Public Meeting Postponed

The meeting that was scheduled for Tuesday night, July 7, at the high school auditorium has been canceled and rescheduled for tonight, Thursday, July 2, at the high school auditorium at 7:30 p.m. according to an announcement by Mayor J. Cain.

As was published in the Slatonite last week, purpose of this meeting is to hold an open discussion of Slaton's financial status and its needs.

Ordinance No. 248 calling for a special election on July 28 to give the voters of Slaton an opportunity to adopt or reject an amendment to the city's charter is published elsewhere in this newspaper.

Voters are urged to read the ordinance before attending the public meeting Tuesday night so that all aspects of the reasons for calling this special election may be examined and clarified.

Voters of Ward 1 will also elect a commissioner to serve the unexpired term of Truett Bownds who has resigned at the special election July 28.

If the charter amendment is accepted it will provide an increase of taxation from \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation to \$2.50.

Members of the Citizens advisory committee, composed of men from all parts of the city will be on hand at the meeting.

After a presentation outlining the needs for a municipal golf course in Slaton by Dr. Don Hatchett, 11 Slaton men indicated they would underwrite the project by signing a note for the purpose of financing the project. Total amount indicated pledged was \$22,000.

The Slatonite reported last week that a million dollars had been raised among the gins and cotton growers in this area to combat the boll weevil threat.

Stanley White Gains Reputation In Dawson Farming Operation

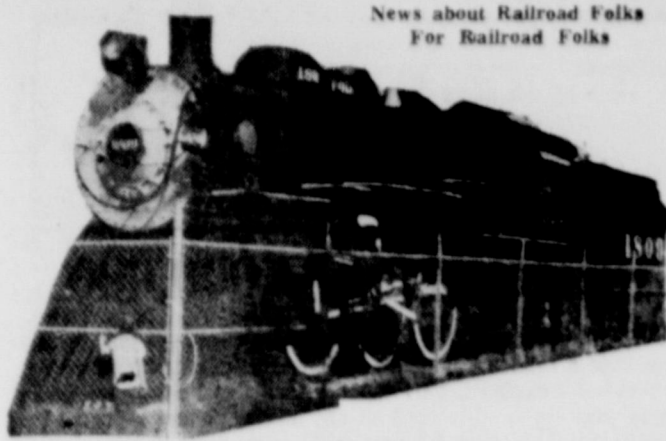
Stanley White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hilton H. White of Slaton, has gained quite a reputation in recent years for his hog farming operations.

Stanley's farm is in the Spangenburg community, in the southern part of Dawson county. He has 322 acres in cotton, 80 in pasture on which he runs about 40 head of cattle, and 500 acres in grain sorghum which he feeds his hogs. He needs about 350,000 pounds a year, and buys

the balance from his neighbors. This year, he is keeping 32 registered brood sows, and fattens them twice a year, which gives him about 500 pigs a year to sell. Most of them go to 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America in Texas livestock shows.

White has a deal with a Lamesa butcher through which several hogs are made into sausage each year and sold under a private brand name.

His feeding and housing arrangements have drawn attention from farm editors and magazines of the area. He has 10 feeding pens with a capacity of 25 pigs each. Every two adjacent pens slope to a common drainage canal, which takes manure and waste to pasture land when flushed. Each compartment is cleaned and sterilized when the pigs in it are sold.

AMENDMENT

An ordinance ordering an election in the City of Slaton, to be held on the 18th day of July, 1964, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Slaton for adoption or rejection, proposed amendment to the existing charter of the City of Slaton, designating the place in which said election is to be held, appointing presiding officer thereof, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Slaton deem it proper to submit the proposed amendment to the present City Charter to the qualified voters of said City; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, SECTION 1: That a special election be held in the City of Slaton, on the 18th day of July, 1964, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said City, for adoption or rejection the following proposed amendment to the existing Charter of the City of Slaton:

AMENDMENT
To amend the first paragraph of Section 1 of Article IV of the City Charter of the City of Slaton so that it will hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 1: TAXATION: The City shall have the power and is hereby authorized, annually, to levy and collect taxes not exceeding in any year Two Dollars (\$2.00) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of all real and personal property within the city limits, not exempt from taxation by the Constitution and laws of the State, or of the United States.

