I believe that prayers in the public schools on a voluntary basis are in keeping with the great traditions upon which this country was founded. Americans must not let this country be weakened by attacks upon its great spiritual heritage. Vicious attacks in the courts on prayer in the school or on any reference to God in our lives, must be repudiated.




