

Nearly 200 Register Here At V.F.W. Convention

Mosser Leads Close Race Over Meurer And Weaver

Closest of all election contests in the primaries Saturday was the race for Slaton constable. Unofficial totals showed James Mosser leading with 334 votes; Allen Meurer, the incumbent with 330; Cliff Weaver with 329, and Donald Carpenter last with 242. The two top men will try against each other in the June 6 run-off election, but until the returns are canvassed officially Tuesday night, no one knows which two of the three will lead.

21,889 votes were cast in the Lubbock County Democratic primary, and 2,832 in the Republican.

Governor John Connally received 15,447 for a second term; Don Yarborough 5,031. In the state, Connally had 1,113,278

401 to Cox' 45,146.

The Republicans held a poll for preferences for their presidential nomination, which of course, had no legal effect. Goldwater ran far ahead with 101,683. Write-in candidate Henry Cabot Lodge was second with 11,803; Rockefeller 5,945; Stassed 5,158; Nixon, 5,253; Margaret Chase Smith, 4,748; others totalled about 1,000.

All around, both party elections went off without much of the usual friction. Fewer than the usual number of ballots were mutilated or challenged. Both parties meet in Lubbock Tuesday night to make the official count of the returns.

The Democrats will hold their county convention at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, May 9, at O. L. Slaton Junior High School in Lubbock. The Republicans, who found themselves far short of enough room in the court house in 1962, will meet at 2:30 p.m. the same day at Lubbock Christian College.

Slaton Man Serving On Navy Carrier

Jams H. Gravell, airman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Gravell of 915 West Jean, Slaton, Tex., is serving aboard the anti-submarine aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge which March 30 searched for nine passengers of a privately owned aircraft which was forced to ditch in the Pacific Ocean.

The plane was last heard from on March 28 when it reported an engine fire on its flight from Hawaii to Los Angeles. At sunset on April 1, the search was called off and the passengers were presumed lost.

Kearsarge normally operates as the hub of an anti-submarine "Hunter-Killer" group composed of air, surface, and subsurface units designed to find and destroy enemy submarines.

Ethel Waters Will Sing At Free Concert



Boll Weevil Control Program Plans Launched At Lubbock

Operational plans for carrying out next fall's giant "Diapause" boll weevil control program on the High Plains were laid in Lubbock April 16 at a meeting of the boll weevil Steering, Area-wide and Technical Advi-

ory Committees, sponsored by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock.

Entomologists at the meeting reaffirmed their statement that such a program is an urgent necessity for the Plains area, and discussed plans on extensive surveys this summer for determining the extent of acreage to be sprayed this fall. Forty-five persons attended the meeting, including entomologists and other top officials from both State and Federal levels. The boll weevil experts have recommended the Diapause program to the Plains as the best known method to keep the weevil from invading the entire High Plains as he has other areas, and they are working closely with area committees and Plains Cotton Growers to assure the program's success.

In a report on the progress of weevil overwintering research W. L. Owen, Entomologist at the Texas Agricultural Research and Experiment Center, said a total of 35 live weevils have been recently collected from the weevil "cages" that were installed last fall. Of the total, 16 were found in Crosby County, seven in Garza, nine in Dickens and three in cages on top of the Caprock near Close City. According to Owen, research so far has given the definite indication that Shimmy Oak is the habitat in which most weevils hibernate below the Caprock.

Early "trap" crops of cotton are being planted to give more information on weevil overwintering, and the information should be complete before commercial cotton crops begin to square, Owen said.

Dr. J. C. Gaines, head of the entomology department at Texas A&M emphasized the importance of in-season weevil control below the Caprock. He explained that this would reduce the number of weevils migrating to the High Plains and thus minimize the acreage needing treatment this fall.