SECTION 2: That the polling place and presiding officer of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Said election shall be held in the Slaton Junior High School Building in the City of Slaton, Texas, and C. H. Whalen is appointed presiding officer (Judge) of said election. Phil Brewer is appointed alternate presiding officer for said election. The presiding officer is authorized to appoint a maximum of three clerks to serve in such election.

SECTION 3: Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Texas Election Code and all persons qualified to vote in said City under the law of this state shall be allowed to vote.

SECTION 4: That the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the Texas Election Code.

SECTION 5: That the form of the ballot to be used in said election shall be respectively, as follows:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
AMENDMENT
Do you vote to amend the present City Charter of the City of Slaton, by amending the first paragraph of Section 1 of Article IV of Charter of the City of Slaton so that it will hereafter read as follows:

Section 1: TAXATION: The City shall have the power and is hereby authorized, annually, to levy and collect taxes not exceeding in any year Two Dollars (\$2.00) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation of all real and personal property within the City limits not exempt from taxation by the Constitution and laws of the State, or of the United States.

YES (For the amendment)
NO (Against the amendment)
All voters desiring to vote for the adoption of the proposed amendment shall permit to remain on the ballot with regard to said amendment, if they desire to have the same adopted, the word "Yes" and those opposed shall permit to remain on their ballot with regard to said amendment, if they desire to have the same rejected, the word "No."

SECTION 6: A copy of this ordinance shall be sufficient notice of said election and notice of the time and place of holding said election shall be given by the publication of such notice in some newspaper of general circulation published in Slaton on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks; the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for such election.

SECTION 7: This ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure in view of the fact that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public business and property and provides for the proper and efficient daily operation of the administrative department of the government of the City of Slaton, Texas, and all other departments and the fact that the present Charter is inadequate creates an emergency, and an imperative public necessity for the suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read upon more than one day, and for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance and such rules are hereby suspended and it is ordered that such ordinance shall take effect immediately. Passed and approved this 22nd day of June, 1964.

ASCS Office To Measure County Crops

Crop reporters from the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service have started visiting farms to measure fields of cotton, feed grains and diverted acreage.

Charles G. Bragg, county office manager, said Monday the agency is putting 38 reporters and six supervisors in the field.

Twelve clerical workers in the ASCS office will compute the acreages plotted on aerial photos by the field reporters, mail out notices to farmers, and similar work.

Compliance with allowable acreages must be checked on about 2,600 cotton allotments in the county. Bragg says approximately 1,100 of these are usually overplanted to some extent. About 230,000 acres of cotton will be measured.

The ASCS manager said about 1,300 farms in the county entered the feed grains program. Most of these signed up to divert 40 per cent of their base feed grain acreage from feed grain production. About 40,000 acres diverted under this program will be measured. There will be about 75,000 acres in grain sorghum production.

Bragg said that excess cotton must be destroyed either by August 15, or within 15 days of the date of the notice of the official acreage, whichever is later.

If the farmer feels an error has been made, he can request a remeasurement within 15 days of the date of the notice of the crop acreages measured the first time. A deposit to cover cost of the remeasurement must accompany the request. It will be returned in the original measurements were in error by at least 3 per cent, or the remeasurement shows the farmer was within his allotment.

Plow-up credit will be given only for areas destroyed in a regular shape with no more than four sides. One side or end must be parallel to the rows or field boundary. This will not apply when the crop in an entire field is destroyed.

"LIGTAS," the second training exercise this year and the 27th since 1956, was part of a long-term schedule announced by SEATO Headquarters in November 1963, to maintain joint military defense.

