Estimated cost of the project was tabbed at \$30,000. The total estimated cost of four proposed grade separations on the bypass around Slaton is \$1,285,000. One interchange is near completion but dates had been indefinite on the other three - at FM-400, FM-41 and the Cemetery Road.

No date has been set on the interchange at FM-400, but local officials are hopeful that final plans are approved and construction is underway in early 1965.

D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, told Rep. Parsley that the department had planned to complete the ultimate facility in stages - as revenues became available and as traffic loads required.

He added, however, that the highway commission felt that an emergency situation existed, as pointed out by the delegation, and that it would be desirable to allocate the money involved in the FM-400 crossing by borrowing funds from slow-moving projects elsewhere in the state.

Greer said the department was not yet in a position to estimate a date for the construction start, but "the work will be expedited in every way possible."

Slaton will be the site of the District Firemen's Association Convention next May, thanks to a successful bid Saturday by members of the local Volunteer Fire Department.

A group of 11 firemen and their wives attended a convention in Hereford, also winning a prize for the most members traveling the greatest distance to the meeting.

The Slaton group distributed plastic calendar cards with the words "Come Alive in '65, Let's Make Slaton the Convention Site for May, 1965." Later in a business session, Slaton received the convention bid.

While the men attended business sessions, the ladies were treated to a luncheon and style show. A barbecue dinner was served Saturday night.

City Budget of \$374,908 Proposed, Hearing Set

The City of Slaton budget for the fiscal year 1964-65, under study by the commission this week, and acted upon during a public hearing Monday night in the Commission room at the city hall.

Commissioners were present at the hearing, which was held at 7:30 p.m. and presided over by Secretary Robert W. Vardy. The budget is about \$40,000 less than last year's total, \$414,908.

The budget approved a 1964-65 rate of \$7.75, 702 and proposed a rate per \$100 assessed value of \$1.015.

The first moisture of any consequence fell last Thursday night, followed by a rain of about .50 of an inch Sunday. Another shower fell in the area Monday morning, totaling almost an inch in some areas for the period.

The rains came too late for most farmers on their current crops, but the moisture brightened spirits as the extended dry spell ended.

Cloudy, overcast skies and cool weather prevailed during the past week, signaling the approach of fall weather and the harvest of King Cotton.

The latest estimate of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and the Plains Cotton Growers Assn. is for 290,000 bales in Lubbock County. In the 23-county PGC area, and anticipated 1,961,000 bales await the harvest.

Cotton observers say the area crop could be expected to pump approximately \$319.6 million into the economy in terms of the gross values of the lint and seed at the farm level.

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almost \$200,000 over last year. The total budget, which includes interfund transfers, shows a breakdown of approximately \$162,110 for the general fund, \$128,232 for the water and sewer fund, \$17,725 for the cemetery fund, and \$67,770 for the interest and sinking fund.

Recommended breakdown on the \$2 tax rate is \$1.015 to the interest and sinking fund, 73.5 cents to general, 20 cents to Board of City Development and 5 cents to the cemetery association.

In other action Monday night, the commission approved an ordinance authorizing issuance of bonds - a follow-up on the recent \$30,000 bond election, approved earlier. It was the general feeling of the commission that no pay increases be considered for at least another year.

An ordinance to control dogs was passed on second reading and will require one more reading. Two new street light installations were also approved.

A report from the Cemetery Board, which included a recommendation for a salary increase for the superintendent, brought up a short discussion on city salaries. A proposal for investment of bond funds, hired a new employee for the water department, and discussed several other matters.

A proposal for leasing a city lot was discussed and tabled until further study could be made. The lot in question is 1.8 acres located in the south part of town.

The annual Slaton Lions Club broom sale is scheduled Thursday, Sept. 24, with proceeds going to aid the blind.

The big van, loaded with all types of brooms, mops and other household aids, will be located on the south side of the square in front of Lasater-Hoffman Hardware all day Thursday.

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Industrial Foundation Topic At Conference

Harry Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, conferred with members of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce industrial development committee here last Thursday.

Accompanying Clark was Larry Milner, a community coordinator for the TIC. The pair reviewed suggested steps leading to formation of an industrial foundation and seeking new industry to locate here.

Dr. Lee Vardy is chairman of the chamber's industrial committee. He pointed out that step 1 in a five-point program has been launched. This is to conduct a community improvement program.

Chamber President Doug Galassini explained that the city had several improvement projects completed or underway. These include a public works project approved by a bond vote, construction of a municipal golf course by private funds, and planned improvements in the city-county park.

