B. H. Bollinger, retired railroad engineer appeared as clear-cut winner Tuesday in the special called election to select a city commissioner for Ward 3. Unofficial tally gave Bollinger 167 votes, against 131 for incumbent J. E. Eckert, Jr.

In the regular April 2nd election, the Ward 3 candidates each polled 104 votes. The total 298 votes cast this week represented a 90 increase from the April balloting in that Ward.

Bollinger will take the oath of office at a special meeting of the commission called for this Friday at 7 o'clock in the evening, according to Wednesday announcement by Mayor Jonas Cain. Official canvass of votes will be made at that time. Also, Mayor Cain states, city finance discussion will be lunched at this called session.

Bollinger, a Slaton resident for 49 years, has been with the Santa Fe Railway for 52 1/2 years, retiring three years ago as a locomotive engineer.

Mr. and Mrs. Bollinger live at 125 South 4th Street in Slaton, and they have reared six daughters here, all of whom attended local schools and have since married and move away.

The newly-elected commissioner served previous tenure in the same city capacity, holding the commission post during years 1955-'58. Bollinger, a member of the Baptist Church, is active in the Masonic Lodge, holding the 32nd degree, and is a Shriner. In a statement to the Slatonite he pledged full study of the needs of the city, acting to best of his knowledge and ability for the welfare of the community.

County Audit Is Given Go-Ahead Commencement At Wilson Friday

An outside audit of Lubbock County funds for the year 1962 was authorized Monday morning at regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court.

Judge Bill Davis pointed out that the audit was authorized not because of any suspicion of irregularities, but to comply with sound business practices.

Retained to conduct the audit were C. A. White, R. D. Saffie, C. W. Smith and Co., certified public accountants, doing business as Cornell and Company.

Actual commencement of the audit should be within about two weeks, Judge Davis stated. The Commissioners Court is to meet in special session today, Thursday, with Haynes and Kirby, architects, to open bids and award contracts on remodeling work in the old courthouse.

In other action at the Monday meeting, payment of \$33,389.29 in special bills was authorized. All members of the court were present including Judge Davis and Commissioners George Green, Les Derrick, Alton Brazell and Lamb.

On May 21, 1963, Susan Lovelady will receive her diploma from Slaton High School. This is not much news to most people but for Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Lovelady, this ends a long history of children in the Slaton Schools.

Thirty-three years ago their first-born, William, "Boots" was a first-grader at East Wad. Each year since, there has been one or more of their children in Slaton Schools.

"Boots" was taken before he finished high school; Scott graduated about three years later leaving myself to finish in 1949. Jimmy joined the Marines his senior year and had to become a high school graduate USMC style.

Mary Jane, their first daughter, finished with somewhat better grades than any of the boys, in 1958. Mike, the "baby boy," got to walk the aisle on commencement night last year.

Now on the 21st of this month, just a few days from now, Susan their last, will bring an end to this lengthy chore of trying to educate a family.

To me it is almost sad to terminate such a long period of rushing at least one kid off to school. What will Mrs. Lovelady do each morning about 8:30. Perhaps she can watch the "Tonight Show" and then sleep late or maybe someone could loan her one of their children. I know she can do a good job if any of you are interested. She knows the answers to all excuses and objections. She has had 56 years of spelling, 14 years of algebra, 28 years of English, memorized about 3000 lines of poetry and knows lines in a minimum of 9 plays. She is a fair boxing coach as well as a darn good short-stop. Cooks like a dream and is as understanding as a minister; she can wash deeper in the ear, without damage to the brain, than any surgeon in the world.

Please if you can, just to give her something to do about 8:30, send your child over so she can send someone to school. They will always remember the joy of each day. I do.

money or else, is about as certain as it would be if all the taxpayers were allowed to vote whether they wanted to keep on giving it. I don't think the Farm Program can be killed completely, but it will have to be better controlled if continued. The controls which have been granted haven't worked since World War Number Two, so the argument is that more might. Surpluses have accumulated, number of farms and farm laborers cut in half, number of unemployed increased.

In 1935 there were 80 farms to each Dep't. of Agriculture employee; now it's about 28 to 1. I was playing golf that year with a boy who inherited a prosperous city business and two farms. County Agent came to the club, asked him not to say anything about the check he had received, because they wanted "the first triple-A check" to go to a Dirt Farmer. He agreed, and I resented it because he won sixty cents from me that afternoon. Some of the Farm Babies that were never weaned off the Farm Formula are too fat for the bassinet now.

In 1961, the four largest cotton loans were made to corporations around Pecos. Halsell Land & Cattle Co., postoffice Shallowater, got \$35,000, and Estes Enterprises, postoffice Girvin, \$23,000 for not planting grain sorghum. Most everybody knows where Billie Sol lives; Ewing Halsell's residence is San Antonio. The little farmer accepts the controls—the big one hires a lawyer.

When the Farm Bill passed Congress last September 202-199, only two Republicans voted for it. Phil Weaver of Nebraska, who got an \$18,500 job in the Department of Agriculture in January, and H. Carl Anderson of Minnesota, who was indicted but hasn't been tried yet for selling mining stock to Mr. Estes. It would have been 200-201 if they have voted the other way.

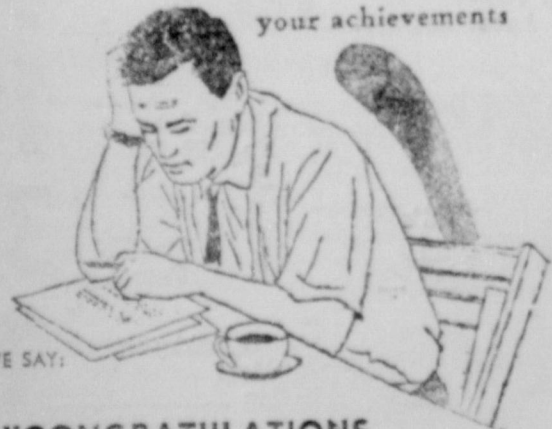

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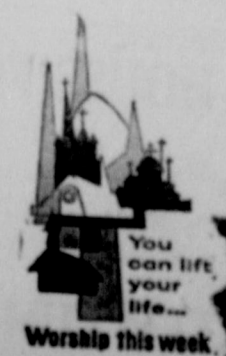

Cut each loaf of bread diagonally, almost through to bottom crust, into 12 equal-sized slices. Combine butter, mayonnaise, cheese, onion, Worcestershire sauce and paprika. Spread 1 1/2 teaspoons cheese-onion mixture between each slice of bread. String loaves on a long, sharp-pointed skewer, inserting the skewer through the center of each one. Heat over hot coals, turning to brown bread on all sides.