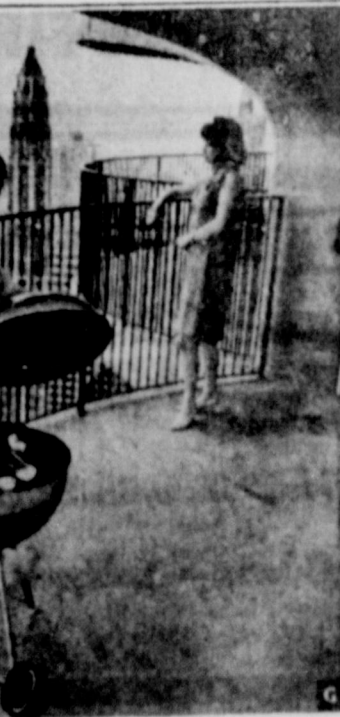

Four Killed In Car Wreck

Four persons were killed and twelve others injured, two critically, about 1:15 a.m. Sunday in a three-car wreck two miles north of Idalou on Farm to Market Road 400. The accident occurred during a rain-storm.

Dead are Mrs. Jose Olivarez, 43, Mr. and Mrs. Facunado Borrego, and their 16-year-old daughter Carmen, all of Route 1, Lubbock.

Eight of the injured were in the Borregos pickup truck. They were Facunado Borrego, Jr., 16; Culberto Borrego, 8; Joe Borrego, 14; Manuel Borrego, 10; Mrs. Angie Carrillo, 22; Jessica Carrillo, 1; Carmen Sahajun, 7; and Johnny Ortevas, 15.

The other four were Jose Olivarez, 46; Luisa Olivarez, 17; Daniel Olivarez, 15, and Ramon Olivarez, 2.

The Borregos pickup truck was traveling south when it was struck from the rear by a car driven by Robert E. Briggs of Lubbock, who was not injured. The pickup veered across the road and collided head on with a 1957 automobile driven by Olivarez. Mrs. Olivarez was thrown from the car and killed.

Both vehicles burst into flames, it being theorized the car caught from the burning truck. Mr. and Mrs. Borrego burned to death in the cab of the truck. Carmen Borrego and Mrs. Carrillo, her sister and a San Antonio resident, were also in the cab and sustained burns over about ninety per cent of their bodies. The others riding in the covered rear of the pickup were thrown out alongside the road.

All the injured were taken to Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. At 7 a.m. Carmen Borrego and Mrs. Carrillo were flown to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston, but Carmen died en route.

Engineer Civil Service Examinations

The U.S. Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling research and non-research positions in all branches of engineering in the Washington, D.C. area. In addition, positions in certain branches of engineering will be filled throughout the United States. The salaries for these positions range from \$5,650 to \$15,665.

This new examination incorporates revised qualifications standards and replaces previous examinations. Persons who have not yet been appointed from earlier examinations must pass this new one if they are still interested in being considered for these positions.

To qualify for non-research positions, applicants must have an engineering degree or an equivalent combination of work and professional experience. For positions involving highly technical research, development, or similar functions a bachelor's degree in engineering is a requirement. Additional professional experience and/or education are required for the higher grade levels.

Full details concerning the requirements to be met as well as instructions on how to apply are given in Announcement No. 332-B.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

Charged With Negligence

COTTON TALKS

LUBBOCK — The propulsive and continuous growth of the world fiber market is an accepted fact, and the cotton industry — of which we on the High Plains are a large part — has but to compete for that market in order to assure its own growth.

And, there is no key more strategic to cotton's being able to successfully compete in this market than research. Only through research can cotton attain the price and quality balance that will keep it in its role as a major contender among the fiber giants.

Probably unknown to some, a wide range of research projects under the direction of able and qualified researchers are constantly being carried out right here on the High Plains. Each year in June Plains Cotton Growers receives requests from research agencies in the area for financial support on a portion of these projects, and each is considered by this committee on the basis of what the results might mean in benefits to the High Plains cotton farmer. Grants have not yet been made on 1964 requests, but the total awarded in 1963 for production research came to over \$45,000. Heading up the Research Committee is Don Jones, Lubbock, a former Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Superintendent whose background gives him exceptional qualifications for the job. Annually the requests for grants exceed the more or less fixed PCG research budget, and it is the committee's job to select for support those projects which show the greatest promise.