Step 2 in the program is to conduct a research project of the city, followed by formation of an industrial foundation, securing potential industrial sites, and actually seeking the interest of industries.



Farm Welding Short Course Set In Slaton

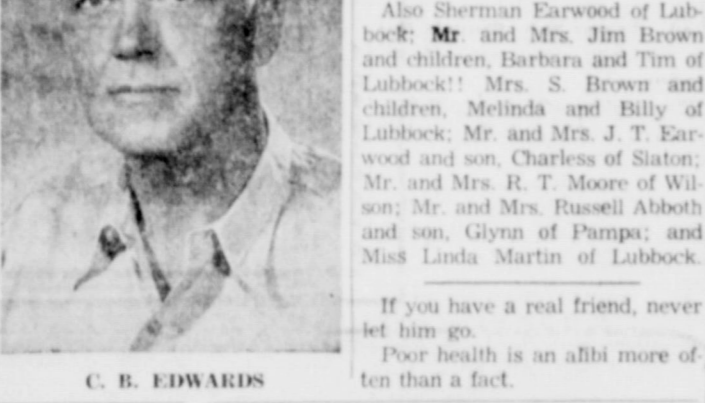
A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Monday through Thursday under the sponsorship of the Slaton High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Don Mitchell, teacher of vocational agriculture. C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College.

Edwards holds two college degrees, a B. S. in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M and an M.S. in Agricultural Education-Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma A&M; and in addition, has several graduate hours at the University of Texas. Mr. Edwards has had experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as supervisor of state schools. He has organized T & I programs and supervised the operation of several shops. Mr. Edwards has been with the Adult Specialist Program since its initiation in 1958.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Edwards and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area I supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview. Arrangements for adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Labay's office.

The short course at Slaton is scheduled to begin Monday at 7 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held Tuesday, through Thursday.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Edwards

will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction according to Mitchell.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call Jack Haliburton, Secretary, Slaton Young Farmers, or the teachers of vocational agriculture, Don Mitchell and Ed Gilliam. An entry fee of \$10 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training session.

Edwards states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding factors controlled by the operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrode preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hard-surfacing, and pipe welding.

