





Dickens Water District Votes \$100,000 Bond Issue

Voters of the Dickens County Water Control and Improvement District No. One approved a bond issue of \$100,000 in an election last Saturday. The bond issue, along with a maintenance tax on the the district, was approved by 116-5 and 116-10, respectively.

The bond issue and maintenance tax will be on a 16 or 17 earthen dam flood control project. The Federal government will participate in the program that will cost about \$1,500,000. The series of structures will be built up and down the Duck Creek water shed, including its tributaries.

A hearing before members of the State Board was held April 25. The state board is expected to hand down a priority rating for the proposed flood control project, sometime in July or August. The work will be done in cooperation with the local Soil Conservation office.

The bond election completed some months of planning and work.

The annual cost of the project is expected to be about \$38,000. While the benefits received from the flood control project will be about \$72,000 annually.

Some 2,000 acres in the flood plan have been lost to erosion. Flood damages have been set at about \$145,000 annually with a major flood occuring on an average of once every five years and a minor flood, each year.

Channel improvement on Duck Creek will also be made. It is reported that when all structures are full of water, that water released gradually, will make Duck Creek a live sream about three feet deep and 30 feet wide. Irrigation wells will be recharged through out the flood control system.

It is possible that some of the structures will be used for recreational purposes, as well as a municipal water supply for our town.—Texas Spur.





Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

The following changes in the charges for long distance calls between points within the State of Texas will be made effective June 15, 1963:

Basic rates for station-to-station calls between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. between points more than 82 miles apart will be reduced from 5 to 50 cents, with a maximum charge of 80 cents for a threeminute call, anywhere within the State of Texas.

Station-to-station rates remain unchanged on calls of less than 83 miles, and on calls made before 9 p.m. In Texas, the lower "after 9" rates will not apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.

Person-to-person rates will not be changed on calls of 56 miles or less.

Basic rates for most person-to-person calls between points more than 56 miles apart will be increased five cents for both day and evening calls.