As an indication of the extent and direction of production research being done in the area, here is a look at some of the work for which support was requested in 1964.

The South Plains Research and Extension Center asked for funds to continue a long-standing project on cotton breeding

and genetics, seeking superior varieties of cotton to produce higher yields, better quality and lower cost of production.

Emphasis of course is being placed on those varieties which would be suited to High Plains growing conditions.

The Center, too, is working toward solving seedling disease problems, attacking the issue from two sides — chemical control and the development of disease resistant varieties.

Studies on the influence of minimal temperatures on the growth and development of the cotton plant and cotton fiber are being made both by the Center and by the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, with each group of researchers approaching from slightly different angles. The objective here is to gain vital knowledge which will help overcome production difficulties stemming from short growing seasons and cool nights on the High Plains.

Both the Foundation at Halfway and the SPREC are working on soil fertility research with the Lubbock Center concentrating on investigating new fertilizer materials and refining the nutrient requirements on various High Plains soils as well as studying micro and secondary elements. The Halfway request for support is based on the need to know the extent of fertilizer carryover from year to year, investigation of the interaction of irrigation methods and fertilizer levels and the effect of starter fertilizers applied with the seed at planting.

One of the more intriguing studies going on is an attempt to develop "dwarf" cotton which can be grown, probably in narrow-row or broadcast systems, without loss of either quality or yield. At Halfway, the tack here is to reduce the size of the cotton plant through chemical sprays immediately following emergence, while the SPREC has developed an undersized cotton plant through breeding.

Reflecting concern in the area over declining water tables, a number of irrigation and water conservation studies are underway at both the above research stations, at Texas Tech, at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Spur and at the Southwestern Great Plains Station at Bushland.

At Bushland the project has a double objective in studying the chemical control of annual weeds in cotton — reduction of both water use and labor requirements. The Halfway group is looking at water use with an eye to getting maximum production from minimum irrigation through various systems

which call for interplanting cotton with grain sorghums and castors. At Spur, which is located in the center of a large dryland area, conservation of rainfall through bench levelling and making full use of water from contributing watersheds is being accentuated.

Texas Tech's request for support is for the examination of rainfall and temperature in a project titled "The Economic Influences of Weather On West Texas Cotton."

SPREC is examining various methods of conserving both rainfall and irrigation water but the newest study — sub-irrigation with plastic pipe — is perhaps the most interesting. The Center has developed machines for perforating and laying plastic pipe, and the project leader, Shelby Newman, feels that in time this could be one of the most significant contributions that research has made in the area.

It is impossible to list here all of the deserving research projects that are either going on now or are being planned. Details of these projects so briefly touched here, as well as other work by these agencies, will be enthusiastically supplied to all interested producers.

Burrus Jackson, General Chairman of the American Cotton Congress, recently said: "The solution to cotton's basic problems lies within the industry's efforts in its own behalf. . . ." and the research being carried out here is certainly an indication the High Plains is willing to do its part.

Education

Texas Association of County School Superintendents now meeting at College Station has before it a proposal to replace county superintendents with 85 educational districts. Ten of the most populous counties would form their own districts. Each district would include several counties, several school districts, and cover a radius of 150 miles.

Districts would provide specialists, such as school nurses, for common and independent school districts. Each would elect a board, appoint its superintendent and staff of specialists.

Texas now has 146 elected county superintendents, four appointed by county boards, and 100 ex-officio county superintendents. El Paso County abolished the office last year.

Proposal Opposed By Sportsmen

A proposal by Parks and Wildlife law enforcement director J. B. Phillips that .22 rimfire ammunition be made legal for hunting deer, elk and other big game in Texas, has drawn opposition from most sportsmen.

There is no doubt the .22 long rifle cartridge will kill deer at ranges up to 100 yards when handled by an expert, but the average hunter could be expected to wound animals which would escape to die slowly.

The three-man Parks and Wildlife Commission meets at Austin Friday to consider the proposal.