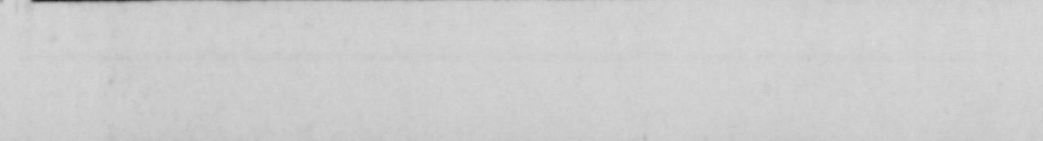

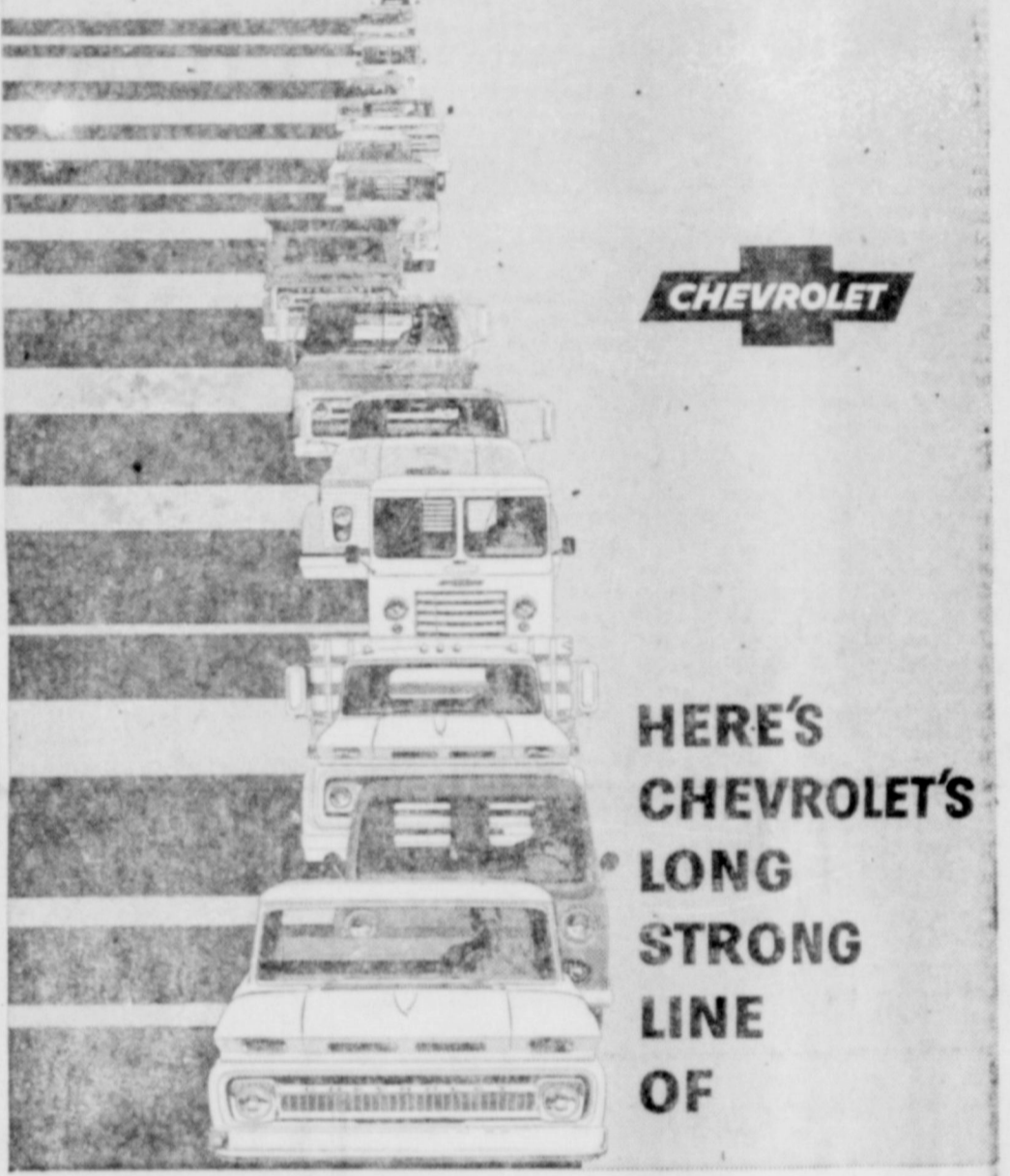

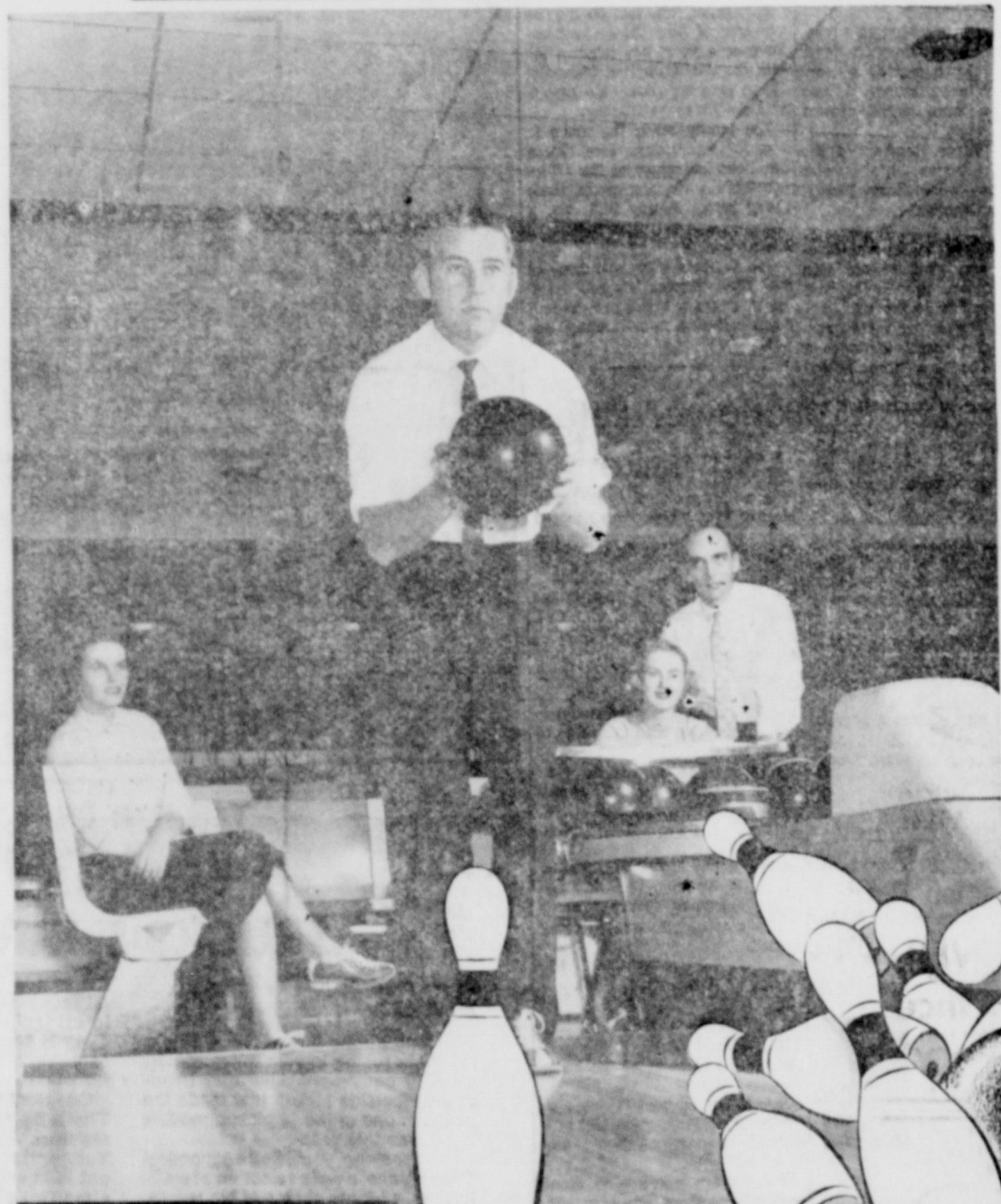

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Annual PP&K Contest Slated Here Oct. 10

Slaton area grade and junior high school boys from 8 through 13 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the nation in the fourth annual Punt, Pass & Kick competition which will culminate with a trip to Washington, D. C., and an appearance at a National Football League championship game for the top 12 winners.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Dealers of America and the National Football League, the Punt, Pass & Kick competition—or PP&K—will be staged in Slaton by Slaton Motor Co. with the Lions Club as local co-sponsors.

Tigers Go Scoreless Again, Idalou Captures 32-0 Victory

Taking advantage of four Slaton fumbles and two pass interceptions, the Idalou Wildcats struck for five touchdowns in the middle two periods and posted a one-sided 32-0 victory over the Tigers Friday night.

The non-district contest was played in crisp, cool weather before a near capacity crowd in Idalou's Reddell Stadium. It was the second straight loss for Slaton and also left them scoreless in two outings.

Idalou took full advantage of Tiger miscues, with all scoring drives starting on Slaton's end of the field. In the first half, the Wildcats marched 47, 23 and 20 yards for touchdowns after recovering Tiger fumbles.

After a penalty put the Tigers in a hole in the third period, Idalou launched a scoring drive from 39 yards out following a relatively short punt. Then the Wildcats clinaxed the scoring with a 49-yard drive after a pass interception.

Neither team scored in the first period after Idalou took the opening kickoff. The Tigers recovered a fumble on their 44 to halt Idalou's first sustained drive, but on the very next play Goad lost control of a pitchout and the Wildcats got the ball back on the Slaton 47. Idalou tallied in 11 plays with Chris Weems and Johnny Wood doing the damage on power drives off tackle. Weems hit paydirt on a 6-yard slant off right tackle. The extra-point kick by Weems was blocked by Gamble, with 10-28 left in the second quarter.

Three plays after the kickoff, Brake hit Smith with a short pass, but a lateral to Goad went astray and Idalou pounced on the ball at the Tiger 23. The Tigers stiffened and held the Wildcats to three

yards in three plays, but on fourth down Quarterback Raymond Ater lofted a pass into the end zone to Weems. The conversion try was wide but Idalou led by 12-0 with 7:47 left in the first half.

The ensuing kickoff bounced near the sideline and Victor Cristian was knocked loose from the ball when he tried to cover it. Idalou recovered on the Tiger 20 and started gainward again. It took eight plays with Ater passing to Ronnie DeBusk on a quick look-in pass for 5 yards and a touchdown. Weems' kick was wide and it was 18-0 with 3:50 left in the half.

Slaton took the second-half kickoff and finally chucked up its first 1st down of the night. Gamble and Brake hit for 11 yards to get the first down. Then a 17-yard run by Goad was erased by a penalty, and Brake finally had to punt from his own 13.

The kick traveled just 26 yards and Idalou cranked up another scoring drive. Conny Chance went 25 yards on a sweep around end to eat up most of the yard-

age, and Weems cracked over from the three several plays later. His kick made it 25-0 with 7:08 left in the third stanza.
